Macclesfield artist among many to be exhibited at local festival next weekend

A local festival centred on social connection, self-expression and bringing artists together for a common purpose makes its return to Macclesfield next Saturday and Sunday.

Presented by the Macclesfield Arts Group – a sub-group of the Macclesfield Community Association – the Macclesfield Arts Festival 'Creative Pursuits' will be held on Saturday, April 27 and Sunday, April 28, featuring work by local artists from the Battunga community.

The event will also feature workshops such as basket weaving, mosaicking, and leather dog collar making, with a mini sculpture symposium to be held at Crystal Lake at the same time.

A family fun day will then be held on May 5, where families can explore the nature and stone carvings at Crystal Lake Park, take part in making 3D art, and witnessing a block of chocolate being carved.

Among the artists being showcased during the festival is Macclesfield's Karo Lutkiewicz.

Karo has been making art 'since she could hold a pencil', and now owns her own studio in the heart of the town called The Stable.

As an arts therapist, she likes to experiment with art, but her preferred medium is visual.

"These days I do a fair bit of weaving," Karo said.

"I'm quite interested in acrylic painting – that's a medium that's natural and easy for me.

"Then I'm an arts therapist, so I'm always happy to use any media and resources.

"The other day I did a body printing workshop for example because I was curious about these ways of expression and using the body in art."

Karo loves being able to express herself through art, and takes inspiration from the world around her, both the beautiful and the 'ugly'.

"It just helps externalise what's inside and it's just fun.

"I love when artists create, and I love creating and being in it.

"I do a fair bit of illustration that is minimalistic and portrays certain ideas, so that's always quite humourous – I love humour – and that's always been inspiring to me.

"But I just (take inspiration from) life, the environment, being alive and doing things... people, stories, funny animals, and ugly and pretty things."

This is the second year Karo is showcasing her work in the Macclesfield Arts Festival.

With the theme of this year's exhibition being 'connection', she decided to take a 'natural' approach to her two submissions.

"The initial piece – the small one – I made it out of local leaves that I found here, and was playing with composition," Karo explained.

"Then the bigger piece is referring to first one with its form and shapes, but asks questions about connection and particularly plants.

"I'm exploring and asking questions in ink on that piece about how many native species do I need to know to belong to the place?

"How many native species and plants have to touch with me as a person to also create that belonging and connection?

"It's pondering about nature and how we are such a part of it, but at the same time, humans tend to remove themselves out, so it's about holistic concepts."

The festival currently has more than 60 artists entered into the exhibition.

Karo said the festival is an opportunity to bring artists together and for the community to connect with each other.

"I think it's that point of coming together because a lot of artists tend to have their own studios and spaces, and all they just create their creations in that and they don't come out and show it," she said.

"So, in a way, getting together, showcasing the artworks and actually meeting face to face, and talking art and life, has been such a pleasure.

"Then (with the) workshops as well it is just fun to again connect with people and just chat.

"I think promotion of art is just promotion of culture, being, colours, shapes and expression, and it's really important."

Karo encouraged people to come and support local artists, and try something new, particularly with the workshops.

Her weaving workshop has already sold out, but she will be holding some art activities catered towards children.

"I think the workshops are really important because there's going to be many workshops across the three days, and I want to promote that because I know it's always local artists, people or craftsmen and women sharing their skills with the wider public," she said.

"It's a good opportunity to do that, get a hands-on experience and make something for yourself and come out with an object or art. "One of the workshops for example is make

your dog a leather collar.

"That's one I think, for dog lovers, having a unique collar you crafted for your four-legged friend is a fun thing to do."

Council knuckles down on finances

Alexandrina ratepayers are anticipating an average rate increase next financial year as council looks towards a "slow and steady" approach towards financial stability without having to reduce its level of services.

The 2024-25 draft Annual Business Plan and Budget, which was approved by the Audit and Risk Committee on Friday, proposes an 8.3 per cent average rate increase, plus 1.3 per cent from new development and property investments – an equivalent increase of about \$189.

The rise represents 4.5 per cent above CPI, which sits at 3.5 per cent, and will go to council at a special meeting on April 29 before opening to public consultation.

"The revaluation of our road and footpath assets has revealed the magnitude of the increase in material costs in the current environment of high inflation, with the value of those assets rising by \$157 million and our annual depreciation costs – the funds we set aside every year to replace our assets – increasing by \$5.3 million," Chief Executive Officer, Nigel Morris, told The Southern Argus.

"This is a bucket of cold water on what council was hoping to share with the community regarding a \$1 million operating surplus for 2023/24.

"Alexandrina Council is about \$4.6 million short of the revenue our Long-Term Financial Plan (LTFP) forecast we should have at the end of 2023/24.

"The impact of past decisions to lower rates less than the predicted LTFP values and, in some cases, less than inflation has caught up with us, and along with the depreciation increases created by the asset revaluations, has caused the Audit Committee and council to this year base economic assumptions on a greater than inflation CPI for 2024/25 in the draft budget. "Council administration has taken all this financial information into account in putting forward a proposal for an average 8.3 per cent rate increase to start addressing the impact of the asset revaluation while continuing to service our community in a financially prudent manner." This will be the third draft budget as Chief Executive Officer for Mr Morris, and the second where he has steered the process for the entire year. He explained, like steering a ship, it takes time to change direction, and in the case of council's finances, this is one in the same.

"When running a business or operating an organisation, getting the fundamentals right is the key to long-term sustainability," Mr Morris said.

"I have made it a priority in the past two years to undertake major financial reform within council.

"We have conducted a full review of financial services, embarked on a program of finding savings and efficiencies in every part of council, and conducted an extensive and legally required revaluation of some 20,000 sealed road, unsealed road, footpath and kerbing assets.

"Our savings and efficiency program found over \$5 million worth of savings over 18 months, ranging from inhouse roadside slashing to the automation of locking public toilets.

"In the next six months, we will be working on our A2040 Community Strategic Plan, Asset Management Plan and Long-Term Financial Plan (LTFP) – foundation documents that set the future direction for council."

This work will be especially prudent with the Essential Services Commission of South Australia's (ESCOSA) anticipated to examine council's operations this coming financial year.

"This is a legal requirement for all councils, with ESCOSA tasked with providing independent, risk-based advice for council's long-term financial decisions," Mr Morris explained.

"It is important to consider the advice when received, and the advice of our independent Audit and Risk Committee, who have suggested a measured, incremental, and long-term approach to increasing council revenue to meet rising costs.

"It is also important to follow the directions laid down in our strategic documents, especially our LTFP. "We are continuing to look at savings and assessing the level of services we provide to

Halfway through clinic trial

A nurse-led clinic trial in Strathalbyn has reached its halfway point, with reportedly positive feedback so far.

The trial is a solution to the town's closed emergency department, which "temporarily" closed its doors in 2019 due to COVID-19 and being located alongside vulnerable people in the conjoined aged-care facility.

The nurse-led model – based on something similar in Gumeracha – offers care for people presenting with urgent, non-emergency care needs for patients 10 years and older.

At a community forum last year, Member for Hammond Adrian Pederick told *The Southern Argus* that the model was a "severe downgrade" from the traditional accident and emergency service previously provided, while other community members raised concern around limited transport options and growing demand for services in Strathalbyn.

After opening in September, evaluations were to be undertaken at the six and 12-month marks, and its first assessment is positive.

"We're delighted that the Strathalbyn community has responded positively to our nurse-led clinic trial," Barossa Hills Fleurieu Local Health Network Acting Chief Executive, Bronwyn Masters, said.

"While it is still early days, over its first six months the clinic has given telephone advice to 312 patients and directly treated 162 people who may have otherwise gone straight to an Emergency Department.

"This means many more patients are getting appropriate care closer to home, without needing to travel to a hospital.

"We are continuing with the trial over the winter and will undertake a review of the service before deciding next steps."

Residents voice concern over Strathalbyn Code Amendment

Local residents have raised concerns about the potential impact a proposed Strathalbyn Code Amendment could have on nearby roads and stormwater at community information sessions held last week.

As previously reported in The Southern Argus, a proposed code amendment has been launched with the Minister for Planning Nick Champion to rezone the neighbourhood and deferred urban zoning over a portion of Lot 1000 Old Bull Creek Road and 14 Abbotts Lane to master planned township for low-density residential development purposes. Two additional overlays, including one for affordable housing, and a concept plan have also been included in the proposal. Information sessions were held last Thursday and on Saturday for the community to learn more about the proposed code amendment, provide their feedback, and ask representatives their questions.

at Thursday's session was stormwater and flooding risks.

Local residents noted significant rainfall already blocks downpipes and flows over gutters, and that in a downpour, the water flowing from properties can get 'backed up'.

Other concerns included children's safety and the impact on local roads.

"With the increased traffic using North Parade, we need to think about accessibility for children to get to and from school because that just increases the risk of trying to cross the road," one person said. Cregan lands Cabinet role

Member for Kavel Dan Cregan has accepted a new role as Police, Emergency Services and Correctional Services in the state Labor Cabinet, along with the role of Special Minister of State.

The acceptance by the Independent and former Speaker follows Geoff Brock resigning from his role as Local Government, Regional Roads and Veterans Affairs Minister last week, prompting a Cabinet reshuffle.

As Special Minister of State Mr Cregan will head the government's implementation of political donation reform.

He will have responsibility for electoral matters more broadly, the Electoral Commission of South Australia, as well as Parliamentary resources (Electorate Services).

On Monday afternoon, Mr Cregan denied reports he was joining the Labor Party.

"SA's Constitution was drafted long before the major parties evolved to dominate politics and allows Independents to be appointed to Cabinet," he said.

^{*}The decline in support for the major parties is a long-term secular trend.

"As that trend continues, I believe you will see many more independents serving in Cabinets around Australia.

"I won't be joining the Labor Party, and will remain an Independent... As well, I will vote independently on legislation before the Parliament as Geoff Brock did before me.

"Joining Cabinet will give our community a voice at the highest level of government." Mr Cregan said it was a "privilege" to be able to serve the state in the new roles, and assured local voters he would maintain his presence in Kavel.

"I will keep very focused on my community, and I am keen to make sure I am meeting my local member commitments, as well as my ministerial commitments," he said.

"I am looking forward to receiving a full briefing from the outgoing (Police, Emergency Services and Correctional Services) Minister, and also from the service chiefs in agency leads.

"I have in the past worked very closely with first responders, in, of course, the Cudlee Creek bushfire, and I am deeply grateful for their service to our state, and I am keen to support them in any way that I can in government.

"I have spoken to Grant Stevens, the Police Commissioner, who has reassured me that in meeting the staffing shortfall that police are experiencing, he is looking to regional communities, and I am very appreciative of that approach."

SA Premier Peter Malinauskas said the adjustments he has made to his ministry would best align with key emerging opportunities and challenges in the South Australian economy.

These include the housing crisis, population and job market growth accelerated by AUKUS and naval surface shipbuilding opportunities, and the implementation of the ban on political donations.

Former Labor MP Leon Bignell has assumed the role of Speaker, necessitating his temporary departure from the Labor Party.

Long Valley Road's four-hour closure



An excavator brought down powerlines on Long Valley Road last Thursday, closing off the road for almost four hours and causing mass annoyance from drivers.

A Department of Infrastructure and Transport spokesperson confirmed that at about 8.30am on Thursday, April 11, a powerline fell onto the road, near Long Valley Cottages Road, after an excavator made contact with the line.

"The road was closed in both directions, with traffic diverted onto Gemmell and Hillview Roads while repairs were undertaken, with the road reopened at 12.15pm," the spokesperson said.

"No-one was injured or trapped during the incident."

However, callers to *The Southern Argus* and social media comments have asked about the traffic management around the incident, feeling more appropriate diversions should have been put in place.

Strathalbyn resident Marcus Warren was first made aware of the closure at about 8.45am by a friend who had been turned around while heading out of Strathalbyn, along with "60 other cars".

Strathalbyn, along with "60 other cars". "I was in Mount Barker three hours later and I headed back to Strath down Long Valley Road, and you get all the way down to the roadworks and there is one guy on the side of the road," Mr Warren said.

"(There were) no signs or anything else saying, 'no, you can't come, you have to turn around and go back'.

"For something like that, they should have put a diversion in at Wistow and a diversion put in Strath saying, 'road closed'. "For all the other traffic management that has been there for 12 months – with all the lights, bells and whistles – (there

was) not a thing. (There was) just a guy in a high-vis

overalls – no signage or anything else – put his hand up (and said) 'you can't come down here, the road is closed; you have to turn around and go back'

"From Wistow, you drive eight kilometres down the road to be told to turn around and find your own way back." Mr Warren said someone should have

stepped up to put in place better detours. "Why wouldn't someone step up and

say, 'oh, this is a problem, it is taking a while, we need to put some appropriate traffic management in'?" he said.

"How a road like that could be closed for three hours with no appropriate traffic management on it – and I talk about detours being put up – is just totally irresponsible and asking for a disaster."

An SA Power Networks spokesperson confirmed they mobilised crews to turn the power off.

Five customers were affected by the outage, with their power restored within a couple of hours.

The spokesperson said it was "not uncommon" for incidents such as this one to happen.

"One of the ways in which people can lose power is vehicles hitting poles, and we get a significant number when you include traffic accidents," they said. "We probably get about 500 a year

"We probably get about 500 a year across SA... and we would go to site to make sure it is safe, so whatever work the police have to do, or if there are any ambulances involved, (make sure), crews would all be safe.

"That would be the priority, and then we would restore power."

Much to the delight of the community, a new cafe opened in Strathalbyn this week at the site that was formerly Hammer 'N' Tongs.

Hammer 'N' Tongs announced its shock closure last month due to crippling inflation costs, and the owner was "devastated" to close its doors - a feeling that was shared among the regular customers.

Now, a new local business The Vault is leasing the iconic building in the heart of town and had a soft opening on Monday, with an official opening planned for May 1.

Business partners behind the venture, Tim Pearson and Strathalbyn local Mark Gaston, also run the upscale fine dining venue Lenzerheide Restaurant in Hawthorn.

The pair work like a well-oiled machine, both as chefs by trade and working together for 25 years.

"Being a local, I've always had my eye out for opportunities," Mr Gatson, who will be in charge of the day-to-day operations, said. "This is such a great venue.

"We had a look over things and we thought,

why not? 'This is the heart of Strath, right on the River Angas."

The eatery has started off with a soft opening of coffees, savouries and sweets.

From May 1, the cafe will offer all-day breakfast and lunch menu, with top-quality ingredients, and a focus on the wood oven and wine bar.

Further down the track, the pair plan to create nightlife in the venue.

"Our vision is to have a really inviting space for the community, and bring people from the city and the Fleurieu to this hub where they know they will get great coffee and food," Mr Gatson said.

"I think it's no secret that hospitality has been through the ringer – it's one of the industries that got hit the worst (in recent years).

"A lot of places have struggled, a lot of staff moved away from the industry.

'We're very passionate and love hospitality. "We want to bring in the right staff and local producers and create some confidence in the industry.

"Hospitality is pretty simple – if people leave feeling better than when they came in, then job done."

Mr Pearson shared the passion for creating a service that makes customers want to return.

"I'm passionate about working with local producers as well - we're going to really support the local area," he said.

"(We aim to) create a story and experience for everybody."

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Adelaide Hills roads dominate worst speed camera locations

The top regional sites for drivers caught speeding by both fixed and mobile speed cameras has been revealed ahead of the school holidays, with half of them being located in the Adelaide Hills, including Paris Creek and Meadows.

According to 2023 SAPOL data, the worst location in regional SA for drivers caught speeding was the fixed camera at Crafers on the South Eastern Freeway, which nabbed 7012 motorists and cost drivers almost \$4 million, including VOC levy.

In fact, the top four regional fixed cameras were all located on the South Eastern Freeway in the Adelaide Hills - three of them being point-to-point cameras.

Of the worst mobile camera spots in regional SA, Alexandrina Road on Mount Barker nabbed fourth place, with 496 people

caught, totalling in \$208,287 worth fines, while Battunga Road and Paris Creek Road claimed seventh and ninth respectively.

Again, five of the top 10 regional mobile locations were located in the Adelaide Hills, prompting an RAA plea for Hills drivers to stick to the speed limit as school holidays begin.

"Excessive speed is one of the 'Fatal Five' causes of road trauma and contributes to 30 per cent of fatal crashes on our roads," RAA Senior Manager Safety and Infrastructure, Charles Mountain, said.

"The list of regional fixed and mobile speed cameras shows thousands of drivers are either deliberately or inadvertently driving faster than the speed limit in our regions.

"If you drive on the South Eastern Freeway, make sure you're paying close attention to the speed limit, which may be lower due to roadworks or another reason that isn't immediately obvious.

"Other roads in the Hills may have lower traffic volumes and it may be tempting to creep over the limit, but doing so puts other road users at risk.

"Drivers need to be aware that even small increases in speed mean you will travel a longer distance before you can react and bring your vehicle to a stop if something unexpected occurs on the road."

Mr Mountain said approximately 70 per cent of lives lost on SA roads occurred in the state's regions.

"With school holidays beginning, many motorists may be heading to our regions with their families during the next fortnight, so this is a timely reminder that exceeding the speed limit puts yourself and other road users at risk," he said.

"We must remember to drive to the conditions and at a speed that allows us to safely respond to unexpected situations or come to a safe stop if required.

"It's also still important to be vigilant near schools even during the holiday period as some will be offering holiday programs, so children may be present, particularly during drop-off and pick-up times."

Drivers "generally well-behaved" during SAPOL's Operation Gather

"Our traffic officers noted large volumes of traffic on the highways, particularly the Dukes Highway, and reported that drivers were generally well-behaved."

"Average age: well over 70, commitment: 100 per cent, and complaints: zero," he said. "My heartfelt appreciation to all the

volunteers from day one. "Thank you very much – a job well done.

"We have saved an important part of Milang's historical heritage for all to enjoy – the Milang Lakeside Butter Factory."

Milang Lakeside Butter Factory's history dates back to more than 130 years.

In 1893, Edwin Buckland and Arthur Lipson purchased the site and began their operations in leased space on Landseer's Store, just down the road, marking the beginning of Milang's dairy industry.

Over the time of operation, the factory became known as a place for embracing innovation.

The idea of cheese production entered the picture in 1941, and the factory produced cheese till the late 1940s.

By 1951, the factory operated as a depot, and was eventually closed and the site sold in 1974 to Claude and Phyllis Sim, who were honoured with a plaque at the nearby Manager's Cottage. Relative Robert spoke at the opening with memories of his dad doing the milk run.

The community then overwhelmingly embraced the vision of purchasing the factory and cottage in 2014, when Milang & District Community Association held a meeting.

In 2016, Milang & District Community Association (MADCA) purchased the property with \$50,000 contribution, and Alexandrina Council provided a \$325,000 grant.

Other funding included a \$150,000 State Government innovative grant, a \$20,000 State Heritage Grant, two federal grants for \$308,000 and \$400,000, with government officials invited to the opening and thanked for their support.

Fundraising efforts from volunteers, from markets and stalls, to the second-hand shop Already Read Books, raised \$60,000 over six years.

"I don't believe we have a town outside of Milang (in Mayo) that values its heritage and knows and treasures its heritage as much as Milang does," Member for Mayo, Rebekha Sharkie, said.

"To everyone who has been involved in this project – my heartfelt thanks to you in ensuring this magnificent building, with thousands of stories inside, will continue to create stories and be greatly cherished by the community."

Member for Finniss David Basham found the transformation "beautiful" and the community's work to be "fantastic".

"Yes, the grants from government certainly help, but that's just to facilitate the work that the community does," he said.

"It's certainly a piece of history that is so worthy to be saved – the dairy industry has been very important."

Over the years, some involved in the project included Mike Galea from EnvironArc, as Project Manager, and Swanbury Penglase which provided a report, concept plan and cost estimates.

Alexandrina Mayor Keith Parkes congratulated everyone involved, and is looking forward to hosting the Heritage Awards at the site in May.

"As a council and as a region, we are very, very proud of our heritage and of our history," he said.

"I hope we all get to do lots of things in this building and get to really enjoy it.

"Walking through it today, it's an absolute credit to this community, so thanks very much."

Walk the talk on budget consultation

It is pleasing to note that Alexandrina councillors have gone some way to making this year's Budget Roadshow meetings more accessible to ratepayers, with two of the three now to be held in an evening instead of mid-afternoon as was initially proposed.

But it does indicate some apparent reluctance from council administration for optimum community engagement.

Section 123 (4)(a) (1) of the Act gives Council two options for budget consultation – to have either a "public meeting" or to make provision at a council meeting for the public to "ask questions and make submissions in relation to the matter for a period of at least one hour."

It seems pretty clear to me that those two options taken together imply an expectation that a genuine public meeting for the purpose of consultation would need to be more than just the information session proposed by admin, but would also provide at least one hour for questions and submissions.

To label an information session as a public meeting – which it technically is – but not include that hour for questions and submissions may give the appearance of compliance with Section 123 of the Act, but in my view does not comply with its intent.

There is still time for council to walk the talk of genuine public engagement at this critical budget time, but the proposal as put to the elected members at Monday's council meeting does not engender confidence that they really want to know what ratepayers think.

With another large rate increase foreshadowed in this budget, now is the

time for the council administration and elected members to be told by ratepayers that enough is enough.

New home builds "painful" decline in SA

New data shows a massive fall in the number of new dwelling builds in South Australia, while Adelaide's rental vacancy rate is now the worst in the nation.

A Master Builders Australia report says "new home building in 2022-23 was quite painful, with the number of new dwelling commencements declining by 21.2 per cent to just 11,250".

This includes a 17.3 per cent reduction in new detached house starts, while the higher density home building market suffered a 35.7 per cent drop, the report says.

The reduction in new home building activity in SA came at a time when housing market pressures intensified, with rents in Adelaide rising by 5.8 per cent over the year to December 2023, and the cost of newly-built homes in the city climbing 8.3 per cent higher than 12 months ago – a bigger escalation than in nearly every other capital city. To make matters worse, new PropTrack

To make matters worse, new PropTrack data shows Adelaide is the hardest rental market for prospective tenants to break into when compared to any other city in the country.

A tiny 0.83 per cent of homes are up for grabs to lease in SA, compared with the national average of 1.08 per cent.

We know South Australia is now the disappointing title holder of toughest rental market in the nation, and when it comes to new home builds, our state is going backwards because conditions are too tough during the cost-of-living crisis.

More than a year ago Peter Malinauskas announced huge land releases, including one in the southern suburbs and work at these sites has barely started.

Peter Malinauskas must get his act together to ease pressures of the housing crisis.

Not all women in other countries are provided with the chance to play sport or take part in education, so this is also a chance to recognise the many benefits of living in a democracy, as well as remember the sacrifices women have made in so many wars.

The Langhorne Creek netball medal is in honour of Margery Phillipa Gamlin.

At the beginning of World War II, Mrs Gamlin first joined the Women's Agricultural Security Production Service (WASPS) – an organisation that helped fill the gaps when male farmers were away on active service.

In 1941 she enlisted in the Army as a Voluntary Aid Detachment (VAD), later known as the Australian Army Medical Women's Service.

She was stationed in New Guinea, 17 miles from Port Moresby on the Lalokai River – two miles south of the infamous Kokoda Track.

It was where she was to serve for the rest of World War II, witnessing and treating those marred with both physical and mental scars.

As members of the medical services in World War I and World War II, women saw the very worst of war, no doubt becoming as scarred as their male counterparts.

Like many women of her era, Mrs Gamlin, after the end of World War II, became involved with many ex-service groups, including Women's Auxiliary, Red Cross, RSL and Legacy.

When attending these Anzac Day matches, take some time to recognise how incredibly lucky we are to be able to play sport – where competition is healthy and fair play rewarded.



Dogs and their owners turned out in droves to take part in Sunday's 'Paw Party' at the Strathalbyn pool, raising about \$2000 for suicide prevention.

The event was a partnership between the Y South Australia and the Strathalbyn and Community Suicide Prevention Network.

Strathalbyn Pool Centre Manager Elysse McCabe from Y South Australia said this was the third time a Paw Party for dogs of all sizes had been run at the Strath pool, which was also the first outdoor pool in the state to take part.

"We had five sessions, as we formatted the event a little bit differently this year," she said.

"Primarily it is a community fundraiser for us, so we are keen to hear feedback from the community about how we can better the event for years to come.

"One of those suggestions was to separate the size of dogs, so we had a session for just small breeds and one for larger breeds, and we did have a couple of sessions for mixed sizes just to make sure there was something for everyone."

Participating dogs made the most of chasing each other, swimming, and fetching objects.

'This was our second year partnering

with Strathalbyn and Community Suicide Prevention Network," Mrs McCabe said.

"We are really big advocates for mental health and wellbeing, and especially mental health and wellbeing for young people.

"We are working for the YMCA, so it is a really important partnership for us, and we are really happy to be able to give them some much-needed funds to further what the network does in the community.

"We are yet to crunch the final numbers raised, but we certainly know that we have at least matched it (from last year)."

Seeing people and dogs enjoying the day was also rewarding.

"It was pretty great to see a smile on everyone's faces," Mrs McCabe said.

"It is a great event that just makes people happy, which is what it's all about.

"It was really good to see people returning that had attended the event in previous years, as well as a bunch of new faces, and it sounds like people have travelled from Adelaide and surrounds to come down and attend."

Organisers are already looking towards next year. zMrs McCabe said the event will keep running as long as the community keep attending.

New RSL mural shows Australians in conflict

The first stage of a mural illustrating a century of history of Australian soldiers in conflict on the walls of the Strathalbyn and Districts RSL Sub-Branch clubrooms has been completed.

The pictorial, which starts from the bottom of the stairwell and moves upwards, is a documentation of Australian military history, starting from the tragedy of the Boer War to modern day aircraft, that was created by silo artist Garry Duncan.

Strathalbyn and Districts RSL Sub-Branch President Cate Goodall discovered Garry's work through a military friend and asked him to create a piece that reflected the RSL.

"This gorgeous building built very kindly by the footy club - hats off to them, they've done an amazing job – was a bit grey and that's just because it's new," she said.

"We thought what can we do to make it us? We thought we'd do something that reflected Australians in conflict from the Boer War to drones, so this is an extraordinary rescope of at least 150 years.

"Garry Duncan, I met through a friend who is a military person who lives in Hahndorf, who had a painting done for himself and the attention to detail was just spectacular.

"So, I thought 'I need to talk to this bloke about (if we can) do that' and that's how we

met up with Garry Duncan."

After about a year-and-a-half of work, the first stage of the pictorial has been transformed into wallpaper and installed, making great time for Anzac Day.

The project has been an extraordinary feat, but Mrs Goodall is "very pleased" with how it has turned out.

"(Garry is) a great fan of the environment... and he'd like his work to be something that translates from A to B and not be a static representation of any one thing, so it's been extraordinary," she said.

"It was actually about the ethos of the picture, so we're starting with the Boer War and the things that happened here which are just horrendous, but I think he's done a very nice job because as you walk your way up the stairs, while it's not the easiest to photograph, it's been spectacularly well done.

"It's not a lightweight exercise, and to that end, not a cheap one either.

'While he's done the artwork in small scale, then we had to put it on wallpaper so in the event it's damaged, we can actually remedy the things that are done.

'For him to have painted it on the wall, we would have had to shut the doors and we can't afford to do that, so it's been a very sensible development."

The remainder of the mural will be done in stages.

Mrs Goodall hopes the mural makes

people appreciate the sacrifices that have been made.

She also hoped the artwork could eventually be part of the silo art trail tour.

"Whatever everyone's thoughts are about military defence and all that in the modern day, the underlining problem here is freedom is not free," Mrs Goodall said.

"Australians across the centuries have worked hard to make sure this country is free even if in the grand scheme of things some of us aren't, so I think the reality is, god aren't we lucky? People have paid with their lives for the privilege."

The annual match-up between the two local clubs returns to the Hawks' home soil this season, and promises to be another spectacle for crowds to enjoy.

¹ Strathalbyn dominated last year's contest by 48 points, but that doesn't mean A Grade Coach Simon Munn is taking this year's match lightly, noting history has shown it's "anyone's game".

"It doesn't matter where people are on the ladder, what history tells us in every new game we come up against Langhorne Creek, especially on this occasion, is it's anyone's ball game," he said.


"We don't want to be under-prepared; we want to make sure we respect our opposition and play the game it should be played.

"We want to make sure our team is all on the same page, and we transition really well from offence to defence, but then again, from defence to offence, so that's the really important part.

"On Anzac Day, one of the most important things for either team is contested balls, so that will be an emphasis given the day that it is and that it is against Langhorne Creek."

Unlike Munn, it will be Langhorne Creek Senior Coach Peter Galbraith's first Anzac Day clash with the Hawks.

He said the boys were "fired up" for the day and want to "make amends" for last year's result.

"To be my first year, I can see how much it means to them," Galbraith said.

"Speaking to a few of the lads that have played multiple Anzac Day clashes, this is a big day for them and they did not like losing last year.

"A few of the older people around the club have said it's not good to lose that clash, so I've been put on notice that I'm expected to win it." Coming into without any expectations, Galbraith is taking on the game with a "business as usual" approach.

"Obviously, it will business as usual – what we prepare for every game – but the amount of support around Langhorne Creek Football Club for this day is phenomenal," he said.

"I think what we're trying to do at Langhorne Creek is get a bit of enjoyment back in the group.

"I have a lot of young lads in the side, so just basing around the game plan that I've had before and blending that with what Langhorne Creek already do."

Both coaches and their playing groups were keen for the highly anticipated event. Munn emphasised it means a lot for the

club to play on Anzac Day. "It's one on the calendar that everyone looks forward to," he said.

"While we're fierce competitors on the field, Langhorne Creek and Strathalbyn have a lot of connections off the field and in the community, so it brings the community together and I think it's one of the best things about this rivalry, but football as a whole."

Galbraith agreed that the club loved both the rivalry and the clash.

"Being at the club for my first year, everyone is on board with (the match) and they love it," he said.

"I think we all have, in our families, people that have had to serve, and this is a great way of being able to show it.

"I think it's great to have a healthy rivalry with the club that's closest to you.

"It all goes well for a good game of footy, and I know that everyone that will go there will be treated to (that)."

The A Grade rivalry will kick off at Langhorne Creek Oval under lights from 6.30pm.

Meanwhile, netballers will take to the Langhorne Creek courts on the same day, where The Margery Gamlin Anzac Day Medal will be presented to an outstanding player.





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Anzac Day clash to bring out the best in netball rivalry...

Langhorne Creek and Strathalbyn Netball Clubs are gearing up for the coveted Anzac Day A Grade clash, with this year's medal again to be named after Margery Gamlin.

Langhorne Creek President Brooke Tonkin said the event has a finals feel about it, and Strathalbyn player Carly Lightfoot described it as "a really big game on the calendar".

With Langhorne Creek claiming the game last year, both teams are expecting a close contest at the Langhorne Creek courts

"There's always such a big rivalry between Strath and Langhorne Creek," Tonkin said. "Everyone has such a build up to the day,

and it has a really good vibe. "Then netball is played earlier than the football, so the footballers come out to support the players as well.

"I think we are the only ones that play on Anzac Day netball-wise – everyone else actually plays it on the Saturday."

Lightfoot said the players were looking forward to the match "very much". "It just highlights how lucky we are to be

able to play the sport that we do," she said. "Hopefully, we can turn (last year's

result) over. "We have recruited well this year, so hopefully we can get some wins on the board, including this one."

Margery Phillipa Gamlin - known as Phillipa – was born in New Zealand in 1918, where she was a champion swimmer before coming to Australia in 1939.

At the start of World War II she joined the Women's Agricultural Security Production Service (WASPS) - an invaluable team of women from country towns who devoted several days a week from their normal duties to assist on local farms while many men were away on active military service.

Mrs Gamlin enlisted in the Army in 1941 as a Voluntary Aid Detachment (VAD), later known as the Australian Army Medical Women's Service, and was stationed in New Guinea, 17 miles from Port Moresby on the Lalokai River, two miles south of the Kokoda Track.

It was where she served throughout the war, treating shocking and extensive casualties.

She went on to marry Max Gamlin, live in Sydney, raise five children, and then later move on to Henley Beach.

Mrs Gamlin was involved in an array of ex-service community activities such as the Women's Auxiliary, Red Cross, RSL and Legacy.

Later she moved to McLaren Vale, remaining an avid sports lover and retaining an interest in ex-service organisations and its people.



The Strathalbyn Museum is throwing open its doors this Anzac Day to help promote its World War I and World War II exhibits.

Museum chairman Warren Doman said looking at history gives you a good indication of what has happened in the past, and what could happen in the future if people are not careful.

'By preserving that history, we can show people what happened during those wars, what people in Strathalbyn were involved, and how they were involved, so that maybe (the visitors) will one day be in a position that they can help ensure that we don't have another one," Mr Doman said.

The museum has two rooms devoted to early war history, with both the tales of those who served featured, but also those on the home front and the issues they faced.

We have a board where there was a chap who lived in Strathalbyn for a couple of years, Robert Hay, and he was a dam buster, so we did a story on the dam busters because there was that connection to Strathalbyn,"

Mr Doman said.

"The dam busters were a group of pilots who flew specially adapted Lancaster bombers in World War II, and they had a secret project they had to train for, which was to bomb some dams in Germany.

"The idea was to try and interrupt the flow of work in the Ruhr Valley, and so they trained to drop a bomb that would actually bounce across the water and stop right next to the dam, sink down the edge, and explode down the bottom, with the idea that it would break the dam open.

"Flight Lieutenant Hay was a critically important part of the famed 617 squadron, led by Wing Commander Guy Gibson, and one of just three South Australians to take part in the famed raid on May 17, 1943."

Another board features the story of the ill-fated HMAS Sydney, which sank off the coast of Western Australia in World War II.

Two Strathalbyn sailors, Able Seaman Ronald Vogt – a local wheat farmer – and telegraphist Charles Honor - who learned his trade at the Milang Post Office - were among all 60 lives that were lost.





Other smaller items and stories are also featured at the museum's war section.

"We have a Lewis gun which is on display," Mr Doman said.

"It has all been now fully made safe, so it can't fire anymore.

"This was a gun that was actually brought back at the end of World War I by several soldiers who returned to Strathalbyn, broken down into pieces and put in their kit bags.

"It was (then) used between World War I and World War II by the town military group while doing their practicing.

"It is actually an aircraft Lewis gun, and if you look at the barrel, you will see it has a very small cooler on the barrel, so it was only used while the aircraft was flying, but they adapted it, and put a stand on the front and shoulder piece on the back, so it could be used on the ground."

Museum members have aimed to write stories that are "not too long and boring", with the occasional quirky side note.

"For example, there is a little story in there about a policeman who was called out to a man's house because the man was digging under the floorboards and his shovel kept hitting a piece of metal under the board," Mr Doman said.

"He pulled it out and found it was a mortar bomb, and so he called the policeman.

"The policeman looked at it, and said 'Oh, yeah, you shouldn't keep this', so he tucked it under his arm, got onto his bicycle, and road back to the police station with this bomb under his arm.

"It was sometime between World War I and World War II, so it was obvious that someone in World War I had this mortar and brought it home as a souvenir and it went under the floorboards." The museum's war history exhibits were

first collected from about 1939.

"A chap called Harold Stowe was the town clerk and they had the Centenary in 1939, so he went and spoke to all the pioneering families, and then he gathered artefacts to put on display in council," Mr Doman said.

"Over the years, people would bring in (all types of historical) things, and he would take these things on until he was about to retire in about 1975/76.

"He contacted a few of the pioneering families in the district again, and they had a town meeting and out of that, came the Strathalbyn branch of the National Trust.

"So, most of it came from him, as he collected it while in council, but we have been collecting ever since of course."

Mr Doman said the war history section attracts a "reasonable" amount of interest.

"Some people have family members that were in those wars and they are from Strathalbyn, so they are interested in seeing if there is anything to add to what they know about their history," he said.

"We do have an honor roll of all the soldiers from Strath that died during World War I and World War II, and some people like to look at that and see, 'oh, there is my grandfather' or whatever."

During World War I, about 10 per cent of the total Australian population went to war, but if you discounted the female and child population, the percentage was actually much higher.

"Rural areas were fully represented, and a lot of that was because they had a national pride and they felt that this was a thing that they should do," Mr Doman said.

"Australia needed them, so they stepped forward and the army was happy to get them.

"Most of them from a rural environment understood weapons, and were probably a reasonable shot with a rifle... And a lot of them understood horses and could ride, and so therefore, the Light Horse Brigade, for example, recruited a lot of soldiers from country areas." The Strathalbyn Museum is located at 1

Rankine Street. On Anzac Day it will be open from 1.30pm

to 4pm.

STRATHALBYN

Community members are welcome to attend the dawn service at the Soldiers Memorial Gardens on Thursday, April 25. The service will begin at 6am, so The

Ode can be played as the sun rises. People who want to join the veteran's

parade are encouraged to do so. Those who have been awarded medals,

wear them on the left and those wearing somebody else's do so on the right.

Breakfast will be provided by the Strathalbyn Football Club afterwards, and the RSL will be open to the public.

The annual Anzac Day clashes between Strathalbyn and Langhorne Creek football and netball clubs will be played at Langhorne Creek this year.

MOUNT COMPASS

For the first time, the army's 10th/27th battalion will be in attendance at Mount Compass' Anzac Day dawn service.

The service will be held at the War Memorial Hall on Peters Terrace, with community members asked to assemble at 5.45am for a 5.55am start.

The Royal SA Regiment will be coming with a full Catafalque Party, as well as a speaker and wreath layer.

After the service, people are called to pay their respects at the Wall of Remembrance, then join others for a gold coin breakfast at the hall and a game of two-up.

In addition, the Fleurieu Branch of the Ulysses Club will be doing an Anzac Day ride, meeting at Harvest The Fleurieu at 5.30am.

MILANG

Milang will have two traditional Anzac Day services for the community to attend on Thursday, April 25.

The service will be held at the recently established memorial commemorating military service to Australia by European and Ngarrindjeri men and women from the Coorong.






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Honey, check this out

An avid gardener recently started a beerilliant new hobby, of beekeeping, to improve his crops, and has been reaping what he has sown.

Goolwa's Phil Sargent has planted about 200 native species with his brother on their Goolwa property over the past two years, and has found the addition of buzzing insects are the bee's knees.

After starting processing honey about six months ago, he recently started a farm stall on Goode Street, and dreams of travelling the country and selling at markets.

Mr Sargent follows two processes, one being cold-pressed honey which gently extracts honey from the comb without heat, which maintains its natural health properties.

Raw honey has a range of health benefits, such as a good source of antioxidants and nutrition, and can help in energy supply to the brain and also help with digestion.

His spun honey rotates at 50 revolutions a minute, which aerates and creates a lighter texture.

Mr Sargent loves the health benefits of the honeycomb and honey, using it daily as a natural sweetener in his coffee, on his toast, and with spaghetti.

"It's really good for you – I love it," he said. "They ate it for health benefits back to the pyramid days."

Ninety-thousand bees typically occupy one strong hive, so using those calculations, Mr Sargent estimates having about 630,000 buzzing friends across his seven hives.

Once he had an angry hive and suffered 27 stings in one week, but believes they get that way for two reasons – the Queen has to go, or they are hungry.

In that instance, Mr Sargent fed them sugar and water which sweetened their mood.

Leading up to winter, their feed will increase

as they retreat to their hives to keep warm.

Typically, Mr Sargent finds bees naturally friendly and will give warning when bothered, by flying figure eights shapes or by bumping into people, and only stinging as a last resort.

Like other beekeepers across the country, Mr Sargent is learning new processes to manage varroa mite, which is the most serious pest affecting honey bees worldwide.

It is a key threat to Australia's honey and honey bee pollination plant industries, and while it is slowing spreading in New South Wales, South Australia currently remains varroa mite-free.

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Dairy plan launches next week

The SA Dairy Industry Action Plan will be officially launched by Premier Peter Malinauskas next week at a Mount Compass farm.

Compiled by the South Australian Dairyfarmers Association, the plan for 2024-2029 has a main goal of increased milk production.

"The plan is to do everything we can to have sustainable growth in the industry over that five-year period and into the future," President, Robert Brokenshire, said.

"There is a demand for milk, this action plan is about growing our industry to produce more so we can offer a satisfactory supply."

During the launch, the first technology of its kind in South Australia, the Amdena Dairy's DeLaval E100 Rotary built in Sweden for Mr Brokenshire's Mount Compass' 1000acre farm, will give a demonstration.

Mr Brokenshire described the system as giving more information on the cows, and "taking the guess work" out of dairy farming, which will help when his herd doubles over the next few years.

The machinery weighs cows, measures how much milk the animal is given, and keeps a record of cow's production, and sends an alert if there is a potential health or rumination issues.



The machine will also support tracking heat cycles so the farmers know the best time to artificially inseminate.

About 150 people in the dairy industry

and government officials are invited to the upcoming event, which will also include an announcement on capital works being spent on dairy farms across South Australia.

"We've done it tough for quite a lot of years," Mr Brokenshire said.

"To be able to get capital investment now is definitely a very good thing."



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Wineries look to re-establish ties with China



Langhorne Creek wine growers will look to renew ties with China in the wake of tariffs being lifted, but are not expecting "a quick fix".

Langhorne Creek Grape and Wine Executive Officer Lian Jaensch said the recent news and the announcement of a State Government support package to help growers re-engage had been "very welcome".

"It is welcome for the whole industry, but I think no-one is of any allusions that it is going to be a quick fix," she said.

"They are just really pleased to be able to get back and re-establish those relationships again.

"Many (wineries) had very strong relationships, and I am sure they kept communicating with their partners over there in China, and it is just a matter of reigniting that, and hopefully tapping back in as soon as they can.

"There's a lot of relooking at the market because things have shifted.

"Nothing stands still, so there is a lot of changes, and it is about how and where they can re-enter."

The wine industry's surplus stocks will also affect how soon the China market could welcome new produce.

"There are stocks the total wine industry has in surplus and that is certainly still sitting there, and that has to move before you can push new product in," Mrs Jaensch said.

"So, like always, you have to work on these, and there will be a slow burn... re-establishing relationships and also addressing new changes in that market in regulatory regime, which I believe has happened in the meantime as well.

"When you are not on the shelf, someone else is, and so you need to figure out where you are going to be placed in that market.

"People have been prepared because the expectation was being built that this was coming, and it is certainly welcome to have access to that market again, and have those good relationships.

"There is certainly still an appetite we believe in the Chinese population for Australian premium wine, so it is just a market we can tap back into."

In October 2020, prior to the start of tariffs, China was South Australia's largest wineexport market with exports valued at \$946.5 million, accounting for 47.2 per cent

of South Australia's wine exports globally. For the year ending January 2024, wine

exports to China were valued at \$2.8 million. Mrs Jaensch said the struggles with China were just one of several challenges that had hit the wine industry in recent years.

"The industry across the board is grappling with the red grape oversupply, and that is continuing," she said.

"China won't fix that overnight.

"We are continually trying to balance the supply/demand ratio, but it has certainly had a lot of impact in the past few years.

"The China market, a lot of global disruption, hang-ons from COVID, and all those sorts of things have helped exacerbate that."

The State Government's \$1.85 million support package comprises five key components:

• Two-way market activation and immersion – \$600,000.

• Promotional marketing and communication campaigns - \$500,000.

• Wine export advisor – \$400,000.

• Technical co-operation – \$250,000.

• Exporter capability building – \$100,000. Meanwhile, Mrs Jaensch said the local Vintage was almost over.

"There is some pretty nice fruit coming out of it, and we just look towards the great quality that comes out of this region, and for people to enjoy and support our local wine industries,' she said.

"There was early and late winter rainfall but a gap of dry in between, and September/ October were very dry, and we had a little frost then I think.

"We had wet November, December, January, so it peaked with some late wet, but overall, I don't think it has been the accumulative rainfall over the season (that has impacted).

"It was a pretty mild summer, but we did have a bit of heat around the Adelaide Cup, and we had four hot days there, with the night time temperatures staying warm as well.

"But at least it was just four days and it was a matter of managing for that... that was probably the biggest challenge this season – that March when your reds are starting to come through for harvest."

Langhorne Creek Vintage reports are that Shiraz is strong, as is Grenache and Cabernet.

"I think people are really pleased with the acid balance in the whites this year too, so we are looking forward to some nice wines, but it is a tough industry environment all round at the moment, that can't be denied, but we have some positive things on the horizon, which we will look forward to," she added.







'The best' Aquafest yet

Organisers behind Goolwa's Aquafest are reeling with joy after the success of last weekend's event, with many describing it as the best one yet.

A variety of vintage, classic, and modern race and speedboats, from the early 1950s to the present, gave "spirited demonstrations" and were display at Goolwa Aquatic Club (GAC).

On Saturday, boaters tested their vehicles before the big day on Sunday, when more than 40 boats across nine categories paraded four laps around a 1.4km course.

An estimated 3000 spectators came in droves across the two days, while many families ate picnics on the lawns, and lines of cars parked for 1km from the club.

"It was tremendous – the weather was fantastic," committee member, Neil Oatway, said.

"We had the biggest crowd on Saturday that we've had in the 15 years of running it – lots and lots of people – it was excellent. "The people I've talked to have said it's the best one they've been to." Some of the highlights were one of the fastest boats in Australia, supercharged at 2000-horse power, speed skiers, and it

a barefoot skier.

Much to the delight of onlookers, a plane surprised everyone by flying loops over the crowds on Saturday.

Rev-heads were in their element – as well as browsing the special boats, they also got to see more than 70 vehicles on the lawns from the visiting Victor Harbor Classic Cars N Coffee Club.

Aquafest is the signature annual event for GAC Speedboat Community and has been running for about 15 years.

Postponing during COVID meant some boaters moved on to different hobbies, but now numbers of participating boats are bouncing back.

"The longer you do things, the better you get at it," Oatway said.

"It was such a success... it was a really positive atmosphere.

"It'll take us a while to get over this one – there are a few sore bodies floating around."

Oatway thanked the volunteers and sponsors for playing an integral role in the event, including Victor Harbor Goolwa Sea Rescue Squadron, saying without the support from all of them, "we could never put it on". Journalist Tara Nash was lucky enough to ride on one of the boats in the lead up to the event. Read about it on page 10.



Nellie walks her way to **World Championships**

Mount Compass race walker Nellie Langford has qualified for her first World Teams Race Walking Championships.

The event takes place in Turkey, on April 21, with Langford flying out on Tuesday for the international meet.

"It is an under 20 and Open aged competition where you represent your country for individual medals like normal, but there is also a team's component to it," Langford said.

The 18-year-old qualified for the 10km event at a national championship competition in Adelaide in February.

"It was announced a couple of weeks ago, you pretty much know from the race, but the third spot is always discretionary, and that was my spot, I got third in that race." Langford said.

Unlike running, race walking comes with it some extra conditions.

"Race walking in general, there is a whole technique to it, but there's two main rules," Langford said.

"The first one is keeping contact with the ground at all times, so this is measured just by the eye.

"There are judges set up all around the course, just making sure.

"It is not like running where you have lots of flight time, to the eye you need to keep one foot on the ground at all times.

"The other rule is a straight knee at the point of contact - so your leg that lands in front, you want to have to have a heel to toe motion and your knee needs to lock as it lands, and as it comes through under your body it bends, otherwise you wouldn't be able to walk properly.'

Langford said she had grown up with a love for sport.

"I have always liked sports, being active and outside, and I never really stood out in the other events, to be honest, so once I started getting some success in it (I had to focus)," Langford said.

"I kind of wanted to stick with running, and not be pulled away from it, but I realised I could get the same benefit that you get from running.

"We had a national camp at the start of the year, and because there is not as many people in the sport, you have more of a chance to get to those competitions. "It is a tight-knit community, all the

walkers, a lot of really smart people and exciting people.

"It is really hard work, but you get so much reward out of it."

Langford said she feels "very lucky" to have made the Australian team. "I planned a couple of years ago, when

I found out what these championships were, it was always the goal to make the team, but it has only started to feel real in the last couple of weeks," she said.

"It is quite nerve wracking but I have got a really good team around me to help me do my best while I am there.

"It is obviously more about the path that I took to get there, than the performance on the day, although I would really like to get a PB or improve on my seed placing.

"I am ranked about 22nd on the start list that came out a few days ago, so I would really like to improve on that.

Langford has fought sickness and injury since finishing year 12 last year, where she had high hopes of having a break-out season - and now just feels thankful to be selected for the international competition.

She battled a chest infection during a national camp at Perisher, and was unable to finish an important race in Canberra - and then about six weeks ago sustained bone stress in one leg.

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500 GAMES: Nathan Duffield make

No one sets out to play 500 games in football, but it's a milestone Strathalbyn's Nathan Duffield is rapidly approaching, making him the first in the club to do so.

The local businessman started his football career around four or five years of age as a way of getting involved with the community, starting in what would be considered as Auskick now but was the Under 12s back then, before later progressing into the senior grades.

Football quickly became a constant in Duffield's life and is part of his routine, even today.

"Apart from my early 20s - I travelled overseas for a couple years periodically and later on (when) my mum passed away, I didn't play for a couple years, but other than that, it was just a constant thing," he said.

'You make a lot of friends, and it's about being involved with the community with like-minded people to a certain degree.

"At those younger ages, it was probably about being part of a social group and involved with your mates at school, then as you get older, the competitive side starts kicking in."

Aside from some time spent playing for the Sturt Reserves in the SANFL, Duffield has been with Strathalbyn through thick and thin.

Though some clubs did attempt to poach him, it was the strong bonds he had forged with his teammates and peers that kept him tethered to Strathalbyn.

"I guess I had some strong bonds with a couple of my peers at the time," Duffield explained.

Some of them are long since retired, but when we first started playing A Grade footy in the early 90s, Strath, the first two years I played, finished eighth and ninth, but we had a predominantly local base.

"Then probably a group of four or half a dozen of us who were the core nucleus of the A Grade went through those periods when we struggled to ultimately win a couple of premierships down the track.

"As a collective we had a drive to see the club succeed and we all wanted to win a premiership, so that probably kept me here.

"(There was) one particular time I thought about leaving, but those bonds were pretty strong and kept me in Strath."

And it was good thing he did because in 2000, the club won its first A Grade Grand Final in 13 years.

It's a moment Duffield will never forget.

"We played in the Grand Final in 1996 and got beaten, then over those next few years, that bond with a few of my peers and local mates of mine grew and obviously, we wanted that success, so every premiership is special, but that one was probably more special because it was with my peers of the same age," he said.

"Premierships – obviously they get one

every year - but sometimes the results take years.

"The one in 2000 probably took us a good six years to build towards, so it comes with a great amount of satisfaction – it is one of those things that is hard to describe.

"Funnily enough, in a couple of weeks it's all done and dusted, and you're onto the next year and trying to either defend it or build to win another one."

Strathalbyn went on to win two more A Grade premierships with Duffield involved - one in 2010 and another in 2014.

Duffield also contributed to the Reserves Premiership in 1993, and had plenty of other success on and off the field, most notably winning the 2003 Mail Medal, being an Association, Zone and Country Championships representative player, and most recently, being inducted in the Great Southern Football League (GSFL) Hall of Fame.

But none of that compares to the feeling of team success and the enjoyment of seeing everyone celebrate the wins, whether they are big or small, for him.

"A lot of those moments are individual awards, which - don't get me wrong - I've always said you've got to be a little bit driven in your own personal space to succeed, and for me, I always wanted to be week to week in the best players because you've got to have some sort of personal drive," Duffield said.

"I think they're something people look back on after they've retired because they're all

good to win, but team success is the ultimate and the premiership is the pinnacle of that.

"For me, as you get older, (particularly) the later premierships I won, you enjoy the club environment and the people behind the scenes, whether it's the canteen volunteers, the people around the club, and the trainers.

"Those premierships later on, the focus is on those guys and seeing the enjoyment they got out of it more so than my own personal enjoyment."

While many would attribute Duffield's career to individual success, he credits a lot of his on-field performance to his coaches.

A few that stood out to him included

Trevor Berriman, Chris Simounds, Kevin Wray - who won a Mail Medal himself and coached the team at the time to Junior Colt premierships - as well as Trevor Vowels.

In addition, Duffield remembered Harvey Chenoweth, who coached the 2000 A Grade premiership, Peter Simmons, who coached the 2010 A Grade premiership and is now his business manager, and Tony Burgess, who coached the 2014 A Grade premiership. But the coach who made the most impact

for Duffield was Brenton Smith.

"Probably now when I look back on what I've done and the player I turned into, I probably credit him a lot back in those Senior Colt years," he said.

"He was an old school sort of coach back in those times, but very driven himself and for some reason, I acclimatised to that really well and took a lot out of his coaching."

Smith is another famous face around the football club and coached the Senior Colts for three years.

He described Duffield as a 'tallish, but not strongly built' player in those early days, who followed instructions well, much to the team's benefit.

"(Nathan) had plenty of confidence and pretty good skills, and what he did do was listen to what you had to say to him and he would carry out the instructions you would give him," Smith said.

"Sometimes it was a case of taking him away from the play to the benefit of the team.

This is a testament to his dedication, skill and enduring passion for the game.

"He had some much bigger and better opponents on him at times in his very early days, who were much more capable than what he was, but because he carried out my instructions, it was better for the team.

"He was moved into different areas where the ball wasn't likely to go, so it would open up opportunities for other players, so he was really very responsive to playing for the team.

"He understood pretty quickly that sometimes you don't always have to get the ball personally to be a really valuable role in the team."

As time wore on, Smith noted Duffield became stronger and a focal point of the team.

Duffield was particularly handy in his first A Grade game, of which Smith recalled he earned himself a nickname around the club.

"I can remember his first A Grade game... where he came on and played in the forward pocket and he kicked three goals," he said.

"From then on, he was going around the footy club calling himself 'Nathan Modra', so that went on for a quite a couple of years."

Eventually, Duffield became a coach himself, leading the charge in the Reserves. "It's just a natural progression in a way,"

Duffield said. "When my peers were finished in their mid-30s they never went on to play B Grade footy, so the B Grade lacked numbers, and trying to keep younger guys coming out of senior footy was hard.

"Then the club was at a bit of a crossroads five or so years ago and were looking at how we rectify those types of things, and that's when Peter Simmons got involved.

"I made the call to \tilde{h} im to say 'why don't you come back to coach here in Strath?' and then it rolled from there, and it was 'if you do the A Grade, I'll do the B Grade' and it sort of started from there.

"I never thought I'd be (a playing coach) myself, but we struggled for players and we don't have a lot of tall players in Strath – we're only starting to see some younger guys now that are probably my height or a little bit more – so I guess that's why I've played a little bit longer than most people too because not having a lot of youth that have height kept me in the game."

The first year as coach was a struggle, but as the years have gone on, the script has flipped and now the team has a plethora of players to choose from each week. "The first year we had 10 or less dedicated

"The first year we had 10 or less dedicated Reserves players, so we were using Senior Colts and struggled through that first year into the second year, whereas now it's the total opposite," Duffield said.

"I think we've got probably 65-plus players in the senior group and I've got probably 38 or so in the B Grade, so it's gone the other way, so it's hard to manage from that perspective to give everyone game time.



"It's been a challenge of the years, but pretty rewarding, and the atmosphere socially within the football club among the senior players and the junior grades is really good.

"Hopefully now the next job is to have some more on-field success and win a premiership because it's been 10 years."

Playing his 500th game is not something he ever imagined would happen, but it will soon become a reality.

For Duffield, the milestone is a reflection of the time he's poured into the sport.

"I don't think you set out from your first A Grade game thinking 'yeah, I'm going to play 500 of these', it's something that just sort of happens in a way," he said.

"Over the years I never gave it too much thought, but obviously, late last year and being three or so games away, you get that close, so it was something that was there to be done.

"It will probably mean a bit more later when you're finished, but it's obviously quite a considerable amount of games."

The milestone will be the first achieved by a member of the Strathalbyn Football Club.

Club President Phil Eatts said it's "enormously significant" on all levels.

"There would be very few people anywhere in any league of football that have played 500 games, so for him to do that is amazing, and not just do it, but do it at a very high standard is very important to be noted," he said.

"From the late 90s to now, he's done a huge amount with his playing career, especially at A Grade level... then as he's got in his later part his career, he's contributed with five years of Reserves coaching, so over that duration, a huge amount of leadership and support for the football club.

"(He'll be leaving behind) a legacy of being a fierce competitor, and good sportsman and person."

At the end of the season, Duffield will look to step away from the coaching position and from football altogether.

Reflecting on his time at Strathalbyn, he appreciated the good and the bad, and all the people who came together to make each game and season possible.

"It's a been a lot of memories, from success to times we weren't going that well," Duffield said.

"When you're younger you probably don't take too much notice of those sorts of things, but as you get older, you appreciate the work the volunteers do around the club a lot more."

He also acknowledged his family and their sacrifices, and their contribution to his 500 milestone as well.

"Early days, like everything your parents, in my case especially, my mother was a great volunteer at the club for many years," Duffield said.

"I played 300-plus games when she passed away and I thought that was enough because that was our bond I suppose, so I gave it away for a couple of years, but fell back into old habits.

"I was probably going to retire a few years ago, and (my wife Heidi) was the one who probably wouldn't let me in a way.

"Your direct family need to be number one on the list because they're the ones who do

things without you when you're at training and during the games."

Smith praised Duffield for his loyalty, saying his "heart and soul" has always been in the club.

"He has been great for our footy club and 500 games is an enormous achievement," he said.

"He had plenty of approaches through his journey to go to other clubs, which I think he pondered very seriously on occasion... but in the end he decided to stay at Strathalbyn and over his journey he has accomplished a lot.

"There's no doubt we had a lot of expectation of him throughout that time to deliver for our footy team and most of the time he did.

"There were very few occasions where he wasn't able to get out at his best, but they were very few and far between."

Duffield looked forward to spending more time in retirement watching his sons play football, and waiting for the next person to join him in the 500 club.

"My oldest one plays at Strath, and my youngest one is playing U18s down at South Adelaide and is going pretty well down there," he said.

"I don't get the chance to watch him very often, so it will be good to put some time back into them and see how they progress.

"Hopefully, who knows? Down the track there's an Auskicker now that possibly sees me play 500 games and is doing it in 30-or-40 years' time.

"Hopefully, I'm around to see someone else do it."
