

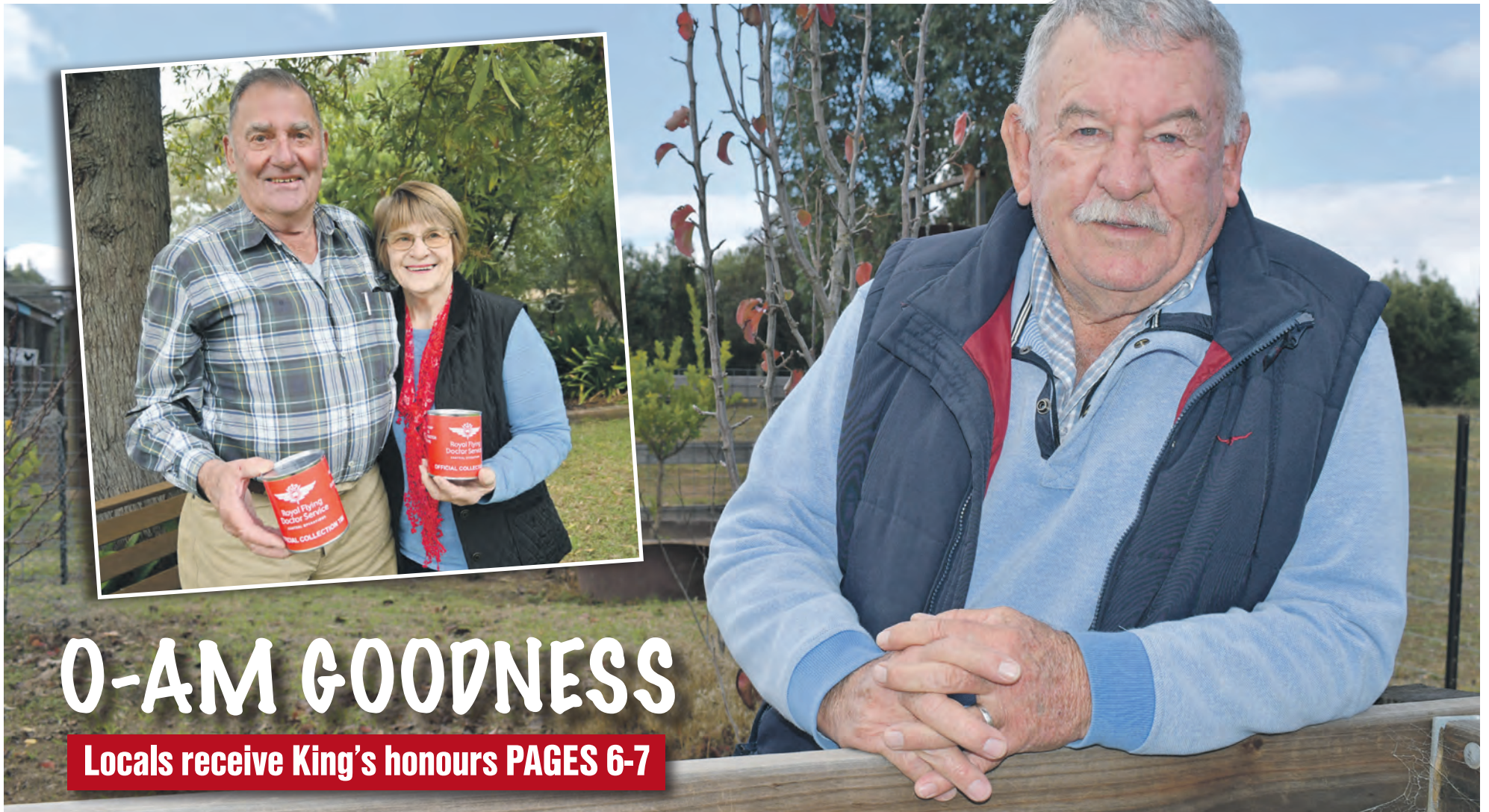

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Youth group plans to expand in Strathalbyn

A new Christian organisation being established in Strathalbyn is opening its doors to locals aged from 12-to-17-year-olds as it aims to expand its newly formed youth group.

Youth for Strath has been formed by Compassion Vineyard Strathalbyn and so far has about nine youth attending its monthly gatherings in the Good Shepherd Hall on Chapel Street.

"We started it because people in the community were saying we are really missing something here for the youth – a safe place for them to hang out and have something to do," spokesperson, Melanie Macrow, said.

"(They said) if you want to start a youth group that would be amazing.

"As it happens, my husband and I have that skill set, and a bunch of people around us who are keen to help.

"I have heard a number of people saying there are lots of youth that are just hanging around, and while they are not causing (a lot) of mischief at this point, they are still low-level mischief and there is the hanging

around in boredom – what do we do with that before it becomes a bigger issue for the town?

"How do we get them involved in something if they are not sport people or if their families are not inclined to get them to sports even if they are interested?"

The free group is looking at all types of activities that youth might like.

"At this point it is just come and meet us, come and have some fun," Mrs Macrow said.

"We play some games and we spend a little bit of time chatting about some of the big

issues for youth at the moment like anxiety and depression, self-worth, and identity.

"We don't spend long on that, but just enough time to bring it up and say, 'hey, if you want to talk more about that, then let's do that'.

"(We play) crazy games that kids love to play – running, chasing, seating and strategy games.

"Lots of them are really designed to get people working strategically but together as well, where the kids can get to know each other without just sitting across and chatting with one another like we might do as adults."

Mrs Macrow said while all young people were welcome to attend, the group would not suit everyone.

"We recognise we are not going to be everybody's cup of tea," she said.

"Sport fits a group of people and church fits a group of people, and some say it is just not for them.

"(Likewise), activities outside suit some people and activities inside suit some people, so we know we are not for everybody, but we know there are others that are looking for something and we are just happy for them to come along and check us out."

Tyndale protests against anti-discrimination legislation

The commission started looking into the rights of religious schools in 2019, but changed its focus in 2022 when the government asked it to look at what changes were needed to better protect students and staff from discrimination on the basis of sexual orientation, gender identity, relationship status or pregnancy.

Recommendations include "substantially" narrowing circumstances in which religious schools could discriminate against students and staff while "preserving their capacity to maintain a community of faith".

The proposal is to ensure that Australia is consistent with international legal obligations.

Religious schools would be in a similar position to other schools under Federal law, however, should be able to still build a "community of faith", by giving preference to hiring teachers who share the school's religion.

Christian Schools Australia Director of Public Policy Mark Spencer claimed this would accommodate some religious beliefs, but not others.

"They wouldn't allow a Christian or other faith-based schools to hold religious beliefs

around marriage that are traditionally held beliefs that are held by millions of people around the world and across hundreds of centuries – that would now effectively be outlawed... if the proposals are accepted,"

he said.

A Faith In Our Future spokesperson described the legislation as an "appalling attack on faith and freedom of belief" in Australia, and that Christian schools "won't

have the freedom to preference people who share the same traditional Christian values and beliefs when making employment decisions".

Tyndale Christian School Strathalbyn Principal Narelle Kluge said International Human Rights Law "expressly protects" the right to freedom of religion, which includes the right of parents to choose the type of education they want for their child.

"Families choosing a Christian school, whether they are people of faith themselves, understand, and in many instances actively support, that the staff at a Christian school will be actively engaged with the faith of the school," she said.

Living Word Macclesfield Pastor Brenton Wood questioned why a workplace would want to employ someone "who is against the ethos of (their) organisation".

More than 700 people from about 25 school communities including Strathalbyn were expected to gather at Salisbury East's Tyndale Christian School last night, June 12.

Federal South Australian MPs and Senators were invited, and testimonials were shared by teachers, parents and students.

"The Faith in Our Future event is a platform for Christian schools to reaffirm these basic rights and to share about the amazing things that Christian schools are doing, both in the lives of our students and in our wider communities," Ms Kluge said.

Last night's town hall event follows similar ones organised by Faith in our Future across Brisbane, Sydney, Perth, Launceston and Melbourne that brought together more than 3800 supporters of Christian schools who communicated their concerns to political representatives.

Taxi trial receives 'positive results'

The feedback and uptake during Des's Taxi Service's recent trial of in-town trips around Strathalbyn and surrounding communities was deemed positive.

As long as local drivers remain available, the service now plans to continue with extended hours to help support the ageing population who have limited transport options.

Des's Taxi Service previously operated between towns, such as from Strathalbyn to Mount Barker or Goolwa, however, this new service is for local journeys such as to a medical appointment or to the supermarket.

The trial also found a demand for trips around Langhorne Creek and surrounding regions.

As previously reported in *The Southern Argus*, the service was initially just Tuesdays, Wednesdays and Thursdays, but is now being extended to include Saturdays and fortnightly Sundays to correspond with SteamRanger's new service to Strathalbyn.

Manager of the Mount Barker fleet, Indian Lochert, has found a gradual increase in trips as more local passengers become aware of the increased service.

"The plan was to prove the concept – see if people were interested in that sort of service, then look to expand," he said.

"The trial definitely proved that there was interest in the service – the response from the community was overwhelmingly positive.

"We think there's enough to expand into the future."

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COST-CONSERVATIVE

Major relief measures and funded upgrades for the Adelaide Hills...

Increased investment in the regions is a welcome sight for many in the Labor Government's third State Budget, with funding allocated to expanding education in the Adelaide Hills and improving local infrastructure, housing and roads.

The budget will deliver a surplus of \$306 million, marking the government's second in a row, which is anticipated to continue through forward estimates.

A total \$686.4 million in new measures are being delivered across health, housing and roads to ensure the state's regions are supported, including \$62.7 million over four years for a new preschool and primary school at Mount Barker, \$4 million to address urgent and high priority facility upgrades at Mount Barker High School, and \$150 million over four years to upgrade two interchanges with the South Eastern Freeway at Mount Barker and Verdun.

"Our regions are critical to the prosperity of this state," SA Treasurer, Stephen Mullighan, said.

"They contribute \$37.5 billion to the SA economy – approximately 26 per cent of Gross State Product.

"This budget invests in health, housing, roads, primary industries, police and cost-of-living relief to build better regions for today and tomorrow."

The new Mount Barker preschool and primary school are expected to provide an additional 450 places combined when they open in four years' time.

Mount Barker's population is growing at a rapid pace and is anticipated to reach 50,175 by the end of 2028.

Mr Mullighan told *The Southern Argus* the commitment was made with the expanding population in mind.

"That commitment has been made with the public education system in mind, but also bearing in mind there will be other non-government educational providers in Mount Barker and the surrounding areas that will be able to provide further capacity as well," he said.

"That is the modelling we got back from the education department that the new term requirement, at least up to 2027-28, is we needed that extra 100 preschool places and 350 primary school places in the public system for Mount Barker.

"But no doubt there will be further needs into the future as well as further options beyond just the government system."

In terms of educational facilities in Strathalbyn and surrounds, the department has been working on a capital works strategy to ensure its continuing to hit schools with additional funding to improve facilities where it's needed.

Similarly, the department is looking further into the roll-out of three-year-old preschool in the Fleurieu in government and non-government settings.

"As it relates to the Fleurieu, it will depend on two things," Mr Mullighan said.

"One is we're trying to leave it open how quickly we roll out the reform in particular areas depending on where there is firstly government capacity – and we have a fairly well-articulated understanding of which centres we can bring on in which point in time.

"But when it comes to private operators, if there is capacity within the private system... then the model allows us to partner with them, provide them with funding, maybe even help them improve their facilities to an extent so they're ready to provide preschool for three-year-olds earlier.

"So, there's a bit of flexibility there and there's an enormous amount of work that will happen over the coming months

between the Office for Early Childhood Development and its Chief Executive in engaging with private providers to see firstly who has got capacity and who has got interest, and what it will take for them to be in a position to have the correct number of accredited, appropriately trained and qualified teachers, as well as the facilities to get them to start."

More teachers and other qualified professionals coming into the regions for employment means a greater need for housing.

The State Government makes a significant investment towards social housing in the budget by funding \$30 million over three years for regional housing, but it is relying on people to make contact with the Office for Regional Housing to determine what locations have most demand.

"In terms of this budget, what we found with the initial \$10 million that we put into the Office for Regional Housing last year is that that's been successful getting six developments under way across regional South Australia," Mr Mullighan said.

"(The \$30 million investment) is a significant step up from the first \$10 million, but we would hope that has got the capacity to unlock quite a number of further development opportunities across regional South Australia.

"Where we found success so far is when there's been a demand from government agencies short of accommodation for their nurses, police and teachers, and also from major regional employers that have got jobs they want to give people in their area but they can't find houses for them.

"So, having either the public sector or major regional private employers underpinning the development has been successful and that's why we've allocated the extra \$30 million."



HEALTH

An additional \$2.5 billion will be funded into health over five years to meet demand and ensure the system is appropriately resourced.

More than \$23 million over two years will introduce an electronic patient care record system to SA Ambulance Service, enabling paramedics to transmit patient data in real time to hospitals and speed up admissions, while \$10.7 million over four years expands the clinical telephone assessment service.

A \$5 million investment over four years will fund a range of programs to support youth mental health services, including an expansion of child and adolescent virtual urgent care services, additional mental health workshops, and support for carers and families of those with eating disorders.

In addition, \$15.2 million over three years will go towards boosting SA Health's ability to respond to and manage current tuberculosis outbreaks across the state, and public hospital workers will continue to benefit from cheaper car parking and free public transport.

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SA Premier Peter Malinauskas and SA Treasurer Stephen Mullighan deliver the 2024-25 State Budget.

REGIONAL

- \$30 million over three years for regional housing.
- Renewal SA will partner with local governments and regional employers to unlock prioritised regional housing projects.
- \$17.5 million over three years to deliver additional road safety maintenance.
- \$5 million in 2027-28 for the ongoing extension of the SA Jetties Renewal Program to address immediate and critical concerns regarding the condition and sustainability of a number of SA jetties.
- An extra \$43 million to combat fruit fly – \$41.5 million of it in the regions.
- \$19.5 million over four years to develop on-farm solutions and support the upskilling of the agricultural sector to reduce emissions through low emission intensity farming systems.
- \$4.4 million for the Family and Business Support Program, which includes the family and business support mentors and rural financial counselling service.
- \$4.7 million over four years to develop a digital police station online system which will enable people to make reports and requests regarding non-urgent matters without setting foot in a police station.
- \$10.1 million in 2023-24 to extend

- the availability of the Country Fire Service's aerial firefighting fleet and costs relating to significant fires.
- \$1.7 million over two years to carry out PFAS testing and remediation at MFS and CFS facilities.
 - \$817,000 over two years for an audit of the CFS' facilities.
 - \$450,000 in 2023-24 for the CFS to buy two new 4WD quick response vehicles.
 - \$218,000 over two years for Volunteer Marine Rescue associations to maintain their rescue capability, including supporting the replacement of a vessel at Wallaroo.
 - \$26.3 million to sustain the ongoing health of the River Murray.
 - \$4.1 million over four years to support hydrogen and renewable energy projects.
 - \$5.1 million over four years for the ongoing operation of an alternative custody facility that supports Closing the Gap.
 - \$11 million in 2024-25 on initial levee remediation works in the Lower River Murray Reclaimed Irrigation Area damaged in the 2022-23 flood.
 - \$26.3 million over five years to support River Murray operations, maintenance and monitoring programs to help sustain the ongoing health of the river system and surrounding environments.

HILLS FLEURIEU

- 62.7 million over four years for a new preschool and primary school at Mount Barker.
- \$4 million to address urgent and high priority facility upgrades at Mount Barker High School.
- \$150 million over four years to upgrade two interchanges with the South Eastern Freeway at Mount Barker and Verdun.
- \$15.4 million over three years to build a new acid drainage treatment plant at the former Brukung mine site.
- \$31.8 million over three years for the construction of three overtaking lanes on Main South Road between Normanville and Cape Jervis.

ENVIRONMENT

A substantial investment of almost \$140 million in the environment has been made that will benefit national parks, animal welfare and the River Murray. To help conserve and enhance biodiversity, and visitor experiences at national parks, \$30 million will be provided over four years to maintain and improve them.

Continuing with support for flood remediation, \$11 million will be provided in 2024-25 on initial levee remediation works in the Lower River Murray Reclaimed Irrigation Area, while another \$26.3 million over four years will support River Murray operations, maintenance and monitoring programs.

Another \$6.5 million a year ensures vulnerable biodiversity is protected when making planning decisions, rising to \$7.9 million a year by 2027-28.

HOUSING

A record spend in housing sees \$843.6 million allocated to build more houses and improve affordability.

First home buyers will benefit from the abolishment of stamp duty for South Australians buying or building their first home, regardless of purchase price.

A \$136 million investment will also help build and upgrade 442 more social housing dwellings and \$5 million to extend the Aspire homelessness program until the end of June 2027.

JOB

An additional \$692 million over five years will ensure South Australians get the skills they need for the jobs being created across the state's economy.

This includes \$275.6 million for more than 160,000 training places in key areas such as defence, health, building and construction, early childhood education, clean energy transition and ICT, and \$56.2 million to help more students complete their training.

COST OF LIVING

In a time of financial hardship, a comprehensive \$266.2 million cost of living relief package is targeted at South Australians most in need of support.

The number of sports vouchers will be doubled from one to two per child each calendar year with the inclusion of music lessons under a \$54.6 million investment over four years.

Parents and caregivers of school-aged children will also benefit from \$24 million to reduce the materials and services charge at government schools by \$200.

A once-off additional Cost of Living Concession of \$243.90 this month, costing a total \$51.5 million, will be delivered to more than 210,000 South Australians, while \$36.6 million over four

years will double the concession from 2024-25 for tenants and Commonwealth Seniors Health Card holders.

Other concession measures include \$14.1 million over four years to improve and expand access, and \$10.6 million over four years to extend public transport concessions to around 15,000 HealthCare Card holders.

In addition, \$35.8 million over three years will go to energy upgrades in 3500 social houses.

Businesses will also benefit from \$20 million in round two of the economic recovery fund to support up to 8000 eligible small businesses and not-for-profit organisations with grants between \$2500 and \$50,000.

JUSTICE

More than \$15 million over the next four years is key to resourcing measures for South Australia's justice system.

Additional funding will go to the Coroners Court, the Office of the Director of Public Prosecutions (DPP), Crime Stoppers SA, as well as supporting key communications infrastructure used across the justice sector.

The Coroners Court will receive \$4.4 million over four years for the ongoing appointment of an additional Coroner and associated support staff, while the DPP will receive \$4.8 million over four years to address matters raised in a review of the office, including streamlining the trial allocation process, and improving staff

training and wellbeing.

A further \$5.8 million over four years will go towards maintenance and upgrades to the Justice Audio Visual Link network used by the Courts Administration Authority, Department for Correctional Services, SA Police, and Attorney-General's Department, and \$332,000 over four years in additional funding to Crime Stoppers SA to foster safer communities and promote crime awareness and prevention.

In addition to these measures, \$25.3 million over four years will deliver the National Firearms Register, funded in partnership with the Commonwealth Government, which will contribute \$11.7 million.

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Retiree awarded OAM for cattle work

A Strathalbyn resident whose career spans from working on a cattle station and being a business owner to featuring in beer commercials and performing 'charity work' for Central Australia received the biggest surprise of his life when he was awarded an Order of Australia (OAM) medal as part of the King's Birthday Honours.

More than 700 Australians received either an OAM, meritorious award or recognition for conspicuous service from the Governor-General David Hurley, shining light on their efforts, the impact they have and the difference they make.

One of the local recipients includes Strathalbyn's David 'Doc' Cunningham for his service to the beef cattle industry and the Central Australian community.

He has spent most of his life in the Northern Territory, working in various areas of the cattle industry, starting as a jackaroo on a cattle station at only 15 years of age.

"I stayed on that property doing a pretty long apprenticeship – about seven years – and worked my way up through the ranks, and after that, I became a contract musterer," Mr Cunningham said.

"I went and bought an airplane, got my licence, and did contact mustering in the southern Alice Springs region for about seven years.

"From there, I moved up to a property called Orange Creek and we started a little lucerne farm with the owner at the time and was there for about five years."

His work on the farms where the only mode of transportation was horseback led him to the big screen.

In the 1980s, Mr Cunningham featured in a Carlton Draught commercial alongside a friend, 'riding horses and drinking beers', before helping film on horseback for Australian cinema – the first, *The Man from Snowy River II*, and the other a television series called *The Anzacs*.

"When I went up to the Territory, it was all horseback – there was no motorbikes back in those days, or planes or helicopters, so it was pretty raw," Mr Cunningham said.

"But through my horse-riding ability, I became an accomplished horse rider, and that's why they came and got us to do this commercial.

"From there, after I finished at Orange

Creek, I went down and did a couple of films with the same guys... I had a camera attached to my shoulder and I did all the filming on horseback with those great actors."

During Mr Cunningham's career, he's also been a livestock agent for Wesfarmers Dalgety and Elders, meat buyer for T&R Pastoral – now known as Thomas Foods International – and owner and co-managing director of his own company Trailco Industries Livestock Agency.

It's involved a lot of travelling on his behalf and time spent among cows.

"Travel is a part of life when you live in the outback – I travelled probably 100,000km a year on average," Mr Cunningham said.

"I was quite lucky I got to know a lot of people, and when I started my own business, I had some good clients.

"People really looked after you, so I enjoyed the lifestyle because growing up virtually in that lifestyle myself, I could see it from both sides of the fence what people really wanted."

During his time in the Northern Territory, Mr Cunningham was also a dedicated volunteer, predominantly with the Central Beef Breeders Association and Central Australian Show Society.

The association was formed back in 1970 by a group of pastoralists in Central Australia who wanted to improve the quality of cattle in the area, which started by working with the Central Australian Show Society.

In that time, Mr Cunningham served as committee member from 1994 to 2017 and was president, and is now a life member.

"It was probably hard for some people back

in that day to get really good quality bulls to take into that area, so (the pastoralists) said 'let's start something with the Show society,' Mr Cunningham said.

"That gave pastoralists a good opportunity to buy good quality bulls right on their doorstep and that's something that worked really well, paid off and over the years, became very successful.

"I was involved there quite a long time, and in that time, I got a government grant to build a big bull statue which is still up there today.

"It's a big Hereford bull and... represents the cattle industry of 100 years of beef in Central Australia and all of the people that were involved in the industry.

"In early July he comes out and he's a pretty good attraction."

His work with the association led him to becoming more involved in the show society.

He was a committee member from 2003 to 2017 and grand parade organiser for 12 years before being awarded life membership in 2016.

"I got into that through the beef breeders side of it because like anywhere, it's hard for people to get volunteers these days and people to do the work," Mr Cunningham said.

"The show society approached me and said 'would you come be our steward for the cattle?', so it went from there.

"The first year was great, then the second year they said 'we want you to get a bit more involved' which I did and I didn't mind; I quite enjoyed it.

"I think agriculture is the main thing about country shows.

"You look at some shows and they're falling

a bit behind these days in that category and it's a bit of a shame.

"You wouldn't want to see it disappear."

Mr Cunningham also served as a justice of the peace for 15 years, a committee member and president of the Kulgera Gymkhana Club for several years, and was an Auskick Co-ordinator.

He finally came to Strathalbyn to retire seven years ago.

"I've always had a bit of a love for the Adelaide Hills," Mr Cunningham said.

"We did have a home here – bought it about 15 years ago as an investment property – so we had a bit of an attachment to the town already.

"We thought it's not a bad place to retire, so we came, sold the other property, and bought this one about seven years ago and are still here."

Never in his wildest dreams did Mr Cunningham think he would receive an OAM.

The award is dedicated to his late daughter Jessy Maddocks, who passed away from breast cancer in early March.

"You don't ever think you're going to get an award like this and that's not what you aim for," Mr Cunningham said.

"I had two life memberships awarded to me, which I thought 'oh my goodness that's fantastic', but something like this comes along and I think 'how did that happen?'."

"I'm still just shocked and I can't believe it's actually happened to me.

"You look at the people that get these OAM awards – people like surgeons, doctors and scientists – and I think these are high profile people and to think, I've got one of them."

Mr Cunningham highly encouraged more people to volunteer in their community.

Teacher and musician recognised for service

A Victor Harbor resident has been recognised for his service to the community through music and to education.

Alan Kimber Field is among the local residents to be awarded an Order of Australia medal (OAM) as part of the King's Birthday honours.

Mr Kimber Field was principal at several schools between 1968 and 1990, including

Victor Harbor, Murray Bridge, Alice Springs and Glengowrie High Schools, and a secondary school teacher between 1956 and 1990.

His service to music expands to the South Australia Country Choral Association where his roles included conductor and president, and continues to be public officer and south coast

choral and arts society delegate, south coast choral and arts society, where his roles included president, vice-president, committee member, choir conductor, chairperson, and musical director, as well as life member and deputy bandmaster of the Victor Harbor City Band, and former conductor/music director of The Hills Choral Society.

Outback adventurers raise countless funds for charity

Mount Barker couple Valerie and Malcolm Hansen combined their two greatest passions over their lifetimes, of volunteering and fundraising thousands for charities, while exploring the beautiful outback Australia, which was recognised with Order of Australia medals.

Hailing from Loxton and Barmera, the couple developed a love for the country from a young age, and wanted to open up the world to others.

With a philanthropic mindset, they began taking others on trips to remote locations while fundraising for charities, before organising the official Campbelltown Rotary Outback Experience events.

“We wanted to share it – we love the bush,” Valerie said.

“We love the country and we decided we

could take people away and show them the country.”

From these trips, they raised an estimated more than \$600,000 for charities, including \$305,000 for the Royal Flying Doctor Service. Being Rotarians since 1980 – almost entirely with Campbelltown – their fundraising was often supported by the organisation which would match or exceed their total.

The trips led to a lifetime of adventure, from staying in the Gladstone Gaol and Loveday Internment Camp, visiting the Loxton Historical Village, and a mine at Broken Hill, and brought much-needed tourism to towns that were at times battling during drought.

They also were camp co-ordinators and caterers for The Waterhouse Club, which is an extension of South Australian Museum.

Valerie and Malcolm supported about 20 scientific field expeditions over 25 years, and became honorary members.

The couple have three children and 10 grandchildren, many of whom have been influenced by their charitable values.

“They’re doing voluntary work all the time,” Malcolm said.

“The youngest one doesn’t stop – she’s just doing voluntary work 24/7.”

The family helps with distributing items through Rotary’s charity shed, which they have been involved with for more than 20 years.

It’s “almost a full-time job” of redirecting items from landfill to their home to sort and donate to someone who needs it, such as op shops in Swan Reach or Murray Bridge.

Sometimes op shops need highly-sought after items, such as blankets, which the family sources from the Rotary charity shed.

The couple also helped organise Drought Relief Hay Drops in the Flinders Ranges in 2020.

Malcolm’s passion for the environment extended into his career as a National Parks and Wildlife Service, where his roles included ranger, and supporter of Troubridge Island Lighthouse, Edithburgh, and the preservation of Seal Bay, Kangaroo Island.

On Monday it was announced that their

service was recognised with a Medal of the Order of Australia in the King’s Birthday 2024 Honours List.

As well as receiving one of Australia’s highest recognitions, the couple have a few other milestones to celebrate.

Malcolm recently had his 80th birthday, which he celebrated while being part of a team in the APY Lands providing 3000 meals for 1500 Aboriginal people. At his party, he fundraised for the RFDS in lieu of presents.

The couple will soon celebrate their 60th wedding anniversary and Valerie’s 80th birthday.

Even while looking over their decades-long list of charitable work, Valerie was humbled and still felt undeserving of the award – “Why us?”

“I think it’s important to give back what you can to the community and as a volunteer, you can do that,” Valerie said.

“If you can give back something to the homeless... to the underprivileged... (it’s important).”

Strathalbyn artist dedicates 40 years behind the easel

became a full-time job for Kathleen – a pleasurable one at that.

Though she started out drawing mainly mammals, Kathleen now also includes birds and the occasional landscape to her repertoire.

Kathleen’s finely detailed drawings take time, and though she knows she could draw with a lot less detail and it might help her increase productivity, Kathleen enjoys how she works and says, “Nature in my eyes is already perfect.”

Kathleen also enjoys using graphite, charcoal and ink.

Over the years, Kathleen has taught, been a member of various wildlife art societies, run her own Wildlife Art Gallery in Goolwa with a fellow artist,

and been President and Co-ordinator of the Stationmaster’s Art Gallery, which she has been a member and exhibiting artist of for 26 years.

Meeting people from all over the Australia and the world who have purchased her artwork is a joy and very humbling.

These days, 40 years on, Kathleen still exhibits widely, and her lovely home studio/gallery Mollymawk which launched more than 10 years ago is open most weekends or by appointment.

EFS principal signs on for another five years

Building on the strong foundations set in place over the last six-and-a-half years, Eastern Fleurieu School (EFS) Principal Ian Kent is planning to keep the momentum going for the next five.

The newly reappointed principal thoroughly enjoys the role of leading a team of 255 staff and approximately 1500 students across five campuses.

Mr Kent’s leadership style promotes a culture of shared distributed leadership and professional growth of staff through modelling, coaching and mentoring.

Director of Primary Education Jo Garwood said he ensures every decision made is guided by the best interests of students.

“Their voices, needs, and potential are at the heart of our work, driving us to create a safe learning environment where they can thrive and succeed,” she said.

“Student voice offers the opportunity for feedback, they also give you ways to fix it, and come out with some unbelievable ideas.

“Giving students the opportunity to lead in every aspect, from decision-making to school assemblies and other events offers more opportunity for success in the future.”

Quality teaching and learning is evident in every classroom and data shows there is success at every level across all campuses.

Students are deeply engaged in their work, which is a clear indicator of their engagement and staff’s commitment to delivering exceptional high-quality education using a variety of pedagogies to meet the needs of all students.

“Our Year 12 results have seen a remarkable improvement over the past four years in comparison to the achievements of the previous four years,” Mr Kent said.

‘Brick by brick’ restoration at the Mill

One of the very few traditional German Cathedral Masons in the country, Christian Frenzel, is continuing conservation work on the south facade of Strathalbyn’s Old Angas Mill over the coming weeks.

As previously reported in *The Southern Argus*, plans are underway to breathe new life into the building in the heart of the town centre, including a dynamic shop, cafe, gallery, community and event space and upper terrace.

The project aims to honour and preserve its history while improving accessibility and user services, and won two awards at Alexandrina Council’s Heritage Awards last month, receiving the Mayoral Award and Historic Research award.

After the southern side – pending council approval – restoration work will

begin on the whole exterior which will mark the beginning of the ‘new’ building.

At this stage, it will take place September to January and will include remaining external stone work, re-roofing, and replacement of windows and doors.

Where possible, the old historical windows and doors will be restored and reused.

The eastern facade facing the swimming pool will be reconfigured with new windows and an entry ramp will assist with access off the footpath.

A landscape architecture firm has been selected to design the gardens that surround the Mill and the entry points on the northern and eastern sides with footpaths.

'Broken promises and rising costs' response

Nicola Centofanti continues to display either an abject misunderstanding or wilful ignorance of the reform of the Marine Scalefish Fishery that occurred under the former Liberal Government between 2018 and 2022.

Ms Centofanti appears to attack her party's own reforms in her recent Letter to the Editor on May 30.

In Ms Centofanti's own words, the promises made by her party when they were in government fall 'woefully short'.

When the Malinauskas Government came into office two years ago, we inherited a process that was almost complete, regarding some aspects which were heavily criticised by the South Australian Civil and Administrative Tribunal (SACAT).

I understand the Marine Scalefish Fishery (MSF) is experiencing a challenging period.

In recognising these challenges, I'm pleased to have been able to extend fee relief for a further three years to assist the sector with its ongoing transition to a quota-based fishery.

Ms Centofanti raises the cost-recovery review and refers to the 2021 government-funded review by SG Heilbron.

This was a review that was commissioned by the former Liberal Government and, notably, was never released or acted upon by the Liberals.

Both the 2021 Heilbron Review and the 2023 update informed the Independent Cost Recovery Review Panel's work, as well as extensive discussions with the commercial fisheries sector.

Importantly, this was an independent review and found there was no support for an all-inclusive GVP model across all fisheries.

Ms Centofanti's calls for a state-wide GVP model completely contradict the Independent Panel's findings.

I believe the Independent Panel to be eminently more qualified than Ms Centofanti as they are the experts in their field and undertook extensive consultation.

Ms Centofanti has been the Shadow Minister for over two years now and she still doesn't understand the quota system her Liberal colleagues introduced.

As Minister, I'll continue to listen and work proactively with the organisations representing the MSF, the South Australian Professional Fishers Association (SAPFA) and the Marine Fishers Association (MFA), as well as other industry bodies involved in South Australia's seafood sectors.

Milang man arrested over firearms

A Milang man was arrested for possession of firearms at Kings Park last Sunday.

New campaign asks drivers to ‘stop flirting with death’

A new road safety campaign is asking drivers to put away their phone while driving and “stop flirting with death”.

The South Australia Police campaign showcases the reality that every mobile phone interaction while driving might as well be an interaction with the Grim Reaper, who will do everything possible to distract the driver and lure them to a far worse destination.

It primarily targets 20 to 39-year-old drivers who account for around 60 per cent of mobile phone infractions.

Officer in Charge of the Traffic Support Branch Superintendent Darren Fielke said the proliferation and increasing functionality of smart-phones is increasing people’s reliance on them and, therefore, the risk that they will use them illegally.

“Unfortunately, mobile phone use is becoming increasingly common while driving,” he said.

“Using a mobile phone while driving

increases a driver’s crash risk by at least four times.

“So far this year, distraction has been a suspected cause in 1904 collisions.”

More than two thirds of people have admitted to using their phone illegally.

Attitudinal research with the target audience shows that a key motivator to use the phone while driving is perceived ‘down time’ in the car and busy lives that make ignoring the phone and potential ‘important calls’ difficult.

The campaign presents the Grim Reaper as temptation provided by a known person – a friend, family member or partner – providing the lure to give in to their phone.

Using this physical manifestation of death shows what might await drivers who give in to that temptation.

“Every second that your eyes are on your phone, they are not on the road ahead of you, and you’re driving blindly,” Superintendent Fielke said.

“The message is simple – stop flirting with death and leave your phone alone while driving.

“It’s not only texting or answering phone calls anymore, it’s also streaming music and podcasts, GPS and increasing connection to social media.

“The challenge is not giving in to the temptation when a new notification pops up on the phone, or when someone is texting or calling.”

Minister for Police Dan Cregan said the targeted approach would help young people to recognise the grim reality of distraction behind the wheel.

“Distraction kills, and swiping, scrolling or sharing content on your phone while driving is far too often to blame,” he said.

“The government is determined to work with South Australia Police to change this all-too-common behaviour and reduce the tragedies on our roads.”

Copper theft causes issue for Strathalbyn housing estate

Murray Bridge students educated on road safety

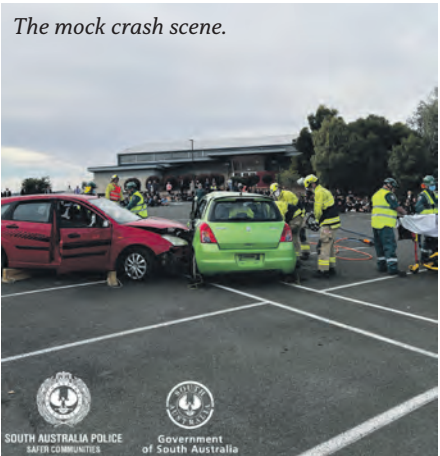
More than 400 Murray Bridge-based students witnessed a re-enactment of a serious crash at Unity College High School last month to educate them on making safe road decisions.

South Australia Police facilitated the event with the support of SA Ambulance Service (SAAS), Metropolitan Fire Service (MFS) and State Emergency Service (SES) in front of 450 students from Unity College, Tyndale Christian School and Murray Bridge High School to provide vital road safety education to some of the state’s young road users and highlight the importance of staying safe on SA roads.

While the crash was confronting for students to witness, they were talked through the response by emergency services at the scene of a crash, and educated on the ‘Fatal Five’.

SAPOL’s road safety ambassador Holly Scott also addressed the students about the long-lasting effects of road trauma, following her life altering crash in 2018.

Officer in Charge of the Murray Mallee Local Service Area Superintendent Cindy Healey said the demonstration is a sobering reminder of the devastating impact that road accidents can have, not just on individuals,



but on entire communities.

“This became even more real to some of the students after the recent road death of a local community member,” she said.

“The commitment of SAPOL, along with SAAS, MFS and SES, to the road safety education reflects our collective dedication to preventing such tragedies on South Australian roads.

“Let this scenario be a catalyst for change, encouraging people to make positive decisions every time they drive.”

Since their opening about seven weeks ago, The Vault team has been overjoyed by the positive feedback from the community, and have recently opened a wine bar following the approval of their liquor licence.

Draft beers are now available on tap, along with a range of local craft beers and wines, with a broad selection by the glass.

The wine bar rounds out the vision owners Tim Pearson and Mark Gaston had for the Strathalbyn cafe of being a place for wine, coffee and wood-oven pizzas.

A liquor licence also opens possibilities for night trading in the future, which will likely be Thursday to Saturday nights, private functions and possibly special DJ evenings.

The business partners are both chefs and opened the new cafe at Hammer 'N' Tongs former site on Commercial Road in May.

The pair bring 25 years of hospitality experience as they also run the upscale fine-dining venue Lenzerheide Restaurant in Hawthorn.

Since opening, the local community and out-of-town visitors have given positive feedback and support which the owners expressed gratitude for.

"We're really pleased to be part of the local community – that was the whole idea, to have local people employed, support local suppliers, and provide another option in a growing town," Mr Gaston – who is also a Strathalbyn local – said.

"I think in 18 months, Strath will look different again so we're rapt to be part of it."

As well as the community, staff members have embraced their vision, and kitchen staff are creating some popular dishes, particularly the wood-oven pizzas.

The chefs spent weeks perfecting the dough recipe, which has a special base fermented for 96 hours.

Dough is initially fermented in bulk before being separated into smaller portions and fermented again to create a fluffy, lighter dough and developed flavour.

The Vault has a seasonal menu which will be updated in spring, as well as weekly specials, including a beef brisket pizza which has proved to be a big seller.

Diners have also been enjoying crust dippers, which includes a side condiment, soups which often sell out, and specials of chocolate chip pancakes, or loaded roschitis which is traditionally a Swiss dish of fried potatoes with toppings.

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Southern lead all the way to beat Great Southern

In the 11th annual clash for the Pilmore Cup, it was Southern leading all the way over Great Southern at Christies Beach, on Saturday, able to counter a late challenge to win their fourth title by 23 points.

In good conditions for football, it was Southern doing most of the attacking in the first term, with Southern's best on the day in Watson, joined by Van den berg, Hogg and Mills-Richardson, putting the pressure on Great Southern's defence work, led by Kain Spinks, Brown and rebound work from Camm.

Southern had the first goal on the board when Potter was able to kick the ball out of the pack to bring up the two white flags, followed by Watson picking up a free to goal from close range.

Great Southern had Welk winning taps in ruck against Mitchell to allow them to have some forward movement through Dominish, Mitton and Thompson, seeing them able to get their only goal for the term when a quick pass by Daniels set Vincent up for the desired result.

While Southern were repelling through Etto and Hamilton, they, in being able to

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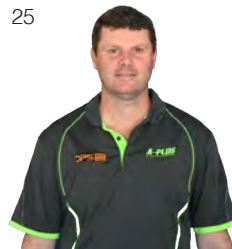

The final race day of the 2023-24 Strathalbyn season, held on Wednesday, May 29, was blessed with excellent weather and a good crowd, who witnessed two firsts be made at the local club.

Strathalbyn trainer Natalie Moody not only celebrated her birthday at the track, but her first win as a trainer, with five-year-old bay mare Sadlers Song, ridden by Teagan Voorham, claiming victory in the sixth race.

Even more exciting, Strathalbyn apprentice jockey Brooke King rode her first winner on three-year-old bay gelding Nasho in the race prior.

Trained by Shane and Cassie Oxlade, the ultra-fit gelding had the lead in the straight and continued through without stopping under King's superb ride.

The 17-year-old told The Southern Argus she had a feeling from the start that she may have a winner on her hands.

"He had been racing in the metro level at Morphettville, so I knew he was probably a class above the other horses.

"I galloped him on the Saturday and he (did) really good, and I knew he'd get up the hill at Strath very well.

"Throughout the run he gave me a good feeling the whole way, and I felt pretty unstoppable and he was."

But it wasn't until she crossed the finish line that reality sank in for King.

"I got to about the 600 metres and I looked up at the 600 marker, and knew I was a long way from home," she said.

"It felt like a long way in front of the others, but I just hoped I had enough horse underneath to keep running home, which I did.

"Every post that came up I was still in front, and I was getting more excited and worried that they'd be right behind me, but he just kept running which was good.

"It took a while to sink in, but once the rest of the field caught up to me it sunk in pretty hard and I couldn't stop smiling.

"The clerk of the course came to get me to take me into the winner's stall and I knew the race was won, and everyone was cheering from the grandstands."

Both of the day's wins were celebrated by family, friends, directors, staff, members and race-goers as they entered the winner's box.

King was grateful to be able to have her first win at home in front of the community.

"I went home and watched the replay a few times," she said.

"Being a Wednesday, the grind doesn't stop, so back to work the next day, but I was definitely living on a high there for a few days.

"It really means a lot to be able to win on my home track for a local trainer.

"I've grown up at Strath and done most of my work here, so to be able to do it at home has been so rewarding."

As winter arrives, racing will take a pause at Strathalbyn until the end of August.

The club thanked its sponsors and members, and all race-goers and stakeholders for their grateful support.

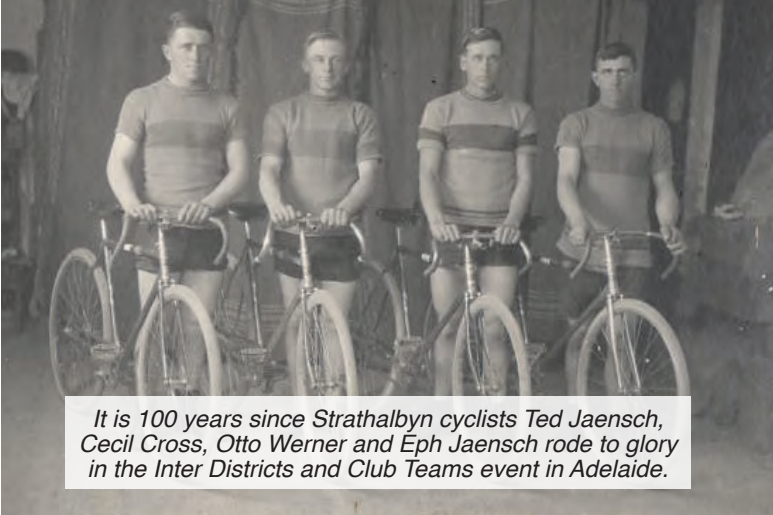

Remembering two monumental cycling wins



It is 100 years since Strathalbyn cyclists Ted Jaensch, Cecil Cross, Otto Werner and Eph Jaensch rode to glory in the Inter Districts and Club Teams event in Adelaide.

Strathalbyn's former cycling club was known for punching above its weight – and this June will mark 100 years since four of its members pulled off the first of two remarkable victories in Adelaide. Brothers Eph and Ted Jaensch, Cecil Cross and Otto Werner had competed locally and as far afield as Kapunda and Meningie in track and road races.

They showed up for the prestigious Inter Districts and Club Teams event in Adelaide in 1924 as rank outsiders, sponsored and encouraged by club founder Wally Gilbert.

They would compete against seven other clubs to take the win.

Eph Jaensch's daughter Janice Patterson has been tracing the cycling history of her family, with the Adelaide race a highlight of her discoveries.

"The 21 and a half mile (34.6km) course ran from Main North Road to Enfield, Prospect and Medindie, and along North Eastern Road to Tea Tree Gully and Hope Valley, returning through Modbury to the starting point," Mrs Patterson said.

"The conditions of the roads were described as 'being somewhat rough, causing a few minor accidents', so the Strathalbyn boys arrived early and rode over the course to familiarise themselves with the turning points."

Competing teams set off in five-minute intervals with the winning team the one with the best average times.

"The Strathalbyn team finished the course in just over an hour and were declared winners with an average time of one hour and 15 and a quarter seconds," Mrs Patterson said.

"The next best team clocked a time of one hour, two minutes, and four and a half seconds."

The four wore blue and gold Hartley Football Club guernseys, and all rode TREBLIG cycles supplied by Mr Gilbert.

They collected eight guineas in prizemoney, and earned the right to hold the Dunlop Shield for the next 12 months.

The four had created their own practice track on the Jaensch family farm at Hartley beforehand by dragging an iron wheel around behind a horse until it was smooth.

In 1925 the team again pulled off the

win, with an average time of one hour, one minute and 11 and 3/5th seconds, beating Western Districts Club who finished with one hour, three minutes and 28 and 3/5th seconds.

In 1926, and boosted by a contingent of local fans who travelled to Adelaide to support them, the boys were hoping to retain the Dunlop Shield permanently.

They were well in control when disaster struck and captain Cecil Cross "dropped a pedal four miles from the finish line and had to clutch the shoulder of a team mate" in order to finish the race.

"Ted raced across the finish line 70 yards ahead of his mates to boost their average times," Mrs Patterson said.

"But when the individual times were calculated it was found North Western Club with an average of 62 minutes, 30 and 3/5th seconds just beat Strathalbyn by 33 seconds."

Mrs Patterson said her dad was extremely proud of the team's performances in Adelaide at a time when cycling was one of the most popular sports in Australia – and often talked about other cycling achievements as a competitor from 1922 until 1934.

"They would often ride to Adelaide for training or compete in other races," she said.

"On one occasion it was raining and they weren't allowed on the train back home with their bicycles, so they raced the train home, beating it, and met it at the Strathalbyn Railway Station."
