## **Rotary and Lions join forces** for school voucher program

Strathalbyn Rotary and Lions Club members have stepped in to save a program that sees struggling students receive \$50 or \$100 vouchers to help with returning to school costs.

The vouchers can be put towards items such as school shoes, uniforms, stationery or sporting equipment.

They are distributed across the region through the Fleurieu Community Foundation, but this year its normal funding body withdrew its support.

That's where the Strathalbyn groups stepped in.

This is an instance of the Lions and Rotary working together to provide the funding for both EFS and Tyndale," Rotary President, John Agnew, said.

The amount is not the world, but sometimes when some of those unexpected things come up at the start of the school year, (it) is something that can help you get through it.

"We are providing \$7500 between the two schools, and that is money that we have raised as clubs and we are sharing 50/50.

"It is certainly something that in these times, when things are tough, it would be something that we hope can help families here a bit."

The foundation has been able to distribute vouchers to schools across the Yankalilla, Alexandrina, and Victor Harbor Council areas, and had chosen to continue the program as the need was even greater this year.

"(Overall), about \$31,000 worth of \$50 vouchers have been distributed, and both the data and anecdotal evidence from previous years shows they are greatly appreciated by the schools and their respective communities," Fleurieu Community Foundation Voucher Program Co-ordinator, Allan Phelps, said.

## **Dry times hit Freedom Hill sanctuary**

The ongoing dry conditions and the increasingly difficult task of sourcing hay is impacting on animal rescue services such as Freedom Hill sanctuary.

As previously reported in *The Southern* Argus, South Australians are facing ongoing dry conditions, with annual rainfalls last year recorded at near or record lows.

Owner Kym Henley said conditions at the Brinkley property were akin to a drought.

"We are virtually growing rocks - there is not one bit of grass or one bit of green at all," she said.

"Going through a 'drought' is incredibly stressful at the best of times, but when you have got over 200 animals - cows, horses, donkeys, ponies, goats, pigs and sheep – that rely on you to make sure the food is there, it does put a lot of pressure on you.

"We always hand feed our animals anyway, even in winter, but at the moment, the horses are going through a bale of hay every two days.

'So, when you would normally be having maybe once a week (that) the horses might eat a bale of hay... they are churning through it in two days, so in your week you are going through three of them."

She said hay prices were continuing to rise, with even meadow hay - the poorest quality - costing \$200 a bale.

"This is where it gets scary – the scarcity of the hay – it just isn't around," Ms Henley said.

"My last truckload of hay that came, the delivery guy said he had been doing runs from Ouyen in Victoria down to Naracoorte to dairy farms until Ouyen had run out of hay.

"There is just nothing around in South

Australia at all, and the last drought that we went through there was nothing about at all (anywhere).

"We ended up taking a loan out just so we could go to an auction and buy 90 bales to get us through, and that was \$30,000."

Ms Henley said animal sanctuaries were binding together to try to figure out a way to help alleviate and work through 'drought' conditions.

"But in saying that, you can't be prepared for it as a sanctuary because you haven't got the money to stockpile your hay," she said.

'You haven't got \$30,0000 sitting there to go and buy a truckload of hay or 90 bales to get you through until the next reaping. "Then we are still unsure as to what this winter is going to be like."

The sanctuary was also facing higher numbers of animals being surrendered to them, including from pet owners and farmers who are unable to care for their animals as dry conditions continue.

"We are the ones they are coming to, and I would probably get a call every two weeks, and if it is not every two weeks, it would definitely be once a month, from people surrendering horses because they just can't afford large animals," Ms Henley said.

"The feed costs are too high, so they want

to surrender them, and they think sanctuaries can take them, but they just don't realise we haven't got an abundance of hay or money to be buy the hay to take their animals on as well.

"I know of one farmer, before the 'drought', (who) had spoken to a neighbour of mine, and he said he was just going to shoot the young lambs because he wasn't going to buy food in and they would starve to death, so it is pretty scary out there.

"I am glad that I am a bit sheltered in my own sanctuary because the paddocks I do see are bare, and I am wondering what the sheep are eating.

Ms Henley said the current conditions were "distressing".

"Rescue work is emotional at the best of times, but when you are constantly worrying about how to afford the next truckload of hay, it takes its toll for sure," she said.

"We pour everything into caring for the animals, and the pressure of making sure that we can continue to always be there, it takes its toll.

"There are a lot of sleepless nights, that is for sure.

"You still have your vet bills and things like that... all those things don't go away."

The problem is only exacerbated because sanctuaries fail to qualify as primary industries, which therefore meant they were unable to qualify for any relevant government assistance.

A Department of Primary Industries and Regions (PIRSA) spokesperson confirmed animal sanctuaries are not eligible for the On-farm Drought Infrastructure Rebates, which are currently being offered through PIRSA to eligible primary producers.

## **Delays continue for Lot 10 project development**

Frustrations have run high over continued delays to the proposed Lot 10 project, with Alexandrina Council yet to make the decision that would solidify its future occupants.

The highly anticipated business case for the development ordered by council was received towards the end of last year, with The Southern Argus previously revealing the project's Steering Committee members had recommended the consultant's preferred option, which excluded the Strathalbyn Harness Racing Club (SHRC) from the site.

Substantial upfront expenditures will be required to realise these plans, with the committee's preferred option estimated to cost \$33.52 million in addition to an annual

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operating expense of \$451,665.

Councillors were initially meant to endorse a preferred master plan option towards the end of last year, but it was deferred due to SHRC indicating its intent to prepare an offer to purchase a portion of the site from council.

This is not the first time the club has proposed to purchase part of the land.

This forced a decision to be pushed back until councillors could have a briefing in early February, which was held in confidence.

At last Monday night's council meeting several Lot 10-related motions were put up for debate, including adjourned motions and governance arrangements.

It was noted that further reports will be presented to council as soon as practicable but no later than the first week of March to progress the project, with a special meeting scheduled for the third of the month.

Council also formally elected North Ward councillors Sue Miller and Christie Thornton, and West Ward councillor Michael Scott onto the project's committee, though not without frustrations being expressed by Cr Miller at all the delays. "This has been going on for two-and-a-

half years and these groups have worked so well together," she said.

"You know what would be best? If there are no council members on it at all and let all the community groups drive it without any interference from council, and we have our say when they make recommendations to administration.

"I am really confused and this just gets muddier and muddier, and it drives the community insane.

"I am incredibly frustrated and this is

just making a mockery of a community that is desperate to have some decisions made, and we're just making it harder for them to make decisions."

Also thrown into the mix now for the site is the proposed Strathalbyn Dog Park.

Its initial location was recommended for the corner of Langhorne Creek Road and Berry Smith Drive, but after local residents opposed the choice of site in May last year, it was opened for further investigation.

Since then, the originally proposed site now houses storage tanks for CWMS and is no longer viable.

At last Monday night's meeting council agreed to investigate the establishment of the dog park as part of any initial stage of development at Lot 10.

## **Councils renew** partnership



## Strathalbyn nurse-led clinic here to stay

The nurse-led clinics at Strathalbyn and Gumeracha will now be an ongoing service following a trial.

As previously reported in The Southern Argus, the model was a proposed solution to the closed emergency department (ED), which "temporarily" shut its doors in 2020 due to COVID-19 and being located alongside vulnerable people in the conjoined aged-care facility.

The appointment-only service opened in Strathalbyn in September 2023, following Gumeracha's in May that year, to support people who need care for non-urgent conditions. "We are pleased to share that nurse-led clinics at Gumeracha and Strathalbyn will continue to operate," Barossa Hills Fleurieu Local Health Network Chief Executive Officer, Bronwyn Masters, said. "The clinics continue to

be well-supported by the community.

In partnership with Adelaide University, a study is being conducted to review the services the clinics provide for the community.

"The evaluation will provide us learnings to ensure timely and appropriate care for both communities," Ms Masters said.

The review is progressing and will be completed later in 2025.

## **Dust and dirt concerns at Old Bull Creek Road site**

While any development has yet to begin on the site, Vincent Leeton, who lives on Archer Court, said trucks were driving in and out of the site "non-stop".

He alleged on Friday that the carting had been going on for about a week, and that residents had failed to receive any notice about it.

They are heavy combination trucks and each truck has a trailer behind it, and there is three of them working continuously," Mr Leeton said.

'Quite often there are two trucks out there on the paddock making dust and another coming down this road here through the gates.

"It is continuous all day from early in the morning, and they generally finish somewhere around 5pm in the afternoon.

"During the day the prevailing wind generally blows from the south to southwest or south-east, so all the dust that is created when they trail across this open plain blows straight across to the right and across our houses, and it fouls our rainwater tanks, makes the solar panels less effective, and covers the back yard in dust.

"I suffer from asthma, so I have to keep all my doors and windows closed whenever these trucks are in operation."

Frencham Lane resident Mike Galea was

likewise concerned by the dumping of the dirt, saying hundreds of tonnes of top soil had been transferred to the paddock behind his back fence.

He allegedly approached Alexandrina Council, and was told the developer was moving the soil from one location to another and was allowed to do so without a development application if the piles of dirt were under three metres high.

Council's Chief Executive Officer Andrew MacDonald told The Southern Argus council's Development Compliance Team had spoken with residents who had raised complaints and was currently investigating their concerns.

"If investigations deem it appropriate, council can use its enforcement powers under the Local Nuisance and Litter Control Act 2016 to address dust concerns as a local nuisance matter," Mr MacDonald said.

"In the meantime, council's Community Safety Team is actively monitoring the site and will be communicating with the developer to ensure appropriate measures are in place to minimise dust impacts.

"No development authorisation is required to stockpile fill on the site, provided the stockpiles do not exceed 3m in height."

An Oakford Homes spokesperson declined to comment when contacted by The Argus.

## Paris Creek ravaged by fire

Two grassfires in quick succession at Paris Creek kept local Country Fire Service (CFS) volunteers on their toes on Saturday.

The first incident was called in at around 11am after a car caught fire on Paris Creek Road and the flames spread to nearby grass.

It spread approximately 0.5 hectares before it was extinguished by CFS ground crews and two water drops from supporting aircraft.

Not long after, at about 1pm, another grass fire was reported on the same road.

Approximately 140 firefighters and 40 trucks worked to extinguish and secure the area over several hours, while 38 water drops were made by supporting aircraft.

The fire burnt 19 hectares of grass and scrub land on private property but the cause is yet to be determined.

Fire investigators attended the scene and ground crews remained on site overnight to monitor conditions, ensure all hotspots were extinguished and prevent any potential reignition of the fire.

## **SAPOL** pleads for better driver behaviour

South Australia Police has made an urgent call for safer road behaviours following the tragic loss of 17 lives already this year.

Vulnerable road users have been over-represented this year, with three motorcyclists, three pedestrians and two cyclists killed on the state's roads.

Officer in Charge of Traffic Services Branch, Acting Superintendent Jaimi Burns, said serious road trauma has been occurring at a concerning rate this year, and it is tragic to see the majority of lives lost on the roads have been vulnerable road users.

Superintendent Burns' warning comes as an analysis of 2024 fatalities and serious injuries reveals speed and dangerous driving as the major causes of lives lost.

In 2024, 91 lives were lost and 847 people were left with serious injuries resulting from road crashes, with the majority of incidents occurring on regional roads.

Distraction, driving dangerously and speeding were the leading causes of last year's 847 serious injury crashes.

Additionally, drug driving was a contributing factor in 70 regional serious injury crashes and 129 motorcycle serious injury crashes.

"Serious road trauma often involves one or more of the 'Fatal Five' road behaviours that significantly increase the risk of being involved in a crash," Superintendent Burns said.

"Tragically, this means almost all lives lost and serious injuries could have been prevented through safer road behaviours.

"With distraction and speeding playing a major role in so many crashes last year, the critical message to road users across South Australia is clear – these selfish behaviours need to stop.

"We are pleading with people driving on

South Australian roads to stay focused, and drive to the conditions and speed limit so everyone can arrive safely."

Young drivers aged 16 to 24 and passengers under 16 were also significantly over-represented in lives lost and serious injury crashes.

In 2024, 11 young drivers lost their lives, while 155 young drivers sustained serious injuries.

Additionally, three passengers under 16 lost their lives and 16 were seriously injured

"South Australia Police will continue to take strong action to deter and detect unsafe behaviours on our roads through road safety education and enforcement state-wide," Superintendent Burns added.

While speaking with the driver, the officer allegedly noticed a traditional Maori wooden baton, a white full-face LED beauty mask, and bag containing screwdrivers and torches in the rear passenger footwell. The man was arrested and charged with going equipped to commit an offence and issued with a fine for driving unlicensed. He was bailed to appear in Murray Bridge Magistrates Court on April 2.

## Police in full force for Fringe

Local residents attending this year's Fringe Festival can expect a higher police presence. South Australia Police has launched Operation Adelaide Fringe Festival 2025

to ensure revellers enjoy the event safely. The operation will see the deployment of foot and bicycle patrols, along with police horses, dogs and Public Transport Safety to the city-west DPP already in place.

This will provide police additional authorities to further protect public safety within the Fringe grounds and surrounding area, including the ability to conduct metal detector searches, drug searches and ordering people to leave the vicinity.

Free safety and assistance wristbands for

At about 4.30pm on February 19, police were conducting speed detections duties on South Eastern Freeway at Callington when they detected a white Mazda sedan travelling at 164km/h in a 110km/h zone.

Police stopped the car and spoke with the driver, a provisional licence holder and 18-year-old Woodside man, who was reported for aggravated driving at an excessive speed.

A provisional licence condition includes not exceeding 100km/h even if the local speed limit calls for it. He was also issued a six-month immediate loss of licence. Branch members to focus on behaviour, liquor licensing compliance, and public safety.

Event Police Commander Superintendent Scott Denny encouraged festival-goers to enjoy the event, but not at the expense of others' safety.

"We want everyone to have an enjoyable, memorable, and safe festival, and we are doing everything we can to be prepared and maintain Adelaide's status as a safe city to live, work and visit," he said.

"Police will have an unwavering focus on road safety, anti-social behaviour and alcohol-related violence and will respond to any reports of crime."

The 'Adelaide Fringe Festival 2025' Declared Public Precinct will be in place for a 12-hour period from 6pm to 6am every night during the Fringe period, in addition children and vulnerable people are available at the Fringe Corner Box Office or Gluttony Box Office located on the corner Rundle Street and East Terrace.

"The festival is family-friendly in nature and people with children are reminded to have a plan in place should they be separated, including having a designated place to meet," Superintendent Denny said.

"Leave valuables at home or ensure they are secured and kept out of sight.

"If you're drinking, organise a designated driver, catch public transport, or catch a rideshare or taxi."

Operation City Safe will also be running concurrently every Friday and Saturday night, commencing at 7pm and focusing on the West End Precinct.

At Leaving Honors level (now year 12) in 1938 Allan prepared A Field Study of Strathalbyn and District for submission to the examiners and was awarded top marks in the state, presenting this original works to the Strathalbyn National Trust Museum on his visit.

## No bulk billing clinics found in Mayo

## Promoting hunting by stealth

Regarding 'Banning hunting by stealth' by Dr Nicola Centofanti (*The Southern Argus*, Feb 13, 2025), the State Government is right in attempting to recover some of the costs to administer duck and quail hunting open seasons.

Duck hunting is an entirely discretionary activity that is undertaken by fewer than one in 1700 South Australians.

The increase in permit fees for 2025 still comes nowhere near covering the full costs to the South Australian taxpayer.

The Parliamentary Inquiry to which Ms Centofanti refers was seriously flawed.

It became clear to non-hunting groups making submissions that no amount of scientific and other objective evidence presented was going to change the entrenched views of the pro-hunting Select Committee members.

An independent survey of more than 4000 South Australians in 2023 (2000 in urban areas and 2000 in regional SA) found

country were without bulk billing clinics. This is outlined in the latest report by

Cleanbill, which is a directory aiming to increase healthcare accessibility.

It was the first report of its kind that offered an electorate comparison of changes in bulk billing clinics, finding "significant drops" in in the practice in some electorates.

It also found "significant disparities" in out-of-pocket changes between electorates, with some experiencing a drop in fees while others had large increases.

an overwhelming majority believed that animals killed for food must be killed quickly and humanely.

It is impossible when shooting birds with shotguns to achieve this.

Many birds are not killed outright and are left wounded.

The Australian Veterinary Association opposes duck hunting on this basis.

According to Tourism Research Australia, international visitors spent \$2.6 billion on travel that involved birdwatching in the year to June 2024, while domestic overnight birdwatching travellers spent \$636 million over the same period, up from \$414 million in 2021 – a 53 per cent increase.

We encourage Ms Centofanti to start supporting activities that protect and treasure our wonderful native birds.

#### Farm fight

Some politicians propose replacing coal-fired power stations with nuclear reactors.

Even pro-nuclear group Nuclear for Australia concedes nuclear reactors use at least 1.2 times more water than comparable coal fired power, and the proposed reactors are much larger than existing coal plants, meaning water use could more than double.

Some suggest desalination plants to supply water for nuclear reactors, but this requires seawater and nearly all the proposed reactor sites are a long way inland.

Desalination is also extremely costly. As a core principle, Farmers for Climate Action stands for protecting regional water supplies and does not support making water scarcer or more expensive for farmers.

Last weekend's close-call fire at Paris Creek was a stark reminder of why we should never take any outbreak or the work of our amazing Country Fire Service (CFS) volunteers lightly.

Crews were called to Paris Creek Road firstly at around 11am to extinguish a car fire that spread to nearby grass, but then not long after, a more dangerous fire broke out nearby, with a watch and act alert issued going out to nearby homes and properties.

About 140 firefighters and 40 trucks worked to extinguish and secure the area over several hours, while 38 water drops were made by supporting aircraft.

With their work, the watch and act alert was soon downgraded.

This fire burnt 19 hectares of grass and scrub land on private property.

How thankful should locals be for our CFS volunteers and those who helped with farm fire units?

South Australia has 425 CFS brigades in South Australia, equating to about 13,500 volunteers.

Every fire season they are called out in the heat, putting themselves in danger, to tackle the many fires that ignite each season.

Every year they call for more volunteers.

Fighting fires is a science that seasoned volunteers know well, and is boosted by being able to have water bombing aircraft swiftly on the scene.

But did you have a thought about your bushfire plan this past week, so you can help protect yourself, other adults, children, people who need assistance, and pets and livestock?

Did you consider what you would do if a blaze broke out and you were at work?

If the pets run away, the children are home alone, if you have guests, and/or your escape route was blocked?

Has your household made a decision about if you will all leave early, where you will go, what to do with your pets, what you would take with you, and who to tell of your movements?

These checklists are on the CFS website as a three-step fire safety plan. Take some time to tick the boxes.

## **Milang Railway Museum** opens new railway loop



About 90 people descended on the Milang Railway Museum on Sunday to mark the official opening of its new rail loop.

Member for Mayo Rebekha Sharkie and Alice Beale from the History Trust of South Australia did the honours of opening the track, while Alexandrina Mayor Keith Parkes and other dignitaries were among those who enjoyed a trip around the new loop.

Milang Railway Museum Secretary Peter Lucas said the handmade venture took about a year-and-a-quarter to complete.

'Back in 2017 we opened a building called the South Australian Light Railway Centre, which was to preserve the history of South Australian light railways, the little narrowgauge railways," he said.

"At that time we had a short train ride which went out a few hundred metres and then back again, and that kept us going until about 2023 when we decided it would be good if we had a much longer ride around the whole area.

"So, we got permission from the rail safety regulator to do that, and then we got planning permission from the council, and went to work and started to lay the track.

"That was at the end of 2023, (and) we had an average of about six volunteers (at a time) doing the work, which was all done by hand."

The sleepers were donated by Graeme Crack, while a number of organisations such as Alexandrina Council and individuals donated towards the expensive ballast.

'We had lots of work to do on the way," Mr Lucas said.

"The sharp curves were a real challenge we had to invent a rail bending machine to do the curved rail at each end, but we got it finished."

The official opening followed the 'Golden Spike Day' on January 7 that marked the completion of the rail loop.

Mr Lucas said the museum had helped

put Milang on the map. "Most people in Adelaide have never heard of Milang, and through this, we have been able to get it on TripAdvisor and Google, and that has brought a lot of people into the town," he said.

The museum volunteers' new project is to enable a Velocipede to be ridden.

"It is like a bicycle that goes down the track," Mr Lucas said.

"They can ride that, but it doesn't go anywhere at the moment.

'We have got permission now for people to ride a Velocipede up and down the railway track outside here, so in about two months, people will be able to come down here, get on a Velocipede, put their kid on the other end, and be able to take them for rides up and down the track."

## **Regional rideshare approved**

The State Government has officially announced the removal of restrictions that had prevented rideshare services from operating in regional areas.

Rideshare services such as Uber have previously been able to operate in regional areas with an exemption permit obtained for about \$300 annually, however, many have called for the metropolitan boundary to be removed to enable them to provide their services to regional areas without the charge.

The removal was flagged in September last year, but the government's announcement on Monday made it official.

"Whether it's for a night out, getting to work or attending medical appointments, having access to reliable transport is essential," he said.

"This decision will enhance mobility for residents, boost tourism, and provide new employment opportunities for locals looking to become drivers."

However, Member for Finniss David Basham took a more cautious approach to the news.

"This regional area is fortunate to have private chauffeur operators, local taxi and Dial-A-Ride (bus) services that provide point-to-point transportation, and other public bus services," Mr Basham said.

"Moreover, many local establishments take responsibility by offering a courtesy bus to ensure safe travel home after events.


"We need to ensure we continue to support the transport services who have been supporting us, otherwise we risk losing the valuable transport options we currently enjoy."



## Demolition of 'heritage' building knocked back by council

An application for a new medical centre at Mount Barker has been knocked back by council's assessment panel due the proposed demolition of buildings, despite its heritage consultant deeming the works compliant and the structure "irredeemably beyond repair".

Beyond Ink submitted an application in November last year for the demolition of all existing buildings, including one local heritage place, and removal of two regulated trees at 44, 46 and 48 Adelaide Road to construct a two-storey consulting room building with associated signage, fencing, retaining, carparking and landscaping.

The building, comprising of a floor area of approximately 1578m2, would have 15 consulting rooms, including nine at the lower ground level and six at the upper, associated supporting facilities such as administration areas, offices, staff rooms, wet areas, bin storage, mechanical plant and communication rooms, and 42 car parks, including disability complaint spaces.

However, the development received strong opposition during the consultation period, with the majority against the demolition of the heritage site.

The development proposed to demolish a 1924 local-heritage-listed home at 46 Adelaide Road, with council giving consideration to the heritage values of the structures at 42, 46 and 50 Adelaide Road, and the nearby 1 Druids Avenue.

Extensive cracking was found throughout the 46 Adelaide Road building by both Remedial Engineering Consulting and On Architecture, as well as other signs of poor footing performance, stormwater management, reactive soils, and proximity of large trees, which, if it were to be rectified, would require the entire building

to be underpinned, together with complete reconstruction of walls and other elements.

It was therefore deemed to be in poor condition and the works would qualify it as being "irredeemably beyond repair", which would support its demolition.

The demolition of two adjacent buildings at Druids Avenue to facilitate the new development were also deemed non-detrimental to the overall character and value of the area.

"It has been reasonably demonstrated that demolition of the existing local heritage place is appropriate, with particular reference to its structural stability and degree of demolition required in order to fully restore the building to a safe and habitable state," a council report read.

"This demolition is further supported by a Heritage Impact Statement, which makes reference to a previous heritage survey that sought to 'downgrade' the building to a contributory item.

"The building design responds appropriately to the context of the Historic Area Overlay, incorporating appropriate building heights, fenestration, materiality and roof form/pitch."

But despite the assessment panel agreeing the proposed development was not seriously at variance with the Planning and Design Code, and the engineer's report deeming the Adelaide Road building "irredeemably beyond repair", at last Wednesday's meeting panel members refused to grant planning consent as they believed it had "not adequately demonstrated compliance" with the Local Heritage Place and Historic Area Overlays.

The medical centre was planned to be a Jones Radiology, which would have made it the organisation's third location in the town. A spokesperson said the organisation

would continue to look for the right space to increase its capacity in Mount Barker.

## Volunteers deployed to Mount Remarkable

Nine local Country Fire Service (CFS) volunteers recently returned from a deployment to the Wilmington fire in the Mount Remarkable National Park in the Flinders Ranges.

Strathalbyn CFS Group deployed the Langhorne Creek 14 appliance, two command vehicles, and nine members from various brigades.

The fire was started by lightning on February 2 at about 4.30pm.

Local crews were quickly on scene, but the terrain made access difficult.

The fire response was quickly upgraded, with response by aviation and ground resources from outside the area.

Due to the complexity of the location, further resources from throughout the state responded, including the Strathalbyn CFS Group.

One member was involved in the logistics section of the incident management team, two members were Sector Commanders, and the remainder were - as CFS volunteers phrase it - "putting wet stuff on the red stuff".

Accommodation was provided in Port Pirie, Port Augusta or Melrose, with meals being provided by the Salvation Army.

The hard-working crews at Stirling North and Port Pirie airbases kept the Single Engine Air Tractors (SEATs) bombers, and the Blackhawk bombers filled with the required fire-retardant type, as specified by the Air Attack Supervisors (AAS).

The Very Large Air Tanker (VLAT) from interstate was also deployed to drop some long retardant lines, and line scan capable aircraft were also used to map the fire edge and locate hotspots.

The aircraft dropped in excess of 39,000 litres of various retardants from 554 drops. The area has so far burnt about

5400-hectares, and the fire boundary is about 60kms.

### Men welcomed to join program

A self-development program that aims to support men in becoming the best version of themselves is coming to Goolwa for the first time.

Good Better Best Men is a notfor-profit South Australian charity founded in 2023 that promotes physical, mental and emotional wellbeing to help participants make a positive contribution to the wider community.

Over the nine-week program, men share their challenges in a non-judgemental and confidential space, ranging from alcoholism, drug addiction, and domestic violence, through to the most common struggle of finding meaning in life.

'What am I doing in life? Something is missing," Co-Founder, Michael Brennan, said.

"Men come because in some way their lives are unfulfilled ... (and) it's a journey of trying to understand that.

"Most men go away thinking: 'I've never actually thought about (meaning and purpose) on that deeper level."

Culture often tells men they're unable to open up about their feelings, however, Mr Brennan believed it's "deeper than that" - that they need support identifying their emotions.

"Part of circle work is that all of you is welcome – the sadness, the joy, the shame, the guilt and anger," he said.

'We hold people energetically in that

space to be who they need to be.

"We don't give any answers – we don't tell men how to do things - they're invited and we play with different things to think about."


By the end of the nine weeks, facilitator Sean Tavener finds a huge change in the participants, particularly after 'vulnerability has been exposed" and they have "opened up to that connection".

Mr Brennan has heard many men say they learn "so many tools" from the experience that they can take home.

After his own relationship struggles and personal challenges, Mr Brennan found a decline in his mental health, then found his "life calling" in his late 60s.

After working as a support worker, with Lifeline, and in a mental health program, Mr Brennan co-founded the community of men after dreaming of the idea for many years.

The introductory session at Goolwa Centenary Hall is this Wednesday, March 5.

Successful projects are those which build social capital through facilitating community participation, create a sense of belonging and improve accessibility.



## **Earliest vintage in memory**



#### By Tara Nash

A Langhorne Creek winery had their earliest vintage in recent memory due to the unseasonably dry season.

Bremerton Wines' busiest season of the year started about three weeks earlier than average, with ripening sped up due to dry conditions.

The low-disease pressure in the vines means the grape quality is looking "awesome", but the challenge has been ensuring the vines remain healthy and irrigated.

Excluding some extremely hot days, owner Rebecca Wilson said generally, the weather has been "really kind" to the region.

"Because of the influence of the lakes and the ocean, the coolness at night is lovely because you retain natural acidity (in the grapes)," she said.

"Langhorne Creek is pretty lucky – we're a pretty consistent region, we don't face extremes very often."

Healthy vines in good soil nutrition and with balanced viticulture can withstand the odd hot day.

Balanced viticulture refers to having good canopy to fruit ratio, so leaves can help the grapes ripen.

During vintage, Bremerton Wines has increased staff operating across seven days a week, with vineyards across two sites as well as a sourcing grapes from a couple of small growers.

Part of the process includes testing the maturity of the grapes, analysing the grape juice's sugar, and looking at its acidity and pH balance.

"We look at the science to guide us but the number one decision is flavour," Ms Wilson said.

"Sometimes the science tells you one story but the taste (tells another)."

This year, she has observed early sugar ripeness, so they have to wait longer for the flavour to develop.

Other parts of vintage include fermentation, separating the juice from the skins, and barrelling the wine for ageing which can be a couple of months to several years.

They have transitioned from working with the earlier whites and roses to red varieties, anticipating they may even finish before Easter, which is "absolutely unheard of" as they are typically done by the end of April.

## Why do I need to have my identity verified in property transactions?

Conveyancers (and Solicitors and Financial Institutions) are required to identify their clients when they are involved in property transactions.

The Registrar-General who is responsible for the administration of property legislation brought in the 'Verification of Identity Policy' to minimise the risk of identity fraud and fraudulent land transactions being registered.

The Policy also allows settlements to be done online.

#### Verification of Identity

This is done when a client attends a 'face-to-face' meeting with their Conveyancer, and produces specific and current documentation required.

The Conveyancer can confirm the Identity.

Identification documentation includes:

- Passports
- Proof of age cards

• Change of name/marriage certificates

- $\bullet$  Birth certificates
- Medicare/DVA cards
- Drivers licences
- Your photo may also be taken

The documentation must be kept on file by the Conveyancer for at least seven years.

It is important that there must be a link between all the documentation.

For instance, if a birth certificate and driver's licence are used, and each document has a different surname (for instance, a person has got married), then you must also have a linking document that provides evidence of the name change.

In this case a marriage certificate would also be required.

### What if I can't attend a face-to-face meeting?

If you can't get to your Conveyancer's office for this meeting, then you will need to do the 'face-to-face' meeting with an agent like Australia Post or use a Virtual Verification Of Identity Service.



#### Verification of the right to deal (Verification of Authority)

Even when your identity has been verified, we must also establish that you have the right to deal with the property.

The Verification of Authority process establishes the link between the property and the seller (or buyer).

Sellers will need to produce land tax assessments, rates notices, utilities notices and mortgage repayment statements.

The type of documents needed to verify a seller's authority will differ depending on the type of conveyancing transaction.

Buyers will need to produce the sales contract and/or finance approval.

If you are signing on behalf of another party, then documentary proof of that authority must be established.

For example, you must produce the original power of attorney, trust deed, court order, Probate, etc.
