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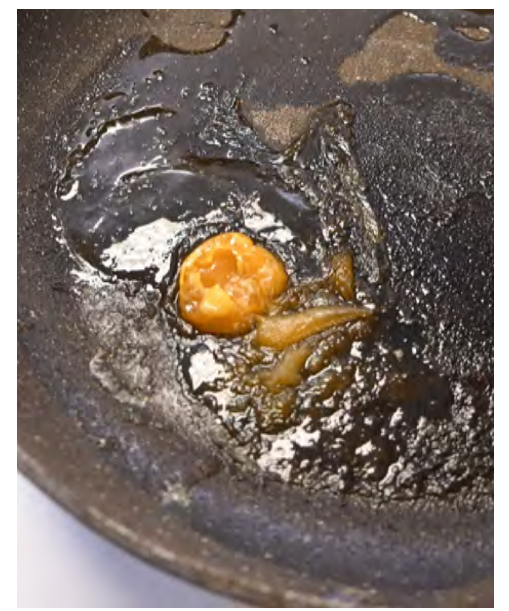

Record hot and dry summer

The region shrivelled through its driest summer for 24 years that had record-breaking average maximum temperatures, according to the Bureau of Meteorology.

This marks the driest summer-to-date since the 2000-2001 season, from December 1 to January 31.

The area-averaged rainfall total for the Mount Lofty district is only 39 per cent of the 1991-2020 average, and just 42 per cent of the average since records began in 1900.

Looking at local towns from November 1

to February 7, Mount Barker recorded about 38mm – which is 44 per cent of the summer average – and Strathalbyn had about 20mm – which is just 31 per cent of the summer average.

The seasons will change on March 1. The maximum and minimum averages and mean temperatures were the highest on record from December 1 to February 6, at the Bureau's Mount Barker site which has 162 years of data.

The maximum temperature average was about 31.3C – 4.8C above the long-term summer average.

The minimum temperature average was about 14C, which is 2.5C above the long-term summer average.

The mean temperature average was about 22.6C – about 3.6C above the long-term

summer average.

The region's last heatwave was considered low intensity, and spanned from January 31 to February 4.

On Tuesday – when temperatures reached a scorching 37C – *The Southern Argus* decided to test the sunrays' strength by frying an egg.

After four hours and 47 minutes, the egg was still uncooked. *The Argus* planned to try again after print deadline.

Autumn will begin in three weeks, and the forecast for the new season, from March to May, has an increased chance of unusually high temperatures, particularly at night.

The region will likely have typical rainfall of 50mm to 300mm, with higher amounts over elevated areas.

Residents raise concerns over river flow

The declining flow of the Murray River can have far reaching consequences such as drought and threats to freshwater species, as heard in the recent River Science Forum held at Clayton Bay.

River Lakes & Coorong Action Group (RLCAG) hosted the event last week to bring together experts to explore the impact of the river health on wildlife and the community.

It was attended by 91 people including representatives from Murray Bridge and Alexandrina councils.

First Nations Elder Mark Koolmatrie welcomed the meeting, before attendees heard from two speakers: University of Adelaide Emeritus Professor Nick Harvey and Coorong Lower Lakes Murray Mouth (CLLM) Research Centre's Nick Whiterod.

RLCAG Secretary Janette Brooks shared her concerns with *The Argus* of the "over extraction" of the Murray Darling Basin and decreased river flow, leaving the region "really sensitive and vulnerable" to drought.

She explained that the river needs adequate flow to push two million tonnes of salt out of the Mouth each year.

Ms Brooks also noted environment impact, such as tide and wind, which can accumulate sand in the Mouth.

Sand also moves in both directions into the Mouth: from the coastal side of the Youngusband and Sir Richard peninsulas.

Over a year in 2015-16 – a particularly

bad period – 821,000 cubic metres of sand entered the Mouth from the seaside, which is about 40 metres of sand in depth over the whole of the MCG playing area.

If this is coupled with a sea level rise of 0.5m, it could result in eight million cubic metres of sand going into the Mouth, which will close it off.

The other forum's topic was the impact to wildlife during what Ms Brooks described as a "global biodiversity crisis".

About one third of freshwater fish should be listed as threatened in Australia, according to a review published in Biological Conservation last year.

Ms Brooks warned of the ripple effects losing one single species could have on the ecosystem.

Ms Brooks challenged the Murray Darling Basin Plan that it is yet to return the minimum amount of water to the system.

The plan was in response to prolonged drought and the over extraction of water.

The Finnis resident called for stronger effort to combat climate change, stressing the importance of the Murray River for South Australia's water system.

Starting in Clayton Bay in 2016, RLCAG members advocate for a healthy Murray Darling Basin system, motivated for a healthy environment and community for their grandchildren.

"Our hope is the environment is taken seriously because it's important for everybody, not just for the generations that are alive now, but for future generations," Ms Brooks said.

"We need to work collectively to

understand the impacts of climate change and strategies to mitigate."

Ms Brooks hopes society can collectively combat climate change to stop or reduce sea level rising.

"The problem with sea level rise – once it starts to happen, once we get climate to the tipping point, it'll keep rising for (decades) even if you stop CO2 emissions," she said.

"If you have an ice block and it starts to melt, it will continue to melt until it's just water unless you put it back in a freezer.

"We really need to have net zero as soon as we can – yesterday was too long ago."

A Murray Darling Basin Authority (MDBA) spokesperson said the Basin Plan is increasing flows through rivers and improving the health of the system, working with "communities, industry and all levels of government".

They acknowledged that climate change remains a "primary challenge" for the Basin and sustainable water management.

While "significant progress has been made" for water recovery, elements of the Plan "still to be fully delivered".

"The Basin Plan was always intended to be adaptive, and as part of that, climate change is actively considered now in our management, and as we prepare for the 2026 Basin Plan Review," the spokesperson said.

"The 2026 Review will provide an opportunity to assess progress and determine the best path forward for a healthy and sustainable Basin."

Wastewater system undergoes repairs at Goolwa North

With the growth of Goolwa North, some residents recently raised concerns about the infrastructure after trucks were seen carting wastewater.

However, Alexandrina Council Chief Executive Officer Andrew MacDonald assured residents this was due to repairs and was part of "normal operations".

"Council's Community Waste Management Systems (CWMS) have sufficient capacity to treat the wastewater generated by the current development occurring in Goolwa North and elsewhere in Goolwa," he said.

"The CWMS team have recently conducted some repairs to CWMS main lines in Goolwa.

"To facilitate these repairs, the team had to turn off the pump station and manually pump until the repairs could be completed."

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Calls for support to keep town's heritage 'afloat'

Calls have been made for the repair and maintenance to Milang's heritage-listed jetty to enhance tourism appeal and honour its key role in the town's history.

Milang local Alby Pavy believes different parts need to be considered for renewal, such as the wonky railing, the weathering and spaced-out planks, and installing more stairs like there was when he was young.

"It's an important part of history and tourism – it should be preserved," he said.

"If they've spent money on a Butter Factory and (honour its history)... why not preserve the jetty that actually supported it?"

He finds the jetty is popular with tourists, fishers, kids swimming, and plenty of boaters arriving during the Goolwa to Milang Fresh Water Classic, which is returning again in the coming weeks.

However, he knows some kids who get scared of the gaps in the planks, and others who have had lost keys that have fallen through.

He has memories of cycling to the jetty after school for a swim, and was also involved in its restoration about 26 years ago.

The jetty and hand crane are council-owned assets under an annual licence agreement with the Department of Environment and Water (DEW).

Alexandrina Council Chief Executive Officer Andrew MacDonald told *The Southern Argus* that the jetty had recently undergone a condition assessment and several components were identified as requiring renewal.

Furthermore, components of the two jetties adjacent to the boat ramp nearby have also been identified as needing renewal.

"Council members will consider the inclusion of the jetty renewals in the 2025/26 Capital Program in the draft Annual Business Plan and Budget," Mr MacDonald said.

Because of its long associations with the early river trade, the jetty is a state-heritage listed place and is among some of the oldest surviving examples of this type of jetty and hand crane in South Australia, built in the 1800s.

The hand crane assisted in the loading and unloading of boats, and is now the oldest crane of its kind in South Australia.

At one stage, the town became one of South Australia's busiest ports connecting Adelaide with the river trade.

Wool arrived in Milang before being transported by horse and bullock to Port Adelaide.

Wheat was also transported to the town and its flour mills and then shipped back as flour.

Foreign goods shipped into Adelaide were then exported to Victoria and New South Wales through Milang, making more than half of the colony's total exports from 1868 to 1872.

A tram track also connected the jetty to Daranda Terrace to facilitate the transfer of cargo.

The jetty has changed in length over its years, and most recently shortened after being severely damaged in the 1956 flood.

The Heritage Places Act 1993 states "reasonable care" is required of state-heritage listed places, and ongoing maintenance and repair is within the best interest to protect its value and "avoid expensive remedial work".

State heritage listed places are eligible for Heritage Conservation Grants, with current applications closing in March.

The State Government has also allocated funding to co-invest with councils into jetties across the state, to address "immediate and critical concerns" regarding their sustainability.

THURSDAY, FEBRUARY 12TH, 1925

The most severe thunderstorm in the history of Adelaide took place on Friday last with a terrific downpour of rain over five inches in two-and-a-quarter hours, spreading to the Hills. A hail storm took place at Echunga and a sharp thunder storm of rain at Strathalbyn. For several days train, tram, telephone and telegraph systems were out. At Langhorne Creek three-and-a-half inches of rain fell, hail, as large as marbles, harmed to the currant grapes, half profits expected. One farmer had his stack in three feet of water and 35 bags of wheat was flooded, another resident having 10 panes of glass shattered, while there were dead birds on the ground.

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New Principal welcomed at Tyndale Strathalbyn

A new face has been welcomed at Tyndale Christian School Strathalbyn who wants to see the place “grow and flourish” under her leadership.

A seasoned Christian educator with decades of executive leadership under her belt, new Principal Julie Sampson has officially stepped into the head position at the Strathalbyn-based Tyndale campus.

Mrs Sampson holds a Bachelor of Mathematical Science from the University of Adelaide, a Graduate Diploma in Education from the University of South Australia, and a Masters in Educational Leadership from the Australian Catholic University.

“I always wanted to be a teacher right from when I was quite young,” she explained.

“I did a maths/science degree in case I kind of thought I might go a different direction, but even through studying maths/science, I decided I still wanted to be a teacher and did a graduate diploma.”

Mrs Sampson started her education journey at Siena College – now Nazareth College – in Adelaide as a maths teacher for seven years, before taking a break and returning to the field for a short stint at St Mary’s College before working at Cornerstone College.

She started at Cornerstone as a part-time senior maths teacher before becoming the maths key learning area leader then moved up to Learning Director.

During her 27 years at the school, Ms Sampson learned a lot about leadership.

“As a leader, I worked under three different principals and I learned different things from each of (them),” she said.

“The Foundational Principal Wagner was really influential in setting up the culture and

the caring nature of the school, and some of the basic structures.

“His love of people was really evident.

“Then he retired and I worked with John Proeve who took it to the next level with education and the importance of teaching your kids well, and having a really good program.

“Then Craig Fielke extended that.”

It was here time spent at Cornerstone and later at Portside Christian College, where she led both the junior and secondary school, that prepared her to take on her

current role.

“I had the opportunity (at Portside) as Deputy Principal and I loved that,” Mrs Sampson said.

“I took it on as a personal challenge and I was a little nervous about working in primary school, but the little people just filled my heart.

“It was just wonderful working with them, and it was interesting shifting from dealing with the more challenging issues of teenagers when you’re doing behaviour management and dealing with issues like social media

through to a child just having a tantrum on your office floor because they didn’t get what they want.”

Aside from teaching, Mrs Sampson is an active member of the C3Church Adelaide Hills in Hahndorf, where she serves as a lay preacher, board member, and musician.

Her career and leadership are deeply rooted in her Christian faith, which is what drew her to the Principal position.

Being a long-time Hills resident and getting to work closer to home was also a major drawcard.

“I’ve worked in the Catholic, Lutheran and Christian sector, and working in a Christian school, and being able to share your faith and work in an environment that’s explicitly Christian was really powerful and energising, and I could see we could have a real influence on the school and community,” Mrs Sampson said.

“And also, I just felt I was ready to go that next step.

“I had a lot of opportunity as a learning leader and in pastoral care, and even though I wasn’t the final leader for a lot of things, I had a really broad experience, so I felt I was ready to take on that next challenge.

“I live in the Hills, so to come back here and live locally was a big side benefit.”

Mrs Sampson plans to get to know the community, students, staff and families first, then work on growing the school.

As a Principal, she highly regards the leadership values of care, authenticity, resilience and excellence, and places importance on both academic and spiritual development.

“I really want to see the school grow and flourish,” Mrs Sampson said.

“I think it’s in a good place at the moment but there is a lot of potential here.

“I’ve been really warmly welcomed, and I’ve been heartened by the community I’ve come into here.”



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Encounter Bay man disqualified for life

An Encounter Bay man has been banned from driving for more than a decade after reversing into two women, killing one and injuring the other, in January 2023.

Roy Skinner, aged 81, fronted the District Court last Tuesday for sentencing after previously pleading guilty to causing the death of Elizabeth Loan and seriously harming her niece by dangerous driving.

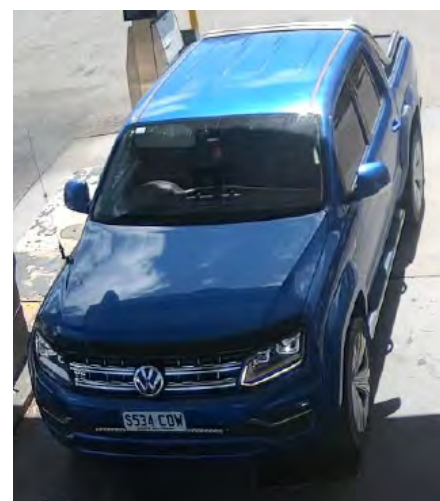
During the incident in January 2023, Mr Skinner is accused of reversing into the two women at 28km/h in the Hotel Crown car park before driving across the main road and crashing into a pole.

He was not drunk at the time, nor had cognitive issues.

In sentencing, Judge Michael Burnett acknowledged Mr Skinner's remorse but

said his driving warranted a prison term of three years, two months and 13 days, with a non-parole period of two-and-a-half years.

Due to the Encounter Bay resident's age, lack of history, health conditions and remorse, the sentence was suspended on the condition of a two-year good behaviour bond, and he was disqualified from driving for 12 years.

Hunt on for missing car

Two people were arrested after committing traffic offences in a stolen car at Murray Bridge last weekend.

On Tuesday, January 28, patrols spotted a blue Volkswagen Amarok utility at a Murray Bridge service station, which was stolen from a Woodville address earlier in January.

Police attempted to stop the car, however, the driver evaded police and was last seen heading east on Old Princes Highway.

Over the next few days, the vehicle was seen on a number of occasions in the Murray Bridge area being driven erratically.

Following an investigation, on Saturday, February 1, police attended a Tailm Bend address where they located and arrested the two residents, a 34-year-old man and 28-year-old woman.

They were charged with illegal use, theft and dangerous driving to cause a police pursuit, and refused police bail to appear in court last Monday.

The stolen blue VW Amarok with registration S534COW has not been located.

Copper and metal theft targeted under proposed reforms

A suite of law reforms to crackdown on copper and other scrap metal theft is being proposed by the State Government to help businesses, residents and industries.

Latest data shows more than two thousand instances of scrap metal theft were recorded in the 2023-2024 financial year, with hundreds of residential properties targeted.

These crimes are not only inconvenient for householders and builders, but they come at huge expense, with businesses spending tens of thousands of dollars a week on replacement and prevention measures.

The theft of copper wiring also poses a significant safety concern, with criminals often leaving live wires exposed on construction sites.

Currently, no regulation of the scrap metal industry exists, operators don't have to be licensed or registered, and there is no requirement to verify where the scrap metal has come from.

The State Government is proposing to develop a stand-alone piece of legislation to make it harder for criminals to sell stolen scrap metal.

Some of the reforms include:

- Requiring scrap metal dealers to be registered and undergo probity checks.



The theft of copper and other scrap metal theft is the subject of a suite of law reforms being proposed by the State Government.

- Prohibiting cash or the use of cryptocurrency to buy and sell scrap metal.

- Requiring proof of ID and accurate records for all scrap metal transactions.

- Requiring scrap metal dealers to upload transaction details to a digital portal.

- Allowing police to inspect scrap metal dealer premises and issue closure orders for those that don't comply.

- Enforcing appropriate penalties for breaches of the Act.

"Copper and scrap metal theft has become an expensive and dangerous problem, and we are committed to making it much harder for criminals with these changes," Police Minister, Stephen Mullighan, said.

"These proposed new laws would protect builders and homeowners by making it more difficult for criminals to have a market to sell stolen metal, and also reducing the cost that these thefts are causing the community.

"The State Government is determined to send a message that these crimes won't be tolerated in South Australia and those caught selling or buying stolen goods will face tougher penalties."

The proposed law changes are currently out for public consultation which closes on February 25.

New laws crack down on stalking offences

New laws to help authorities crack down on stalking have passed State Parliament.

Developed in consultation with victim support services and the justice sector, the reforms lower the threshold required to prove the offence of stalking, making it easier for authorities to take action against perpetrators, and reduce the threshold for criminal offending in order to capture a broader range of harmful stalking activities.

The reformed stalking offence will cover stalking with intent to cause any physical or mental harm instead of only serious physical or mental harm.

The reforms will also ensure the offence will apply even if a person who does stalking activities did not specifically intend to cause harm or fear, but should reasonably have known that the conduct would be likely to cause harm or fear.

Further, to address misconceptions about what the types of behaviour that constitute

stalking, the offence will now also be known as 'stalking and harassment', which incorporates broader activities that can constitute the offence, including harassment via communication and surveillance technologies

"Stalking and harassment are vile forms of offending, with particular effect on those seeking to leave abusive relationships, and it's essential that authorities have every tool available in their arsenal to help combat it," Attorney-General, Kyam Maher, said.

"These changes will help to hold perpetrators to account, and also better define what constitutes this type of offending."

"These reforms also update the types of behaviours that can be considered stalking and harassment to ensure new and emerging forms of technology – such as using devices to track a person's movements or to monitor their communications – are also covered."

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SAPOL issues fire safety reminder

The community is warned to be extra vigilant about the use of tools during the fire danger season.

This time of year can see an increase in bushfires started due to misuse of spark-producing tools, including angle grinders, welders and other cutting tools.

Everyone has a responsibility to understand the restrictions that apply to their use during the fire danger season to help keep themselves and their communities safe.

On days that are not under total fire ban restrictions, tools can be used provided:

- People have a 10-metre cleared space around the area.

- Water or an appropriate extinguisher is at hand.

Use is not permitted during a total fire ban without a permit, and are generally only issued for emergency purposes.

Anyone who is unsure about the weather conditions is asked to wait for a more suitable time.

If there is a fire or imminent risk of one, call Triple Zero (000).

If you see anything suspicious, immediately call the police assistance line on 131 444.

Rotarians install another lifesaving AED device

The Strathalbyn and surrounding district recently received its 18th Automated External Defibrillator (AED) since the local Rotary club began advocating for the installation of as many as possible.

The Rotary project was sparked in early 2022, when husband and father-of-two Andrew Lee experienced heart failure, and family sought help by using a local AED which gave them "precious hope" before he sadly lost his life.

An AED is a medical device used to help those experiencing sudden cardiac arrest.

It can analyse a heart's rhythm and, if necessary, deliver an electric shock or defibrillation to help the heart re-establish a rhythm.

As reported in *The Southern Argus* at the time, in lieu of floral tributes, family and friends donated to Rotary Club of Strathalbyn to purchase more AEDs.

Rotary continued the fundraising momentum and teamed up with Heart of the Nation – a charity founded by former Yellow Wiggle Greg Page – to deliver the project.

Heart disease is a leading cause of death in Australia, with more than 25,000 people suffering a sudden cardiac arrest each year, with just a five per cent survival rate.

The majority happen at home, which is why Heart of the Nation aims to increase survival rates through education and access to AEDs.

The bright additions to the community can now be seen in various locations around Strathalbyn, including surrounding towns of Woodchester, Wistow, Milang, Belvidere, Ashbourne, and Hope Forest.

The club received the Premier's Community Service Health Award for 2023 for their efforts.

Rotary is now promoting the initiative to local clubs and organisations to purchase an AED with an aim of ensuring no one in the town is less than several hundred metres away from an accessible lifesaving device.

The volunteers also aim to connect with other Rotary clubs across the country to extend the program further.

The most recent AED is in the prominent location on the fence corner of Langhorne Creek Road and Bosisto Lane, near local schools and easily identifiable when driving into the town from Langhorne Creek.

Owner of the home, Daniel Bartolic – who has been a long time local for 38 years – was pleased to be part of the initiative.

"I'm quite happy to help them and the community in any way," he said.

"You never know – I might need it myself one day."

Strathalbyn group awarded grant for food education

A Strathalbyn organisation promoting education on local food systems and their connection to climate change has received an almost \$20,000 grant to help this initiative.

Foundation for Rural Regional Renewal (FRRR) has awarded \$685,242 in grants for 27 initiatives through its Community-Led Climate Solutions program that will empower rural communities across Australia to adopt practices and solutions that reduce emissions and address the impacts of climate change.

The program offers grants via two streams, and allows not-for-profit organisations (NFPs) to prioritise local needs and address factors affecting the community's ability and capacity to adopt new ideas, adapt to a changing climate, and take actions to mitigate the risks of climate change.

FRRR Climate Solutions Portfolio Lead Sarah Matthee said the program emphasises the importance of empowering local people to lead local climate solutions.

"Local NFPs and community organisations want to play a bigger role in creating sustainable and enduring climate solutions for their communities," she said.

"The 27 projects funded showcase a diverse range of future-focused, community-led climate solutions, including addressing energy supply, reuse and recycling, distributing knowledge and climate risk adaptation.

"This diversity reinforces the fact that each community's experience of the social, economic and environmental impacts of a changing climate is unique."

One of the successful grant recipients is The Food Embassy Incorporated in Strathalbyn, which received \$18,688 for its Local Food Solutions for Climate Resilience project.

The project aims to promote education on local food systems and their connection to climate change, while activating the local food system to address food insecurity, reduce food waste and build resilience.

"The Food Embassy is a social enterprise, and our work is to connect community to food through workshops and events with the premise that we want to connect people with where their food comes from and understand how the local food system works," Project Lead, Liz Sanders, said.

"We plan on delivering a series of workshops in Yankalilla and Strathalbyn, and those workshops are around food democracy, so it's about encouraging people to think about becoming an active food citizen.

"So, rather than being a passive food consumer, being more active in their food choices and how that can have an impact on the climate, on their wellbeing, and the community's wellbeing.

"What we're hoping for is that people will be more informed and feel more empowered to make different food choices, and we also hoping out of this there will be an actual project that will be community led around taking some local action."

The group is looking to run the Strathalbyn-based workshops in May.

Banning hunting by stealth

Is this current State Government banning duck hunting by stealth?

It certainly looks that way.
South Australian hunters are facing an unprecedented attack on their way of life.

Under the guise of regulation, the State Government has imposed excessive constraints on duck hunting without due process or proper consultation.

This is not a direct ban, but an insidious attempt to eliminate hunting through financial and bureaucratic means.

A Select Committee of the Legislative Council conducted an inquiry into the hunting of native birds on March 9, 2023.

This inquiry confirmed that hunting in South Australia was well-regulated.

It did not recommend a ban on hunting or propose excessive fee increases.

Instead, the Committee made 11 recommendations aimed at improving animal welfare, regulation, and oversight.

Despite this, the government has introduced measures that disregard the Committee's findings and threaten the

future of hunting in our state.

New restrictions include banning the hunting of hardhead and pink-eared ducks, along with limiting the hunting of mountain ducks – all without any publicly available scientific justification.

In addition, permit fees are set to skyrocket from \$50 per species in 2024 to an astonishing \$250 per species by 2029.

That's a 400 per cent increase with no clear reasoning, making South Australia the most expensive state for bird hunting.

These changes have been imposed without any consultation with key stakeholders, further demonstrating the government's disregard for due process.

This is not the first time the Labor Government has ignored democratic procedures to impose its ideological agenda.

Take late last year when the government proceeded with a complete ban of bowhunting by proclamation, bypassing any democratic process.

Now, we see a similar pattern emerging with duck hunting.

The real issue here extends beyond hunting, even beyond the thinly veiled attack on Australians' right to engage in outdoor recreation.

It is about government overreach and the erosion of democratic processes.

If the Labor Government continues to disregard Parliamentary Select Committee findings and impose its own dogma, it is undermining public trust and faith in our democratic institutions.

Whether you support hunting or not, this should concern every South Australian.

A government that rules by stealth, imposing ideological restrictions without due process, is a government that must be held accountable.

We must demand transparency, consultation, and respect for democratic procedures before more freedoms are quietly stripped away.

“I heard a bit of news there was a new sheila in town,” he said.

“Of course the boys all pricked up their ears. “I heard she was working at the chemist shop, so I needed some hay fever tablets and went in and thought ‘I better find out a bit more about this girl!’

“We messed around at the swimming pool just talking to her and eventually started dating, and we went from there.”

Mrs Sheldon also has a memory of their first encounter.

“There were a lot of young fellas coming into the chemist shop,” she said.

“Pinnaroo didn’t have too many new people coming into town, but yes, I can vaguely remember it, but it is a long time ago though – 64 years.

“We must have liked one another because that was just it.

“There were lots of trips up to the swimming pool to get to know one another, and we went out a little bit too – lots of dances, pictures that they held in the Pinnaroo Institute, and all those things that you do when you are young.”

The couple’s first ‘official’ date was to a dance across the border in Cowangie, with Mrs Sheldon having to get permission from her dad who said ‘I suppose it will be alright’.

They dated for four years before Mr Sheldon’s ‘proposal’.

“It wasn’t a romantic, down on one knee proposal or anything like that,” he said.

“I just said ‘Well, I think we are getting along alright, would you like to get engaged and get married in 12 months time?’”

Mrs Sheldon’s quick reply was “yes”.

“So, we got engaged on Boxing Day, and because SA traded on Boxing Day and Victoria didn’t, I couldn’t do any harvest because the silos were closed, so we went to Adelaide together and bought the ring,” Mr Sheldon said.

one occasion, and the family home on another.

But there have been plenty of good times. “There has been a lot of highlights through the years,” Mrs Sheldon said.

They both have had several jobs over their lifetime, moving to Meadows to run the Meadows Hotel for five years before retiring to Strathalbyn in 2012.

Mr Sheldon began as a farmer, co-ran the Pinnaroo Newsagency, sold farm machinery

and cars, took over the Meadows Hotel, became maintenance man at the Memorial Hospital in Adelaide, and did some work for one of the hospital’s neurosurgeons before returning to life on the land to manage a beef cattle property.

The couple have been avid sportspeople over the years, playing and supporting each other while enjoying a range of sport such as football, netball, tennis, golf, volleyball, and bowls.

They still play bowls for Strathalbyn. Mr and Mrs Sheldon put the secret to reaching their diamond anniversary down to being compatible.

“We just get on so well – we like the same things,” Mrs Sheldon said.

“Whatever we have done, we have done together – ever since we have known each other.

“It is also about just knowing that people aren’t perfect, and everybody is going to make mistakes.

“It has just been so good, the whole thing.” For Mr Sheldon, who Mrs Sheldon said was “romantic at times”, the secret was to “find a good woman, then make sure you look after her”.

The duo celebrated their 60-year milestone on February 6 with a meal out together, a family function at Lake Breeze Wines on Sunday, and are planning on a trip away once the bowls season has finished.

Survival Day marked at Laratinga Pavilion

This year's Peramangk Watta Survival Day was held on Sunday, attracting hundreds to Laratinga Pavilion in Mount Barker.

While extreme heat forced the postponement of this year's Survival event – which was originally scheduled for January 26 – it failed to deter 500 people from gathering at Laratinga Pavilion on Sunday to mark the day's significance to Indigenous Australians.

The event, which allows people to stand in solidarity with First Nations communities across the region, saw those who took part honour Indigenous culture, connection, and resilience through storytelling, song and dance.

The past was remembered and mourned, while participants embraced healing in the present for a stronger united future.

There was plenty for people to see and do, with a VIP Elders tent, political speeches, First Nations stalls, a screening of the film *Wash My Soul in the River*, a Kids Zone, live music, dance and poets, and workshops.

The Survival Day was presented by the Ruby Hunter Foundation in partnership with Mount Barker District Council.

Art grant brings local music project to life

Mount Barker District Council has successfully secured nearly \$12,000 in funding from Country Arts SA for the 'Travelling Instruments' project.

This community-driven initiative, conceived by local artist and musician Andy Rasheed, will see the creation of seven handmade percussion instruments, designed to enhance both accessibility and artistic engagement in the region.

The project's goal is to make music accessible to all, regardless of ability, while promoting a deeper connection to the arts.

Each of the instruments will be tuned to each other, ensuring they produce harmonious music regardless of the player's skill level.

"I'm building instruments for a septet covering a tonal range from deep to high," Andy said.

"There will be a couple of bass marimbula, with up to five drum faces built into the sides of the body – two, multi-drum cajons, a set of triple bongos, and two adaptive instruments designed specifically for people with disability.

"The adaptive instruments will be percussion stations, ergonomically designed to ensure they can be comfortably played by young people in wheelchairs."

Developed over several months with input from the Mount Barker Community Library, Mount Barker Community Centre, and local arts organisations, the initiative aims to create inclusive artistic experiences across the district.

"These travelling instruments will be an invaluable resource," Council's Arts Officer, Sally Hardy, said.

"They'll be used in creative workshops at the library, township outreach programs, and as interactive installations at events.

"They'll also feature in professional performances at arts festivals and be available to local organisations for their own events."

In addition to the instrument creation, the grant will fund a professional development workshop for musicians and teaching artists, as well as community workshops to showcase the instruments and inspire local participation.

About 180 to 200 riders are ready to put their pedal to the metal in one of South Australia's biggest cycling events, Tour of the Fleurieu.

Run by Adelaide Hills Cycling Club, the annual event will run on February 22 and 23, with the first day being two stages in the local region of Finnis, Milang and nearby Lake Plains.

The first stage is a time trial of a "fairly flat and fast" course, starting at Finnis General Store to Glengrove Road near the Clayton Bay/Milang turnoff.

In the afternoon, competitors will take a longer course of about 85km, starting again at Finnis, travelling through Milang then up

Lake Plains Road, which Club President David Hammond described as "tremendous" flat riding.

About half of those involved in the weekend are expected to stay in the region, largely in Goolwa and Victor Harbor.

Then on Sunday, cyclists will tackle Waitpinga Road and Range Road near Waitpinga, which is "quite hilly", before the challenging hill climb from Port Elliot up Crow's Nest Road.

"A lot goes into establishing a course and the feedback that we have from our riders is they love it and hate it because it is so challenging," Hammond said with a smile.

"They're out there to enjoy that sort of challenge.

"That bottom of the Fleurieu just gives us

some real variation and some real challenges for road racing."

Previously known as the Tour of Goolwa, it is one of the biggest cycling events on the South Australian calendar outside of the Tour Down Under.

Riders make up about 34 teams and a dozen individual cyclists have signed up – an option added for the first time.

Some cyclists – particularly in the U17s category – will work with coaches who monitor

their times which they can use to help qualify for national events.

The event is supported by about 30 volunteers.

Adelaide Hills Cycling Club – which is spread across the region, sometimes

meeting in Macclesfield, Gumeracha or Balhannah, for example – runs about 14 racing events each year, typically from outside of Gawler to the bottom of the Mount Lofty Ranges.

Entries open for freshwater Classics

Entries are now open for two local freshwater Classics: the Goolwa to Milang Lake Alexandrina Classic and the Milang-Goolwa Freshwater Classic.

The races will be held on Saturday, March 8, and Sunday, March 9.

Leading up to the two classic races is the Dash for Cash, which is a winner takes all knock out race where the fastest boats on the water compete to win \$750 in cash on Friday, March 7.

Together all three races comprise the March Classic – a recognition of the importance of boating, sailing and the river in the local communities of Lake Alexandrina and the Lower River Murray.

The Milang-Goolwa Freshwater Classic is a must-do race every year for hundreds of sailing families from around the state.

There will be 10 divisions this year, catering for many off-the-beach monohull and catamaran classes, as well as family trailer-sailor and larger multihull yachts, along with wooden vintage river boats and the historic Restricted 21 racing wooden boats racing in their own division – among them Australia's oldest wooden boats still actively racing.

Young basketballer selected for national team

Strathalbyn 15-year-old basketballer Alex Blackmore is the youngest player to be recently selected for the Rollers 2025 extended squad, the wheelchair basketball team that is the highest level in the country.

He is one of the rising talents from Spinners – the U23 men's national team – and Head Coach Brad Ness found he showed great promise.

"Alex brings speed and versatility to the 2.0 class, which blends well with our current style of play and rotations... we are starting to build out a core group of youth in our squad," he said.

"There is an exciting mix of players, with a majority of the 2024 Paralympic team returning to the fold and a touch of youth from the current Under-23 World Cup squad.

"The main focus for this year is to get the squad operating holistically across the board, from coaches to athletes to service staff, bridging the gap between the players here in Australia and those playing overseas either at college in the USA or in the European leagues."

His selection for the national team follows the Spinners winning gold in the IWBF (International Wheelchair Basketball Federation) Asia Oceania Championship in Bangkok last year.

At the time, Basketball Australia referred to Blackmore as a "defensive rock" who "proved a challenge for the opposition".

The win qualified the Spinners for the U23 World Championships in Brazil in June,

and he has a major game every month leading up to it, including a special camp with Rollers in March, a camp with Australian Institute of Sport, representing South Australia in a national competition, and a selection camp for a world competition later this year.

The Tyndale student is having flexible study options to work around his dreams, such as getting work early and completing some SACE elements during Year 10 this year.

"Obviously it's been a whirlwind, and it's coming along well," his mum, Lauren, said.

"Talking to the coaches, he seems to pretty valuable."

The recent selection follows an upward trajectory for the local player since he was chosen to represent South Australia in the U23 team at just 12-years-old.

As followed in *The Southern Argus*, the Tyndale student started basketball to meet other people with disabilities, but quickly began moving from strength-to-strength, including playing in the National Junior Wheelchair Championships last year.

The ultimate goal for Blackmore would be the Paralympic Games in Los Angeles in 2028.

Blackmore has been supported by former Australian of the Year Dylan Alcott, who has the same diagnosis as Blackmore, and whose foundation – which aims to help young Australians in sport and education – granted him a special sports chair and a pair of Kicks.

It was a stunning effort by veteran Allen Anderson in the Strathalbyn Golf Club's par competition last Saturday under ideal conditions, coming in with a score of +7.

Allen, not having to play bowls on the day, was out to show he still had it in playing golf, and despite still playing with his broom stick putter, modified with various bends in it, won with +7 by one point from Gordon Robson on +6, and early clubhouse leader Matthew Gniel on +5, while young Tyson Furniss was next on +4.

Allen did have a bit of help from captain Graeme Bertholini, who he was playing with, in pointing out that Allen was marking his score on a lower handicap than he was actually on, as he had just +1 after the first nine holes before clicking into gear to add to this with a +6 on the back nine.

Gordon Robson was putting in a solid effort on the back nine, before he blew the last hole which would have seen him level with Allen, but still have lost on a count back, while Matt Gniel with +4 after nine holes had just +1 on the back nine (the 12th his problem hole), as he was in and out of trees on his way to the green, though still had a chance to square the hole but missed the putt.

On the day, Gordon hit some long shots as he was over the back of the green in two on the par five 12th before he had four putts, was interrupted in his putting when Brenton Welk, further back on the fairway in another group, produced an unusual long hit for the ball to roll onto the green while Gordon was about to putt.

Playing in Gordon's group were Ken Lester, John Owen and James Beney, and when on the 13th, Gordon found himself over the back of the green in two again, and in missing out on a birdie, he was saying that he didn't need birdies as he still got a plus with a par four.

On this hole, James Beney had all

kinds of problems with his tee shot, hitting a tree to finish near the ladies' tee block to the left, then went at right angles across the fairway to be in the trees, and in trying to get out, did so until the ball hit the big gum tree on the dog leg corner.

Then James had a very short hit before, at last, getting on to a good hit but going well over the back of the green as he picked up, with Ken also picking up while John had five for a plus.

There was confusion all round for the group on the 14th, because as John saw his tee shot head toward the creek, Gordon had a long drive which rolled off into the rough on the left, as did Ken and James, but not as long and just only off the fairway.

Ken then had a nice shot down the fairway, but it was James' ball he hit to cop a penalty.

James, on retrieving his ball, had a decent second shot, while John was still looking for his drive, and then deciding it was lost and had a drop to hit the ball further up the fairway.

Then Ken, finding his ball, was wondering whose ball it was just a metre behind him under a bit of bark, and it turned out to be John's lost ball, so John promptly reverted back to playing his original ball.

Gordon, with his second shot, was a bit annoyed that his long hit finished up almost in the trees on the hill above the hole, but his third shot was a beauty, as it rolled to within two feet of the hole to pick up his par and another plus, with James also having a plus with his five.

On the 15th, James came back to earth as his tee shot went into the creek and, four shots later, with clumps of grass and dirt flying everywhere, decided to pick up as John had to scrub the hole, while Gordon and Ken both had a plus.

Gordon also picked up another plus on the 16th as James, off the tee, found himself in the creek again, with Gordon telling him this time to take a drop (which he did), but he still picked up in the end.

Sean Walsh was partly responsible for nailing a sheet of iron to a tree at the fifth tee to use as a bird scarer, with the cockies congregating there lately, and using a big stick proved that it worked.

Partner Michael Young then picked up a long stick, and another member of the group Kirk Richardson thought he was going to have a go at scaring the birds away but, no, he simply used it to get a new ball out of the drain pipe near the tee block that Sean had hit in there a few weeks ago.

Sean and Michael both squared the hole, while Kirk had his first minus for the round.

On the seventh, Kirk, being in the rough above the small dam on the left corner of the fairway, saw Michael and decided to take Kirk's buggy over to him but almost came to grief as it took off on him, not being used to remote controls.

Kirk, being on the green in three got his par five, while Michael and Sean had to settle for six.

Michael was also a bit confused on the eighth tee block when lining up, luckily seeing that he was about to use a six iron on the par three, smartly changed to his three iron, though might as well have used his first club selection in the way that the ball travelled.

Brian Simpson, who had three holes for four points on the front nine, didn't do too well on the sixth as in getting over the creek, hit a tree, as did his next two shots before his fourth was far too long and into the rough as he picked up, Brian making amends with a long putt for par on the eighth and a plus.

Playing with Brian were Michael Clarke and Dave Pryor, Dave on the ninth having to chip back onto the fairway from the left rough after his drive, on his way to a -5, while Michael also went left, but could not find his ball to scrub the hole on his way to -7 for the day, while Brian was on this green in two and then just missed a birdie chance before then missing a short putt as he finished the day on -1.

The winner on the previous Saturday,

Phil Perrin, was less than perfect this Saturday, never recovering from being -5 after five holes, but he did limit the damage a bit on the back nine, having a birdie on the tenth, finishing with -8.

Mark Condon was doing reasonably well in being square after 12 holes, but then it was four scrubs in a row as he finished at -4.

Michael Beasley was quite happy about sinking a 20-foot putt from off the green on the 17th, but not so happy after three putts on the last to end up at -1 for the day, as partner Paul Coombe also sunk a putt from well off the green on the fourth, as he finished with -2.

Another member in the group, Terry Merritt, said he had never been in positive territory before as he finished with +2, and also mentioning that his putting was steady as he lined up the pin well.

Terry did have a bit of misfortune on the fifth, when he was pinged for hitting the wrong ball (saying that they all said it was his ball before he hit it), but he did have a bit of luck on the last when his shot hit Mick's cart parked near the green to stop the ball from going to the boundary fence, leading to a par on the hole.

Ben McLeod on the 14th, had a 20-metre drive, but the next shot was only about 90 metres from the hole to then chip in for a birdie, also picking up a birdie on the 12th to have 38 off the stick on the front nine for a +4 and 42 on the back nine for a -2, to finish at +2 for the round.

Gary Beasley had -1 on the front nine, with a couple of scrubs, and went a bit better on the back as some long putts went in, to have +1 and be square for the day, and while partner Sam Avramidis had -1, their scoring system must have been complicated as they took ages to put their efforts on the computer to actually find out their proper score.

Russell Kimm had a bit of bad luck on the 14th when his tee shot hit the big tree just over the drain on the left, to see him play his next shot out of the drain on the other side of the 13th

fairway to pick up a minus on the hole.

Russell tried his best to get into the dam on the 16th before he found himself well over the back of the green, and after two more shots was still not on the green, then after getting on the green just missed sinking a putt to pick up a minus.

Russell was in the last group of five, including Randall Pitt, getting an ordinary -5, Troy Williams who had three birdies on the day coming in at -3 after being -5 early, Red Sorrell back after a bit of a lay off and doing well to finish at +1 and Kim Wittwer who was also at -5 early.

Kim was in a battle not to come last, thankful in having a plus on the 14th, but then picking up a minus on the par three 15th.
