A crowd of about 2500 people are expected to line the riverbanks in the lead up to the big countdown.


Some families spread out on rugs enjoying picnics while others build up anticipation at nearby house parties or events leading up to the clock striking midnight.

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Hills transport issues put under the spotlight at public forum

A local transport forum brought together community members and politicians last Thursday night to discuss the future of transport in the Adelaide Hills, particularly the South Eastern Freeway and passenger rail options, and share solutions.

Organised by the River Road and Strathalbyn Road Traffic Group, the forum was held at the Mount Barker Town Hall in the shadow of two years of missed opportunities, cancelled projects and widespread recognition, and concern that the State and Federal Governments have no over-arching plan to streamline connectivity and put in place adequate plans for the fast-growing and economically expanding Adelaide Hills.

It was also an opportunity for locals to connect with state and federal politicians, particularly the candidates running for the seat of Mayo at the upcoming election, and express their views, discuss ideas and seek their position on the issue.

Guest speakers included concerned community members Emma Smith-Jones and Jeremy Roberts, one of the organisers Anne Fordham, RAA Senior Manager of Road Safety Charles Mountain, and Mount Barker District Council Mayor David Leach.

Ms Fordham was pleased by the turn-out from the community.

"I think it was really good at getting people together, and we had people there with common issues and concerns – I think that was really positive," she said.

"I think we also agreed on some initiatives we'd like to see happen in the region, and the revitalisation of the plan that was done by DIT we got through Freedom of Information.

"We had some good liaison with Local Governments, and we also had a good opportunity to meet some of the Mayo candidates.

"It was disappointing not to have Rebekha Sharkie there and also the Labor representative because Rebekha had another appointment and Labor hasn't yet declared a candidate.

"Robert Simms from the Greens gave a very good presentation and gave us a sense what the Greens can offer, but again, they didn't have a candidate."

One of the hot topics on the night was the Mount Barker and Adelaide Hills Transport

Study which, while outdated, had many initiatives community members at the forum wanted to see such as improved traffic flows down the freeway, ring roads, and dedicated truck and commuter routes.

Other discussion points included future planning, potential for passenger rail, the cost of infrastructure, the accountability of government to ensure they meet promises and listen to the community, truck issues, and potential grant options.

The meeting followed with group discussion to workshop ideas and speak with some of the government representatives in the room, including Rex Patrick and Robert Simms.

Ms Fordham acknowledged the challenges, but expressed the need for regional planning on transport issues, and collaboration between governments and the community.

"I think there was some uplifting moments, a lot of frustration in the room, and I think people appreciated the opportunity to come together and discuss it," she said.

"Could we have gotten further? Probably, but it was a good start and I think the political representatives got a very good appreciation of the issues we're facing, so it's really up to them now and how they take that forward in terms of how they campaign and what they're going to offer.

"We've got time for that to happen – that's why we ran (the forum) a little bit earlier before the campaign starts to try and have some influence on what they might focus on, and maybe it will put a bit of pressure on the current incumbent to put a stronger focus

on these sorts of issues because I think the Liberal candidate is all over it.

"I think we would like to lobby for this idea of applying for federal investment funds, and also continue to have dialogue with the candidates as they continue to emerge, and try to make sure community interests are represented in that, and they understand what the issues are and what people are needing.

"I think also ideally we'd like to put pressure on the government to revitalise the so-called transport study and come up with, through the Premier, a really robust plan that the councils could get behind, and integrate some of the broader state planning they're doing but a bit more detailed to help the region with some of these pressing issues."

Safety calls for Goolwa Beach


After a problematic Christmas season on Goolwa Beach two years ago, a local security company increased their patrols last year resulting in a "much better" period.

Two years ago, Great Southern Security reported an "out of control" season with four-wheel drive cars camping in the dunes, destroying vegetation and leaving litter

The company is contracted by SA Water to ensure drivers and campers stay off the dunes which has fragile ecosystems, can erode and has cultural significance for Indigenous peoples.

Last Christmas, increased patrols coupled with cooler weather offered a better season according to Great Southern Security, which is planning a "bigger presence" on the beaches again this Summer.

"Last year was certainly much better than



will be pretty much the same," owner, Ian Haylock, said.

'It's just educating – 99.9 per cent of the time, when you stop and educate, people are pretty good and they behave."

One year ago, speed limits were reduced on South Australian beaches, a law that is enforced by South Australia Police (SAPOL) but Great Southern Security helps remind

From December last year, the default 100km/h speed limit was reduced to 40km/h and 25km/h if driving within 50m of a

"Some like to scream down the beach at much higher speeds than 40km/h," Mr Haylock said.

"It's educating those to say 'hey look, there are families, kids, animals on the beach - you need to adhere to the speed limit and be conscious of that and drive to the conditions'.

"While there are a lot of locals there, a lot of people over that time of year are coming to Goolwa Beach for the first time and are unaware of the rules.

"Some of them were unaware that the speed had changed - the last time they were out there the speed was still 100km/h."

SAPOL has not detected any motorists nor received any recent traffic complaints regarding speeding along Goolwa Beach.

A spokesperson acknowledged that Goolwa Beach is a "popular destination" during the holidays and reminded motorists to drive to the limit.

'(SAPOL) implores all road users to be vigilant during this busy time, remembering to stick to the posted speed limits, not to drink or drug drive and be alert with the increase of pedestrians who might be in the

"Police want people to enjoy the break with family and friends, but also remind people to make it a Christmas holiday filled with happy memories - not traumatic ones.

'Speeding on beaches is dangerous, reckless and poses a risk to the community as well as causing damage to the environment."

Anyone witnessing dangerous driving behaviours is urged to report the incident to police via the police assistance line on

Meanwhile, cars often get bogged at the ramp entering the beach.

"Don't forget it's (for) four-wheel drives not an all-wheel drive or two-wheel drives," Alexandrina Mayor, Keith Parkes, said.

You need to have a four-wheel drive and preferably know how to drive it, so you don't get bogged and cause hassles for yourself and everybody else."

People urged to 'assess the risks' while at Goolwa Beach

Less surveillance on Goolwa Beach this Summer and holiday period has Alexandrina Council and the local Surf Life Saving Club imploring people to swim between the flags and assess the risks before heading into the water.

Volunteer life savers will be on the beach from 12pm-6pm every weekend and public holiday until the Easter long weekend.

However, unlike other years, councilfunded lifeguards will be absent on weekdays over the holiday period after councillors decided to remove the money for it from the budget in June.

If people do get in trouble outside of those hours, they can contact Triple Zero and get onto a life saver, however, Goolwa Club Captain Cassie Wilmot is asking people to take the responsibility on themselves to assure they keep safe.

"I think any time we take away trained professionals that can help people when they get into trouble causes concern for the community and the people that are heading to the beach," she said.

'We know we have a number of tourists and foreigners that do frequently visit Goolwa Beach, so to not have people there that can help them, guide them in the right direction, and outline where the rips are, we can always come into trouble.

"We just want people to remember that while (life savers) are not there, they need to take the responsibility on themselves to assure they keep themselves safe when they do go to a beach that's not necessarily the usual beach they visit.

"I think the most important thing is that people really stop, look and plan, and determine whether they have the skill set to be entering the water in the conditions they're seeing, and if they don't, there really are other beaches in the region they can go to that are calmer and less severe.

"We do know that Goolwa is the most dangerous patrolled beach in South Australia and that does come with a risk, and we just want everyone to know there are risks.'

One of the most important things people can do to keep safe is swim between the flags if they are there, and to read the signs as you enter the beach.

Also make sure you let people know you are at the beach and how long you will be there, so if you don't come back, someone knows where you are, and emergency services can begin looking and helping.

"Our main messaging is really stop, look and plan," Ms Wilmot said.

"Before you enter, determine what hazards and what risks there are as you're entering, and definitely know your limits.

"There are plenty of pools in the area go for a swim in the pool if you're not a strong swimmer.

"(Also), alcohol and swimming are not friends – they do not like each other; we

don't recommend it."

The beach is also restricted to speed

Alexandrina Mayor Keith Parkes reminded people to drive to the conditions and be mindful of other hazards on the beach.

"I think you've got to remember the new speed limits of 40km/h or 25km/h within proximity of people, and it will be policed by SAPOL," he said.

"It's there so the beach is safe for everybody to enjoy in comfort and safety.

"As with any beach anywhere in South Australia or Australia, be mindful, particularly on Goolwa Beach, it can be a dangerous beach and you should only really swim within the flags when Surf Life Saving are on patrol for your safety.

"If the flags aren't flying it means the lifesavers aren't on patrol, and you should be really careful about swimming and not going into the water too deep, and try and keep an eye on what's going on."

Man arrested over Murray **Bridge siege**

A local man was arrested following an incident at Murray Bridge last Wednesday.

At about 11.30pm on December 11, police were called to Jarvis Avenue following reports of a disturbance in the street.

A group of people left in a vehicle prior to police patrols arriving.

Police also received information that one person was in possession of a firearm.

Murray Bridge police identified the people involved and later found the vehicle parked at a home in Francis Street.

Police set up cordons around the home, and with the assistance of STAR group officers, safely negotiated two female occupants out of the home.

A man was then found hiding in the roof space, who was subsequently arrested.

A search of the suspect vehicle uncovered a gel blaster.

A 20-year-old Murray Bridge man was charged with possessing a firearm without a licence, threatening to kill, and other traffic offences.

He was refused police bail and appeared in Murray Bridge Magistrates Court last Friday.

Beware of parcel theft this Christmas

South Australians are being urged to be aware of parcel security if they're ordering deliveries online during the Christmas period, with thousands of packages likely to be stolen across Australia in the coming weeks.

Australia Post has delivered more than 50 million parcels during previous December periods in the lead-up to Christmas, creating a spike in opportunities for thieves to strike when no one is around.

RAA Insurance is highlighting simple steps that can be taken to reduce the risk of having expensive deliveries stolen ahead of Christmas, including:

- Requiring a signature on delivery for expensive parcels, so they aren't left unattended.
- Sending your deliveries to a workplace or where someone will be present.
- Installing security cameras to deter thieves or prove a theft occurred.
- Installing a lockable parcel delivery box. RAA Insurance Chief Claims Officer Jess Lyons said parcel theft was a growing concern for homeowners.

"No one wants to have their Christmas presents stolen from the front porch," she said.

"Unattended deliveries present opportunities for thieves to pounce if they're walking past and can see a package sitting in the open air.

"We recommend always keeping an eye on the tracking page of any deliveries, so you know when to expect them and can bring them inside as soon as possible, or have them delivered to a workplace or somewhere where you know there will be people around to accept it even if you're not there.

"Other measures like requiring a signature on delivery or sending it to a secure parcel locker can also reduce the risk of having a delivery disappear."

If delivered parcels do unfortunately go missing, shoppers should contact Australia Post or the relevant delivery service to confirm it was delivered and if anything can be done to locate it.

CCTV vision can help to determine it was stolen and make a police report, so homeowners are encouraged to have cameras installed at their front door.

Homeowners may also be able to submit an insurance claim with their home and contents insurer if they have a parcel stolen, depending on their policy.

Trio arrested over break-in

Police arrested three suspects earlier this month following a break-in at Murray Bridge.

At about 3.15pm on Saturday, December 7, police were called to Riverfront Road after three people entered a shack and confronted the occupants.

One suspect was wearing a balaclava and armed with a knife.

The occupants immediately fled the home and called police.

The suspects allegedly stole alcohol, phones, and other personal items.

Police quickly responded and arrested the three suspects a short distance from the scene.

The arrested trio are two men aged 26 and 20, and a 16-year-old boy - all from Murray Bridge.

They were all charged with aggravated serious criminal trespass and theft, and will appear in the Murray Bridge Magistrates and Youth Court on February 9 and February 4 respectively.

Investigations are ongoing.

Victims given stronger voice

Reforms to give victims of crime a stronger voice in the criminal justice system have passed State Parliament.

The reforms aim to address concerns raised by the former Victims Rights' Commissioner Bronwyn Killmier about the potential for victim impact statements to either go unheard or be edited by third parties before their provision.

Under the reforms, prosecutors will be able to seek an adjournment when a guilty plea is entered unexpectedly and victims need more time to prepare a statement.

In addition, victims will be able to tell the court in their own words the impact the offending had on them without the risk of being edited.

Victims will also be advised of their rights to tender a statement and, following an amendment from Connie Bonaros, courts will have the discretion to allow loved ones of a person who died or suffered a serious injury in connection with criminal conduct to submit a statement to the court.

"The victim impact statement is an important moment in the criminal justice process, and victims deserve to have their voices heard," Attorney-General, Kyam Maher, said.

"These laws ensure potential impediments are reviewed and victims can have their moment in court."

Murray Bridge man jailed over offences

A Murray Bridge man has been handed a jail term for several child sex offences.

Troy Lang, aged 26, appeared in the District Court last Monday for sentencing after pleading guilty to 27 different child sexual offences across an 11-month period throughout 2023 and 2024.

Judge Michelle Sutcliffe sentenced Mr Lang to seven years imprisonment with a non-parole period of five years, seven months and six days, backdated to January 8, 2024.

Historic police station is sold

If the walls of Milang's historic 1874 police station could talk, as well as telling the rich history of housing officers and criminals, they will now tell of the renovations made in recent years by Jodie Lutz and Manuel Quinquis.

Located between the post office and Milang Institute, the building housed about 24 officers and their families for a century and hosted the visiting Magistrate.

It was decommissioned in 1972, and was first restored from 2013.

The station had a three-bedroom villa, a public office, prison cells, stables and groom's quarters.

Its history can still be seen throughout the building, including the old exercise yard that is now an entertaining area with Jarrah pergola, and old cells are now a new cellar.

The home also has a central hall to the living room, master, and formal dining room – all adorned with fireplaces – and the dining room with outside access via Cedar French doors.

Over their four years at the property, Ms Lutz and Mr Quinquis largely left their mark by transforming the stables out the back into an attractive guesthouse and developing the cottage garden.

Mr Quinquis hopes their work has secured the building for another 150 years to come.

"You own a part of the history, so when you think about it that way, you can only be respectful of the building and the structure of the architecture," he said.

"Then we're handing over this book with



its history and 100-year-old drawings."

The couple have lived in and developed largely off-the-plan homes in cities around the world, but hands-down, this was the most interesting property they have worked on.

What made the project so enriching was honouring the history in their renovations as well as meeting people with connections to the property.

"We found ourselves spending more time here... we fell in love with this property in Milang, it's a really lovely community," Ms Lutz said.

"People have knocked on the front door wanting to come in because their relatives

were constables based here.

"We've heard some pretty good stories about the history of the property."

The couple has brought tourists to the region by opening up the studio accommodation to more than 50 couples over two years.

For the majority, it was their first time visiting Milang and the region, and they "absolutely loved it".

With the couple venturing to a new project at Christies Beach, the property was recently sold by Harris Real Estate Property Consultant Sally Ness who loves when the "right people come into the right property", as the couple appreciated and honoured its rich history.

"I love when people come in and enhance rather than demolish or modernise," she said.

"I'm very lucky that I've been able to sell some very historic properties."

Living in the area her whole life, Ms Ness appreciates and understands the "beautiful history" of the region's townships.

"With the growth of Milang, there are more people coming here and investing here," she said.

"Milang is changing – it's not the little shack town on the lake anymore."

Unfair treatment

The collapse of Beston Foods highlights the most unfair treatment metered out to primary producers by current insolvency law.

Time for action by our lawmakers to rectify this discrimination of our nation's food producers.

Many years ago, workers involved in failed business were lifted to the status of secured creditors – an understandable and desirable change.

Is it not factual that process workers would not have had a job without primary products suppliers?

Yes, it is called primary production for a reason.

The start – the beginning point – for secondary enterprise.

Not even the insolvency managers of a failed food processing company would have had a job without the primary product suppliers providing the raw materials to start with.

And the administrators will be paid in full. Come on politicians – do the job that you are paid to do and make the changes to our laws for the financial security of food producers and end this shameful discrimination.



"It is a very good thing to donate. "(It is) a brilliant thing to present to



Shana plans to study a Bachelor of Medicine at Flinders University next year, while continuing to serve as a support worker and leader on the worship team at her church.


She was excited to gain more independence, and study something she wants to do.

The pair are urging people to be safe on the roads ahead of the Christmas/New Year period...



Hindmarsh Island family stresses the importance of road safety during Christmas/New Year period

Warning: readers may be distressed by the following details.

A Hindmarsh Island mother who is still impacted by her daughter's car accident two decades on is urging parents and their children to discuss the consequences of making poor choices behind the wheel ahead of the Christmas/New Year period.

The holidays are one of the worst times of the year for road accidents in South Australia.

For Hindmarsh Island mother Veronica Karpinski, she wants families to talk to one another about the seriousness of road safety to avoid some of the life-long impacts from her daughter's car accident that affect both of them to this day.

It was a Friday night in June 2004 – a year the state had been lashed by terrible rains – and Ms Karpinski's daughter Theresa Dennis was in the car with her then-boyfriend of three months, travelling up Flagstaff Hill Road, when he decided he was going in the wrong direction and slammed on the brakes to perform a U-turn.

The car allegedly spun and hit a stobie pole on the passenger's side, causing it to fold over the car and hit Ms Dennis' head, leaving her with a permanent brain injury that forces her to rely on others to help her with most everyday tasks and use a sign board to speak.

In the early years proceeding the accident, Ms Karpinski and her late husband primarily cared for Theresa, but now she has two carers who provide assistance through the NDIS.

While both are glad Theresa survived the accident, it does come with its consequences.

The predominant lasting impacts of the accident for the mother and daughter is

the hard work that goes into every day, and planning for the future.

"You need all the help you can get so you're not alone," Ms Karpinski said.

"Before, you could be old, go into a nursing home, and your life's set – mine isn't set and neither is Theresa's.

"We don't know what's going to happen tomorrow.

"Most people don't, but I feel like one of those flowers that only lasts 48 hours then they die, so I just live for today and if it doesn't work, doesn't matter, I'm hoping there is a tomorrow.

"Theresa, she doesn't worry at all – she lives life at the moment and she's got a much better attitude than me."

The biggest message the pair have for people is to talk to one another about the consequences of making poor decisions behind the wheel, and to remember the road rules have been put in place to protect, not hinder them

"The consequences and lifetime of their mistakes is either pain in their parents' heart or the whole loss of life as they know it," Ms Karpinski said.

"It's not everybody who will keep their children at home; it just so happened my husband was the GP and I was the nurse, and we were able to do it for as long as he lived.

"Parents shouldn't yell at their kids because they're all going to make mistakes.

"(Instead) make kids aware of the rules – they're not made to punish them, they're made to keep them safe.

"You can prevent getting into a car with a bad person, and you can prevent going to a place you know serves alcohol and drugs – still go, but be aware of what you're taking."

Waste services over the festive season

With the busy Christmas and holiday season upon us, and the weekly collection of recycling in full swing, Fleurieu Regional Waste Authority (FRWA) kerbside waste collections will still occur on all public holidays except Christmas Day.

Wednesday, Thursday and Friday collections of Christmas week will occur one day later (e.g. Friday collections move to Saturday).

FRWA Waste and Recycling Depots and the Goolwa office are closed on public holidays, and will also close early at 1pm on both Christmas Eve and New Year's Eve.

"Our team have been working hard to plan and schedule all the extra collection runs," FRWA Executive Officer, Simon Grenfell, said.

"These include the increased weekly yellow and green FOGO recycling, as well as supporting our commercial customers during these peak times.

"With the increase in the region's visitors, a major focus is also the public litter bins, with daily collection runs."

Most of the increased waste during this peak time comes from food and packaging which can be recycled.

"It's a busy time of year for us," Mr Grenfell said.

"Our drivers, site and customer service teams work hard to achieve waste management and environmental goals.

"We thank residents for their ongoing assistance by ensuring they put bins out the night before, understanding run times may be different and diverting their food and recycling away from the landfill bin."

Extra paid services are available for businesses, holiday rentals or households that generate more waste by contacting FRWA on 8555 7405 or (visiting www.frwa.com.au).

Following two successful years, the Summer peak weekly recycling bin collections also returns to the region, having already started on Monday, December 16, and finishing on Friday, January 24, 2025.

Both yellow recycling and green Food Organics Garden Organics (FOGO) bins will be collected weekly, while the collection of blue/red waste landfill bins remains fortnightly.

"Previous bin audits revealed most of the increased waste at this time of year belongs in recycling, not the blue/red bin," Mr Grenfell said.

"Food waste – even prawn shells, meat, bones, bread and dairy – all belong in the green bin to ultimately become compost and soil.

"The increase in festivities at this time of year also increases waste, with much of the content beyond food being recyclables like cartons, packaging, glass and tins."

This period also sees an increase in holiday home rentals and waste.

Waste management beyond standard residential amounts is a business expense worn by the operators, not residential ratepayers.

FRWA offers extra paid collections and has contacted local rental agencies to detail these services.

If you run an Air BnB or need extra collections, refer to their website.

With the increase in collection demands resulting in run modifications, Fleurieu Regional Waste Authority (FRWA) reminds residents that bins must be out the night before.

Some runs will start earlier, while other collections may extend into the late afternoon.

Due to operational demands over the Summer peak season, residents in Ashbourne, Paris Creek, Mount Observation, Woodlands, Woodchester, Langhorne Creek rural areas (not Langhorne Creek town central), Salem, Hartley, Gemmells, Highland Valley, Red Creek and Bletchley will again have their Friday December 20 and 27, plus January 3 and 18 collections moved to Saturdays.

Due to these run changes, FRWA asks residents to wait until late afternoon before reporting a missed bin.

If your bin is missed, please submit a 'report a missed bin' form at (www.frwa.com.au).

Nursery blossoming with growth

Clayton Bay Nursery and Environment Group is being supported through a community program in collecting seed, propagating and dispatching local provenance tree species for ecological restoration projects.

The funding is from Foundation for National Parks & Wildlife, which is the charity partner of national parks and wildlife services.

The organisation aims to safeguard ecosystems, wilderness and flora and fauna, and supports community-based nursery programs.

Local nursery volunteers recently welcomed a visit from Landscape Resilience Manager Sandy Eager to discuss their projects.

Clayton Bay has been involved in revegetation projects since 1997.

Since then, they have developed a vegetation management plan with support from Second Nature Conservancy, grown thousands of plants for local revegetation

projects, and became an incorporated body.

The group of volunteers now participate in the ongoing restoration and vegetation of the natural environment of the foreshore and local environment.

Some of their plants grown are for Alexandrina Council, local landowners, wineries and revegetation projects.

The group is also remembering their former late nursery manager Phil Collins, who sadly recently passed away.

Mr Collins brought decades of experience of nursery management and plant production, with his long career including a 12-year stint as the State Flora Nursery Manager.

He is being remembered for further promoting the production of high-quality seedlings for the town and surrounding districts to enhance local flora for positive biodiversity outcomes and to combat land degradation for shade, shelter, windbreaks and ornamental value.



Soaring high above a river, surrounded by mountains and trees in Slovenia, is an unbelievable and breathtaking experience.

The longest zipline in Europe is in Bled and is a total of 4km on seven courses, where participants reach speeds of about 60km/h as they fly through the picturesque scenery.

Bled is a town in the foothills of the Julian Alps and on a beautiful lake, and is a great spot to add to the itinerary for adventure sports.

White water rafting down the Sava River - just below where I was ziplining the day earlier - is thrilling, and a hike around Vintgar Gorge is beautiful.

With little knowledge of Slovenia, I had few expectations, but was instantly charmed by the central European country that is cuddled between Croatia, Austria and Italy.

Squealing in excitement when first arriving in the capital Ljubljana, it's easy to fall in love with the city that has Ljubljanica River running through the middle and the iconic three bridges which connects both sides.

The laneways are filled with life and atmosphere, with plenty of cyclists, eateries, and buskers with live music bouncing down

Being just a few hours from Venice, it was hard to pass up the opportunity to explore another city on water and indulge in some Italian dishes. A day trip to nearby island Murano helped to escape the crowds of tourists.

Nearby, Croatia offered plenty of gems to explore, like hiking around the waterfalls at the Pitvice Lakes National Park, which my friend rightly recommended to me as "unmissable".

On a peninsula, Pula proved great for beach-hopping during the hot summer days and was also worth braving the heat to walk to the only remaining Roman amphitheatre that has all four sides towers entirely preserved and built between 27 BC

The island Hvar was also great for lounging around the coastline and soaking up rays, after you get accustomed to the rocky beaches.

The relaxed, holiday feeling of the island captured my heart immediately, leading to quickly booking an extra night.

Hours and days could be lost walking through the historical cities of Zadar, Split and Dubrovnik, particularly their Old Towns which transport you to another world.

I also loved indulging in the seafood dishes. With so much to explore, the clock on a month-long solo trip quickly ran out, but the memories and experiences fed my adventurous and curious soul for a long time to come.

Or, until next year, anyway.

Perinatal mental health set centre to soon open

New and expectant South Australian of expecting and new parents – and parents will get free, personalised mental health support, with a new perinatal mental health centre to be established at Murray Bridge.

An estimated 100,000 Australians are affected by perinatal depression and anxiety (PNDA) every year, prompting the Federal Government to fund centres that will offer local families support during the vital perinatal period from pregnancy through to baby's first birthday.

Providing early intervention and support will reduce the effect of perinatal mental illness on families and set them up for a healthier, stable future.

The Murray Bridge centre will be operated by Gidget Foundation Australia – a not-for-profit organisation that supports the emotional wellbeing is expected to be established and operational by 2026.

"It's common to be overwhelmed and tired during pregnancy, and as a new parent, but many Australians are faced with far greater challenges," Federal Minister for Health and Aged Care, Mark Butler, said.

"Becoming a parent is a profound change - for many parents understandably it can be overwhelming.

"These perinatal mental health centres will provide families needing that extra support for free."

The centres will help meet local demand for mental health care and provide psychological services with no out-of-pocket costs.



Pageant 'burned' due to hot weather

Since the Goolwa pageant and concert were cancelled last Sunday due to hot weather, community members have shown an "outpouring" of interest in supporting future events.

While the decision to cancel the festivities was "devastating", Goolwa Community Association Chairperson Tamara McRobbie felt positive about the potential of hosting Christmas and other events next year under the now newly-formed entity and volunteers.

"I'm excited for 2025 because we've got a brilliant set up in the background so (next year's) event is going to be a lot less intense to put on because we started from essentially nothing this year," she said.

"So, we could quite capably and quickly

get everything organised and ensure the event runs better.

"I'm so proud of the effort the team put in and I'm really disappointed that we didn't get to showcase what we'd been working so hard on but we have bigger and better ideas for 2025.

'We have had a brilliant outpouring of support (for volunteering and membership)... the more the merrier when it comes to running events and becoming a financial voting member of our organisation.'

The much-anticipated return of the pageant after a four-year hiatus was thanks to the hard work of the Goolwa Community Association which formed earlier this year.

It brought together local organisations and individuals with the aim of planning Christmas celebrations and other events throughout the year.

Since 1994, the town celebrated the festive season with a pageant and concert, organised by the Lions and Goolwa clubs respectively. Southern Argus, the membership numbers and age of members meant Lions were unable to continue the pageant.

The Christmas concert continued but was in jeopardy last year due to financial challenges.

However, it then was saved when local service groups sourced the remaining necessary funds and ended up pulling off "first class" entertainment attended by about 3000 people.

The community wasn't spared another curveball this year, when in the week leading up to Sunday's pageant and concert, the forecasted temperature "skyrocketed" up by 8C, raising concerns and discussion among

The event time was initially push backed before the volunteer concert team opted out of the day.

Finally, the committee decided to cancel the pageant too.

"It certainly wasn't a decision we made

However, as previously reported in *The* lightly and not one we wanted to make that decision, but we had no choice," Ms McRobbie said.

"We wished we could have gone ahead but... the risks far outweighed the benefits, particularly with how hot it would have been.

'We would not have been able to live with ourselves if something happened to somebody."

While "99 per cent of the community" was "very supportive", some critical feedback "hurt (them) greatly", after the committee put in their "time, blood, sweat and tears" for more than 12 months.

'We're doing our absolute best to run a free community event," Ms McRobbie said.

"The majority of the support from the community has been outstanding.

"The support we got from the council this year was incredible.

"The support from local businesses was absolutely outstanding and we want to make it up to the community."

Council withholds decision on **Future Living Code Amendment**

Alexandrina Council is withholding a final decision on a policy framework to enable new forms of 'co-located housing' to be developed in established suburbs until it hears the full community's views of the proposed code amendment.

As previously reported in *The Southern* Argus, the Future Living Code Amendment aims to introduce a new form of co-located housing to allow more homes to be built in established suburbs without impacting the existing character, heritage and streetscape

It intends to do this by creating low-rise and small-scale housing, and encouraging the use of intelligent design and adaptive reuse to modify original houses and preserve the existing trees, mature gardens and established streetscape.

The proposed policy would only apply across the Established Neighbourhood Zone in the region, including pockets throughout Goolwa, Port Elliot and Strathalbyn.

Community consultation was held between August 15 and November 7, with council notifying landowners with properties in the established zones via mail, holding briefings with community groups, and hosting two community drop-in information sessions.

Fifteen submissions were received by Alexandrina Council alone – eight in support, four in support with some concerns and three in opposition – however, the full consultation state-wide is ongoing, which council would like to wait to consider until it makes its final position known on the code amendment, given some of its concerns.

These include the code amendment's failure to propose a minimum site area, the likelihood of very small sites occurring due to adding one or two dwellings to one spot which could compromise the ability to accommodate on-site wastewater management systems, the lack of scheme descriptions, and lack of clarity around fence requirements.

"Whilst the intent of the code amendment is supported as it will be providing an alternative model of housing, which can also be relatively more affordable, there are technical matters with the policy that still need to be addressed," a council report read.

"Minor technical adjustments are required to the definition and meaning behind terms within proposed policy.

"Given that a submission from council was required by or soon after the closure of public consultation, it is recommended that council does not necessarily commit Alexandrina Council to the spatial application of the colocated policy just yet, with a decision to be made after council is able to see the overall results of the consultation period, including any submissions received from the other participating councils and the proposed response."

In a letter drafted to the State Planning Commission at last month's meeting, councillors agreed to support the intent of the code amendment, but withhold a final position until it has a full understanding of community engagement and a resolution to the issues identified.

Plans afoot for forum on retirement

Plans are afoot for a forum on retirement living options in the electorate of Finniss in early 2025 following the success of two Ageing Well events this year – one in Victor Harbor and one in Goolwa.

Organised by Member for Finniss David Basham the 2024 forums have sought to provide a wide range of information about how to age well, with a presentation by expert Gail Miller, and information supplied by groups such as Services Australia, My Aged Care, ARAS, Connect Care, and others.

About 100 people attended the Goolwa Ageing Well forum last month.

"(We looked at) many things around ageing and the different models of where you can live, for example the different models of retirement village versus residential park versus living in your own home versus moving into a nursing home – all those sort of things as it is such a complicated space," Mr Basham said.

"The interest was very much about 'what do I do?', 'what do I need to do?', 'who do I need to talk to?', 'how can I get help?', 'who do I trust in these things?', and asking questions about what is best for them in their own personal circumstances.

"There is no (overarching) answer to what you should do when you are at a

particular age.

"It depends where you are and who you are, what family you have around you, and how your house is set up – all those things play a huge part in it.

"There are people out there that can help, so it is worth talking to them and getting some useful advice, (and) our office has all the details for those."

Organising medical care as you age was one topic of importance in 2024.

"Letting your family know what your intentions around your medical care and those sort of things are important," Mr Basham said.

"Realising that your body starts to slow down and you need to manage that in advance (is important) because if you get sick tomorrow and you are not ready, it is really hard to organise it quickly."

While one of the younger persons at the forums, Mr Basham found some relative tips for himself as well.

"It was probably more so at the first forum, (as) it jogged my memory that I should just update my will, for example, as it had been 20 years since I updated it," he said.

"So, just by having these conversations jogged my memory about what you should do."

Mr Basham hopes to hold a forum looking at retirement living options in February or March in 2025.



Maccy photographer releases third book

Macclesfield photographer John Gitsham has released his third book - a collection of black and white, and colour images taken over the past three years.

Named *The Image Collector*, it showcases his love for the surreal and abstract, and follows two previous books - The Dream Theatre and ambient.

"I just have a lot of images and I thought I would like to do a third book, as for some reason, three seemed like a good number in a particular type of work," Mr Gitsham said.

"It is a mixture of urban landscape, still lifes, and it has a few bird photos in it, but I would put it down as more abstract or surreal as that is probably the way I

"I have always liked the surrealist and abstract painters, and photographers of that period, and I guess that is my style dark and broody.

"I don't normally shoot much in colour because most photographs when you take colour out, it has to stand up by itself... it has to have a strong design and composition, whereas sometimes colour can hide that.

"The few colour ones that I have in there are generally almost monochrome in themselves, so I thought I would put some in so that people can see that I do shoot in colour occasionally, and do like good colour photographs if they are done well."

While taking the photos can take some time, putting them together was a quicker, more intuitive process.

"If I included the time taking the photographs, that could be hours and and hours, and days and days, but putting the book together, once you have the idea, it doesn't take that long," Mr Gitsham said.

"The sequence of how I put them in the book, I just intuitively do it.

"I don't put a lot of time in trying to match photos, although some I do, (as) some themes I have matched together.

"But basically, as I go through my collection of work, I see what flows."

Mr Gitsham has drawn inspiration from both near and far.

"Maccy is quite an inspiration for me – my three books have quite a lot of Macclesfield images in there," he said.

"I have been up here for 35 years, so I kind of know where all the good spots are and things I have always wanted to photograph. "But I travel a fair bit, so this particular book has probably got the most from other places.

"I was in New York for three months five years ago so there are a few New York photos in this one, and also Darwin.

"I work three months of the year up in Darwin doing bird tour guiding up there... so there are a few Darwin or Kakadu photos, a few Queensland photos in there, and some old photos that I took in the 1908s that I have reworked - hand coloured or just reworked them to bring them up-to-speed."

Mr Gitsham's other passion is conservation, but he says his conservation work is normally separate to his artistic work.

"At times they do cross over, but I am more just an observer of life really, whether it be an urban street, a set of rubbish bins or a weed coming out of a fence," Mr

"I guess it is not really directly related to conservation, but the art of seeing I guess." Mr Gitsham was proud of all three of

"I am proud that I have put together the book, and Moonglow Publishing does a great job putting books together," he said.

'We are using a local printer, local publisher, and local photographer, even though some of the images are not taken in South Australia.

"I just hope it sells well.

"I have a list of 150 people who have bought my books in the past, so hopefully, they will support me – at least 100 of them as I only do a limited run of 100.

"It is a niche product, and it is cheaper than doing exhibitions.

"That is one of the reasons I started to do photography books, as they are actually cheaper than putting on a solo exhibition, and you reach more people and they are around longer.

Mr Gitsham expects it to be quite some time before he tackles another book.

"My fourth will probably be in a few years time, and I may do a bird book with some descriptions about the bird that I photographed," he said.

"I am thinking maybe I will photograph some birders as well and call it 'Birds and Birders'.

"So, it will be quite a different format and I am not sure how I am going to do it.

"I want it to be artistic as well, so the portraits might be a bit funky, but time will tell with that one."


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

Christmas on cherry farm

It is Christmas time at Kerrie's Cherries at Yundi, with the cherry harvest now in full swing.

Kerrie and Pete Arthur bought the small property back in 2013, knowing nothing about growing cherries.

They are now slightly seasoned farmers of about 800 trees – 700 of the sweet variety and 100 of the sour.

"We weren't looking for a cherry farm, but we were looking for property with some water and some space, and a place to do music," Mrs Arthur said.

"We bought it in December 2013, so we managed to pick that season, as we got taught by the previous owner how to do it, but we didn't really count that one as ours because we didn't grow it, so we say 2014 was our first harvest."

Over the years they have celebrated good seasons and endured rough ones.

"Someone told me when we first bought the farm, 'cherries will break your heart mate', but they make (your heart) too though, and there is always an upside I reckon," Mr Arthur said.

"It is not an easy fruit to get in the cold room, (although) some years it is, and we have had years where it has been no problem at all and we think 'well, this is easy."



Then they have seasons like last year.

"Last year we had five days of rain just before we started picking and it split nearly everything – it was a bit of a write-off," Mrs Arthur explained.

The early stage of harvest this year is a little better.

"There are patches of really great fruit, but we have had some rain, as a lot of growers have this year, which splits cherries and also creates some problems with brown rot," Mr Arthur said.

"So, overall I would say we are looking at an average year, but it won't be a long year because of the damage."

Mrs Arthur said several components are needed to growing a good cherry.

"We are fortunate here to have spring water, so I think that is a really nice part of the flavour profile of our cherries," she said.

"We (add) some organic fertilisers, and prune to make light and air for them, with plenty of sunshine.

"Some cherry producers in the Adelaide Hills have lost a lot to birds and flying foxes, and that is just devastating, so we have a net and that definitely does help."

The couple free ranges chickens in the orchard to clean up bugs, fertilise the soil, and scratch it around, as part of a plan to make things as "natural" as possible, and produce fruit as close to what you would grow in your backyard.

A number of things are needed for a good cherry.

"It is about the balance of the sugar and the acidity," Mr Arthur said.

"Some cherries are higher in acidity, so I think it is like any good fruit, it is not overly sweet, but has freshness too.

"Cherries are a great food – good for your health and for your sleep."

The Arthurs aim to deliver a "nice and firm" cherry with a green stem.

"If you see them in the shops and they don't have a green stem, don't take them with





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you as there is no more life in that cherry, it is just going to get pudgy," Mrs Arthur said. 'You have to keep them cold.

"Seeing them on the supermarket floor is devastating because you know some grower grew them and then they have just been

"They have to be kept cool, so if you want them at home, put them in your fridge and just bring out what you want and leave the rest in there as it keeps them for longer."

The Arthurs say cherry growers on the Fleurieu, including the nearby Fleurieu Cherries, who offer pick-your-own cherries, were also reporting a good season so far.

Prices for consumers could change according to where you are sourcing your cherries, with city prices tending to be more than those bought straight from growers.

"We tend to set a price that we think is a fair thing every year," Mr Arthur said.

"The market fluctuates, so we are not really in control of any of that, and it is widely reported every year that cherries (will be expensive).

"But most of our cherries are sold directly through the farm and at market, so we set what we think is a fair price and buyers know what they are getting.

The Arthurs take pride in being able to provide a Christmas fruit for families, with the general feedback from customers that it is 'not Christmas without Kerrie's Cherries'.

"People are setting up to spend time with their family, and to be able to provide something for the Christmas table, we always find that to be quite a special thing for us," Mr Arthur said.

"That is what we strive to do – make people happy with the fruit - because it is that time of the year."

While most of the Arthurs' cherries are predominately sold at the farm gate, they also sell at the Willunga Markets and deliver to Kadina for orders around that area.

"I grew up in Kadina and we couldn't get good cherries then," Mrs Arthur said.

"There are actually a few people that go up there now, but when we started, we went well there's no fruit and veg store there anymore, so let's take some up for the people that want some, and through Facebook, people tag each other and then the orders come in.

"Pete drives up there with a cool room full and people pick up their cherries."

The word from the Arthurs is that Santa is a big fan of cherries.

"Put it this way," Mr Arthur stated.

"For the fruit he eats, cherries are the first cab off the rank.

"He might eat lots of cake and pudding but he likes cherries too - that is his health food."

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Support available for eID transition

With the date for mandatory electronic identification (eID) for sheep and farmed goats fast approaching, the State Government has invested \$10.2 million into a range of assistance measures to ensure producers have the best tools for a successful transition.

All sheep and farmed goats born on or after January 1, 2025, will need to be identified with a National Livestock Identification System (NLIS) accredited eID tag before leaving their property of birth.

From next year, producers who bring eID tagged animals onto their property directly from another property will need to record individual animal transfers on the NLIS database.

The State Government is working with the Commonwealth and industry to transition to the national eID system, and a number of discount and rebate programs are available to assist

The State Government's support measures include:

- The Point-of-Sale Tag Discount Scheme provides sheep and farmed goat producers to receive a \$0.95 discount for NLIS-accredited eID tags at the time of purchase (black tags in 2024 and white tags in 2025), allowing sheep and farmed goat producers to access this support in a fast and convenient way. Ends June 30, 2025.
- The Expanded eID Device Rebate allows sheep and farmed goat producers to apply for 50 per cent rebate up to a cap of \$0.95 for NLIS-accredited eID tags purchased between January 1, 2023 and June 30, 2025, that are not aligned to the NLIS year-of-birth colour system. Closes June 30, 2025.
- The Sheep and Goat eID Implementation Essential Equipment and



Infrastructure Rebate provides support of up to 75 per cent rebate of the cost of essential equipment and infrastructure required by saleyards and processor to implement eID. Closes June 30, 2025.

- Eligible applicants can apply for a 75 per cent rebate on the cost of purchasing essential equipment through the Sheep and Goat eID Implementation Essential Equipment Rebate.
- Agents can apply for a 75 per cent rebate to a maximum of \$7000 for the cost of essential equipment, including pocket reader, stick reader or wand, mobile panel reader and the scanner component of a weigh crate through the Sheep and Goat

eID Implementation Essential Equipment Rebate. Closes June 30, 2025.

• The eID Advantage Program will deliver targeted training to support eID implementation and increase confidence in the use of eID technology, and includes upskilling workshops for producers and stock agents, and face-to-face training sessions to build understanding of eID tags, technology and how to use the NLIS database.

"Electronic identification for sheep and farmed goats will ensure we have the best possible traceability system, which is crucial to protecting our \$2.96 billion livestock industry in the event of an outbreak of an emergency animal disease such as Foot and Mouth Disease," Minister for Primary Industries and Regional Development, Clare Scriven, said.

"The State Government has committed significant funding to assist South Australia with the transition to the national system, including the \$9.3 million package which was announced in the budget last year, and the additional \$900,000 for the eID Advantage Program.

"For many producers, the only change will be going from a visual tag to an electronic tag.

"For others there will a few more things to consider, which is why the State Government has a range of support available."

Summit to host Showdown

Crosstown rivals Adelaide Football Club and Port Adelaide Football Club will go head-to-head in a twilight Summit Showdown contest at Mount Barker's Summit Sport and Recreation Park (SSRP) in February, which is set to bring in record economic profit for the Hills region.

For the very first time, one of the AFL's highly anticipated Showdowns will be played outside of metropolitan Adelaide.

Mount Barker District Council has been working closely with the Adelaide Football Club since April to secure the pre-season Friday night match simulation. on February 21 which will give local fans the opportunity to see their teams play closer to home.

It follows the success of the AFL Gather Round games played at the Summit in both 2023 and 2024, which drew in

crowds of 7000 and 9000 respectively. "To have the state's two AFL men's

teams play in the Adelaide Hills for the first time at the SSRP is going to be huge, and we're expecting thousands of city and country fans to come to Mount Barker and see the Crows and the Power battle," Mayor Leach said.

There was a great buzz of excitement around the district when we hosted AFL Gather Round matches in 2023 and 2024 and, acknowledging how much South Australians love the thrill of a Showdown, anticipation will be at fever pitch given the long-standing rivalry between these

"It's a great opportunity for the locals and people all around South Australia to come along and see what happens when you have a great ground like this, and you have an environment where people can stand this close to the pitch and cheer those people on - it's going to be a really great evening."

The game is expected to "uplift the whole economic community by several hundred thousand dollars", with local

sporting associations and community groups being given the opportunity to fundraise by selling food and drinks at the game.

It's also set to showcase the quality of the oval to the nation.

"Major events provide a boost to our local economy by attracting more people to the district, promoting greater community connection which is important in a fast-growing area, and helping raise our region's profile," Mayor Leach said.

"We are 30 minutes up the freeway there is easy access here, it's a relaxed environment, and you would not get a better oval outside of Adelaide Oval in South Australia in my opinion.

"The Adelaide Football Club and Port Power are really pleased to be coming

"We think this is important for those two AFL clubs to come up here and see what we have to offer, but it's also good because it showcases us all around South Australia and Australia - this will

be broadcasted."

tickets and is expected to sell out.

However, Mayor Leach hoped to be able to increase capacity before February's match.

This would require temporary grandstands to come in.

Residents who registered for the presale will receive a private link and be given the chance to purchase tickets through the Ticketmaster website from 9am today until 8am tomorrow.

Tickets for the general public will go on sale through the Ticketmaster website from 9am tomorrow.

They will be priced at \$10 for adults and free entry to children under 15.

"That is just part of giving back to the community," Mayor Leach said.

"It's not about money this time, this is about getting the young people here and people my age, to all come along to watch a good exhibition of footy and get people geared up for the season ahead.

Gates will open at 3pm for the Summit Capacity for the game is set at 5500 Showdown and the game will start at 5pm.

Adelaide Football Club CEO Tim Silvers said the club was eager to venture outside of suburban Adelaide, and see and meet as many Crows members and fans as possible in the lead-up to the

"It's always exciting to see our team back in action after a long pre-season, and we are looking forward to getting up to Mount Barker where the community has really embraced AFL football during Gather Round in the past couple of vears." he said.

"It's a great opportunity to have an important pre-season hit-out, and at a venue that is AFL standard and so close to the city."



During the bidding, East made an Insufficient Bid, which was not noticed by South and West, and when North was considering what to call, noticed that East's bid was insufficient. The Director was called and ruled that since both South and West had passed after the Insufficient Bid, they had, they had accepted East's bid as legal, so that was that!

Since 1S by East was now condoned as a legal bid, North was able to repeat the 1NT as a legal bid, not that it served any useful purpose, as it enabled East to now bid 3S, which was passed out and became the contract, and made 9 tricks. (Should have made 10.)

An alternative to bidding Spades over the 1NT might have been for East to Double, intending to bid Spades later, no matter what South or West did, thereby showing 18+ HCP and paving the way to 4S or 3NT, which the Hand Record analysis said was makeable. Two problems, one was that the Double of 1NT can have different meanings, two was getting West to bid anything at all. Let's look at the possibilities:-

- 1. 11NT (Doubled) became the contract East leads the ♠A and takes the first 7 tricks: then exits with a low Heart or Club, won by North, who now has to concede 3 more tricks to East, for a score of 800 to E/W.
- 2West treats the Double as a Takeout and bids 2H: East now bids the Spades to show the 18+ HCP, but unless he/she bids less than 4S, they are unlikely to reach Game, so a score of 170 to E/W, or 420 if 45 was bid.
- 3. 1NT(X) is the contract and East leads a Spade other than the Ace. West wins and returns a Heart or Club. taking out East's stopper and East can now make only 9 tricks for a score of 500 to E/W. If West returns a Diamond, E/W will only make 8 tricks for a score of 300, which is less that 420 they could get for 4S.

When this was played, half of the other East/Wests played in 3S making 10 for 170, half played in 4S making 420, none of them played in 1NT Doubled, and none played in 3NT. There were no N/S contracts.

Students will then have a guaranteed pathway to the Mount Barker campus for their senior school years.

St Andrew's celebrates 180

Guests of honour were Her Excellency, the Honourable Frances Adamson AC, Governor of South Australia, and Rod Bunten, who were introduced to others in the community.

Jointly funded by the Federal and State Governments and Alexandrina Council, the state-of-the-art sporting precinct has been years in the making, with the official opening closing the chapter on the last stage of upgrades to make the facility fully available to its user groups.

Council adopts budget

In a minor win for Alexandrina ratepayers, council has voted for a less than initially projected rates increase to accommodate cost-of-living pressures and significantly cut down its budget.

As previously reported in *The Southern Argus*, Alexandrina councillors opened the 2024-25 draft Annual Business Plan and Budget inclusive of an 8.3 per cent rate rise plus 1.3 from new developments and property improvements in April to public consultation.

CEO resigns

Two years on from taking the position, Alexandrina Council's Chief Executive Officer Nigel Morris has resigned, citing family and opportunity reasons.

The budget will deliver a surplus of \$306 million, marking the government's second in a row, which is anticipated to continue through forward estimates.

The \$239,000 grant comes from the Power of Her Infrastructure and Participation Program – a legacy from the FIFA Women's World Cup last year – and will be put towards new toilets and changerooms for players, officials, and spectators alike to enjoy.

Southern Districts falls short

A disappointing weekend at the 2024 THINK! Road Safety SA Country Football Championships saw Southern Districts finish fourth and fifth in their respective teams, despite a home ground advantage.

McLaren dee-stroy



McLaren Districts ended Willunga's reign on Sunday, taking down the three-time consecutive champions in the Great Southern Football League Women's Grand Final to become season 2024 premiers.

Held at Yankalilla, the Demons and Sheagles faced off across all three grades, with McLaren having their work cut out for them in the Under 17 Girls and A Grade Women against sides with a three-peat under their belt and a minor premiership.

New woes for Town Hall

IBS Planning and Projects' Dennis Chung lodged the application for the alterations and additions at the Murray Street site on behalf of landowner and Murray Strath Investment's George Mocatta, who wants to extend and reclad the existing buildings and structures, and provide additional carparking and landscaping to improve the site's overall appearance and make it a viable commercial investment.

Myponga breaks drought



With both sides in the midst of a premiership drought it was the Myponga/Sellicks Mudlarks who broke their run of outs when, in a neck and neck struggle with the Victor Harbor Roos, snatched victory in the dying moments of the Grand Final for a point win.

The Mudlarks went into the game not having won an A Grade premiership since 1984, in which their President Geoff Hutchinson and his partner in Fleurieu Milk Barrie Clarke, major sponsors of the League, played in, while the Roos had not added to their trophy cabinet since 1999.

Uber-good review

A local advocate for the removal of the metropolitan boundary for rideshare services, particularly Uber, has described the State Government's decision to do so as "a win for logic and common sense".

Gilbert's finds new owners



After more than a century of ownership under the Gilbert family, the town's historic motor museum has changed hands to the Strathalbyn Tourism Association (STA), allowing the local attraction to continue its operations, and become "even bigger and better" in future.

The family moved into the High Street premises in 1902, where it became known as Gilbert's Garage - a business predominantly centred around bicycle manufacturing but began working on cars and trucks, and even started engaging in motorcycle manufacturing.

In December 2018, Gilbert Motors closed its doors after almost 120 years, before being brought back to life as the Gilbert's Motor Museum.

Green and gold berth for Daisy

Strathalbyn young gun basketballer Daisy Hocking will don the green and gold colours for the first time at the FIBA Under 15 Oceania Cup in November.

Daisy is one of 12 young female basketballers chosen for the Australian Sapphires team, who will compete for the title against Guam, Samoa, Cook Islands, New Caledonia, Tahiti, Fiji, New Zealand and Tonga in Canberra from November 11 to November 16.

Abattoir in jeopardy

The Fleurieu Community Co-operative in charge of the Strathalbyn Abattoir redevelopment has gone into voluntary administration, putting the future of the project in doubt.

The abattoir closed in December 2020 when former operators Strath Pastoral ceased trading, but was reinvigorated by the Fleurieu Community Co-operative, who undertook a \$3.5 million restoration of the site.

New technology for growers

In a first for the region, satellite imagery will be deployed by the State Government to assist grape growers, including those in Langhorne Creek, with future planning and preparedness by mapping the extent of frost damage caused to vineyards.

Frost causes serious damage to grapevines by freezing the water in grapevine leaves and shoots, causing cell damage that can significantly reduce yield and delay vine growth, with the secondary replacement shoots often producing fewer and smaller bunches.



Transport under the spotlight



A local transport forum brought together community members and politicians to discuss the future of transport in the Adelaide Hills, particularly the turbulent South Eastern Freeway and passenger rail options, and share solutions.

Organised by the River Road and Strathalbyn Road Traffic Group, the forum was held at the Mount Barker Town Hall in the shadow of two years of missed opportunities, cancelled projects and widespread recognition, and concern that the State and Federal Governments have no over-arching plan to streamline connectivity and put in place adequate plans for the fast-growing and economically expanding Adelaide Hills.

Beston collapse hits home

A number of Fleurieu dairy farmers have been left reeling from the collapse of Beston Global Food Company.

Milk production at the company's infrastructure at Jervois and Murray Bridge will end on Friday, with the infrastructure to now be auctioned off.

Concerns over station hours

Mount Barker and Murray Bridge police stations will soon have reduced hours for their front counter services, raising concerns for the local communities.

Mount Barker and Murray Bridge stations' hours will be reduced from 8am to 8pm seven days a week, to 9am to 5pm weekdays except on public holidays, and 9am to 3.30pm on weekends starting from December 23.

They are among 14 stations that will have new standardised hours following a review by South Australia Police.

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


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
