Medallion hits a bullseye

Kim Lang, Strathalbyn's winner of a local long-running shooting competition, recently presented a significant medallion handcrafted by a local silversmith to the Hahndorf Rifle Club, so his achievement will be honoured throughout history.

Lang was the winner of Handorf Rifle Club's historic Kingshoot – which is also known by its German name Koenigschiessen – in 2021.

With a target of over 200m, Lang shot in German-style by sitting on a stool with a rifle on his knee with one shot at a time through a peep-eye.

He only missed the bullseye for three shots, finishing with a score of 152.2, crowning him the winner.

The long-running event started in 1864 and over the years, winners have been recognised with a badge which is hung on a breast plate, which is on display at the Hahndorf Inn, and Lang added his special

piece last Saturday.

The delay was because in the meantime, the club relocated from Hahndorf to the Monarto Shooting Complex.

It plans to resume activities, with the next

Kingshoot on April 14.

"Mine was the 140th event that the club held, even though the club has been going longer, there was a few (interruptions) with The Great Depression, wars, COVID, and bushfires," Lang explained.

"I've been shooting since I was a little tacker, chasing rabbits with dad down the South East where I was born and bred, but target shooting like this since 2008."

His beginnings at a Naracoorte club were symbolised in the badge, which is steeped in intricate meaning and detail, including his Scottish family crest.

The piece was made by Strathalbyn master silver and goldsmith Jacques Fabian, who has 47 years of experience and is just one of few in the region who follows traditional techniques such as hand tools.

"I knocked on his door, and after lots of chats and emails, he came up with that beautiful work," Lang said proudly.

Fabian worked on and off the piece and also used the Queen's former engraver.

While also a jewellery maker, Fabian finds his biggest passion – his "bread and butter" – is making bigger sentimental pieces like this one.

Family fun at Mt Barker Show

Organisers of the weekend's Mount Barker Show say it delivered "a really fun day out", particularly for young families.

Crowd numbers are expected to come in on par to last year's event, and spokesperson Sally Woodward said feedback from entertainers, trade sites and event participants had all been positive.

"It was a great day, and just going on rough figures we were doing straight after the show, we thought there were a few more people there than last year," she said.

Highlights of the day included the inter-school scone bake-off won by a Mount Barker High School student.

Cornerstone College, Urrbrae Agricultural High School and Mount Barker High School all participated in the competition.

"They make the scones on the day in front of spectators; it is really our version of Master Chef," Ms Woodward said.

"What I wanted to do, because I started that scone comp a few years ago, was encourage younger people to participate in the show because it is hard to get volunteers.

"If we start getting people used to the show when they are young, maybe they will keep coming and (also) volunteer to help"

Ms Woodward said entries in the various show competitions were "pretty good".

"The Photography always comes up well," she said.

"Arts and Crafts might have been down a little bit, and Flowers were also down a bit, but that is due to the impact of the (unseasonable) weather, and veggies I think were down too."

Mount Barker councillor Brad Orr took out the prestigious 2024 Celebrity Goat Milking Competition in amusing circumstances.

"That goes straight after the opening ceremony, and I think there were five goats and five people taking part," Ms Woodward said.

"Michelle Wallis (of Wallis Cinemas) was one of them, and she was one of our major sponsors.

"Her goat kicked her bucket over, and so she had to start again – it was just a lot of fun.

"We (also) had a section where we have lots of little entertainment bits and pieces –

there were some dancing and agility dogs, line dancing that got a lot of people up to dance, and Scottish dancers, (along with) bands."

A popular band on the day was Pulse Band.

Pressure builds on Neutrog odour issues

Mount Barker District Council will contact the State Government to intervene on the stench and dust from the Neutrog site impacting surrounding residents.

Neutrog began manufacturing pelletised fertiliser of decomposed chicken manure on the Kanmantoo site in 1988.

The facility grew to cope with demand, and surrounding residents have made ongoing complaints about the stench and dust from the piles of decomposing chicken manure being carried by the wind.

Residents initially complained to council and the Environment Protection Authority (EPA) and conditions were believed to be imposed, however, residents believe they are not going far enough.

Councillor Simon Westwood put forward a proposal to address the issue, following a community meeting in January, describing the issue as a "very, very long journey for these residents", and that the "ball's in State Government's court".

Council is requesting the State Government to step in to compel Neutrog to move the piles of chicken manure to a site out of range of the surrounding residential properties.

Neutrog was contacted for comment.

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Minor increase to dog fees

Alexandrina dog registration and associated fees will rise for the first time in two years, with a few exceptions, following an increase in canine related management expenses.

Dog registration and associated fees have remained unchanged for the past two years since the adoption of the 2022-23 financials, however, council's expenses related to dog and cat management has increased by approximately 11 per cent due to after-hours contractors, the dog pound facility, compostable waste bags and increased costs.

"The dog management function is experiencing heightened costs in providing services to the community," a council report read.

"The fee increases are intended to help offset these rising costs and ensure the sustainability of a fee-for-service model.

"Council's administration advocates for the adoption of these recommendations to bring the dog management function closer to cost recovery objectives, thereby reducing reliance on ratepayer income to cover cost differentials.

"The fee increases (for) seizure, impound, and late fees are only applicable to dog owners in cases where the fee is warranted.

"For instance, when a dog is found wandering at large and requires collection or impoundment, or when dog registration fees are unpaid by the required due date.

"It's important to emphasise that prior

to applying a late fee for unpaid late dog registrations, council expends resources on distributing newsletters, conducting roadside imaging, and issuing multiple individual reminders to dog owners well in advance of the due date."

The new fees as outlined in the 2024-25 Annual Business Plan and Budget for all dog registrations will align with CPI – 4.8 per cent at the time of reporting – rounding up to the nearest \$2.50 with the following exceptions:

- Dog seizure fee increased from \$37.50 to \$40.
- The daily impound fee increased from \$41.50 to \$45.
- Dog re-registration late fee increased from \$17.50 to \$20.

Additionally, racing greyhounds are now to be treated as a standard dog, and an additional fee of \$70 will be applied for residents making an application to keep more than two dogs.

The introduction of the new fee reflects the costs incurred by council ratepayers for the assessment of applications, as authorised officers may need to visit individual properties to evaluate housing suitability for more than two dogs.

The fee is in line with other councils. Exemption of pro-rata registration fees for new dog registrations received during June each year was also approved by councillors.

All revenue generated from dog registration is allocated to council's animal management function, with 12 per cent of total registration fees remitted to the Dog and Cat Management Board which allocates funds to welfare organisations, training for dog management officers, and education materials for councils.

As previously reported in *The Southern Argus*, council commissioned the preparation of a detailed business case for future recreational land uses at Lot 10, Langhorne Creek Road and an infrastructure investigation report in March last year.

Currently, business case investigations have found a high demand for basketball, soccer, cricket, and accommodation facilities.

However, investigations have also revealed some complications that could potentially reduce the effectiveness of the business case, primarily the inefficiency of the existing master plans – the Lot 10 Project Steering Group version and the Strathalbyn Harness Racing Club version – to utilise space in an efficient way, and their inflexibility to allow the project be staged to when each stakeholder is ready to activate their projects.

The costings previously commissioned by council are also now two-years-old and may be inaccurate.

As such TSA and the Steering Group both recommended council engage a master planner and quantity surveyor to produce a revised master plan/s and project costings to strengthen the business case and improve the chances for stakeholders to obtain project funding.

The proposed works are expected cost up to \$50,000, which, while was believed to be a "sound investment" into Lot 10's future by administration, drew concerns

from some councillors.

But despite this, elected members approved the steering group committee's recommendations at last Monday night's council meeting, with the master planner and quantity surveyor expected to produce a revised master plan/s and project costings that:

- Is most likely to secure funding.
- Has a cost-effective layout.
- Is costed by element to allow an understanding of cost by stage.
- Optimises potential benefits.
- Meets the needs of tenants.
- Seeks to minimise embodied carbon.

"I completely understand the reservations here," North Ward councillor, Sue Miller, said.

"At the Lot 10 Project Steering Group meeting, when the TSA representative came and spoke to everyone that there was no business case at this point, it was very disappointing.

"We don't have any budget to do any work at Lot 10 – I think that's generally accepted by the community and the users.

"What they want is a document that will let them go and chase it, and do all the hard work and heavy lifting, and we have not been able to give that to them because we have this terrible situation.

"If we're not going to do it for them, then we need to get out of the way, give them the land or do something with the land, and let them work it out because they'll drive it, all we have to do is put services out there."

Urgent blue green algae warning

Health experts are warning local residents to avoid body contact with and drinking from Lake Alexandrina until further notice after unusually elevated blue green algae were recorded last Thursday, March 21.

Water samples collected on Thursday, March 21, from Lake Alexandrina showed elevated levels of potentially harmful blue green algae across the lake.

Unlike other blue green algae, the species detected at the lake generally does not form scums and is not easily visible to the naked eye.

The type of blue green algae in the lake has not previously been detected in such high numbers in South Australia and while the cause is unknown, health experts believe climate variability may be a factor.

"Testing of water quality at Lake Alexandrina has shown the presence of a blue green algae bloom," SA Health Principal Water Quality Adviser, Dr David Cunliffe, said.

"We are warning those living in communities around the lake, as well as those planning to visit the area over the Easter weekend, to please avoid body contact with the water in Lake Alexandrina,

don't drink the lake water, and keep your pets and children well-clear.

"We're continuing to monitor the lake and test for algae levels and will work with relevant agencies, so that hopefully, people can get back in the water soon."

Consumption of water containing blue green algae can cause gastro-intestinal symptoms, including vomiting, bloody diarrhoea, as well as fever and headaches, while direct contact may also cause local irritation to the skin, eyes, ears, nose and mouth.

People living in the area or visiting parts of the lake can still enjoy boating and fishing, but are strongly advised to take extra care not to ingest the water.

If you have been in the water at Lake Alexandrina and start to feel unwell, seek help by consulting your GP and saying you may have been exposed to blue green algae.

Pets are particularly vulnerable and should be kept out of the water.

Fish caught in the lake should be cleaned and gutted thoroughly before being eaten.

SA Water does not source water from the lake and has confirmed the water it supplies from other sources to the area remains safe to drink.

A tribute to butter factory suppliers

Alvyn Hopgood has spent his 87 years in Milang, and has now paid tribute to the suppliers of the town's iconic butter factory in a new book. *Cream and Milk Suppliers to Milang Butter Factory – 1893 to 1951* was launched at the town's Institute to a room full of interested townsfolk. Alexandrina Deputy Mayor Margaret Gardner was on hand for the launch, long-term resident Brian Landseer, aged 92, addressed the crowd, while the book's Editor Jude Aguilina and typist Jennifer Whitfield were also in attendance, along with many who provided photos for the book. Mr Hopgood said this book followed his first which was about the employees at the factory, which only had a print run of 10 editions. He started work on both books in 2017. "I mixed them up for a while, and then I realised it would be better if I split them," Mr Hopgood said. "I have been here all my life, and I have always been interested in the factory up there. "A friend of mine, a tester, when I used to go up there when I was about 10-years-old he would show me different things on what was going on, and I just got interested in it." Mr Hopgood said the stories were personal recollections on those who delivered to the factory. "I have tried to get a photo or some resemblance of their property, and then write a caption of what I know of them," he said. "It is my story of them in nearly all cases because I have known them personally. "I started putting them into the *Community*

Cyclists riding for a cure make a lunch stop in Strathalbyn

Strathalbyn played host to Tour de Cure cyclists and support crew on Saturday when they paused for lunch during their 1400km trek to raise more than \$2.1 million for cancer research.

A total of 138 riders and 63 crew were in town for lunch, on the last leg of a nine-day ride from Hobart, Tasmania, to Adelaide via the Great Ocean Road.

Tour de Cure spokesperson Sally Heginbotham said the tour was an “amazing” experience, with the team pulling together right to the end.

“With the \$2.1 million that we raised, everyone is very much on a high from all of that, and so happy that we are able to contribute to cancer research,” she said.

“We are just so thankful and grateful to the Australian community.

“To come on this tour, each rider has to raise \$12,000 each, and support crew need to raise \$2500, (and) I believe everyone has gone over their targets.

“We have had corporate sponsorships, we have had our local businesses just chipping in, (as well as) road side donations – it has just been phenomenal.”

The cyclists rode in six pelotons in groups of the same skill level, with a lead and rear car around each peloton to keep riders safe and manage traffic around them.

The Signature Tour donated \$10,000 to nine local cancer projects along their journey, and also announced its 1000th project awardee – Professor Richard Scolyer, who, with the

\$50,000 funding, will be able to further his brain cancer research using the protocols he has invented with his melanoma treatment.

Mrs Heginbotham said the smaller donations went to a variety of cancer projects along the way.

“It could be anything from helping to fund respite accommodation for a family going through a cancer journey, or it could be for equipment for local communities so they can do chemo locally,” she said.

“(For example), we funded a transport service, helping with fuel and car costs, so that volunteers can drive people (to appointments).”

Mrs Heginbotham said funding research was incredibly important in the battle against cancers.

“It is thought that by the time any Australian turns 80, 50 per cent of us will get cancer of some description,” she said.

“Basically, cancer affects everyone, so anything that we can do to fund cancer research is a step forward for all Australians or the whole world, really.”

The stop at Strathalbyn was a chance to spread the word of hope that research brings.

“It is a beautiful place Strathalbyn,” Mrs Heginbotham said.

“We were lucky enough to have a beautiful community come out and say hello, and we love that and having a chat with people.

“What often happens when we travel through places is people get a little bit of hope that something can be done about cancer, and that is part of the journey to be honest.

“It is about raising funds for cancer research, but also to raise awareness of the need for it, and just get out there to give a little bit of hope to people who are going through that journey.”

Delivering for the Community

Matron Alice Tuck (MBE)

I spoke in Parliament last month about Tuck Reserve, located at Hicks Court, Hayborough.

Tuck reserve is the chosen site for a fantastic new Ambulance station and aptly so because Matron Alice Tuck was a warrior for the Victor Harbor Ambulance service.

I have some concerns about the location and hope I am proved wrong but I have asked the government and South Australian Ambulance Service to consider naming the new station in Matron Tuck’s honour, ensuring the story will continue to be told.

South Coast Ambulance 1938

The first official South Coast Ambulance was handed to the District Hospital on Easter 1938, a reconditioned chassis, body built by Messrs Gitsham & Sons, inspected by Dr Shipway and looked “equal to new”.

The completed ambulance had two beds and cost approximately 350 pounds raised by Miss May Douglas and made up of community donations acknowledged in the local paper.

The first ambulance was stored at Griffins Garage for use of the district and driven by garage staff. Later the ambulance was moved to the hospital and driven by Mr Jim Lee and emergency drivers.

The Victor Harbor Times (Friday 6 May 1938) reported the South Coast Ambulance being summoned, possibly its first call out, to attend a car rollover on Inman Valley Road when driver Mr Coote hit a rabbit (?)

Matron Tuck 1897-1980

Matron Tuck was born in Clare in 1897, cousin to Thomas Playford and became Matron at the South Coast Hospital in 1938, a position she held for 20 years. Her ruling passion was a commitment to serve others in a practical way which she did through the second world war, a baby boom, a growing community, and her ‘retirement’.

Matron Tuck was a strong advocate for the ambulance service and fought hard for a new ambulance that was modern, travelled faster and mechanically reliable. After 17 years Matron accepted the new ‘Fargo’ ambulance (1955) with light canvas stretchers instead of heavy wire mattresses enabling the transfer of patients to Royal Adelaide Hospital trolleys to be safe and convenient.

By this time the ambulance attended an average of 50 calls a year to local, district and city trips. Volunteers were a challenge even then and relied on for the high standard of work.

Motivated by Matron Tuck, the Board of South Coast District Hospital negotiated with the St John Council of South Australia to replace the ‘Fargo’ around June of 1956 with a fit for purpose Volkswagen.

Dr Lowitja O’Donoghue 1932-2024

South Coast District Hospital was a Training school for Nurses affiliated with the Royal Adelaide Hospital (RAH).

Matron Tuck supervised a young ‘Lois’ Lowitja O’Donoghue who was an excellent nurse, with great potential and a leader amongst her peers.

At the end of Lowitja’s two year probation, she was not accepted to continue so Matron Tuck lobbied to the premier and others in government. Lowitja become the first trainee Aboriginal nurse in South Australia, graduating at the RAH and later promoted to charge nurse.

Matron Alice Tuck and Dr Lowitja O’Donoghue are both remembered as fearless, truly great people, leaders, kind, inspirational, compassionate, persistent and driven by a passion for making others’ lives better.

SAPOL delivers ‘sweet’ and simple Easter road safety message

South Australia police are urging everyone to ‘keep it sweet on the road’ and do their part to ensure a fatality-free Easter long weekend.

Over the past five years, seven lives have been lost and 43 people have been seriously injured over the Easter long weekend – mostly in regional South Australia – with the Hills Fleurieu region in particular recorded one fatality, 11 serious injuries and 18 other casualty injuries between 2019 and 2023.

With 20 lives lost so far this year (as of Tuesday) and 162 serious injuries, the state’s road toll is off to a better start than at the same time last year – 35 fatalities and 232 serious injuries – but each life lost is one too many.

With an increase in traffic on the roads as people travel to their holiday destination over the long weekend, Hills Fleurieu LSA Operations Manager Inspector Michael Sampson urged all road users to be diligent and aim to do the “right thing”.

“Every crash on our roads where someone dies or is seriously injured is preventable,” he said.

“Our aim is to obviously have zero road lives lost at all times, but especially over Easter and other special occasions.

“If you make a bad decision on the road – you get distracted, choose to drive after drinking or taking drugs, creep over the speed limit, choose to blatantly speed or you choose to drive dangerously and take risks on the road – the fact is you or a loved one are likely to be our next death.

“Our staff will be visible on our roads this long weekend and if you make an error in judgement, I would expect a low tolerance approach from our members responding because it is about saving lives and preventing serious injury on our roads.”

This year, SAPOL’s Easter campaign ‘keep it sweet on the road’ offers a different approach to road safety than in previous years, and will coincide with Operation Safe Holidays – Easter and Operation Stop Drink/Drug Driving, which runs from today to Monday, April 1.

Police will be highly visible, targeting



the ‘Fatal Five’ – drink and drug driving, speeding, distraction, failing to wear a seatbelt, and driving dangerously.

Inspector Sampson emphasised that if road users obeyed the rules and failed to make decisions like drink and drug driving, people will arrive to their destination safely.

“The simple fact is if you comply with the road rules and the laws around driving a motor vehicle, you simply won’t draw attention to yourself and this will significantly increase your chance of making it safely to your destination,” he said.

“Especially over Easter but at all times just to make that conscious decision as the driver that you’re responsible for yourself and the people that are in your car.

“If that’s a long-distance drive, take regular rests every two hours at a minimum, make sure you don’t drink drug drive, don’t speed, and don’t allow yourself to get distracted.

“Modern cars with technology have GPS, navigation systems and music, and you’re all in a festive spirit because you’re going on holiday, but just try not to allow yourself to get distracted and get to your destination safely.”

Other safety tips for motorists included planning the journey in advance, having a good sleep the night before, be aware of changing traffic conditions and congestion, avoid driving at times you would normally be asleep, and most importantly, be patient, not complacent.

“Some people might think it’s a good idea to finish work late Thursday and drive all

night to get to their destination to maximise their holiday time – that’s probably not a great idea,” Inspector Sampson said.

“Obviously, some roads will be congested, especially, for example, Victor Harbor Road.

“If you’re coming from Adelaide or other regional areas to the Fleurieu those roads can be congested, so you have to be patient on those overtaking lanes.

“It’s better to take an extra 15-20 minutes to get there than not get there at all.

“In particular for (the Hills Fleurieu), don’t overtake on a hill or a bend because some people aren’t used to windy, hilly type roads where you can’t see far ahead, so if you can’t see, don’t do it.”

New farm safety campaign highlights inattention risk

More than 20 incidents occur on farms annually where powerlines are struck by vehicles.

A new advertising campaign launched by SA Power Networks aims to reduce the risk to farmers from powerlines on rural properties.

On average, more than 20 incidents occur on farms each year where powerlines are struck by vehicles, as well as countless near-misses and incidents where work is done far too close to them.

The new campaign, which is being launched to coincide with the beginning of the sowing season, focuses on the issue of 'inattentive blindness' – a psychologically recognised behaviour where people gradually don't notice things they see every day.

"We have so much information bombarding us that our brain gets really good at reducing the input, so we can focus on what we think is most important at the time," SA Power Networks Head of Corporate Affairs, Paul Roberts, said.

"We are making thousands of decisions basically on auto pilot, and we stop noticing things that actually could kill us.

"So, our campaign is about getting people engaged in actively thinking about the risk from stobie poles which can go un-noticed on farms, with potentially disastrous consequences."

The campaign has the simple focus of 'what you don't notice can kill you'.

Television, radio, press and digital advertising will take the safety message to all parts of regional South Australia as the sowing season commences, with a specific focus on broad acre farming regions where most vehicle related incidents occur.

"This isn't about blaming farmers, it is about recognising this is how we are as humans," Mr Roberts said.

"We want to break that cycle and ensure when working on their properties, farmers, their families and all their contractors are mindful and paying full attention.

"SA Power Networks is also launching its first advertising campaign tackling issues around use of high vehicles such as tipper trucks around powerlines."

Flood failure

The proposed Old Bull Creek Road Strathalbyn Planning and Design Code amendment currently open for public consultation applies to land on the southern side of Old Bull Creek Road identified as Lot 1000 and 14 Abbotts Lane.

The amendment would allow housing development with a density of up to 35 dwelling per hectare with a minimum of one dwelling per 285 square metres, similar to that on the Wistow Road entrance to Mount Barker.

The proposal is causing concern for a number of reasons, one of which is flooding.

Lot 1000 is cropping land on the western hills face of Strathalbyn and was the home of the Strathalbyn Rifle Range, while 14 Abbotts Lane is flat land below and adjoining Lot 1000 and was formerly an orchard.

Dawson Creek is on the southern side of both properties.

During high rainfall events, 14 Abbotts Lane and surrounding properties are flooded by overland flows originating from the western hills face catchment of which Lot 1000 is a part.

The Southern Argus, on January 29, 1941, reported on the 41 flood when 216mm of rain fell in 40 hours and described how the Dawson Creek added its contribution to the huge volume of water coming down from the Rifle Range (Lot 1000) and the majority of houses along West Terrace were surrounded by rushing water.

Other major floods involving the Dawson Creek area were reported in *The Argus* in 1883, 1895, 1906, 1917, 1923, 1981, and 1992 when overland flows flooded 14 Abbotts Lane, and properties on Old Bull Creek Road and West Terrace.

In 1985, The Urban Strathalbyn Drainage Study for the Strathalbyn District Council was prepared by Kinhill Stearns as a planning aid to avoid major flooding problems.

Historical research into past flood events was carried out to verify the results of their study.

The study found overland flows enter Strathalbyn from a 40-hectare catchment located either side of Old Bull Creek Road and both catchments discharge into the township area flooding across Abbotts Lane and West Terrace, entering the Dawson Creek in the vicinity of Ashbourne Road and West Terrace.

The findings of the study were proven by the 1992 flood.

Future Urban, who are involved in the public consultation process on behalf of the developers, have been made aware of the existence of the Kinhill Stearns report and provided with relevant parts.

The original report with flood mapping and overland flow paths is in possession of Alexandrina Council.

Lot 1000, which forms part of the catchment on the southern side of Old Bull Creek Road responsible for flooding across 14 Abbotts Lane and nearby properties, is also subject to overland flows from the rising foothills on its western boundary.

The housing density permitted by the

Code Amendment would significantly reduce the area available to absorb storm water and create additional run-off from buildings, roads and footpaths.

Buildings and fences would change the natural overland flow path, impede the rapid drainage of floodwater, and increase flood damage in areas already subject to heavy flooding.

Storm water from the area can only be directed into Dawson Creek which could not contain the extra volume.

Overtopping of the creek would increase the severity of flooding downstream, particularly in Abbotts Lane and West Terrace.

While Lot 1000 and 14 Abbotts Lane may be suitable for some form of open residential development, the natural features, the lay of the land and the history of flooding prohibits the type of development proposed by the rezoning amendment.

Primary producers
worthy of support

Dear Editor, primary producers in Alexandrina Council are once again having their 17 per cent differential rate questioned.

It's not a rebate, discount or subsidy.

Rates are a land tax based on property value.

Property values reflect among other things the relative availability of, and access to, council services and infrastructure.

All residents and visitors, not just ratepayers, receive benefits from rates, however, we each use them in different quantities and ways.

Rates are not a 'user pays' service – that means all ratepayers are cross-subsidising each other.

In a contemporary, thoughtful society, that is very fair and reasonable.

Primary producers not only contribute greatly to our local and regional economy, they have significant responsibilities (not always by choice) in environmental conservation, while at the same time, not enjoying the same level of access to council-provided services and quality of infrastructure those in townships do.

They're not generally eligible for, nor seek, government financial support except in exceptional circumstances.

It is very appropriate that council each year considers and resolves to differentiate rates based on how the Valuer-General defines how land is used and/or the locality of that land, and impose a reduced general rate accordingly.

It's recognition of the significant contribution primary producers make to driving our Fleurieu economy.

Primary producers support school agricultural programs, sponsor sporting clubs and community centres and services, and community owned halls, which are often the central hub of rural life, relieving council and ratepayers of maintenance and

renewal of these vital assets and services in our smaller townships, critical to the physical and mental health and wellbeing of our rural community.

Primary production, as with most small or medium size enterprises, is very sensitive to cash flow and seasonal influences.

However, rates are not calculated on income, and they shouldn't be.

I can't think of many residential ratepayers who'd like their rates to be calculated on income.

If you know a rich farmer, it's likely not from their farming pursuits, but careful saving and investments or from off-farm income, or a working spouse.

Fifty-nine per cent of roads in Alexandrina are unsealed and critical for townships and rural sector to function.

The roads connect residents, farmers and business to suppliers and markets, activate our growing value-adding rural economy, carry our children to school and underpin social connectivity and access to emergency services.

The Local Government Act is very specific when it comes to conflict of interest and setting of rates – there is no conflict when the benefit is one in common with a significant number of others – others I proudly represent.

RETIREMENT INCOME CAN SHRINK – SO WHAT YOU CAN DO ABOUT IT?

There are three common income shrinkers, which you can avoid with the help of your financial adviser.

1. Paying down a mortgage

Many people may need to pay down a mortgage in retirement as a result of a combination of elevated house prices and delayed household formation. According to the Retirement Income Review¹, the average age at which owner-occupiers finally pay off their mortgage increased by 10 years – to 62 – between 1981 and 2016.

Indeed, more than 50 per cent of owner occupiers aged 55-64 still carry some mortgage debt.

Older mortgage holders don't just have to deal with a constant drain on their lifestyle income. They're also more vulnerable to economic shocks – such as rising rates – and the financial and psychological stress this causes.

Paying off debt in retirement has a whole range of downstream effects:

- It may leave less money to invest in growth assets to support income for longer in retirement.
- It means lending or gifting money to children carries more risk – if it can be achieved at all.
- And it's a reason many older Australians stay in the workforce after their preferred retirement age.

On current trends, all these stresses are likely to affect a wider range of retirees in the future.

Head of AMP Technical Strategy, John Perri, says: "More retirees are retiring with home loan debt and that limits their options."

"Ideally, advisers would help clients accelerate home loan repayment while they're working," Mr Perri said.

"Or help them strategically salary sacrifice into super so they can take a tax-free lump sum on retiring (aged 60 or more) and use that money to clear debt."

Sometimes eliminating home loan debt is not necessarily the best thing to do.

If retirement savings are earning 6 per cent tax free and mortgage debt costs 3-4 per cent, it may make sense to gradually reduce your debt rather than deplete your retirement capital.

2. Experiencing a catastrophic market event

Sequencing risk is one of the most dangerous risks for retirees.

That's the possibility a GFC/COVID style event smashes such a large hole in your capital that it permanently shrinks your potential retirement income.

Proponents of lifetime income streams argue the ability to 'exchange' a chunk of

retirement capital for a lifetime income is a useful counterweight to sequencing risk.

Government enquiries like the Retirement Income Review suggest many retirees limit their lifestyle spending due to the Fear of Running Out (FORO) and/or lack of clarity around their future spending with most only drawing the minimum legislated rate.

3. Gifting or leaving money to your children

Many retirees place a premium on passing on capital or a property to their children.

That sacrifice also happens before death, with many retirees gifting home deposits or school fee cash to their children.

Reducing the lifestyle effect of those capital drawdowns requires judgement.

"With some clients I'm trying to convince them to be more selfish, to think less about their kids' lifestyle and more about their own," said Clinton Smith of Abound Financial & Lifestyle.

"If you die and leave a two-million-dollar property, your kids are going on all the holidays you didn't."

Yet retirees – and their advisers – must

consider the whole board when it comes to helping the next generation without trimming their own sails.

In some situations, that's considering the impact of inheritances.

At other times it's shuffling the components of a clients' portfolio for maximum effect.

That might mean planning to use up all financial assets but leaving the family home to the next generation.

Or ring-fencing a lifetime income stream and allocating your account-based pension and other assets to fund bequests and gifts

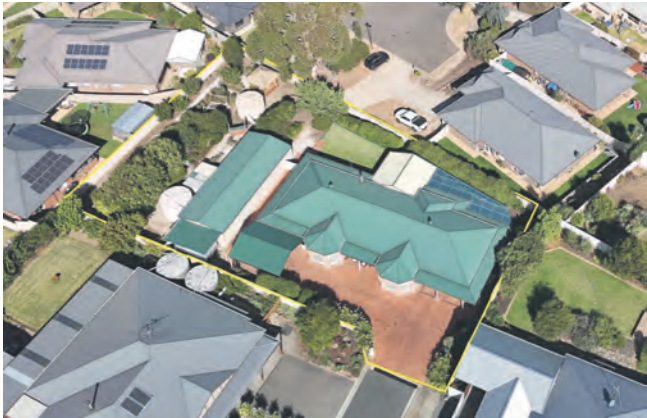

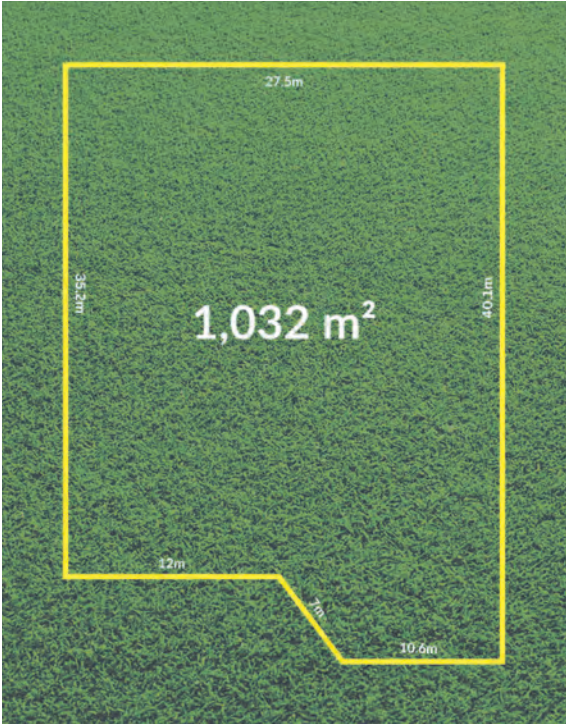

Algae blooms cause change of tack for Rat Race Regatta

Parts of this year's Rat Race Regatta were cancelled over the weekend, after SA Health put out a health alert about unsafe levels of toxic blue green algae in the water. Clayton Bay Boat Club secretary Ric Kies said the actual Rat Race for dinghies less than 5.5m had to be called

off, but other events such as the Stony Point Race went ahead. "We had a bit of drama on Friday, when Lake Alexandrina and the waters from the Barrage through past Clayton Bay were closed to swimming and diving," Kies said. "There was an advisory put out generally to the community to stay out of the water so we had to rejig our event. "We lost two thirds of the boats that

had registered for competing because they were dinghies and wind surfers, and we couldn't take the risk of getting them into the water and suffering from the effects of toxic blue green algae. "SA Health advised that it had been detected in greater than satisfactory levels, so that affected us a bit. "It was a bit disappointing, but we had to risk manage it, and couldn't take the risk of kids getting sick, so while it was

disappointing everyone understood." After some changes the revised events went ahead. "We managed to have trailer-sailors in two divisions over the two days, so we managed to get a Rat Race Regatta sailed, everyone had a fun time, and we had 20 boats on each day," Kies said. "We just did the Stony Point race, so that was a good success, and we had a well-attended dinner on Saturday

night, and the hot dog lunch on Sunday, followed by some live entertainment by L. R. Marsh who is touring Australia from Queensland." Kies said it was not the first time the Rat Race has had to be cancelled. "We have had many numbers of reasons for cancelling, including COVID, and drought," he said.

Brodie O'Dea won the toss and batted in overcast conditions, winning the Tigers' second coin toss in 12 Grand Final attempts since 1963.

Lobethal's opening bowlers Matt Martin and Jeremy Hackett were steady, but it was Dave Huxter who provided the first dismissal with a sharp run out at deep backward point, with O'Dea looking for the second run, for a disastrous start for the Creek.

The Tigers through James Dawson and Jaspa Tonkin were watchful, as the Lobethal skipper pushed back players early to see three fielders patrolling the short east side boundary.

Lobethal showed their intent early, picking off ones and twos from Dan Kropp and James Dawson with the new ball, with Mitch Weeks in an aggressive mood.

Lobethal cruised, picking up runs all around the wicket, with some expansive shots from Weeks leaving the Langhorne Creek Tigers struggling to contain him.

Troy Blackwell was first to strike when he knocked over Ben Matthews with a beauty, clean bowled for 35.

Weeks continued on his way, chancing his arm on a flat Langhorne Creek wicket, bringing up his 50 just before drinks, with the Tigers 1/90 (23).

From there, Jeremy Hackett scored 29 before Blackwell knocked his off stump out of the ground, and Sam Martin fell the next over to Blackwell for one caught behind to see Lobethal at 3/158.

Matt Martin joined Weeks as the northern Tigers cruised past the Creeks score of 165 in the 39 overs, with Weeks 90* in a stellar performance from the Captain.

Langhorne Creek will rue the below-par score of 165, particularly after the big scores in their last games, scoring well-over 230, whilst Lobethal were jubilant, winning their third consecutive title, surprisingly, all away from home.

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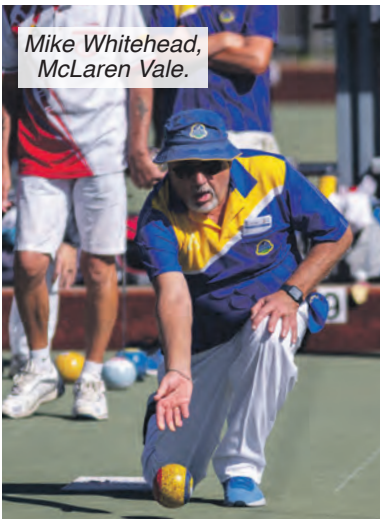
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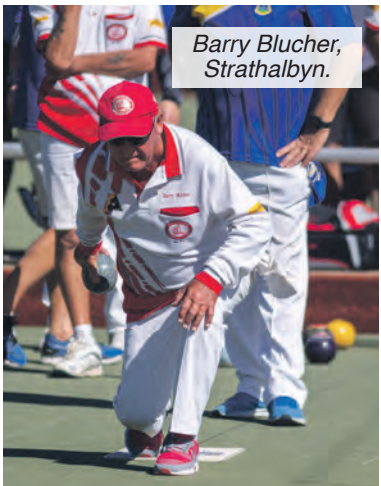

Mrs Cross said plenty of good dogs would be competing.

"Stefan is obviously the one that is in form, he is our local competitor," she said.

"His dog Lady, she represented Australia last year in New Zealand.

"Stefan has just come back from the National Championships where he came second with her, so she is certainly the dog to watch.

"We have some great local competitors, with Stefan's brother Milton also one to watch, and Anthony Ireland, our state president, he has some good dogs and they are in form."

The trials begin from 8.30am on both days for the all ages event, with entry free.

Cross and Lady our Champion of Champions



Stefan Cross and Echo Park Lady won the Champion of Champions event at the National Sheepdog Trials in Canberra – along with finishing second in the National Championship.

Strathalbyn sheep dog handler Stefan Cross, and his dog Echo Park Lady have taken out the Champion of Champions event at the National Sheepdog Trials in Canberra – along with finishing second in the National Championships.

Cross and Lady were competing in the Champion of Champions competition as the reigning SA Champions, and were also among 200 dogs taking part in the Nationals.

Competitors are given three obstacles to complete in 15 minutes, starting with 100 points, with the winner being the duo who lose the least points.

"It is just like a normal Australian trial where you can't help your dog at all, except by voice command and signalling," Cross said.

"I just went along because it was an honour to be in it.

"I won the state championship with Lady, and this was sort of the next step, which I had only been to once before.

"I went with Bazza, which is Lady's brother, two years ago – but I think Lady is a fraction better."

In the Champion of Champions Cross and Lady were competing against five other dogs.

"I went out second I think, and then I had to sit and watch the other dogs, and then one by one they scored a little

bit less, so that meant we ended up first.

"I was pretty happy about winning."

However finishing second in the Nationals just behind Scott Smith and Wynella Pink was also a huge achievement.

"In my mind it was almost a bigger achievement to finish second in the Nationals," Cross said.

"I finished with two dogs – Lucy and Bazza – in the top 20, and then two dogs in the top six for the last round.

"Then Bazza got a bad sheep and finished sixth, but then Lady finished second.

"We were pretty close to winning... The Nationals have been going for 80 to 90 years, and it has been the premier event for a lot of years, so there is a lot of history with it."

Cross said he was "very proud" of seven-year-old Lady.

"Probably her natural working ability is one thing (that sets her apart from other dogs), but her obedience is another factor," he said.

"It is very hard to get a dog that is so obedient and so good (at) natural work – they either want to be one or the other.

"They either want to work really well and ignore you, or they want to wait to be told all the time."

A Very Weak Two

The whole point of Weak Twos is to be obstructive, and it is a firm rule of mine that whenever I make a Weak Two bid, I will not bid again unless forced, and the only forcing bids that I recognise will be ace asking or Ogust, neither of which occur here. The Weak Two gets some validity from the fact that I have a partner, and the HCP that I lack, I hope will be made up by my partner, and that did happen here.

Ogust is only used by a responding hand where Responder is not sure what to do next, and more information is to be sought from partner, who used the Weak Two. How weak is your hand, and how good is your suit? But we are not going down that path this time.

I have another formula for responding to a Weak Two, and this has very rarely let me down over 40 years of playing Bridge. The formula goes like this: Firstly, Responder assumes the Weak Two will fail by 2 tricks, secondly looks in his/her hand for Certain Tricks, that is Aces and AK's and counts them. The first two Certain Tricks are to cover the assumed failure; any other Certain Tricks are to raise the level of bidding. With three Certain Tricks, one can be used to raise 2H/2S to 3H/3S, but only if opponents throw in a bid to upset you, otherwise Pass the Weak Two and play in 2H/2S. With four Certain Tricks, bid Game immediately, as above. (Normally, I prefer to find the Certain Tricks in side suits.)

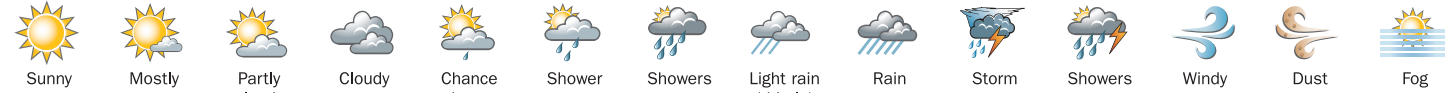
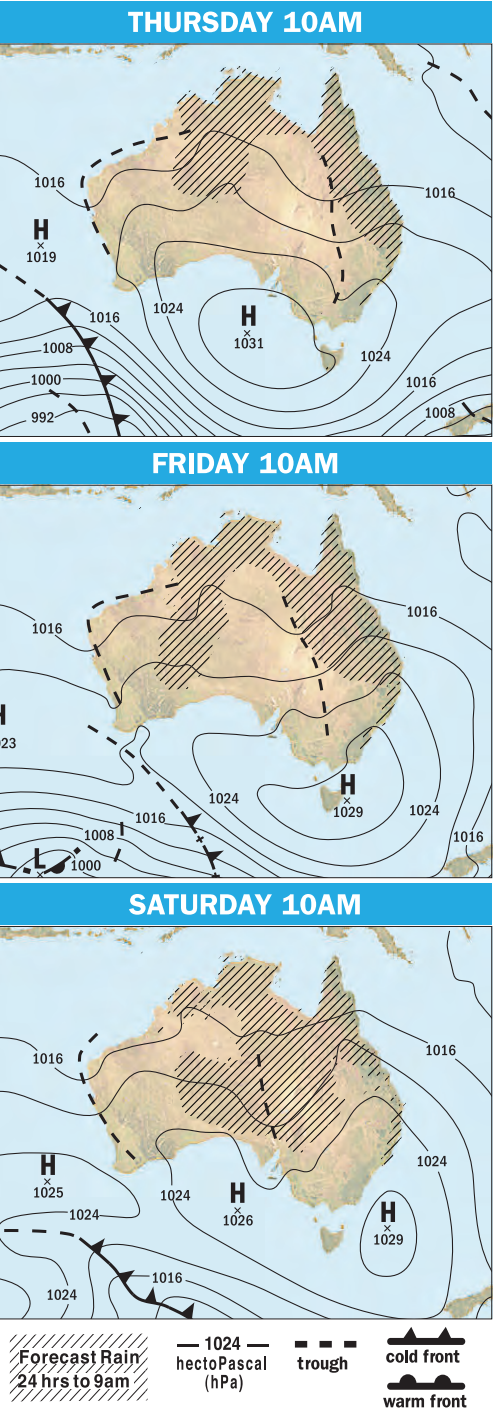
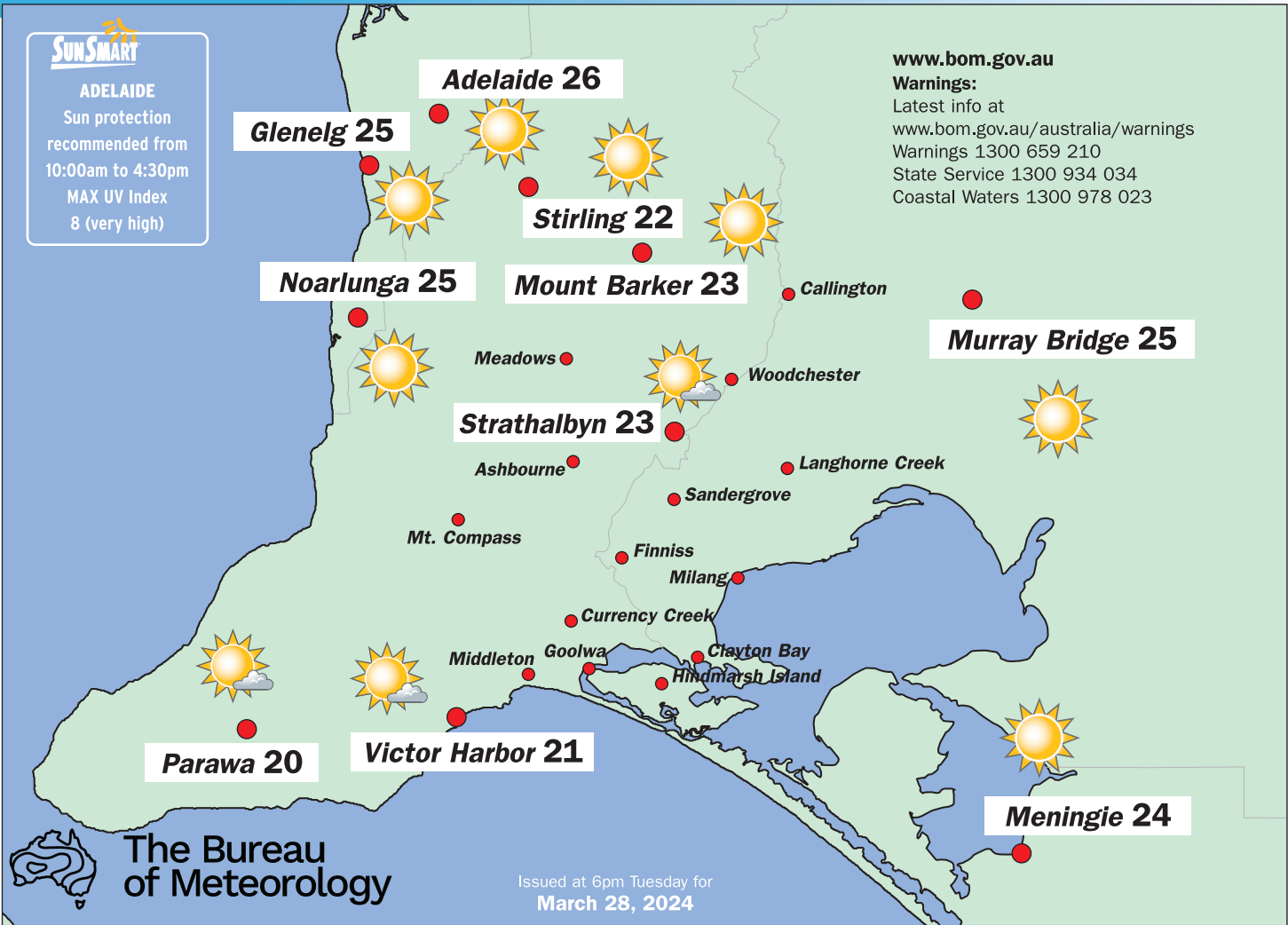
In the above example, South can easily see 3 Certain Tricks, ♠ A K and ♦ A and between the Clubs and Hearts thinks there is surely one more trick, that gives the 4 Certain Tricks they need to bid Game, and in fact they made 11 tricks by discarding a losing Club from the North hand, conceding only the Ace and King of Hearts. The Diamond void in North's hand was a bonus!

This all started by not being deterred by opening a Weak Two with a very weak suit.

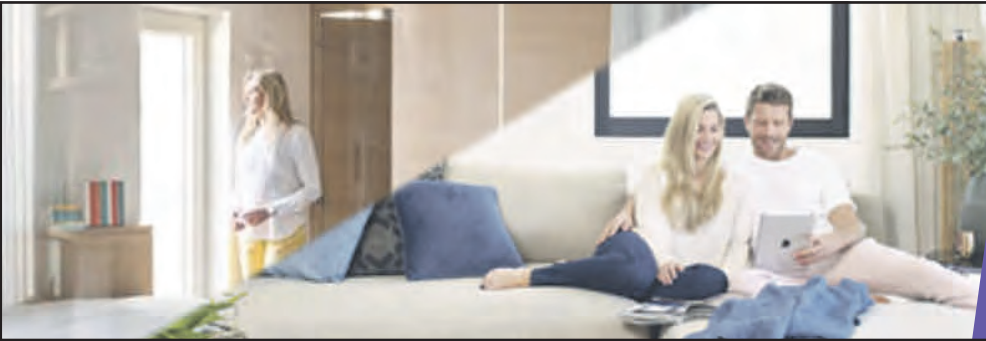
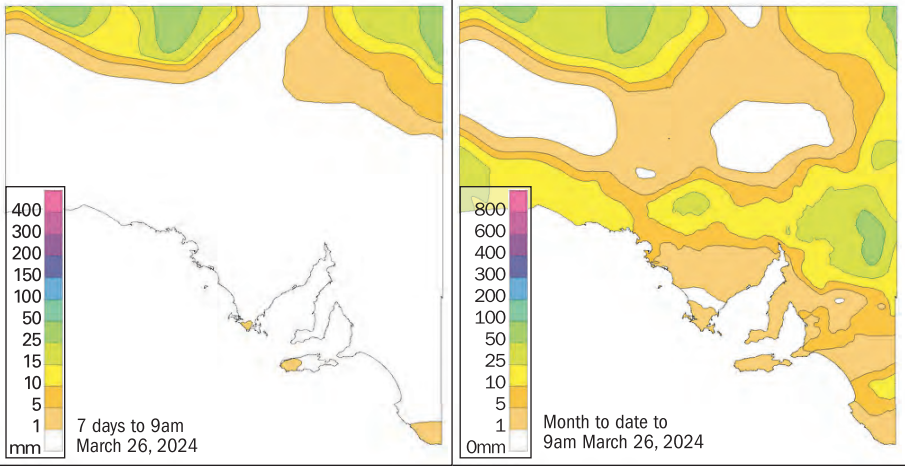
