# ALARMING AUDIT

An asset condition revaluation

performed by Alexandrina Council has revealed a significant increase in depreciation, which could potentially have an impact on upcoming rates.

Council undertook the revaluation of a several critical asset classes in the 2023

financial year, including sealed and unsealed roads, pathways and kerb ramps, and kerbs, which revealed significant increases in asset values and annual depreciation.

Affirmed revaluations have resulted in an increase of valuations of \$157 million,

with council's total assets across all classes increasing in value from \$496 million to \$665 million.

A Goolwa resident with an infatuation for the love bug has had his dream of owning his own Herbie become a reality.

As previously reported in *The Southern Argus*, Jack Colman is a 19-year-old with autism and an intellectual disability who found love with the renowned pop culture icon 'Herbie' and hoped to turn this passion into a courier service named '53 Express'.

The initiative would see Jack, alongside his support worker, provide delivery services for individuals and businesses in the Fleurieu and southern suburbs of Adelaide.

It seemed like a faraway dream for Jack and his family, but with the help of Car Hub Australia, it recently became a reality.

When the team saw Jack's story, they set out on a mission to find the perfect vintage Herbie model, and after three weeks of

calling nearly every Volkswagen (VW) restoration place and club around Australia, they found success with the Australian VW Performance Centre in Victoria who had a customer with a complete original 1967 VW Beetle.

The 57-year-old car was then picked up by Car Hub's Tom Traynor, driven to Stacked signs for finishing touches, and personally delivered to Jack's door.

Jack's mum, Lauren Clifford, said it took a while for it to sink in.

"It was just too unbelievable that someone would just buy Jack a car," she said.

"I don't think he quite comprehended - which I did think was going to happen - that it was actually his.

"It was a stinking hot day, but he pretty much sat in the car for the rest of the afternoon."

With the car now in their hands, all that's left to do now is get the business started.

The family has obtained insurance, had a compliance check performed, and paid for the registration with the help of donations provided through the GoFundMe page.

Ms Clifford said it's "slow-going" but they are moving forward with setting up the service.

"We're thinking we may turn it into a non-profit instead of a full-fledged business because the goal ideally is to have Jack go out into the community, so we're just trying to figure out the legalities and process of that at the moment," she said.

"We're just trying to make sure Herbie is ready and up for the job, which I have no doubt he is.

"It's a beautiful car and it's so well-

Goolwa resident Jack Colman is a 19-year-old with autism and an intellectual disability who found love with the renowned pop culture icon 'Herbie' when he was only three years old.

He watched the Lindsay Lohan version first when he was about three, and he was just obsessed," Jack's mum, Lauren Clifford, said.

"It was a way for him to connect with my dad who was a car enthusiast, so to become a thing with him and grand-dad to watch."

Since then, Jack's affinity for Herbie has increased ten-fold, and he never misses an opportunity to greet the love bug when he sees him around town.

He calls the ones that aren't covered in Herbie stickers, Herbie's girlfriend, but he still goes and talks to them in the parking lot," Ms Clifford said.

"It's not for some very embarrassing moments when the owners come out and let's get the license of the car."

"We go 'He's just obsessed, he's autistic' and they're usually like 'oh, and some of them will be like 'I can take him for a ride around the block if you want'."

"The 'Think you, but he won't get out' - Jack's love for the street racer has worked in his favor at times, helping her to him into things such as taking his medication, but mostly, it's brought joy to his life.

His paediatrician wanted him to change medications, and... he was about seven and eight and had never read a book before, and he was like 'I can do it!'" Ms Clifford said.

There was a collectible Herbie at the hobby shop in the Murray Shopping Centre - it was \$250 - and I said to Jack 'I will buy you that Herbie if you swallow the tablet and he swallowed it straight away."

"He sat there so much for me from Herbie, it's gotten to the point where all of his support here's your part of - its something, but it's not too massive (or) too much for him."

"When it comes to the elderly community, a lot of those people are very lonely, so if you're sitting at home and don't have a lot of visitors, and you need someone to drop off transport and there was a guy who, not sure if he was autistic, but he had some form of disability and I watched him hop out of the truck - he wasn't driving, went to the back, get a package out, went to the window and got it hand it up, then the guy gave him the thumbs up, and then he walked up and he handed the package over me," she said.

"That's when the idea came to me that Jack could potentially have his car that he always wanted."

"Obviously, Jack can't hold a driver's licence, but he has support workers that can drive the car, then they can help make sure the package is going to the right place, find the address and all that kind of stuff."

"My original thought was that he could here's your part of - its something, but it's not too massive (or) too much for him."

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"That's when the idea came to me that Jack could potentially have his car that he always wanted."

## Long Valley Road leaves users 'bemused'

A Strathalbyn local who first raised concerns about the delays to works on Long Valley Road last October says road users are 'bemused' by the time it is taking for the project to be completed.

Allan Ivory said while works were "getting better", he and his friends fail to understand why the overtaking lane heading south was not "fully open".

"I don't know why that is," he said.

"It looks finished to me; you come down one lane and it changes over to the other.

"It is just reduced to one lane and nothing is happening, and it seems confusing to everyone because no one can understand it.

"Everyone is bemused; they just can't work out why... the southern overtaking (lane) for all intents and purposes looks like it is finished, (but) it is just not fully open."

A Department for Infrastructure and Transport spokesperson told *The Southern Argus* works on the southern overtaking lane were now expected to be completed in mid-2024, and remediation works on the northern overtaking lane (from the railway line to Gemmell Road) were expected to be completed in mid-to-late 2024.

The spokesperson said works on the southern overtaking lane north of Long Valley Cottages Road to south of Mine Flat Road began in May 2023.

"Traffic was switched to the new north-bound lanes in February this year, and pavement rehabilitation has commenced on the south-bound lanes, and in the new north-bound and south-bound turning

areas," they said.

"The new overtaking lane on Long Valley Road completed in May 2023 currently has one lane closed due to damage that occurred after heavy rainfall last winter.

"Remediation work is almost complete on drainage improvements, which will assist in directing water away from the road reducing the impact of excess water on the pavement surface.

"The pavement has been assessed and tested, and a final remediation solution developed.

"Pavement remediation works are currently being scheduled."

The spokesperson added heavy rainfall last winter caused damage to a section of the northern overtaking lane after its construction, meaning pavement investigations could not be completed until warmer drier conditions occurred.

## Bus proposal accelerates forward

The wheels are in motion for a community bus service for Strathalbyn and surrounding communities after Alexandrina Council approved a \$45,000 loan for the Strath Neighbourhood Centre to purchase a vehicle.

During Monday night's council meeting, a motion was passed for the loan for the term of five years at a rate of six per cent interest, for a mini-bus that can generate a complementary or low-cost service for Strathalbyn, Langhorne Creek, Milang and possibly Ashbourne and Clayton Bay.

The proposal was originally brought to councillors during February's meeting, but was adjourned to this week.

Strath Neighbourhood Centre Manager Mal Sutcliffe said the concept is in

the early stages, but was "delighted" councillors saw its merit.

He is seeking guidance from the Department of Transport and

Infrastructure, and will take the proposal to the centre's committee of management.

"I think there are a lot of people around the town who want to see it happen," he said.

"Our community has been saying - for the nearly two years that I've been in the job - that we need transport around Strath.

"That's what's given me the motivation, and now we're getting a little bit closer, I think there's a bit of excitement around the town.

"We now need to look into the community (to get them) on board because without community, we're not going to get this off the ground."

A lack of transport has been an ongoing issue for the town, and earlier this month, a three-month trial of a taxi service began in Strathalbyn to meet the needs of an ageing population.

## Sealing works to be considered for Mt Compass road

Sealing a portion of a Mount Compass connector road could be the solution to easing pressure off a nearby junction that causes "considerable frustration" for locals, travellers and heavy transport.

Bahloo Glen Road, which connects the Victor Harbor Road opposite the 'strawberry farm' and Lanacoona Road to Nangkita Road via a short section of Enterprise Road, currently has 4.5km of its 6km length unsealed.

The road was recently reassessed under the road hierarchy, and traffic flows indicated it should have a rural connector status rather than the previous rural local classification.

At last month's Alexandrina Council meeting, West Ward councillor Bill Coomans requested the bitumen sealing of a 1.1km section of Bahloo Glen Road from the currently sealed section at the Victor Harbor Road end of the road to the junction with Proctor Road be considered in the 2024-25 budget considerations.

High-level estimates of design and construction costs for the works are projected at approximately \$3 million.

"It's a road that's been on my to-do list for a long time," Cr Coomans said.

"The road, if sealed, will not only provide a much-needed service to our ratepayers, but will also take some pressure off the Victor Harbor/Nangkita Road junction which is currently causing considerable frustration for locals, travellers and especially, the heavy transport that uses Nangkita Road as an authorised through-road."

However, a council report stated the upgrade would benefit a small number, with others on the road still having to use the unsealed section.

"It is unlikely the sealing of this portion of Bahloo Glen Road would divert traffic away from the Nangkita Road/Victor Harbor Road intersection as undertaking this alternate route would still require travelling on a portion of unsealed roads," the report read.

"In addition, Nangkita Road is a gazetted heavy vehicle transport route and much of the traffic using this road would not be permitted to deviate from it.

"Administration has made recent enquiries with (the Department of Infrastructure and Transport) DIT regarding an upgrade to the Nangkita Road/Victor Harbor Road intersection.

"DIT has advised that an upgrade to this intersection is not a priority for them at this time."

Despite this, councillors agreed to include it in upcoming budget considerations.

# Council depreciation increases following asset revaluation

Annual depreciation has increased from \$6.2 million to \$10.6 million, meaning a further \$4.4 million depreciation will be charged on an ongoing basis.

“Council doesn’t renew all its assets at once, but the new figures have shown that our forecast depreciation figure for roads, kerbs, footpaths, and associated infrastructure has risen by \$4.4m,” Chief Executive Officer, Nigel Morris, said.

“Depreciation measures the decrease in value of an asset over time and we account for it, so we set aside sufficient funding to maintain and renew our assets into the future as they wear out.

“Council is responsible for maintaining 793km of unsealed roads, 528kms of sealed roads, 120kms of pathways and 303kms of kerbs, so the material price increases really add up.”

As a result of increased depreciation, council faces two issues when it comes time to adopt the upcoming rates – the first being the additional depreciation charge, which

will be ongoing, and the culminative effect of not increasing rates by the full CPI in 2020-21 and the current year, which has put council 5.8 per cent behind the Long-Term Financial Plan.

“This higher depreciation amount must be faced, if council is to be able to properly maintain and replace its assets in timeframes the community expects,” Audit and Risk Committee Independent Chairperson, Alice McCleary, said.

“If council chooses not at least to begin to ‘catch-up’ on its rates increases this year, council’s purchasing power will continue to erode and we will have to do less with less.

“Any less than this may begin to cover the CPI-under recovery of past years, but will not begin to ameliorate the additional ongoing depreciation charges, leaving them to be an accumulating drag on council finances and sustainability.

“I would like to thank all the staff and consultants who were involved in this very complex and best-in-class asset revaluation process, and to council itself who agreed

to advance funds for the project last year, despite having many other important spending priorities.”

At Monday night’s meeting, council adopted the Audit and Risk Committee’s recommendation to draft the 2024-25 Annual Business Plan and Budget with an assumption of an average 8.3 per cent rate increase, so council can start addressing the impact of the asset revaluation, while continuing to service the community in a financially prudent manner.

The draft budget will be presented at next month’s Audit and Risk Committee meeting, before being recommended for public consultation at a special council meeting in April and then likely adopted in June.

Mitigating strategies for the impact of the depreciation increase is being considered at the next Audit and Risk Committee meeting.

Remaining asset classes – CWMS, stormwater, and parks and open spaces – will also need to be similarly revalued during the 2023-24 financial year.

Council noted the process had

emphasised the importance of more frequent condition-assessed asset audits and financial evaluations.

“The line has been drawn in the sand we now have reliable data to manage our major assets,” Mr Morris said.

“We have a better understanding of where we are and are now better placed to work with council and community to plan for the future.

“Our Independent Auditor advised that councils across the country are facing an increase in costs for fuel, bitumen, and concrete in the range of 30 to 60 per cent.

“As we prepare for the next financial year 2024-25 budget process, it was recommended by council’s external auditors to the Audit Committee that ‘it is unwise and inappropriate to pass sharp increases in rates onto ratepayers in response to significant changes in depreciation estimates’.

“Whilst some increase in rates will be required, appropriately responding requires caution and restraint.”

## Lights out at Goolwa and Hindmarsh Island

A Goolwa restaurant had to discard an estimated \$4000 worth of food and close over the busy long weekend due to a power outage, while 1600 Goolwa and Hindmarsh Island households and businesses also lost power days later.

Hays Street Bar and Kitchen’s electricity switched off near the end of dinner service on Saturday, March 9, and diners finished their meals by phone torch lights then left.

With soaring hot temperatures, the restaurant discarded an estimated \$4000 worth of food, and over the long weekend, they were unable to replenish their stock.

The restaurant decided to close for the anticipated busy Sunday and Monday, losing at least 200 diners and wages from preparing the stock.

“I was a bit flat and down the next day about it, not about the money but you feel like you’re disappointing people,” owner, Dan Cahill, admitted.

“I feel like we’ve been really lucky and supported by the community, (and) I can’t blame anyone... sometimes you get unlucky.

“My intention is to get people in to give them a good experience.

“If people come in and have a good time, you get fulfilment out of that.”

After investigation, he was told the fuses and wires had melted in a nearby power pole.

“An electrician said when wires get hot, they get a worse connection, and it was a hot day, and they work harder which makes them hotter and eventually they get to a point where they melt,” Mr Cahill said.

“It was hot – people would have been drawing higher amounts than usual from their aircons.

“It is what it is – these things happen.”

Hays Street Bar and Kitchen applied for compensation through SA Power Networks.

An SA Power Networks spokesperson said the circumstances require a detailed

investigation and under current law, compensation applies in situations where SA Power Networks was negligent or had not made best endeavours.

The restaurant reopened on March 14, the same day that 1600 customers across Hindmarsh Island and Goolwa lost power due to an insulator failure.

The power went off initially just after 8am, then was restored for about half of those customers about 45 minutes later.

Power was fully restored to Hindmarsh Island at 11.27am and final restoration for the remaining customers in Goolwa occurred at 12.15pm.

## Mt Barker continues to grow

The Mount Barker District Council population is set to grow by 44 per cent over the next 22 years.

According to Informed Decisions – a company of demographers, social researchers, urban economists and industry sector experts – the current district population is 44,772, forecast to grow to 64,838 by 2046.

The growth rate was 4.49 per cent in the last year.

The Mount Barker growth area is set to soar from 7561 to 23,954 by 2046.

The outer district, excluding Mount Barker, Littlehampton, and Nairne, is steadily growing at around 0.5 per cent per year.

This growth aligns with Plan SA, projecting a state-wide population of 2.25 million by 2046.



# Deteriorating Mount Compass courts 'unsafe' for players

The deterioration of the Mount Compass netball courts has reached a level that if left untreated, could make them unviable to play on next season, prompting the local club to implore Alexandrina Council for help with fundraising for their remediation.

The Mount Compass Netball Club is a family-focused club that is continuing to expand, with seven senior and nine junior teams expected to play this season.

The club uses the community-owned courts for games, but in recent years, the state of the grounds has deteriorated significantly, with cracks appearing in the surface, grass and weeds growing out of the court, faded markings and poles sticking out. This has caused safety concerns for players.

"We have a really strong emphasis on our juniors coming up through the club, and providing them a safe and secure place to play netball," Mt Compass Netball Club representative and Life Member, Elissa Fisher, said during February's council meeting.

"I particularly value the importance of this as I'm a high school teacher in a suburban area, and I see the benefit of children growing up and playing sport in a small town.

"It keeps children safe, resilient and

focused on staying healthy, both with their mind and body, so keeping the club thriving and maintaining good facilities is crucial for children to stay safe and engaged, and find a somewhere they fit."

It has also left Mount Compass out of the race to host finals in the foreseeable future.

"We are also located in what I would like to say is the hub of the Great Southern Netball Association (GSNA) – the most central club," Fisher said.

"In previous years, this has been a strong benefit to us, as we have been the hosting club for GSNA camps, trainings and finals – all of which we'd love to be able to host again, but unfortunately due to the state of our courts, we're not really in a place to do that at the moment.

"GSNA moved all their trainings to Willunga as they have better courts, lights and facilities, so unfortunately, until we get that upgrade, that's not going to happen for us.

"The courts haven't been done since 2007, and they're cracking and becoming quite unsafe for players.

"Having to do trials in the last few weeks, it's really quite evident the need for them."

The club has received two quotes for the upgrades of the courts – one a basic, quick-fix which would involve putting a layer on top of the existing courts and cost about \$44,000, but only last a few years, while the other is a complete redo and cost approximately

\$204,000, but be a long-term investment.

Members have been fundraising towards the courts' remediation, including through teams holding fundraisers, recruiting sponsors, and running Saturday night meals, but can only do so much as a community group on top of dealing with other expenses.

"Our club cannot raise sufficient funds to give these courts the safety and attention that is require, despite a big effort to do so," Fisher said.

"So far, we have approximately \$50,000 in our current account, however, that money also needs to go towards new equipment, junior development and also helping out families who require financial assistance.

"We have a really dedicated committee who are passionate about getting this under way, and providing an amazing space for our girls to enjoy netball with friends and family now and in the future.

"These courts benefit many in the community, including the school, tennis club and also opportunities for the general public to use them as well."

The club has reached out to Member for Finnis David Basham and Member for Kingston Amanda Rishworth for financial support with the project, as well as council at last month's meeting.

It is hoped the courts can be resurfaced before the 2025 season.

"We've obviously left it too late now to get

it done before this season, however, by 2025, I think we wouldn't be able to play netball on the courts given the current state of them," Fisher said.

"So, anything will help and our first preference is to be able to pay the money outright.

"We're obviously all volunteers, and as I said, community run, so the ideal situation is to receive grants and direct financial support, but we would definitely take what we can take in regards to the 2025 goal to get these courts completed."

Fisher also noted council support with lighting, drainage and road surfaces was something the group would love considered in the future.

Since the meeting, the club has been in contact with council's grants officer.

"Besides their deputation to council, the Mount Compass Netball Club has written to the Mayor seeking assistance to source grant funding opportunities," Council CEO, Nigel Morris, said.

"Council has subsequently been in touch with club representatives to provide some information about available grants at different levels of government and some suggestions regarding submitting successful applications.

"We have also invited the club to contact us again so we can discuss their proposed project and clarify the support they are seeking."

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# Major milestone celebrated for Strathalbyn's Rankine family

The Rankine family of Strathalbyn has ties to the very earliest of European history in the town and its latest chapter was celebrated on Saturday for Janet Rankine's 90th birthday.

Mrs Rankine's daughter Valerie said her forebear William Rankine was among 150 Scots in 1839 who journeyed to Adelaide before marking out land at Strathalbyn, and along with James Dawson donated land for the centre of Strathalbyn.

"William Rankine had the son Matthew Rankine, who had John Rankine, who had Robert Rankine, who married my mum," Valerie said.

Mrs Rankine was born in Bothwell, Tasmania on March 16, 1934, which was a rural area.

Her father farmed merino sheep, and had the distinction of the highest wool price in the world during World War II.

She was the fifth of six children, with her younger sister Helen able to attend her birthday celebrations on Saturday.

At 10-years-old she left for Fahan Boarding School in Hobart, where her chore was to milk the cows.

Mrs Rankine left school at 16 to go to Invergarry, which was a finishing school that taught home making skills.

But she was to return to the home farm Dungrove, where she continued milking, supplying a butcher who sold it under the counter.

A friend Tas Ford introduced her to Robert John Rankine and the couple were married on December 31, 1964.

The couple moved to Braemar, Strathalbyn, where Mrs Rankine fully involved herself in farm life, raising four children born between 1966 and 1973 – Fiona, Angela, Valerie and Matthew.

At shearing time, she would also feed the shearers, and would raise calves bought at market.

Mrs Rankine was a regular at the cattle markets, buying and selling, which she does to this day.

Her extensive charitable work began with the Red Cross while she was in Tasmania, and this devotion continued in Strathalbyn, where the Red Cross fitted out child safety capsules in cars for babies.

Mrs Rankine has been part of the Trees for Life movement since its inception in South Australia, growing thousands of trees for others and at the farm on Paris Creek Road.

She is a life member of the Strathalbyn Agricultural Show Society, Strathalbyn Tourist Association, Milang Classic Car Club, and petitioned the local council for better signage at the Strathalbyn cemetery.

She still makes shortbread to raise funds for the restoration of St Andrews Church and Glenbarr Homestead, and has also volunteered at the Strath churches bookshop, and the heritage museum.

Until recently, she regularly completed park runs, finishing 122 of them.

Mrs Rankine learned to grow and preserve much of what she eats, and has extensive knowledge of farming and animal husbandry, particularly with cattle.

As an avid Adelaide Crows supporter, she is looking forward to the football season.

On Saturday, surrounded by family and friends from afar, Mrs Rankine celebrated her 90th birthday at an afternoon tea in the Glenbarr barn – the original home of William Rankine.

## Strathalbyn GP awarded dermoscopy grant

A Strathalbyn doctor will be able to save more lives locally by being able to detect skin cancer early with the help of one of Cancer Council SA's Dermoscopy Grants.

A dermatoscope is a specialised microscope for the skin that allows doctors to look more closely at spots on the skin, which improves early detection of skin cancer, resulting in more lives saved and less unnecessary procedures.

Cancer Council SA has recently awarded grants to 30 South Australian GPs in locations where there is a higher rate of skin cancer, to receive a fully funded dermatoscope.

With two in three Australians diagnosed with some form of skin cancer before the age of 70, Cancer Council SA Prevention and Advocacy Manager Christine Morris hoped the program would help save more lives.

"In 2020, 860 South Australians were diagnosed with melanoma, and we know that regional South Australians have a higher chance of developing melanoma compared to those who live in metropolitan areas," she said.

"That's why it's important that GPs in high-risk communities receive up-to-date training and resources to detect skin cancer early."

One of the grant recipients is Strathalbyn Family Medical Centre's Dr Nicole Lewis.

Other local grant recipients include Mount Compass Medical Centre's Dr Ahmet Lokaj and Mount Barker and Balhannah Medical Clinics. Cancer Council SA recommends people check their whole body regularly for changes to any existing spots such as size, shape, colour or texture, along with any sores that itch, bleed or refuse to heal.

Anyone who notices any changes, should see a GP immediately.

# Tackling breast cancer with information

Breast Cancer Network Australia (BCNA) staged an information session at Murray Bridge on March 7 to tackle the disease by educating local women and men.

The aim of the forum, which attracted 90 people in person and online, was to help ensure people have the most up-to-date and relevant information to be able to make informed decisions about their breast cancer treatment and care, while allowing them to connect and meet others on similar journeys in the local area.

"The most magical moments are to see

women and men in the local community meet new people," BCNA CEO, Kirsten Pilatti, said.

"For many, this will be the first time they have ever had the chance to sit and share their experience with others diagnosed or caring for someone with breast cancer."

Topics covered on the day included Lymphoedema (risk reduction and management) with Lymphologist Professor Neil Piller, local services and support in and around Murray Bridge with McGrath Breast Cancer Nurse Annie Williams, current and emerging treatments for early breast cancer and metastatic breast cancer with medical oncologist Associate Professor Rohit Joshi, and

managing the emotional impacts of living with early breast cancer or metastatic breast cancer with clinical psychologist Dr Charlotte Tottman.

The day also included a member panel discussion with BCNA members Wendy, Donna and Tania, who shared their personal experiences with breast cancer.

In preparation for the forum, BCNA recently met with local health professionals to identify the specific issues in relation to health care and treatment for people with breast cancer in the Murray Bridge area.

BCNA Director of Policy, Advocacy and Support Services Vicki Durston said local health professionals had reported difficulties

accessing information resources and support services in Murray Bridge.

"We heard a big barrier to access is the lack of breast cancer specialists' services close to home and people are having to travel long distances at great cost to get the treatment they need," Ms Durston said.

"And this is not restricted to Murray Bridge. We know this is a problem across rural and regional Australia where there is simply not enough specialist services – and in many cases – close to home."

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## Dangerous driving behaviours observed in Hills Fleurieu region during Adelaide Cup long weekend

Almost 60 drivers were caught speeding in the Hills Fleurieu over the recent long weekend, while several others were detected committing other offences.

Over the Adelaide Cup long weekend, South Australia police conducted a state-wide traffic operation from Friday, March 8 to Monday, March 11 with the aim of deterring and detecting traffic behaviours that result in collisions and road trauma.

Police were also focused on dangerous road users, including give way offences, failing to keep a safe distance and lane

behavioural offences.

While, thankfully, no lives lost were recorded on the roads, seven people, including three motorcyclists and three pedestrians, suffered serious and potentially life-altering injuries as a result of road trauma.

In the Hills Fleurieu region, 59 drivers were detected speeding, while five others were caught drink driving and one for failing to wear a seatbelt.

Another motorist was reported for driving while disqualified.

The highest drink driving result was recorded at Littlehampton at about 8pm on

Saturday, March 9, when a 47-year-old man was observed straddling lanes and then recorded a blood alcohol reading of 0.323.

"While pleasing that no lives were lost, police still detected 206 offences related to dangerous driving practices during the long weekend operation," Officer in Charge of the Traffic Services Branch, Superintendent Darren Fielke, said.

"These are behaviours that put the driver, their passengers, and all other road users at risk.

"We urge everyone to make road safety a priority and ensure that every time you use the roads, you do so safely."

## Murray Bridge man refuses breath test

A local man lost his licence after failing to submit to a breath test at Murray Bridge earlier this month.

Just before 4pm on Friday, March 8, police were alerted to a possible drink driver on Adelaide Road, who was then identified and located at his home address.

The man allegedly refused to say who was driving the vehicle at the time as well as to submit to an alcotest when directed.

The 53-year-old Murray Bridge man was subsequently reported for failing to truly answer questions and refusing to comply with directions of an alcotest.

His vehicle was impounded for 28 days, he was issued with a 12-month instant loss of licence, and will be summonsed to appear in court at a later date.

## New laws proposed around child crime

Criminals who try and recruit kids to engage in criminal activities are being targeted under new laws proposed by the State Government, which will carry the toughest maximum penalties in the country.

Reform is proposed to laws around aiding and abetting, which will allow adults to be prosecuted as if they were the ones committing the crime when they are accessories to crimes of children.

Separately, a new stand-alone offence will target any individual over 21 years of age who tries to get a child under 18 to carry out a serious criminal offence, regardless of whether the child actually carries out the act or is under the minimum age of criminal responsibility.

This new offence will carry the toughest maximum penalty of anywhere in the country – 15 years' imprisonment.

"It's important tough penalties are in place to send a message to those who may try to circumvent the law by getting children to do their dirty work," Attorney-General, Kyam Maher, said.

"We are ensuring that those who seek to exploit kids for illegal purposes can feel the full force of the law by changing the law about accessory liability and establishing

a new criminal recruiting offence – the toughest anywhere in the country."

The government is preparing the legislation to be consulted on and introduced to State Parliament.

At the same time, the government has released a discussion paper setting out a proposal to raise the minimum age of criminal responsibility from 10 to 12 years of age, with a discussion paper and consultation on the proposal available on YourSay.

"We know that when a young person has contact with the criminal justice system, they're more likely to become entrenched in the criminal justice system, leading to a cycle of recidivism that is rarely broken," Mr Maher said.

"Getting the supports in place to divert young people before they become a permanent fixture in the system will ultimately enhance community safety by addressing the root causes and preventing future offending.

"At the same time, though, there will always be cases where young people simply won't be able to engage with that process.

"This is a significant matter of community safety, and I'd urge South Australians to have their say on our proposed model."

## Tough new laws fast-tracked

New laws that would see serious repeat child sex offenders subject to indefinite imprisonment and face lifetime electronic monitoring have been fast-tracked in South Australia.

Under amendments to the Sentencing Act 2017, if a paedophile is jailed for a second time for a serious child sexual offence, they will automatically be sentenced to indefinite detention, making these laws the toughest of their kind in the country.

An offender would then need to be able to demonstrate to a court they can control their sexual instincts to be considered for release, and in those circumstances, would face lifetime electronic monitoring if they re-enter the community.

The State Government is currently well-advanced in the drafting of this legislation and intends to introduce it by March.

## Drivers caught at Murray Bridge

Police detected several drivers committing traffic offences at Murray Bridge over the weekend.

At about 5pm on Saturday, Murray Bridge police stopped and arrested a 32-year-old Eudunda woman for allegedly driving along Monash Terrace while disqualified.

Her vehicle was impounded for 28 days and she was bailed to appear in court at a later date.

At about 9pm that same night, a vehicle was pulled over on the South Eastern Freeway, near Monarto South, after it was detected travelling at 121 in a 110km/h zone.

Police also observed a teenage child sitting in the boot unrestrained.

The driver, a 39-year-old Campbelltown woman, recorded a blood alcohol reading of 0.072, and checks revealed she was also unlicensed.

She was reported and will be summonsed to face court at a later date.

At about 12.30am on Sunday, a 31-year-old Redwood Park man recorded a blood alcohol reading of 0.085 when stopped by police on Fourth Street.

He was issued with a six-month instant loss of licence and will face court at a later date.

When emergency services arrived on the scene, they found a Hyundai fully ablaze along with some nearby scrub.

Country Fire Service volunteers battled

the fire, while police conducted checks on the vehicle, which revealed it had been stolen from a Murray Bridge home earlier in the night.

The car was destroyed and police are investigating the incident.

### Re: Old Bull Creek Road housing development

Alexandrina Council in their town plan 2014 to 2024 detailed the feelings of the Strathalbyn residents and concluded the following conditions should apply to this land set aside for future development adjacent Old Bull Creek Rd (sic): "11 allotments per hectare reflects current residents and future residents' preferences for larger allotments.

This land is on the outskirts of town – not immediately adjacent to the town centre which is better suited to smaller allotments and denser development.

It was also stated that (sic): "the larger allotments on the outer provide somewhat of a transition to the rural lands abutting this land".

This has not changed just because there is a housing crisis.

The country town of Strathalbyn, established as a rural support centre, has a proud heritage that most ratepayers wish to preserve.

A building envelope plan, 'Master Planned Township Zone', has been proposed for approval in relation to development on this land and is currently open for public consultation until April 27.

It proposes to set the standards for future development in the surrounding areas.

Four of the many changes that will apply are an increase of over 60 per cent from 11 to 35 allotments per hectare, reduction of minimum allotment sizes, increasing building height, and reduced front and side setbacks.

Re-zoning to enable three times the density of housing, placing it on a hill on the outskirts of Strathalbyn, then calling it Town Zone will result in development similar to those that have recently surrounded other Hills towns like Mt Barker, Nairne, and Littlehampton to name a few.

They could now be classed as Outer Metropolitan Adelaide suburbs, and have lost their country town identity.

In Adelaide they saw the need to protect their Hills Face Zone to prevent housing expansion. In the Adelaide Hills, councils need to follow suit and place similar zoning around rural country towns to ensure their outlook and heritage is likewise preserved.

We need to stop or at the very least control this housing metastatic cancer.

It's consuming our country towns while destroying prime agricultural land on a journey to environmental catastrophe.

I realise that we are very lucky to have the support of our family, but do feel guilty that they are putting their lives on hold for us.

Strathalbyn is in need of some sort of transport for the older residents as there are a lot of us.

This matter has been a topic of conversation for us.

It almost seems that we older people don't matter.

I look forward to hearing the result of having a taxi based here in Strathalbyn and also how we go about accessing the service.

The initiative would see Jack, alongside his support worker, provide delivery services for locals and businesses in the Fleurieu and southern suburbs of Adelaide.

Back in January, it seemed like a faraway dream.

But then Car Hub Australia stepped in, finding the owner of an original 1967 VW Beetle at the Australian VW Performance Centre in Victoria.

Car Hub's Tom Traynor picked up the car, had some finishing touches taken care of, and then personally delivered 'Herbie' to Jack.

Jack's family has now obtained insurance, had a compliance check performed, and paid for the registration thanks a GoFundMe page.

They think they will turn the venture into a not-for-profit one, with the main goal to get Jack out into the community.

On the first day of having his car, Jack spent most of the afternoon in it, despite the heat.

It has already brought Jack so much to look forward to, as on the first drive, he was able to enjoy the fun his car brings, with people stopping the vehicle, along with waving and pointing to him.

Jack's mum Lauren said knowing that people cared enough to donate or support Jack in any way means the world to her family, saying she believes there will never be a 'Herbie' more loved than this one.

In a world where bad news seems to dominate news channels - be it on television, radio, newspapers, magazines or social media - Jack's story is one to remember, to remind ourselves that human nature's power to do good is just as powerful as its power to do the opposite.

# Strathalbyn Players prepare for 2024

The Strathalbyn Players have announced plans for a number of productions in 2024, with auditions for the first one held last week.

Show Director Peter Hackworth said production number one *The Jurors* will be staged at the end of May and run for three weekends.

"It is based on a 1960s play *Twelve Angry Men*, but obviously, we have updated it to ensure that women can be in the play," Mr Hackworth said.

"The plot... it is a jury considering a murder trial.

"We never get to see who the accused is, but it is (about) how they come to a decision and the conflict that occurs within the jury room, so it is a drama but with some comic moments."

Mr Hackworth said 26 people attended last week's auditions, with 13 parts available.

"Basically, for the auditions we had a reading of the play," he said.

"We explained the rehearsal and performance dates, and we got people to identify which particular roles they might be interested in, and we will make a decision as a committee as to who will get the parts.

"The philosophy of the theatre is to give new people a chance to be on stage, so we actually had about six people who have never performed with Strath Players come along.

"The philosophy is also to be inclusive and have people of all ages, genders, religious views or ethnic backgrounds."

Rehearsals for *The Jurors* start in under a

fortnight, with opening night to be May 24.

The productions will run over the following three weekends at night, with a matinee on Sunday, June 2.

"We do have good numbers at present," Mr Hackworth said.

"We have got a lot of enthusiasm, particularly among the younger adults – people in their 20s and early 30s.

"It is a really strong group, which is great for the future of the theatre.

"They haven't decided on the script yet, but the youth theatre will do a performance (this year), and in the second half of the year, we will be producing Shakespeare's *Much Ado About Nothing*.

"That has a big cast, so we are looking forward to that occurring in the second half of 2024."

While fielding a cast was important, so was the need for help in the background.

"We will have people who will help with things like stage management, lighting, sound, set painting, acquiring props, and managing props that we use on stage," Mr Hackworth said.

"(We also have) our front of house – the people who meet and greet the customers on the night – and we need people to help with organising publicity, so designing posters, advertising, and working on social media.


"It is probably a bit too late, as far as being involved as cast (for *The Jurors*), but there are always opportunities for people to be involved behind the scenes.

"We get a lot of support from the community, which is the reason we survive because people come along to the shows.


"So, we are always trying to look for shows that people will find interesting and entertaining, and enjoy."





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## 53 years of wool classing

Strathalbyn farmer Graham Jenke will turn 73 this year, and celebrate more than 53 of them as a wool classer and roustabout.

Graham always wanted to be a farmer, but as a child, his father wanted him and his brother to seek a profession other than farming.

So, Graham also chose wool classing and roustabouting, and his brother chose mechanics.

"Traditionally, a wool classer, if you go back to the 1970s, just stood at the table," Mr Jenke said.

"All the roustabouts did the skirting, and the wool classer just classed the wool into lines of wool.

"But nowadays, the classers usually work on the table as well – they help with skirting, they will pick up fleeces when they have to, and they usually do the pressing as well.

"In a smaller shed that is a combined shed, if you are in a big eight to 10 stander with 10 shearers, you would just do the classing."

Technically wool classers group fleece into categories such as length and thickness,

quality, colour, strength and cleanliness.

"It is about sorting the wool into lines," Mr Jenke said.

"Australian Wool Innovation (AWI) has specific lines for different types of wool, and principally it is based on merinos and you are looking for evenness in the quality of the wool, and evenness in the crimp.

"Wool is sold on specifications which is tested and microned.... So you are basically putting wools together of similar types, similar microns and similar lengths."

Mr Jenke said roustabouting and wool classing could be challenging.

"You have to be prepared to work for a start," he said.

"You have always had to do a course on wool classing, and nowadays, you can do it through AWI as they have schools that they do.

"You have to do so much theory and so much practical, and then you have to submit clips.

"They have to pass them and they have to be up to their standard that they want, and you have to do crossbred clips as well as the merino clips."

Despite the challenging work conditions, plenty of work exists for wool classers and roustabouts.

"There is a shortage of wool classers at the moment," Mr Jenke said.

"It seems there has always been a shortage of people to work in the shearing industry.

"You have to start work at 7.30am and you don't knock off until 5pm, so you have three two-hour sessions and one hour-and-a-half session with half hour breaks and an hour for lunch.

"It is constant work and you have to travel a bit, but it pays really well though.

"To be just a roustabout – which is just picking up fleeces, skirting the fleeces, and just doing whatever jobs – you don't have to know a lot about it, but you have to be prepared to learn, see what is happening around you, and just do it."

The Strathalbyn region has about three wool classers who occasionally work together as a team, sometimes roustabouting and sometimes classing.

Mr Jenke sees a positive future for the industry.

"It is not a produced synthetic material, it is

biodegradable, and the wool itself can keep you warm in winter and cool in summer," he said.

"No other product can do that.

"It is not a problem with landfill or anything like that, and the product lasts a lot longer.

"We are facing the animal liberation people that say you shouldn't keep animals for wool, which is silly."

At 73, Mr Jenke wishes more people were interested in working as wool classers or roustabouts.

"I have actually said that I would like to do less," he said.

"But I would rather keep busy as I am one of those people who always wants to be busy, so if I am not doing wool classing, I will be doing something else.

"If there were plenty of people to work in the sheds, I wouldn't have to work, but I get rung up fairly regularly – 'we need you for a couple of days here, can you fill in?'

"I suppose you can say no, but there is no one else to do it, and that can be our biggest problem."

## Unseasonable weather impacts flowers

Unseasonable weather has thrown a hurdle to local flower farmers who find it unpredictable of when buds will bloom.

Yarruks Farm owner Allora Skurray has seen no consistency over the six years that they have owned the Currency Creek

property, which she credits to global warming.

"When we look back at pictures from last year of what we had flowering at this exact time, it's completely different to what we have flowering this year," she said.

"Especially the rain and not having the summer heat as what we should have had made flowers not open."

Flowers need rain and a burst of heat to make them pop, so a few cooler days can slow down their opening.

However, the family-run business gets the longest growth and flowering times possible to supply some species all year round by contracting on other farms as well as their 60-acre property.

"The weather from here to Myponga or Lenswood is so diverse," Ms Skurray explained.

"Our flowers start flowering closer to the sea, down Yankalilla way, then we follow the flower growth throughout.

"We have about two weeks over Christmas

of down time and other than that, there isn't any time that we don't have stock to sell."

Previously living in Seaford, Ms Skurray and her partner Ryan purchased the property six years ago and rebuilt much of the space including replanting over three quarters of the plantation.

Yarruks Farm – which is their surname spelt backwards – is supported by a team of employees and family members, and collaborates with Jagged Farm.

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## Trend towards local farmers

“Ryan always wanted to work for himself and he’s always loved farming and being on the land,” Ms Skurray said.

“He is the flower brains – he knows all about the flowers and has gone to seminars and conferences and made friends with other growers around South Australia.

“Overtime, he’s taken other peoples’ opinions, learned from them, and applied it to our own life.”

The farmers sell direct to florists and wholesalers in Adelaide, Brisbane and Sydney, and also cater for weddings, funerals, corporate and community events, including Mount Compass sport.

The farm grows native flowers to Australia and South Africa, including king proteas which are one of the most popular flowers requested as a focal point for brides’ bouquets.

Native flowers have been trendy over recent years, which Ms Skurray believes could be since COVID halted international imports, and that they dry well.

“Wholesalers were almost completely reliant on what people could grow within the country but it specifically put an emphasis on local growers within your own state,” she said.

“During COVID, the world shut down, whereas we actually got busier.

“We were lucky enough to be deemed an essential service and we were still able to work and supply.”

A lot of love and manual labour goes behind the farm, including hand-maintenance of pruning trees while harvesting to encourage

growth for the following season.

Creating a bouquet arrangement depends on where they are being sent, with many florists having a specific model of what they want in their bouquets.

For example, when *The Argus* visited last week, staff were creating arrangements with two large focal flowers, about three to four leucadendrons, a filler, and a pretty flower.

In addition, GPSA has commissioned a team of researchers from the University of South Australia (UniSA) to undertake a project on the attitudes and behaviours of farmers to mitigate spray drift.

Agricultural chemicals protect crops from pests and disease, but their incorrect use can have adverse effects on health and the environment.

A key component in helping to change the actions of those who do not adhere to regulations for spraying in the grain industry is through behavioural change.

GPSA Chief Executive Officer Brad Perry said the two projects are designed to think outside the square when it comes to minimising off-target damage.

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## Lobethal seeking threeppeat at the Creek

Lobethal are chasing their third straight AEHCA one day title this Saturday when they take on the Langhorne Creek Tigers at Murray Road. The Brodie O'Dea led Langhorne Creek finished minor premiers for the second year running and will be keen to atone for last year's grand final loss after no blemishes during the minor round in 2022/23 before going down to Lobethal by 75 runs in an upset.

It will be Langhorne Creek's fourth grand final in six years since their last premiership in 2018/19 when they defeated Hahndorf by two wickets whilst Lobethal are in their fourth straight grand final.

Langhorne Creek were the first team

through to the grand final with the first final abandoned through the heat policy whilst Lobethal headed to the knockout final and defeated Strathalbyn in an easy win at Lobethal, turning the tables from their last meeting only three weeks ago.

Langhorne Creek only lost twice in the minor round, a loss to the wooden spooners, Bremer/Callington and Lobethal snuck past the Tigers at Langhorne Creek in the first game after Christmas.

Lobethal had four losses in the minor round and surrendered top spot late in the year losing three games on the trot, but opener Ben Matthews found form at the right time posting 107\* against Bremer/Callington and with keeper/batsman Dan Norsworthy posting 356 runs and Mitch Week 347 runs for the season, the Lobethal Tigers do bat deep.

Former SA state country fast bowler

Matt Martin has not been as influential this year with the ball as previous years but always keeps the batsman on their toes and the addition of Jeremy Hackett on a full-time basis from East Torrens with 19 wickets has stiffened up the Lobethal attack.

Langhorne Creek bowlers led by off spinner Daniel Cleggett and State Outbacks fast bowler, Troy Blackwell both with 21 wickets hold the key to keeping the Lobethal batting order under control with all-rounder, Daniel Kropp hoping to repeat his devastating spell from last year's first final when he ripped through the Lobethal top order at Murray Road.

Langhorne Creek posted the most

runs in the minor round and conceded the least number of wickets and have won five of the last eight outings against Lobethal, and with a touch more depth in the batting and bowling than Lobethal, the Creek Tigers will be confident they can get the job done at home.

Lobethal on the other hand have performed well in the finals at the Langhorne Creek Oval and will be keen to stake their claim as the number one Tigers team in the AEHCA with three successive premierships. It should be a great clash for the last game of 2023/24 at 12:30pm.



# Hahndorf too good for Langhorne Creek Black

A cohort of former retired A Grade legends from Hahndorf were too good for the Langhorne Creek Black team on Saturday at Hahndorf to the tune of 149 runs.

Hassold moved past his half century, as he cut and pulled viciously before the slow swing bowling of Jacob Tonkin brought him undone for 66.

Nathan James continued to bowl full and straight as he took down O'Neil, Baker and Browning in quick succession, despite the run rate still ticking over, with James finishing with 4/37.

Veterans Dennis Raymond and Mark Trafford-Walker saw out the last few overs, as the Magpies finished on 8/228 from their 40 overs.

Looking for their first B Grade premiership since 2019/20, the Tigers were off to an ordinary start that saw left-hander Shane Nurse bowled by Allegretto for five.

Paul Newbery followed not long after to a sharp catch to Raymond behind the stumps, and when Jacob Tonkin went the same way, the Tigers had limped to 3/41 from 13 overs and the game was almost done.

Former A Grade star Nathan James was the Tigers only hope, but when he was bowled by Willy Pearce for 19, the Tigers were 4/51 and the LC Blacks would have to settle for second place.

The Tigers lost 7/38 to capitulate to be all out for 79 to see Hahndorf record their first B Grade since joining the AEHCA in 1996/97.

Well done to Jarrod Cock and his team who made the decision to step up and add a second Langhorne Creek side to the B Grade from C Grade to ensure six teams in the B Grade for season 2023/24.

## Model glider enthusiasts converge on Milang

The Southern Soaring League's grounds near Milang were destination central for model glider enthusiasts from across Australia recently – with local club members faring well in two competitions. An International F5J event was held over the long weekend, and won by Melbourne flyer David Haskell. Meanwhile, a GPS triangle racing competition was held in the days afterwards, where local club member John Copeland won the lightclass category and finished second behind Steve Maitland in the Sportsclass competition by 61 points out of 4600. Club spokesperson Trevor Schultz said the F5J tournament attracted

about 30 participants from as far as Western Australia, New South Wales, and Melbourne – as well as locally – with Haskell coming in first, followed by Rod Watkins, and Adelaide-based flyer Nick Chabrel third. "We can't fly on total fire ban days, and unfortunately Saturday (on the long weekend), was a total fire ban so none of us could actually fly," Schultz said. "But on Sunday and Monday, even though the conditions were extremely hot and windy, there was no fire ban, so we were allowed to fly, which we did. "We finished about 1.30pm each day (as) the maximum temperature was around then, and we are not young anymore so we called it around lunch time.

"Each person did six flights in teams on Sunday and six on Monday, which gave us 12, which is a bit down as normally we would fly 18." Participants in the F5J event were given a challenge to fly for 10 minutes. "You catch thermals, and you have to land exactly before or on the 10-minute mark," Schultz said. "If you go over you lose all your points, and sometimes you can be down in three minutes if there are no thermals around. "You are limited to a certain amount of height, and also distance... You get a 30 second motor run, and the motor turns off. "We lose half a point per metre up to 200m, over 200m we lose three points per metre, so you have to try and launch and keep below your 200m.

"If someone launches at 50m and gets a thermal, gets his 10-minute flight, he buries everybody else score wise." Flyers then have to attempt to land on a designated spot, which is a 50-point bonus, with every metre out losing five points. John Copeland said the weather for the GPS Triangle was perfect. "We had about nine people entered in the GPS competition, and they have come from all over Australia," Copeland said. "We have a virtual triangle out in front of us, and that is of a certain distance, and depending on the class we have got 20 minutes to do as many laps as possible from a given height. "There is another class where you get 30 minutes to do as many laps as

possible." The larger GPS gliders still fly in a similar way to the smaller ones. "They have a propellor at the front which is operated electrically, and they stay in the air by thermalling," Copeland said. "So, you have to make lots of decisions about whether to thermal or fly around the course, and once the motor is switched off, you can't use the motor again for 20 or 30 minutes depending on the task. "We have got telemetry in our ears – so I have got headphones on... and they have a variometer, so you can actually hear the model going up or down." Meeting up again was the highlight for the participants, as they only get to get together three or four times a year.

Chook Baker was run out at first by R Pearce for the first out.



# Off to the world championships

Strathalbyn archers Nicky and Simon Fairweather have cleared the final hurdle in their quest to represent Australia at the upcoming World Championships in Canada this September.

As previously reported in *The Southern Argus*, the duo had both shot the pre-qualifying scores necessary to make them eligible for selection on the team – but needed to finish in the top three at the Australian Field Open in Gippsland over the March long weekend.

They both achieved that aim.

"We had a pretty successful weekend," Nicky said.

"Over the two days of ranking I ranked second and Simon was ranked first, and then in the finals – the elimination part at the end – I managed to sneak up a spot and took the Gold medal, and Simon came second, so we got a Gold and Silver medal between us in the individual.

"And in the teams' event I also won a Gold medal."

Nicky said official selection was now a "formality" for her and Sydney Gold Medal Olympian Simon.

"They haven't technically announced it yet, as they have got to take the list of everybody to the board and get them to ratify it," she said.

"But the process was that we had to do that pre-qualification that I spoke to you about last time, and then rank in the top three as well on the first two ranking days.

"So, we have met the criteria, now it is just a formality of waiting for them to give the green light."

Nicky said she was "pretty excited" by the opportunity of going to her third World Championships and compete in the barebow category.

"I don't think it has really sunk in just yet, because we had always planned that we would be going, but now that it is really happening I guess it is time to make some training plans and make sure we are as ready as we can be," she said.

"(The competition in Gippsland) was pretty tight actually... I won my gold medal match in a one-hour shoot off at

the end, which was pretty nerve wracking, and Simon's competition was really, really tight.

"I think there were three or four men who were in the mix for the top spot, so he did really well to finish where he did."

Nicky said it was expected that Australia will send a large team to this year's world championships at Lac la Biche, near Edmonton from September 16.

"I am not sure how many people will end up being in the team," Nicky said.

"I know there were 30 archers across the country who had done the pre-qualifying, and obviously not all of them will be selected, as there are limited numbers for each bow type.

"But it will probably be the biggest team that we have had for a really long time, I would think."

Once there Nicky and Simon have a chance to shoot in the mixed team event together.

"The event will have the same format to what we shot in Victoria, where there will be two days of ranking first, and if we are the first ranked archers from the Australian team, for the men and women, we get paired up for a mixed team," Nicky said.

"I guess because we train together all the time, and shoot together all the time, it would be a really nice experience, and we know each other's shooting really well so I think we would be a great team.

"But obviously it comes down to whoever in the squad is shooting best at the time, as to whether we get the opportunity – so we just have to put in the work and make sure that that is us."

Nicky said they expect the overseas competition to be "pretty tough".

"In the men's division the guy that beat Simon in the finals on the (long) weekend was ranked 11 in the world at the last world championships, so Simon gets a really good taste of what to expect just competing locally," she said.

"In the women's the European shooters are really, really excellent, and the US also have some really great barebow shooters, and there was even a women from Japan last time that knocked me

out on the way up to the final, so it can be really tough, there are a lot of high quality shooters."

Nicky and Simon will have to pay their own way to Canada.

"Archery Australia provide us with uniforms and cover our entry costs for the event, but the meals and accommodation and flights are usually out of our own pocket," Nicky said.

"We have our flights now, I got that organised really quickly, as the longer you wait the more expensive it gets."

She said she and Simon were both reasonably happy with their form going into the final months of preparation.

"I probably wasn't shooting my best through the weekend, so to still come out with a win while I am not feeling my best, is still a good confidence boost, but I still have some work to do," Nicky said.

"Simon has been shooting really great though, he is doing really well.

"Obviously he didn't manage to beat Hugo on the day of the finals (in Gippsland), so he has still got some takeaways which is really valuable for him, to have some things to be worked on.

"But I think his technique is actually looking really solid, and he is on track." The couple will now look to increase training for September.

"We will be shooting most days of the week, for at least a few hours a day, and try to get to as many competitions as we can on the weekends," Nicky said.

"There are limited opportunities now to shoot the full format, (but) I think there is another one coming up in Victoria in about a month, so that is a good one for us, if we can get across there for that."

Nicky took the time to thank her local club at Strathalbyn, the Great Southern Archers.

"I don't think we would be as prepared as we were if the club hadn't made the effort to make the adaptations to our field course," she said.

"Honestly, it has been a huge help and I couldn't be more thankful to them for that, because they are basically volunteers and have gone out of their way to really try and assist us, to make sure we can be as prepared as possible."


Brian ran into a bit of trouble on the tenth when he needed a drop out of the drain after his second shot, to have five for the hole.
