Alexandrina Council deemed financially unsustainable by ESCOSA...

Alexandrina Council's current financial performance has been deemed unsustainable, according to a review conducted by the state's Essential Services Commission.

The Essential Services Commission of South Australia (ESCOSA) released its review on council's financial performance on Friday.

In its report, the commission found council's current financial performance unsustainable due to the \$7.1 million deficit, and its projected financial

due to historical and forecast high levels of expenditure on new and upgraded assets, and underspending on asset renewal and replacement.

The commission said council risks further deficits and a greater burden on ratepayers, either through higher rates or increased debt levels, if it's unable to achieve its forecasted operating expense.

"Overall, the current economic environment is putting pressure on many communities' financial capacity, including those in the council area," the report read.

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

Community cleans up Macclesfield



Outdoor furniture chairs, a car tyre, an old computer desk, and plenty of cigarette butts were among the haul collected at Macclesfield for Clean Up Australia Day on Sunday.

Sunday marked the 35th Clean Up Australia Day, with a total of 11 local volunteers turning up to put in a couple of hours to collect the rubbish.

Clean Up Australia Day was started by Ian Kiernan AO, who turned the day into the nation's largest community-based environmental event, with 22 million Aussies since pulling on their gloves and donating time.

Site supervisor for Clean Up Australia on behalf of the Macclesfield Community Association Graeme Milne said despite Macclesfield being a relatively clean town,



there was still plenty to collect.

"In the end, it was about six bags of rubbish, a couple of outdoor furniture chairs that had been dumped on the side of the road, a car tyre also just dumped on the side of the road, and an old computer desk,"he said.

"It is always the same with cigarette butts... you walk down in front of the hotels and there are always cigarette butts outside because there is no smoking inside and they just drop the butts on the ground, (along with), a little bit around the picnic area in Davenport Square."

Mr Milne said it was important for locals to become involved with Clean Up Australia Day.

"Macclesfield is not a very dirty place anyway, and you often see people pick up bits and pieces of rubbish that are lying around," ĥe said.

"But it is good to have a look along those streets leading in and out of town, and picking up those bits of rubbish that are thrown out of cars as they pass.

"A lot of that is fast food stuff, which is frustrating."

Drakes earmarked for Meadows supermarket

A Drakes supermarket could be the next chain to come to Meadows, with new designs revealing the retail giant as a potential occupant for the Battunga Road/Mawson Road development application alongside a pharmacy and surgery.

As previously reported in The Southern Argus, KevJohn Pty Ltd submitted an application in 2023 to construct a supermarket with onsite carparking, associated fencing and signage, water storage, landscaping and infrastructure at 5 and 7 Battunga Road, and the rear of 33 Mawson Road - the location of Meadows Mini Mart – which was approved by Mount Barker District Council.

Any news on the development had been scant up until recently when a sign popped up at the site notifying residents of the new plans and inviting them to have their say on the recent additions/alterations.

The company still intends to construct a supermarket with associated car parking and landscaping, but now plans to also construct two shops and consulting rooms.

The construction of the shop – which will have an approximate 486.51m2 floor area - will be adjacent to the supermarket and be accessed from the south via the shared car parking area, while the second shop

which will have an approximate 235.13m2 floor area – will run parallel to the northern site boundary, and incorporate a reception/ counter area, storeroom, staff room and toilet facilities which can be accessed from the Battunga Road frontage.

An existing dwelling will be renovated and extended to contain three consulting rooms, a treatment room, store room, reception area, administration/office areas, staff room and toilet facilities.

Proposed operating hours for the shops and consulting rooms are 7am to 9pm seven days a week.

The application proposes a sealed car parking area of 89 onsite spaces, however, a review notes 97 will be needed to fit to code 85 for the approved and proposed shops, and 12 for the proposed consulting rooms.

A Drakes spokesperson confirmed a development application had been submitted, however, it is working with council to find a larger site to better service the local communities and were unable to further comment on the application.

Local MP demands action on intersection

A local MP is teaming up with the community and council to demand the State Government stop "dudding" them and fulfill its promise to complete the works on a troublesome Meadows intersection.

Mount Barker District Council has been working with the Department for Infrastructure and Transport (DIT) who cares and controls the Mawson and Battunga Roads - on the treatment and design for the Mawson, Battunga and Nottage Roads intersection for years, but, as previously reported in The Southern Argus, the project has yet to receive warrant or funding, putting it "years away" from construction.

DIT previously told The Argus this was due to costs.

"It was determined the construction of a roundabout at the intersection would be the preferred option to improve safety, traffic efficiency and heavy vehicle turning movements," the spokesperson said.

"Each year the department receives many hundreds of requests to undertake works at specific locations throughout South Australia, however, the cost to undertake all of these projects substantially exceeds the available funding, so a priority system is used to assess which projects receive funding.

"The department will continue to collaborate with the Mount Barker District Council to further develop this concept as opportunities arise."

But one local MP says this is simply not good enough.

Member for Heysen Josh Teague is calling on the State Government to fulfill the promise it made to the community and bring this much needed infrastructure to fruition to relieve them from the congestion and delays they encounter.

He has written to Minister for Infrastructure and Transport Tom Koutsantonis as well as launched a petition to support his campaign. A street corner meeting will also be

held at Pik a Pie at 10am on March 15.

"Throughout the year last year, the government and I, local residents and council were all proceeding in reliance on the minister's promise this would be done and paid for," Mr Teague said.

"The department had already drawn up the plans and that informed the minister's letter in January 2024, but then at the end of last year, out of the blue, the minister had his Chief Executive write to Mount Barker Council and say it's not any longer something they are doing in a great rush.

"I'm really regarding it as a broken promise and council, the community association, me as a local member, and I think it's fair to say residents, are unanimously and loudly saying 'get this done'.

'To get to a point where those calls have

been met with a promise to get the work done was a significant step, so it's just all the more galling and insulting to then see the minister and government do a U-turn and dudding the community."

Supporting the campaign is Shadow Minister for Infrastructure and Transport Ben Hood.

He went door knocking around the township with Mr Teague last week and visited the site to see the significant traffic that flows through the intersection.

"You can just tell the frustration with those people in Meadows that had been promised this - it had been something they had been expecting – then had the rope pulled out from under them," he said.

"We just know it is such a tricky and dangerous intersection that something simply has to be done.

"I was sitting at Pik A Pie with Josh and I couldn't believe the amount of traffic just flowing through there, even just on a week day during lunch hour.

"You could understand that if you're not a local and maybe you're someone who is visiting the region, enjoying the beautiful area around Meadows, just a little bit of inattention could really be a dangerous thing.

"It's really incumbent upon the government to really step up and do what they said they were going to do."

Mount Barker District Council previously said it would continue to strongly push for this intersection to be recognised as a key connection to the townships of Kuitpo, Echunga, Meadows and Strathalbyn.

Minister Koutsantonis told The Argus the funding commitment had been made for the project.

"Through the Adelaide Hills Productivity and Road Safety Package, the State Government committed to the planning and design of a possible upgrade at the Battunga Road, Nottage Road and Mawson Road intersection in Meadows," he said.

"The government has continued to collaborate with the Mount Barker District Council to further develop this concept, and can confirm a funding commitment has been made by the State Government to progress this solution in partnership with council.

"I thank council for its constructive engagement and look forward to engaging with the community as we progress this project."

"This is ground we've covered already," Mr Teague said.

"I'm very much encouraging people to sign the petition, but just as much as that, for people to be really demanding when the government says it's going to do something, we expect it to happen and not just to have some walkaway for no reason."

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Alexandrina Council considers its options for Lot 10

Alexandrina Council is continuing to explore its options for the proposed community sport and recreation precinct at Lot 10, Langhorne Creek Road.

As previously reported in *The Southern Argus*, several Lot 10-related motions were put up for debate at council's February meeting, resulting in a special meeting organised for March 3 and councillors Sue Miller, Christie Thornton, and Michael Scott being officially elected to the project's committee.

Council held the special meeting on Monday night to discuss the options before them in the Business Case prepared by TSA Riley in November last year, and the purchase offer made by the Strathalbyn Harness Racing Club (SHRC) around the same time.

The newly named Strathalbyn Recreation Precinct (Lot 10) Advisory Group met prior to Monday night's meeting to discuss the master plans but failed to come to a unanimous recommendation for Chief Executive Officer Andrew MacDonald. Of the five stakeholder groups represented at the meeting held last Tuesday, the Strathalbyn and District Basketball Club, Strathalbyn Model Aircraft Club and Strathalbyn Campdraft preferred council to proceed with option 1A – which excludes the SHRC – while the Strathalbyn Cricket Club and Strathalbyn Agricultural Society had no preference and could work with either option.

The remaining two stakeholder groups – Strathalbyn Soccer Club and Eastern Fleurieu School – were absent, however, the latter has raised concerns with council about the inclusion of harness racing and the associated gambling and advertising, and have also indicated a preference for option 1A.

While it waits for a decision from the group, council could move forward with a first stage development on the site, regardless of the potential inclusion of the SHRC.

With a Federal Election fast approaching, council's administration believes there will likely be an opportunity to secure government funding to support the development, which could potentially include basketball, cricket and soccer facilities, a dog park and an RV park. "Having reviewed the costings provided within the TSA Riley Business Case and having obtained information from other councils regarding similar facilities, administration is of the view that a twocourt indoor facility could be constructed, with some playing fields and a dog park," a council report read.

"In addition, an RV Park and campground could be established by council at a relatively low cost that would support the new facility as well as the broader community, which provides an opportunity to establish new revenue streams for council or the community.

"It is acknowledged that a two-court facility would not necessarily meet the current and future demand for courts, particularly basketball, in Strathalbyn and, as such, when considering a design, it is recommended (it) enable the addition of two more indoor courts at a future time.

"The provision of playing fields would address an immediate need for more soccer facilities in Strathalbyn and could easily be adapted for a back-up cricket oval in summer months.

"The provision of a dog park could occur in accordance with either Master Plan within the western triangle of land identified, with input from the community."

Though while this would finally kickstart development on the long-awaited site, council only decided to further consider the stage one proposal, subject to securing an appropriate level of external funding.

It also decided to further consider the SHRC proposal, subject to the club providing information on the construction costs associated with the proposed concept designs and providing essential services to the site, and the business modelling that demonstrates financial sustainability, including a formal commitment from Harness Racing SA to hold future racing events in town.

"We can't put at risk a funding application when time is of the essence, and so I am comfortable to move this as it's printed, but I will say, I will be lobbying very hard on (the basketball club's) behalf if we can seek funding to provide an initial facility that is more than two courts," North Ward councillor, Sue Miller, said.

"We need to get this moving.

"I think this simplified approach, (and) I think it gives us a really good document to move forward with and give our community confidence."

"Council's public consultation report concluded there was a strong message within the consultation findings that the community is concerned about the impact rate increases will have on household budgets in the current economic climate.

"The Commission is of the view that council and its community needs to consider the options available in terms of what the community is willing to pay, and the services and asset stock this can accommodate."

The commission believed council should reassess its rate of expenditure on new and upgraded assets, take a period of consolidation to focus on asset renewal and constrain expenditure on new and upgraded infrastructure, and to update its Asset Management Plan to better inform the level of ongoing investment required to adequately renew and replace its existing assets.

In light of the report's findings, council says it has made significant changes to its draft Long-Term Financial Plan and is on track to be in surplus in 2026/27, substantially reducing projected rate increases over the next four years.

"I acknowledge the ESCOSA report, but I would like to reassure the community that we have not been idle in the months that this review was being compiled," Chief Executive Officer, Andrew MacDonald, said.

"ESCOSA's assessment that council's current financial performance is

unsustainable and that our projected financial performance is potentially unsustainable is based on a Long-Term Financial Plan (LTFP) that we are in the process of overhauling.

"Since joining this organisation, I have been working closely with the Financial Team to review all our operations.

"We have also been working closely with council members to workshop the LTFP as part of the 2025/26 Annual Business Plan and Budget process.

"This work will continue, and the community will be able to see our new LTFP when the Annual Business Plan goes out to public consultation in May."

The draft LFTP reviewed in ESCOSA's report included a projected rate rise of CPI plus three per cent for three successive years and then a two per cent sustainability rate plus CPI.

Mr MacDonald alleged this had been cut in half.

"We have significantly reduced expenditure, removing any non-essential expenditure and demonstrating significant restraint in coming years regarding new projects," he said.

"In 2025/26 we are proposing CPI plus a sustainability rate rise of 1.75 per cent, reducing to 0.75 per cent in 2026/27 and then 0.5 per cent in subsequent years.

"That has taken Alexandrina's projected rate increases from 11 per cent over four years to 3.75 per cent over four years. "Collectively, council needs to hold its breath and demonstrate restraint when it comes to expenditure, but I believe we are on the right track to becoming an economically sustainable organisation, provided expenditure continues to be managed responsibly."

The ESCOSA review made 10 recommendations:

• Improve the transparency of assumptions and explicitly state the basis of preparation of Annual Business Plans, budgets and the LTFP.

• Continue the good practice of providing 10-year forecasts that show separate results for the CWMS and the total result including the CWMS to provide ratepayers with transparency on the financial sustainability of its CWMS facilities.

• Review the recurrent budget to identify opportunities for savings, and adopt savings targets, track achievements and report the target savings and achievements in the annual budget to provide evidence of controlling the growth in costs, and achieve efficiencies across its operations and service delivery.

• Consider undertaking a detailed review with its community on what it's willing to pay, and the services and asset stock this can accommodate, to achieve a more robust financially sustainable position.

• Consider the pace of repayment of debt, balancing the proposed rate increases, levels of debt and cash held by council while ensuring council fully funds its asset renewals.

• Ensure a formal valuation of assets every four years, including condition assessment and assessment of remaining useful lives. Incorporate these in Asset Management Plans and corresponding depreciation schedules, and in expenditure forecasts in the annual budget and annual long-term financial plan update.

• Review its asset register to ensure it contains a full list of council's assets and include the detail in the Asset Management Plan.

• Consider undertaking a period of consolidation, focusing on asset renewal and constraining expenditure on new and upgraded infrastructure.

• Consult with ratepayers on the proportions of expenditure on asset renewal and replacement, and on new and upgraded assets, including the services ratepayers both want and are prepared to pay for.

• Continue the good practice of consulting with the community on its Strategic Management Plans and on proposed rate increases.

Council claimed all recommendations are being implemented through the overhaul of the draft LTFP and the Strategic Management Plan review, which includes the Strategic Asset Management Plan 2025-2035 and its ongoing Annual Business Plan and Budget process.

A local motorbike group – which helps showcase the beautiful Fleurieu Peninsula – is being hailed for encouraging new riders, promoting road safety and fostering social connections among its members.

Ride the Fleurieu member Craig Murton said the inclusive group welcomes all skill levels, vehicles and cultures.

"The group is... very beneficial for new riders, and I have often seen (founder Bronwyn Ridge) herself taking care of these new riders at the back of the pack where they can learn new skills, but still be involved in the group," he said.

"The group also promotes rider safety and motorcycle awareness – again, a great benefit to new, inexperienced riders. "The aim... has always been to showcase to a likeminded group of people magnificent places in this great area we call home."

Ride the Fleurieu was formed by Hindmarsh Island motorcyclist Bronwyn Ridge, after finding a need for a locallybased group after joining others based closer to the city.

She planned the first group ride in December 2023 which exceeded her expectations when 30 bikes arrived, making it a "great success".

Mr Murton has been a regular since the second ride, when he joined about 80 bikes in starting from Mount Compass, riding through the Fleurieu Peninsula before finishing at the Murray Mouth. Fast forward to today and the group has more than 1700 members and always welcomes new riders.

"The great thing about this locallybased ride group is that it's not just about motorcycles," Mr Murton said.

"In my time with the group, there have been several social events, a bowling day, a picnic day on the lake – all great fun and a chance for riders to get together away from the bikes."

Members can also organise their own rides. Mr Murton encourages anyone interested in joining to search 'Ride the Fleurieu' on Facebook.

Proposed library redevelopment

Mount Barker Community Library at its current Dumas Street location could be redeveloped following a recent meeting.

Mount Barker District Council will now look into partnering with TAFE SA and the State Government for the redevelopment, while also considering raising the budget, staffing, and resources over two years to meet national standards.

This follows a report by independent consultant AEC last year which found that a larger library was needed to address the rising demand for services, driven by the district's rapidly growing population and evolving community expectations for library facilities.

The report was developed after community consultation that received 1413 submissions.

Survey results showed that 94 per cent of respondents felt the current library met their needs, and 93 per cent were satisfied with its location.

At a recent meeting, councillors emphasised the importance of thoroughly considering the community's preference to retain the library at its current location and consulting with State Government stakeholders before finalising any plan.

It also stressed the need for a clear understanding of why expansion at Dumas Street might not be feasible before pursuing alternative options.

Mayor David Leach will now write to TAFE SA, SA Premier Peter Malinauskas, and relevant State Government ministers to explore potential partnerships for redeveloping the existing site.



CFS extends thanks for donations from Paris Creek fire

Local Country Fire Service (CFS) volunteers have expressed gratitude to the individuals and businesses who donated goods to the brigades during the recent Paris Creek fires, and helped them to battle a blaze that could have had catastrophic consequences for the town.

As previously reported in *The Southern Argus*, two grassfires broke out in quick succession on Paris Creek Road on February 25 – the first was a car fire started from an electrical fault that spread to nearby grass and the second was from a mechanical fault with a tractor that then burned through hectares of grass and scrub land on private property.

Firefighters had only just returned to the brigade from the first fire and were cleaning up when they were called out to the second.

Strathalbyn CFS Group Officer Greg Pfeiffer was one of the first on scene, and was quick to direct farm fire units and trucks to be where they needed to be.

"The pager went off and my immediate thought was the car fire had rekindled because everyone had left, so I thought I would shoot up the road and have a look," he said.

"I was up at the farm at Glenbarr and I was going home anyway, so instead of turning right going home, I turned left and went up the hill, and I got just to the top and there was a huge column of smoke and I thought 'here we go'.

"Because I was on my own, I just sat the car there, put the handbrake on, let it run and then started to organise because a heap of farm fire units followed me up, so I sent them down to the southern side of the farm because that would be the safest place for them to operate.

"I said 'knock it out', then two or three trucks turned up and... I sent them down with the farmer on his tractor, and I said 'take them down to the bottom' and I told those guys to get to the head and start working their way around on the front of it.



"I organised the aircraft to drop the gum trees next to the house because that's where it was going fairly well and to also attack the head."

Mr Pfeiffer's biggest concern was preventing the blaze from reaching Schofields Track, which would have spelled disaster for Strathalbyn.

"Local knowledge came into play because if it jumped Schofields Track and gone a couple hundreds of metres we would've been in trouble because it would've gotten into the long grass and there's a lot of acacia through that gully," he said.

"It would've gone up through Reynold Park across Bull Creek Road into Formby's and finished up somewhere around the racecourse, then when the wind changed, Strath would've legitimately been in strife, so my number one priority was to halt the forward rate spread, which we did.

"We did that pretty quick but we had a lot of outbreaks.

"There was lots of animal manure that was burning, so every now and then it would jump and start, but we had the farm fighting units on one side of the fire and the fire trucks on the other side, then eventually we had enough fire trucks to go around the fire and they just kept working on blacking out the edge.

"The first thing we did was black out the edge 30 metres in, then we started doing stuff that was in the middle."

Approximately 140 firefighters and 40 trucks worked to extinguish and secure the area over several hours, while 38 water drops were made by supporting aircraft.

The fire burnt 19 hectares of grass and scrub land on private property.

During this time, donations from the local community kept firefighters going.

Woolworths donated \$350 worth of bread, drinking water and sandwich fillings, while the neighbourhood centre assembled the sandwiches for volunteers.

The Monday following the incident Dunlop and Giles helped fix some damaged trucks by mending two flat tyres and providing a

hydraulic repair respectively.

Strathalbyn CFS Brigade Captain Andrew Wardle thanked everyone for their "vital" donations.

"Fighting a fire on a 40-degree day and dragging hoses, you tend to get a bit thirsty," he said.

"Our pallet of drinking water went (quick), so Woolies brought up a car load of water that was vital.

"When you've got multiple strike teams on a fire ground there is no establishment that can make that many meals in such a short time, so sandwiches were an absolute God send.

"We have ration packs which is enough for a couple of hours but can run out pretty quickly.

"There were a couple of individuals who also donated some food and drink."

The incident was a reminder that people need to take potential faults into account when driving machinery on hot days.

Drivers caught in weekend round-up

Three local drivers lost their licence after committing traffic offences in the Hills Fleurieu and Murraylands on the weekend.

At about 1.30am on Saturday, police stopped a Holden sedan on East Terrace at Murray Bridge and breath tested the driver.

The 25-year-old Murray Bridge woman had three passengers under the age of 16 in the car at the time when she allegedly produced a blood alcohol reading of 0.081.

She was reported for drink driving and issued a six-month instant loss of licence. Just after 5pm on the same day, police stopped and breath tested a driver on Adelaide Road, who allegedly produced a blood alcohol reading of 0.127. The 58-year-old Mannum man had his vehicle impounded for 28 days and was issued a six-month instant loss of licence. Both drivers will be summonsed to appear in Murray Bridge Magistrates Court at a later date. Meanwhile, at about 11.27am on Sunday, a 27-year-old Tooperang man was detected riding a motorcycle at 152km/h in a 100km/h zone at Brookman Road near Kuitpo. He was issued an expiation notice for \$1997, nine demerit points, and a sixmonth immediate loss of licence notice.

Help needed to locate stolen Holden

Police are seeking the public's assistance to help locate a Holden Kingswood stolen from Murray Bridge last month.

The vintage car was stolen from a locked shed on Adelaide Road sometime between 5pm on Saturday, February 22, and 10am on Monday, February 24.

People caught abusing, neglecting or mistreating animals will face tough new penalties after new animal welfare laws were recently passed in State Parliament.

The Animal Welfare Act – which had not been updated since 2008 – now includes a proactive 'duty of care' provision requiring pet owners to provide animals with a minimum level of care such as adequate food and water, allowing authorities to address neglect before an animal is harmed.

This means RSPCA SA can talk to owners about better looking after their animals without having to wait for the animal to be harmed and without having to lay cruelty charges.

Those found guilty of animal cruelty now face maximum fines of up to \$250,000 and/or

10 years jail for the aggravated ill-treatment of an animal – up from \$50,000 and/or four years in jail – while a corporation can now be fined up to \$1 million for mistreating animals.

The definition of an animal has also been broadened to include fish, bringing South Australia into line with the rest of the nation. However, recreational and commercial fishing activities remain unaffected.

In a first, the reforms create an Animal Welfare Fund to capture licence fees, fines and penalties that can be put back into supporting and promoting animal welfare. It also includes mandatory reporting of suspected animal welfare offences within the greyhound racing industry and improving regulation and oversight of animal research. sedan with the registration SOL181 was undriven for a long time and would have had to have been removed on a car trailer.

Argus wins first Country Press national award

The Southern Argus made history on Friday night, taking home its first ever national Country Press award for one of its advertisements.

The annual Country Press SA awards night held at Adelaide's Hilton Hotel on Friday night brought together more than 100 journalists, editors, advertising and other media representatives, sponsors, and politicians to celebrate local newspapers' 2024 coverage.

Country Press SA President Darren Robinson expressed in his opening speech how privileged he felt to celebrate the lifeblood of regional communities.

"In every regional town, on every main street, and behind every local business, sporting club, and community event, there is a story, and it is only through our newspapers that bring those stories to life," he said.

"We don't just report the news, we are the trusted voice, the fearless advocates and the keepers of local history.

"At a time when misinformation spreads faster than the truth and global media giants overlook the realities of regional Australia, our newspapers remain steadfast.

"But beyond that, we are the heartbeat of our regions.

"Our work matters, our stories matter, and we will continue to stand tall, no matter the challenges we face."

The sentiment was shared by special guest SA Premier Peter Malinauskas, who was also on hand to present the Excellence in Journalism award.

"Every morning I wake up and see what's happened overnight, and there's never a dull moment lately, and I think it speaks to a couple of things, not least of which a degree of uncertainty that exists everywhere you go at the moment," he said.

"I think there is uncertainty when you go right up to the top, and you look at the geopolitical and geostrategic circumstances the world now finds themselves in – we have not seen this degree of instability over the last 50 years – so there's uncertainty everywhere you go, and in that environment, people quite understandably and justifiably are looking for sources of information and truths they can trust.

"Trust now has greater value than it ever has at any point in recent history because people aren't too sure what to trust any more.

"But the medium you facilitate and give great diligence to week in and week out in rural press has a particular place in people's hearts in terms of being a trustworthy source of community news, and that represents value – value that is hard to see replicated anywhere else in terms of medium because you treat your craft seriously, and you have a sense of responsibility and dedication to the communities you all individually serve.

"That is worthy of high praise and great credit."

When it came time for the awards, *The Argus* received two special mentions in the Best Headline category – first for its punny 'Food Fight' front page headline and the second



for its reference to one of ABBA's greatest hits 'Dancing Queen' in another edition.

Your local newspaper also came runnerup in the Best Newspaper in the under 4000 category, with judges describing *The Argus* as "a very good one for local news".

The state awards coincided with the national awards, which was hosted by SA this year.

The Argus experienced success in the nationals, coming home with Best Advertisement for its 'This is not a burger' advert.

"This is an eye-catching and very clever advertisement, harnessing the visual appeal of the burger to reinforce the power of advertising and indeed, the power of the local paper," Country Press Australia Executive Director Peter Kennedy, who judged the award alongside the Regional Media Connect senior team, said.

The Argus' sister paper, *The Leader*, had a lot to celebrate on the night too.

Not only did the Barossa-based paper win Best Newspaper in the nation for 2023, it took home five state-based awards, including Best Advertisement – Image/Branding, Best Community Profile, Best Headline, Best Photograph, and Best Special Publication.

"The 114th Country Press SA Annual Awards provided a fantastic opportunity to celebrate excellence in local news media, and I am incredibly proud that *The Southern Argus* was once again recognised as runnerup for Best Newspaper in South Australia," *The Argus*' Manager, Darren Robinson, said.

"Achieving this placing for the second consecutive year is a testament to our consistency and dedication to delivering high-quality local news to our community.

"This achievement would not be possible without the support of our loyal readers and local advertisers.

"I also want to acknowledge the professionalism and dedication of our talented team, who work tirelessly each week to bring you the best newspaper possible.

"We are passionate about what we do, and we remain committed to serving our community with the news that matters most."

Meanwhile, road safety on regional roads – including the troublesome Long Valley, Goolwa and Victor Harbor roads – was a topic at Country Press SA's conference prior to the awards.

RAA Senior Manager Safety and Infrastructure Charles Mountain aimed to further collaborate with the state's country newspapers to help shine a light on road safety.

Across 10 years of data, 632 lives were lost on regional roads, and 67 per cent of SA lives lost were on regional roads.

"While they might be experienced drivers, the rate of decline in cognitive ability is quite variable," Mr Mountain said.

"That can be a particular problem... for people in regional areas because their only form of transport is to drive.

"So, they're faced with a real challenge of: 'do I surrender my licence but then I lose my mobility? Are there other means of getting around?'.

"That becomes an ongoing challenge and it's something we're having lots of discussions with the government about."

Victor Harbor, Long Valley and Goolwa roads were among the RAA's top 10 riskiest in regional areas in a report released in 2021, with a more recent list expected to be released shortly.

As reported in this edition of *The Argus*, Long Valley Road has had long-running issues with its upgrade with recent repairs just 12 months after roadworks were completed.

Other topics during the conference included the important role newspapers play in small communities and how artificial intelligence could be embraced in business to improve efficiency while maintaining integrity.

A very good one for local news.




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Bridget Jones: Mad About the Boy





There's no doubt the now four-part Bridget Jones series has become part of modern film culture.

Which woman among us hasn't seen a bit of themselves in Renee Zellweger's dishevelled, mad cap character, struggling to keep her life intact and have some form of a love life?

First there was Bridget Jones's Diary in 2001, then Bridget Jones: The Edge of Reason in 2004, Bridget Jones's Baby in 2016, and now Bridget Jones: Mad About the Boy.

To be fair, it was always going to be hard for the latest instalment to beat the third one for me, but having said that, this is undoubtedly one of the most enjoyable films I have seen in the past 12 months.

While a comedy in the best sense, this movie also ticks boxes with the way it addresses grief and ageing.

Here we find Bridget as a single mum after the love of her life Mark Darcy (Colin Firth) is killed while on a humanitarian mission to Sudan four years earlier.

She has two loud, but mostly fine, kids, although school drop-offs are often done in pyjamas, with a shower and housework going missing.

This instalment is loosely based on Helen Fielding's 2013 novel Mad About the Boy and sees a number of unforgettable characters returning to our screens.

Like Hugh Grant as Daniel Cleaver, for example, who returns to the series after being feared dead in Bridget Jones's Baby.

But Cleaver himself has also aged and somewhat matured, becoming Uncle Daniel to Bridget's two children, and at one stage, even questions his raffish past.

The romance stories in this instalment see Bridget team up with the much younger Roxster, played by Leo Woodall, and when that falls apart, Bridget's son's whistle-blowing science teacher Mr Wallaker (Chiwetel Ejiofor) steps in as a most geeky long-term partner prospect.

This instalment in the Bridget Jones series is directed by Michael Morris, who keeps the film very Bridget in manner and humour.

We are allowed to grow up alongside her, which brings more depth to the tale than perhaps the previous three instalments.

It is more than a bit of a laugh.

Restoration grants available for Our View Hills and Fleurieu landholders

Grant rounds will be offered twice a year and will be open to select regions each round. Applications are open for 12 weeks, closing

on Friday, May 16, 2025. Eligible grant projects may include, but

are not limited to:

• Revegetation of local native species.

• Pest plant and animal control and management of over-abundant native species.

• Fencing to exclude stock or other activities that impact biodiversity

 Protecting vegetation through a Heritage Agreement.

A second program - the Heritage Agreement Incentive Grants – is also available to encourage landholders to establish new heritage agreements to protect native vegetation on their land.

Roads and intersections

According to the RAA, across 10 years of data, 632 lives were lost on regional roads, and 67 per cent of SA lives lost were on regional roads.

With this in mind, road safety on our country roads, including its intersections, has been front and centre in regional politics.

Intersections that include the Mawson, Battunga and Nottage Roads intersection at Meadows, for example.

Take a drive to Meadows, and the level of danger and congestion at this intersection is plain to see, along with the confusion it poses to those not accustomed to driving through it travelling through the town.

This project has been a main concern for residents, Mount Barker District Council, and local members for years now.

The Department for Infrastructure and Transport, who oversees Mawson and Battunga Roads, says a priority system means this intersection will continue to miss out on an upgrade, although funded.

Member for Heysen Josh Teague has launched a petition to support the campaign to get this intersection upgraded sooner rather than later, with a street corner meeting to be held at Pik a Pie bakery on Saturday, March 15.

The Mount Barker District Council says it will continue to advocate on behalf of the community for the intersection to be officially recognised as a key connection to the townships of Kuitpo, Echunga, Meadows and Strathalbyn.

DIT has told The Southern Argus the construction of a roundabout was the preferred option to improve safety, traffic efficiency, and heavy vehicle turning movement, but because there are so many requests across the state for such upgrades, a "priority" system has seen its chances of immediate work dissipate.

Perhaps Mr Teague's petition hopefully flooded with thousands of signatures - will see it bumped up the list.

We can only live in hope.

After almost six years at Stationmaster's Art Gallery, Co-ordinator Catherine Pallin has decided to hand over the reins and move onto her next chapter.

Stationmaster's Art Gallery is an artist-led, volunteer-run gallery, located in Strathalbyn's old heritage Stationmaster's cottage.

Exhibitions change at least every two months, showcasing the work of local artists, and Ms Pallin works with a team of about 45 volunteers.

She has now opened an expression of interest campaign for the role, promoting it as "fulfilling" and "meaningful".

"I've just learned so much about organisation, working with people, and I've really grown in confidence through doing the role in so many ways," Ms Pallin said.

"I couldn't have done that without all the other people involved – I felt really supported from the artists, members, volunteers, and the community.

"I'm proud of the culture – and contributing

to a positive culture – everybody involved makes that happen."

As a painter and drawer, Ms Pallin initially regularly visited exhibitions before putting her hand up for the Chairperson position, then moved into the Co-ordinator role.

In her second year, the interior was painted from a yellow to white which made "such a difference" to the feel of the place.

She has also loved collaborating with and platforming local artists.

"They're so talented," she said.

"Just having a place for local artists to show their work and come together as a community is really important."

Those interested in her position are encouraged to register in-person at the gallery, view the space, and leave a message at the front desk.

"I feel that it's someone else's turn, it's someone else's time to shine and put their flavour in the gallery – a new person would bring in new ideas," Ms Pallin said.

"I'm ready to move onto new things in my personal and work life.

"It's a great opportunity for someone – it's being part of a community, being part of a committee, choosing art for the gallery, you use your creativity in putting artwork together."



Program helps strengthens community ties in Fleurieu

In just a few months, Junction Community Connector Franki Scarfo has become a friendly, familiar face at Goolwa supporting locals through the Community Connections Program (CCP).

Delivered by Junction in partnership with Skylight Mental Health across the Fleurieu, the CCP is a Department of Human Services initiative.

The program involves a dedicated community 'connector' getting to know and understand a person's goals and interests to link them with longer-term, sustainable supportive community, social, and service networks.

The CCP supports people ineligible for other government programs, such as National Disability Insurance Scheme (NDIS) and My Aged Care.

Priority is given to unpaid carers, Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander people, people who identify as LGBTIQA+, those from new and emerging culturally and linguistically diverse communities and those who are financially disadvantaged.

Ms Scarfo said the CCP was about people connecting with themselves as well as others.

"The CCP allows one-on-one support to develop the goals we may have only dreamed possible," she said.

"The first thing isn't always the right thing, but the next thing might be."

Ms Scarfo said navigating pathways was pivotal.

"There is often a lot of information available, and people need help to process that along with a focus on their own interests," she said.

"It can be overwhelming not just on an emotional level but also, in a practical sense."

Since starting in the role late last year, Ms Scarfo has worked with around 15 people including Lisa, who asked to use a pseudonym, and who recently moved to Goolwa.

After growing up in a tight-knit rural town, Lisa was seeking community connections and after learning of the CCP, met Ms Scarfo for coffee.

Several months on, Lisa described the program as "a revolution".

"The big change for me was doing something practical not just walk or look around aimlessly by myself," she explained. "I knew I wanted to be part of community

activities, but I wasn't sure what that looked like.

"One of the other issues I faced was finding groups or places with people my own age."

To start with, Ms Scarfo accompanied her to a couple of programs.

Lisa is now "really busy", being a regular at the library and community centre, taking part in a range of activities.

She is also undertaking several selfdevelopment courses to position her for the future.

Repairs undertaken to Long Valley Road

Repairs have been made to Long Valley Road's southbound overtaking lane less than a year since improvement works were completed.

Safety improvement works comprising of the construction of two new southbound overtaking lanes between the railway line to Gemmell Road, and between north of Valley Cottages Road and to the south of Mine Flat Road, along with two junction upgrades at Stirling Hill Road and Gemmell Road were completed in May last year.

But less than 12 months on, a defect was found at the start of the new southbound overtaking lane, prompting repairs recently.

"Following an inspection, repairs were undertaken and completed on Wednesday, February 26," a department spokesperson said.

"Speed restrictions will remain in place until all works, including line marking, are complete this week.

"We will continue to monitor this site. "While the works are under warranty, the

contractor is obliged to fix all defects."

The repairs left local residents and users of the road disgruntled.

RAA Senior Manager of Safety and Infrastructure Charles Mountain said the issue comes down to the contractors.

"We understand that even though it's just been completed, they're going to have to repatch certain sections," he said.

"That goes to the point about good

quality and maintenance, and the quality of contractors doing the work, so that comes back to the whole point about supervision and accountability.

"It's hard enough to get the work done – the last thing you want is having to go back to redo it.

"It's not common but there have been some well-documented examples of where this has occurred in recent times.

"I think this has been a reminder that you can contract your work out, but at the end of the day, you've still got to ensure you've got a good responsibility and follow-up procedures to ensure the work has been done properly."

"Scouting is all about empowering young people with skills for life teamwork, leadership, problem-solving, and resilience," Mr Merrill said.





A historical military reenactment group has found a new home at Macclesfield for its training sessions, and by all accounts, has been embraced by the locals.

The Adelaide Regiment of Volunteer Rifles now runs monthly training shoots in Davenport Square, and last month, the group was focusing on firing and advancing and retiring in skirmish order in preparation for doing it with live ammunition and targets at Monarto in a couple of weeks' time.

The regiment are all about keeping military history alive.

"We reenact the South Australian Volunteer Military Force of the 1860s period," Mr Grguric said.

"They were like the Army Reserve of the time, and their job was to protect South Australia in case any of Britain's enemies tried to raid us, which never happened.

"The threat changed depending on the politics of the time, so it started with the French, then there was a chance that America would go to war with Britain, so the people here were worried about that... but of course that never happened either."

The group members confess to being like-minded "history nerds" who also share an interest in the target shooting side of being members.

During History Month they will be staging a camp and show at Glenbarr Homestead.

Dry conditions to boost corella numbers

A local contract shooter says Strathalbyn residents can expect increased numbers of corellas as continued dry conditions across the region bring them into the town and its greenery.

Nicholas Adams has been a shooter for almost a decade and says a co-ordinated approach by a number of shooters over a series of days could be needed if the population of the birds explodes.

"I have found out after the fact that Strathalbyn did solve the problem once,"

Mr Adams said.

"It was something like 10 guys with 10 shotguns for 10 days, and what they didn't scare away, they blasted into oblivion.

"They moved on, and they stopped destroying those beautiful heritagelisted trees that are in many townships and stripping them to the point of death."

Mr Adams said corellas are "very smart" birds that keep one partner for life, and while they can be scared away out of townships and back to the river systems, coastal areas and the scrub, they will often return.

His advice for residents and businesses having problems with the birds was to find someone with an air rifle to shoot them and couple it with gas guns. "It will certainly move them on, but for how long, is a very good question," he said. "It took them years to come back to Strath, but now they are back and they haven't left.

"Because of the dry and hot summer, they are coming into the towns for food and water. "Right in front of Laucke's opposite the high school, the trees are all stripped and left on the ground.

"(Once) they have killed them all then they will move on, and every tree that is in the middle of the Strathalbyn township in that park, they will destroy and kill. "That is going to cost thousands and

thousands to get them removed."

In what was a vital one day clash for a place in the 'Four', Wistow refused to play on a damp pitch at Langhorne Creek, with curator Trevor Potts, a member of the grounds committee to deal with the suitability of grounds and wickets saying it was suitable for play. The tribunal sorted out an appeal by Langhorne Creek to declare the match a draw which saw Wistow drop out of the 'four'.



Pair offers unique day care service at Kanmantoo

Every dog has its day, and at Jame Farm Days, they get to live that day to the fullest.

The Kanmantoo-based dog daycare service transports their canine customers via bus from various stops across Adelaide to the Hills site for a day of running, fun activities and social interaction.

The business has been operating since mid-2019, and started from owners Teagan and Kobi Jame simply pet sitting a couple of dogs on their days off to something larger.

"I started as a veterinary nurse when I finished high school, then after that, I managed one of the really big pet stores, which is where I met Kobi, my partner," Teagan explained.

"While we were working there, we started working with a company that does pet sitting on the side – we had another dog at that stage that was a bit older, and we were like 'maybe he can keep other dogs company while we pet sit'.

"Someone asked us if we would do day care and we were like 'okay, we'll do daycare on our days off', but rather than an indoor daycare setting, we would take them in our backyard and take them out to Kuitpo forest and go for adventures, and we kind of saw how happy they were and were like 'we could probably do this on a bigger scale' and then we could help a lot more dogs and make (them) happy.

"So, we started looking for a property that had the capacity to hold a lot more dogs, then the bus service just came about because we knew we were a bit too far out for people to be dropping off and picking up.

"That wasn't really viable – people's time is really scarce with family, jobs and other activities, so we wanted to make sure enough dogs got a good day out but it wasn't too much of an inconvenience for the owners." The business looks after about 40 dogs per day on average, and offers a range of different services tailored to each dog's need. In hybrid daycare, dogs experience a combination of group play, one-on-one activity-based play and rest time, while those only in group play will have the time to socialise with others in the expansive play space, and those doing solo only receive oneon-one attention from the carers. To know which option suits a dog best, Teagan said they have a discussion with the owners first and then slowly introduce the newcomer to the regulars.



want to know about any quirks or traumatic experiences previously that we need to know about," she explained. "Because we have all the different programs now, other than human aggressive dogs, we have something for every dog, so even if they are having issues with other

uogs, we nave sometning for every dog, so even if they are having issues with other dogs, we have a solo day care program where they do just get to have one-on-one time with the humans constantly throughout the day rather than being with the other dogs. "They still get to play all the fun games

and get to be in the outdoor space, but they don't have to have contact with other dogs if they've had a traumatic experience or have had no experience or whatnot, so there's no sense of urgency for some owners if they're desperate for their dogs to go somewhere or have a day out, compared to many daycares where they just don't have the space or set up for the different options so people have to give a bit of white lie or say their dogs are better because they're just desperate for them to go. "Obviously, we know in different environments they do act differently, so we have a bit of an assessment when they first get here and we see how they are with us, and that gives us a pretty good gauge on how they're going to go from there-in. "If there are issues, that's fine, we can just flag that for that particular dog and make sure we don't put them in situations where that's going to be an issue." The business model provides benefits for both owner and dog.

knowing their dog is being looked after in a safe environment and being provided an enriching experience, while for the dogs, it satisfies their biological needs.

The dogs live their best life on the farm.

For Teagan, she personally loves the transition stories that come out of her work.

Being able to give them a day a week where they can run around and make decisions for themselves in a large space that's far enough out that they don't bother anyone, but not too far of a trek out of Adelaide, is what makes it a success.

"I've got quite a few (dogs) I'll work with who start off really unsure, shy or scared, or just lack of exposure... and then normally, within a short while, they start to come out of their shell, become way more comfortable and they start playing," Teagan said.

"That compared to where that dog started is a stark difference, but knowing there's not many places that could offer that just because traditional daycare is just not an option for them - they don't have the space, set up and time – that's what my heart sing. "We love our dogs so much but they do need a bit more socialisation - that doesn't mean playing with other dogs, it means just being in a pack and outdoors, and having a day where they can do what they want to do. "Just having so much space allows us to expand and do different things for the dogs - it doesn't limit us so much - and with the second exit for Mount Barker that now comes to Nairne, it's about half an hour from the bottom of the freeway, so it's so convenient, but it's far enough out that we have enough space so we can really give them so much fun stuff to do, and give them such a great environment without having to go too far."

For owners, they receive the peace of mind

Mount Compass Area School is encouraging its families to engage, stay active, share knowledge, and learn together by facilitating activities, with the help of a grant, that foster connection.

More than \$80,000 will be shared across 22 South Australian government schools and preschools through the Parents in Education fund for parent engagement projects that help parents and carers get involved in their child's education, and support learning at home through positive relationships with schools.

One of the schools participating in this is Mount Compass Area School, which received \$4600 in funding for its 'Connecting our Community' project.

Through the project the school aims to encourage families to engage, stay active, share knowledge, and learn together by providing parents with valuable strategies and a support network.

By connecting more intentionally with parents and creating better relationships between families and the school, staff aim to build trust with parents to work together, which will positively impact the school's ability to create a safe and inclusive environment.

To do this the school aims to deliver a series of facilitated activities this year such

as using the food and hospitality centre to create a simple, healthy home-cooked meal once per term that parents and staff sit down and share together, four workshops that parents can come together to explore various creative mediums in a relaxed atmosphere, and an overnight camp for fathers that features organised games and activities, and a shared dinner and breakfast.

One of the activities that has already started is the weekly walking club.

After parents have dropped their children at school on Thursday mornings, they come together to complete a walk, then return to the staff room for a coffee and a catch-up.

Plan launched to save native threatened birds

Conservationists, researchers and government have come together to launch a bold new plan to save threatened native bird species throughout the Mount Lofty Ranges.

The Mount Lofty Ranges has one of the highest concentrations of threatened woodland bird species in Australia – 78 species are declining and 12 are already regionally extinct.

This decline of bird species in the region can be linked to a combination of factors, including habitat loss, changes to fire regimes, and the impacts of native and feral grazing animals on the remaining native vegetation.

The effects of climate change are also expected to exacerbate these threats.

The ReBird the Ranges Action Plan seeks to address this decline through restoring critical bird habitats through revegetation, protecting existing habitats, and managing threats, as well as researching, monitoring and adapting plans to improve bird recovery initiatives, and increasing community awareness and participation in conservation efforts.

Some projects under way already include revegetation of heathland in Deep Creek Conservation Park on the Fleurieu Peninsula to support the western beautiful firetail, Mount Lofty Ranges chestnut-rumped heathwren and Mount Lofty Ranges southern emu-wren, and revegetation of low-rainfall grassy woodland in priority areas of the eastern Mount Lofty Ranges to support the diamond firetail, hooded robin, restless flycatcher, jacky winter, southern whiteface, chestnut-rumped thornbill and brown treecreeper.

Other partners include local councils, Trees for Life, Second Nature Conservancy, Nature Foundation, Birds SA, The University of Adelaide, SA Water, Bio-R, Greening Australia, Nature Conservation Society of South Australia, Birdlife Australia and Conservation Volunteers Australia.

Calls to moderate water usage amid SA's record dry summer

Temporary, emergency bulk water collection points have been established in the Adelaide Hills and Fleurieu Peninsula from today, March 6, to ease overwhelming demand as drought-like conditions continue to be felt across the state.

The move between the State Government and SA Water is for those who have no other means of accessing water, and has user-pay points at Woodside, Sandergrove, Brukunga and the fourth was expected to be near Aldinga. The State Government also announced other measures, such as supporting water carters in identifying alternative sites for extraction and linking them with transport supply companies to provide additional delivery truck capacity. A number of locals with significant rainwater tank reserves – who have no other supply – have reportedly run out, and water carting businesses are exceeding supply. This has left some residents reportedly being forced to stay with friends in the interium.

private water business that services about 200 Mount Compass households – sent a letter to their customers with concerns about water supply.

"We monitor the level of water table from where we draw water very closely," Director, Stephen Connor, stated in the letter.

"For the past month, the water table level has dropped below the point from which we can pump – on a daily basis.

"Our tank is full at present, but it only holds a few days' supply for our customers." Given this, he urged customers to The local region is experiencing its driest summer for 24 years, according to the Bureau of Meteorology, and the state's driest in 33 years.

This is the worst Mr Connor has seen in his nine years of business.

"I have never had phone calls from people wanting to cart water to them, and I get one a day now... I don't have the facilities to do that," he told *The Argus*.

"I'm getting very desperate phone calls from farmers particularly, their wells are dry, their dams are run down or running



This comes as Compass Springs - a

moderate water usage where possible.

"We are not yet at a point of restricting supply, but we feel it prudent to make you aware of the situation," he wrote.

"If you are watering your garden, please do it at night and sparingly and generally keep your usage to a reasonable minimum.

"Hopefully we see some rain in the nottoo-distant future, but until then we will continue to monitor the situation closely." As prevously reported in *The Southern Argus*, hundreds of households are struggling for water for drinking, showering and cooking due to low rainfall, putting increasing pressure and demand on carting businesses.

out – things are pretty tough."

However, he said Compass Springs still has "reasonable capacity" and "didn't want to alarm" residents, but more so communicate that they are closely monitoring the situation.

"I just wanted to let (customers) know that we're watching it... and if we can be careful with our use then we can nurse our way through this process," Mr Connor said. "We'll... manage it as best as we can

and hope for some rain."
