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Strathalbyn feeling fair fever

Dressed in period clothing, Antique Bazaar's Henningsen brothers took to Strathalbyn's cobbled streets over the weekend to promote the town's treasured fair.

Looking the part, Charlie, 8, and Archie, 6, helped spread information and excitement for Strathalbyn's two-day Antiques and Collectables Fair coming up in August.

Hard-core antique collectors and upcyclers will enjoy rummaging for bargains and unique pieces on Saturday, August 19 and Sunday, August 20 when one of Strathalbyn's biggest annual events returns.

The fair was originally started more than 30 years ago as a replacement for the lost penny-farthing race and a remedy to slow trading and quiet times through winter.

"This year we have several new dealers coming in with different stock, and even though some of the dealers are regular exhibitors, they bring new and different stock each year," Strathalbyn Tourism Association's Linda McLoughlin told *The Southern Argus*.

"Apart from the fact that it is a great day out in beautiful Strathalbyn, all the businesses and shops are ready to welcome locals and visitors, as are all the dealers in the halls. "It is a whole-town event and a great opportunity to have a look at and buy something different."

High Street's Town Hall and Coronation Road's Carruthers Hall will be packed to the brim with classic, rare, intricate, fragile, weird, and wonderful antiques, including jewellery, furniture, décor items and all manner of collectables.

A shuttle bus and entry into Gilbert's Motor Museum is included in the \$10 per day event ticket price.

The fair will provide the perfect hunting ground for treasure hunters from 10am to 5pm Saturday, and 10am to 4pm Sunday.

On the Sunday, from 7.30am, the popular Treasure Market, run by the local Rotary Club, will also line Strathalbyn oval grounds.

"Come and find things for the home, office and garden and things not everyone is going to have. If you like a point of difference this is where to find it," Mrs McLoughlin encouraged.

"The fair also raises money for local tourism and some of our important community groups."

Historic SteamRanger Cockle Train derailed

A formal investigation is under way into the derailment of SteamRanger's historic Cockle Train between Victor Harbor and Port Elliot on Sunday.

At about 4pm, two of four railcars on SteamRanger Heritage Railway's regular Cockle Train service between Victor Harbor and Goolwa derailed between the seaside holiday towns.

Approximately 30 people on-board the

1950s 'Redhen' railcar at the time were uninjured.

Everyone was safely evacuated, and completed their journey to Port Elliot and Goolwa by road coach.

The cause of the derailment is being formally investigated.

"SteamRanger appreciates the concern from locals and tourists, however, asks interested parties to avoid accessing the derailment site while vehicle recovery and track repairs are undertaken," SteamRanger wrote in a Facebook statement.

"Updates regarding the operation of the historic Cockle Train while recovery is undertaken will be provided via the SteamRanger website or social media channels."

New CFS appliance firing on all cylinders

A new truck has found its home at Ashbourne's Country Fire Service (CFS) station, and will better protect volunteers and equip the brigade with enough water storage for emergencies without needing immediate support.

The brigade received its new 14 appliance last Tuesday night, replacing the former 22-year-old Mitsubishi-based vehicle, which had reached the end of its lifespan, sending it to salvage.

Built by Moore Engineering, the new Ashbourne 14 is based on a 2021 Isuzu NPS 75-155 chassis, and comes fitted with an HM24 motor/Darley 1.5 AGE pump, driving lights, Engel fridge, Stihl chainsaw, in-cabin breathing, halo system, and the capability to carry 1550 litres of water compared to the previous truck's 750.

Ashbourne CFS Captain Rob Crase said the newest addition will better service and protect the town's growing community.

"It's just better fitted out and it gives us more water to be able to last," he said.

"(Previously) we had to wait 20 minutes before Strath trucks got out to us, (but) we've



got two trucks with this capacity now, which will leave us in a situation where we can survive before a bigger truck arrives.

"It's just an evolution that's come along built around the safety of the guys that are in them."

The brigade is always looking for new members.

On The Run still on the way

Strathalbyn's 24/7 On the Run (OTR) service station is reportedly still going ahead despite the family-run chain's recent sale.

Australian service station giant Viva Energy – known for Coles Express, Shell, and Liberty fuel stations – purchased the OTR retail chain in a deal worth \$1.15 billion in April. However, the deal is still subject to the approval of the Foreign Investment Review Board and the Australian Competition and Consumer Commission (ACCC).

Nevertheless, an OTR spokesperson told *The Southern Argus* Strathalbyn's OTR station development, situated at Lot 508 Braemar Drive, is moving forward.

"The development is still going ahead and is currently in detailed design," they said.

"Works are likely to commence on site late 2023 and early 2024."

Strathalbyn's OTR will include three fast-food outlets (including one with a drive-through), a six-bay car wash, eight fuel pumps, dog wash facilities and 44 car parks.

A mix of 25 to 35 full and part-time job positions are expected to be created upon completion, with an opening date yet to be announced.


Upcoming community health forum

Alexandrina Council delivers draft budget for consultation

Alexandrina councillors adopted the 2023-24 draft budget inclusive of a 7.2 per cent average rate rise on Monday night, but hope to scale it back to five per cent during public consultation.

As previously reported in *The Southern Argus*, a rate increase of CPI 7.9 per cent minus 0.7 per cent, plus 1.3 per cent from new developments and property was proposed by the Audit and Risk Committee last Friday for Alexandrina Council's draft 2023-24 Annual Business Plan and Budget.

Council is mindful it needs to operate in a sustainable manner, which is why a strong focus was placed on delivering a budget and Long Term Financial Plan (LTFP) that operates with a small surplus over the short and long-term.

To achieve financial sustainability and implement A2040 community strategic plan initiatives, the proposed average annual rate increase is 7.2 per cent plus 1.3 from new developments and property improvements – equivalent to approximately \$154.

The CWMS service charge for the financial year will also increase to \$690 for occupied and \$495 for vacant properties.

At the time of the draft Annual Business Plan's preparation, the State Valuation Office was yet to finalise its overall assessment of regional property assets, however, recent advice from the Valuer General is property valuations across the council area have increased by 14.7 per cent – \$10.1 to \$11.6 billion – which council is attempting to cushion the impact of by continuing the application of rate capping.

Council believed this is a responsible draft budget that considers the current economic climate, provides for new infrastructure in a growing community, and maintains existing for our community to drill down on this budget and maybe look at cutting services, but if they're not inclined, then we go into a deficit, which we can catch up in the following year... ??

assets in good condition and continued provision of existing services.

"We have listened to the community, and this proposed Annual Business Plan and Budget is a 'back-to-basics' budget, with a rate increase less than inflation without reducing services to the community," Alexandrina Mayor, Keith Parkes, wrote in his budget message.

"It is also a year to complete projects already commenced, and not start any new (ones)."

New operating initiatives totalling more than \$2,051,000 have been included in the budget based on council resolutions, legislative requirements and identified risks, including:

- \bullet \$113,000 for an additional safety officer.
- \$25,000 for an Affordable Housing Plan.\$150,000 for asset revaluations.
- \$5000 for biodegradable dog waste bags.
- \$10,000 for cat by-law implementation.\$195,000 for a climate change officer
- and initiatives.
- \$155,000 for community centre funding.
 \$50,000 for a Recreation and Sport
 Strategy and Facilities Development Plan.

Major council projects funded over the next financial year include the Goolwa Wharf Revitalisation Precinct Project, Port Elliot's Freeman Lookout, sealing of unsealed roads, Strathalbyn's streetscape, and Sugars Beach Project.

The draft budget projects an operating surplus of \$160,000 – a \$905,000 turn-around from last year's \$745,000 adopted deficit – and a peak of \$48.3 million to council's borrowings in 2024-25, reducing to \$9.6 million by the end of the plan.

However, the majority of elected members desired a rate reduction to five per cent and to go into a deficit budget instead to ease further cost-of-living pressures on the community.

"I fully concur on the last three speakers on the 7.2 per cent rate increases being a bit high," North Ward councillor, Craig Maidment, said.

"Last year, you'll remember (we had) 6.2 (per cent) and there was a huge outcry over that, and people were hurting just as badly then as they are now.

"This is an opportunity for our community to drill down on this budget and maybe look at cutting services, but if they're not inclined, then we go into a deficit, which we can catch up in the following year."

Mayor Parkes also acknowledged the community's hardship, and noted council would have to 'pull in' and deliver a budget with controlled expenses.

"I don't think we're going to find when we do the roadshow people wanting us to cut surplus' and not do things because we're doing the basic things we're supposed to do and we'd be neglectful if we didn't do them," he said.

"I think at five per cent we'd be having a negative result – we'd be running at a loss basically – but I don't think too many people in our community are running at a profit.

"Please, when we adopt the budget, don't sit here and say 'I will not support a deficit budget' then five minutes later come with a list of ridiculous projects you want done.

"Hopefully, this inflation rate will turnaround, CPI will come down, and we'll be right."

Strathalbyn Revitalisation Project progresses

Stages three and five of the Strathalbyn Town Centre Revitalisation Project, which includes streetscape upgrades along High Street and Swale Street, have been completed, creating a more vibrant, pedestrian-friendly environment for the community.

The newly paved intersections, additional pedestrian access points, and improved footpath paving will enhance connectivity, and make navigation easier and safer for residents and visitors.

Added lighting will increase visibility, ensuring a secure environment during evening hours, while the introduction

of street trees and garden beds adds to the town's natural beauty, fostering community pride and environmental sustainability.

"The successful completion of stages three and five has paved the way for the ongoing progress of stage four, which aims to breathe new life into the heart of our town centre in Strathalbyn," Alexandrina Council Chief Executive Officer, Nigel Morris, said.

"To date, we've laid 5300m2 of footpath pavers, and at completion, there will be 6845m2 laid – that's around 76,000 pavers!

"In addition to this, there will be 4200m2 of road pavers laid during

the revitalisation project.

"As we continue this revitalisation journey, we are excited to create a vibrant gathering place at the intersection of Catherine Street and Donald Street, fostering community spirit and providing a welcoming space for residents and visitors alike."

However, Strathalbyn residents have recently voiced safety concerns over raised and uneven pavers around the town, and other issues with the completed streetscape works.

Community members are asked to alert council of an issue or safety concern by downloading

Commencing in June, the next stage of works will simultaneously encompass Dawson Street, with upgrades to the Donald Street and South Terrace intersections, including installation of a pedestrian refuge island.

The Strathalbyn Visitor Information Centre will also be upgraded to include new asphalt pavement, an improved stormwater management system, additional lighting, and garden beds to make it more welcoming and accessible.

"We remain fully committed to the ongoing development and improvement of our community, and would like to express our appreciation to the State Government for their support through the Local Government Infrastructure Partnership Program," Mr Morris said.

"We also extend our sincere thanks to the residents, businesses, and visitors of Strathalbyn for their patience and co-operation during the construction period, as together, we shape a brighter future for our town.

Goolwa Primary students say 'no' to bullying

A splash of colour has made all the difference at Goolwa Primary School.

Previous Wellbeing Leader Kieran Read secured a \$5000 grant from the Department for Education (DFE) last year for the school's anti-bullying project, which aims to implement initiatives to tackle the global issue through a series of lessons to support students' wellbeing and promote positive friendships.

Through the grant, the school was able to develop a mural for its gym wall to complement the work being done in the classroom, in addition to being an 'uplifting, eye-catching piece' for staff, students, families, and other visitors.

Current Wellbeing Leader Toby Medlin, who has seen the project through to its completion, said the mural had already made an impact around the school.

"Last year, the DFE put out expressions of interest for anti-bullying initiatives... and obviously, we put in an application around implementing anti-bullying initiatives here at school through the development of a series of lessons to support students and friendships," he said.

"Part of that application was also to have a centrepiece to refer to at the school in the form of our mural.

"It's already been highly utilised by our staff... for example, our classes have already used it when they're teaching a lesson around

positive friendships and what that looks like, and come out to this space and used (the mural) as a prompting piece.

"I know teachers have taken photos of classes to support the lessons they've been learning, and sending that home through our different communication channels."

South Australian artist Gen – also known as Gen + Tonic – was engaged to paint the mural in collaboration with students, who

voiced input on its colour and design, particularly, the phrase 'this place has no space for bullying'.

In creating the mural – which took about a week-and-a-half to complete – Gen and the school wanted it to be bold, bright, fun and playful, while also delivering the hard-hitting anti-bullying message.

"Working with students and getting that student voice, we felt, was very important," Mr Medlin said.

"We workshopped the design with our students, then together with our artist, we've come up with the finished piece.

"Obviously, students had some very strong ideas and opinions, but we were guided by our very talented artist Gen, who does lots of murals for schools in South Australia and Northern Territory, and she's come up with this brilliant, bright, happy colour palette for us.

"We wanted it to be an eye-catching and uplifting piece, hence the bright colours; we didn't want it to be something that had any negative connotations to it."

Mr Medlin hoped the mural contributed to the school's safe and inclusive environment.

"We're wanting and committed to providing a safe, respectable and inclusive environment for every single one of our students," he said.

"Making sure students have strong friendships, and feel safe and connected to our school community is really important to us.

"That's why we put in for the project, and hopefully, (the mural) just further continues and makes our school community a stronger and safer one to be."

Council funding to keep halls and ovals in tip-top shape

A coat of new paint, maintenance repairs, and a good scrub-down of the region's community ovals and halls delivered through Alexandrina Council grant funding will enable committees and caretakers to continue their much-needed work.

At council's March meeting, elected members approved for \$17,634 worth of funding in the 2022-23 combined grants budget to be distributed evenly to eligible community-owned and managed halls and/or ovals who submitted an application before the end of April for maintenance, improvement, renewal, or installation of new infrastructure.

Funds were increased to \$20,634 after Strath Neighbourhood Centre, who received a \$3000 Community Wellbeing Grant in December 2022, withdrew their project application

The following successful applicants will each receive \$1470 for essential projects:

- Langhorne Creek Historical School: development and production of information boards about the iconic red gums in and around the town in collaboration with students from Eastern Fleurieu School to promote sustainability.
- Mount Compass War Memorial Community Centre: repairs to hall's back screen door, repainting of main hall kitchen,

supper room, and store room and adjacent area, repairs to adjoining door between hall and side office area, and application of a non-slip surface on the front verandah wooden stairs and ramp. Asphalt surface and line-marking will also occur to the oval's carpark adjacent to the netball courts to make it better, safe, and more organised for patrons.

- Ashbourne Cricket Club: replacement of storage sheds for turf roller and mowers.
- Tooperang War Memorial Hall: preparation, repair and coating of main hall floor.
- Ashbourne War Memorial Centre: remediation of gravel driveway, including pothole filling, building up of road level, and drainage upgrades to minimise flooding impacts.
- Finniss and District Hall Incorporated: kitchen repairs, including replacement of louvre windows and underfloor venting, renewal of floor coverings, replacement of the kitchen sink, installation of hot water service and associated plumbing, and replacement of two doors, an entrance and exit.
- Richardson Hall Woodchester: replacement of all ballast-type fluoro lighting with LEDs.
- Langhorne Creek Memorial Park: high-pressure cleaning and general cleanup of outside toilets to make them more presentable, and removal of old, scraggly melaleuca trees at the southern end of the

park to reduce insect breeding sites.

- Lake Plains Community Centre: gutter and roof repairs to stop leaking, vermin, and birds.
- Belvidere Soldiers Memorial Hall: replacement of sash windows.
- Strathalbyn Polo & Recreation Grounds: infrastructure improvements to stable block

two, including replacement of timber railing.

All recipients will be required to sign a grant funding agreement prior to payment, and submit an evaluation and acquittal report upon project completion.

Disbursements are expected to be made no later than June 30.

An exhibition will be held at Macclesfield Institute, while a variety of workshops on offer include stone sculpture, writing, garden design weaving, ceramics and photography.

Local singer-songwriters will entertain crowds with original music at Three Brothers Arms open mic.

The day will finish off with a 'meet the artists supper', at the Macclesfield Institute, where attendees and artists can mingle and discuss creative processes while enjoying nibbles, drinks and celloist music.

Co-ordinator Tess Minett is driven to "introduce people to the creative process" and has incorporated "as many creative activities as possible".

"You don't get perfection the first time... it's trying to encourage people to have a go and accept less than perfect," she explained.

"(The creative process) is in

that striving and learning how things work, the material, and how it all functions – that's part of the process of creativity.

"A lot of people say, 'I can't sing', because they listen to someone who's a great singer... but what they're afraid of doing is being less than perfect.

"It's not about perfection, it's about the opportunity for everyone to express through a creative process and that's very fulfilling, and that's part of the activation of the human spirit.

"All of us are creative in some way."

Presented by Macclesfield Art Group, a sub-group of Macclesfield Community Association, the event is supported by \$1342 of council funding and \$9100 of in-kind support.

Macclesfield Art Group member Karin Scholz initiated the idea for the event after dreaming of organising an exhibition, and teamed up with Ms Minett, who has experience as a community artist and arts and cultural officer, and other group members in coordinating the jam-packed day.

Creative Pursuits is at Macclesfield Institute and a few other venues next Saturday, June 3, from 10am to 5pm, with an evening supper from 6pm to 9pm.

Alexandrina coastal projects to thrive under new funding

Two coastal projects in Alexandrina have been boosted by a combined \$80,000 in funding from the Coast Protection Board's annual grant program.

South Australian councils and community groups will share in almost \$1.1 million to undertake coastal protection projects, such as beach replenishment, flood emergency planning, hazard assessment, and weed control and revegetation.

In the latest round of funding, Alexandrina Council received a \$75,000 Coast Protection Grant for coastal flood emergency planning and community engagement for Murray estuary settlements, while Hindmarsh Island Landcare Group Inc received a \$5000 Community Participation Grant to complete the Sugars Beach/Murray Mouth revegetation project.

"South Australians are lucky to live near such fabulous coastlines, and it's important we continue to manage and protect these for future generations," Minister for Environment and Water, Susan Close, said.

"This million-dollar-plus funding provided by the Coast Protection Board will help do exactly that by supporting the delivery of a range of projects across the state to help councils manage their coastal hazard risk.

"South Australia's coastline is the first defence against a changing climate, and the coast is often central to our regional economies."

THE VOICE: Community to discuss upcoming referendum

A non-partisan presentation next week will educate local residents on the upcoming 'The Voice' referendum.

Later this year, Australians will have their say in a referendum about whether to change the Constitution to recognise the First Peoples of Australia by establishing an Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander Voice.

The Voice would be an independent and permanent advisory body, which would give advice to the Australian Parliament and Government on matters that affect the lives of Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander peoples.

An upcoming presentation presented by Macclesfield History Group and supported by Mount Barker District Council aims to educate attendees on The Voice and referendums, from a non-partisan, informative perspective.

The session will be led by Peramangk and Ngarrindjeri woman Courtney Hunter-Hebberman who has a law background, and will include a Q & A panel to discuss attendees' questions.

While Ms Hunter-Hebberman is hosting the session as a concerned community member, rather than in connection to the government, she believed her background

would offer an indigenous perspective. She said the session will be uninfluential, as she wants residents to make their own decisions, and personally, she is "conflicted" and believes "a lot of Aboriginal people are"

"I think the transference of power to 24 individuals that represent all Aboriginal people – we actually have hundreds of different nations," she said.

"The transference of power from cultural authorities to a Western system of governance, personally to me, that is a form of assimilation."

On the other hand, Ms Hunter-Hebberman believes her ancestors fought for a voice.

"My great, great-grandfathers... they had protested to the King in the 1800s at the time, and it's come through the generations," she said.

"My ancestors in a way, they wanted a voice – they fought for this.

"The Peramangk consultations that were done on our country, they were really inclusive... I feel that was done really respectfully."

Ms Hunter-Hebberman also wonders what the election process could look like for Aboriginal people in the future.

"I also look at that us – one of the most incarcerated peoples in Australia – the elements that are required to be met to be elected to The Voice body, will exclude a lot of people," she said.

"We have complex trauma, and excluding people because of complex trauma isolates them even further and that entrenches division."

Ms Hunter-Hebberman encourages residents to be analytic about their vote, to listen to Elders and the community while looking past "marketing strategies".

"We're talking about a voice – Aboriginal people have had a voice for years, it just hasn't been listened to," she said.

"Everyone has a voice, everyone's been speaking up, you see them when they protest and march – there's thousands of them

"We've been here for millions of years... versus the last two centuries, we've always had a voice but then it was silenced.

"My mother was silenced, my grandmother was silenced, my great-grandmother was silenced.

"In this life, it has been my goal to not be silent – I speak my voice.

"I am now welcomed in these spaces."

"I'd like to thank the wonderful members of the Young at Heart Club, the community as a whole and the businesses from Macclesfield and surrounding districts who donated so generously," co-ordinator Cathy Megson-McAllister said.

"My dream is that my great-grandchildren... will grow up in a world where they (don't fear) a diagnosis of cancer... to help Cancer Council with their wonderful research."

Macclesfield Institute kitchen had a delicious morning tea spread donated by community members, along with auction items, and Young at Heart Club members entertained the crowd.

Southern Argus Editor Sara Gilligan was among the event's guest speakers and gave an honest talk on her own stage 3 bowel cancer diagnosis and journey into remission.

The Macclesfield resident's key takeaways included not taking health for granted, and "trusting your gut".

"Unfortunately, due to my age, I was misdiagnosed and had that doctor given me better preventative advice, I may never have suffered cancer," she revealed.

"Early detection really can make all the difference.

"Despite being told my symptoms were dietary related, I knew in my gut something wasn't right and got a second opinion.

"This second opinion saved my life."

Ms Megson-McAllister found Ms Gilligan's honesty "incredible" and thanked *The Argus* for its in-kind support.

"I think everybody felt the impact from her, and her bringing awareness of what the Cancer Council can do, while also bringing awareness of knowing your own body and early detection," she said.

"Thanks to *The Southern Argus*, you've given us so much promotion and we had a lot of people come from Strath.

"The coverage that *The Southern Argus* has given us has been wonderful."

Member for Mayo Rebekah Sharkie finds the event "one of the best days of the year".

"There's nothing that personifies the love and community support that Mayo has for each other than the Macclesfield's Young at Heart Biggest Morning Tea," she said

during her speech.

"Congratulations to you and all the volunteers – this would not happen if there wasn't an army of volunteers making it happen

"I don't think there's a person in this room, including myself, who hasn't been touched by cancer, either someone you love, your neighbour, someone you know or maybe even yourself.

"What we need is to get to a point with technology and with research where the fear is gone."

meeting Standards Australia requirements for road and public space lighting for new developments.

The replacement LED lights emit less blue and shorter wavelength light pollution, ensuring the environment remains unique and natural, and keeps the streets safe and convenient for residents to navigate at night.

To further enhance, protect, and celebrate Clayton Bay's natural skies, Alexandrina Council is working with the Clayton Bay Community Association to present an information session on Monday, June 5, around the process involved in obtaining Dark Skies accreditation.

Strathalbyn teenager arrested

A Strathalbyn teenager was arrested on Friday after cannabis was found at his residence.

The occupant, a 17-year-old boy, was arrested and charged with possessing a firearm without a licence, and possessing cannabis and equipment. He was bailed to appear in Mount Barker Youth Court on June 1.

Application requirements eased for regional victims

New application rules will make it easier for victims of crime living in regional South Australia to seek much-needed compensation.

Previously when victims applied for compensation, they needed to provide copies of two forms of photo identification that have been certified by a legal practitioner of Justice of the Peace (JP).


In response to feedback from Commissioner for Victims' Rights Bronwyn Killmier and the Crown Solicitor's Office, the State Government has now updated the rules to allow police officers to certify documents, and require only one of the ID forms to be photographic.

"For those of us living in a metropolitan area, it's often easier to find a JP or a legal practitioner," Attorney-General, Kyam Maher, said.

"However, for people in regional and remote South Australia, it can be quite a challenging task.

"We firmly believe the process for applying for compensation should be as simple as possible, sparing victims any further or unnecessary stress or trauma.

"These changes will make it far easier for people in regional areas to carry out this task."



Alarming jump in red light offences

New data has revealed the number of South Australian drivers caught running red lights at pedestrian crossings has risen by almost 25 per cent in the past four years.

According to SA Police data, 4636 offences were recorded for disobeying redlight signals at pedestrian crossings last year – up an alarming 24.3 per cent from 3729 in 2019.

RAA Senior Manager Safety and Infrastructure Charles Mountain said the data showed many drivers failed to show due care around the state's most vulnerable road users.

"Pedestrian crossings are designed to provide a safe location for crossing the road, and it's alarming to see the number of drivers disobeying the signals is increasing," he said.

"These mid-block crossings are put near schools for a good reason, and it is essential drivers obey the red-light signals to avoid potentially catastrophic consequences."

It was also revealed fixed camera fines cost South Australian motorists a total \$2,795,978 last year.

To promote national road safety, RAA placed five-metre-tall, colourful, inflatable elephants around metropolitan and regional SA last week to represent the 'Fatal Five' - distraction, speed, dangerous road users, failing to wear a seatbelt or child restraint, and driving under the influence of drugs

"Many of these red-light offences may be due to inattention or distraction, which is one of the 'Fatal Five' causes of road trauma in South Australia," Mr Mountain said.

"(During) National Road Safety Week, RAA raised awareness of the 'Fatal Five', and asked all road users to consider their behaviour on the road amid our alarming fatality and serious injury numbers this year."

Checks revealed the driver, a 45-year-old Murray Bridge man, was disqualified from driving.

He will be summonsed to attend Murray Bridge Magistrates Court at a later date.

Water heater catches fire at Strathalbyn home

A smoke detector has saved a Strathalbyn family's life after a fire spread through their home in the early hours of last Friday morning.

Just after 3.30am, Strathalbyn Country Fire Service (CFS) crews were called to Albion Drive after a fire started alongside a water heater, then spread to the building's ceiling and verandah.

A working smoke alarm from inside the house woke the family, who quickly evacuated the building and extinguished the blaze with a

CFS crews used a thermal imaging camera to look for concealed hot spots, and a Multi-RAE to ensure the smoke had cleared enough for the family to collect their belongings.

Mount Barker man jailed

A Mount Barker man who allegedly abused two children while working as a Christian youth group leader in the early 1990s has been jailed three decades later.

Andrew Buitenhuis, aged 59, allegedly sexually assaulted two nine-year-old children while playing games like 'sardines' and 'capture the flag' at night during the time he volunteered at a youth group attached to a Fullarton-based

Christian church in the early 1990s. However, Buitenhuis wasn't arrested until decades later and charged with two counts of maintaining an unlawful sexual relationship with a child.

He fronted District Court on Monday for sentencing, receiving a 10-year imprisonment sentence, with a mandatory non-parole period of eight years due to his stature as a serious repeat offender.

With time already served, Buitenhuis - who maintains his innocence - will be eligible for parole in March 2031.

Local towns tarnished by grafitti

An increase in graffiti incidents across the region has Hills Fleurieu Police on high alert.

The latest incident, which occurred on Monday, May 15, saw the Glendale Grove skate park marked with grafitti tags.

Previous damage was also reported in April at a Goolwa toilet block, and at a Gardiner Street school in February.

It follows a similar incident at Strathalbyn, where a local cafe's bathroom was targeted.

Photographs of the markings and video footage have been delivered to police.

Officer in Charge of Hills Fleurieu Police Inspector Michael Sampson asked residents to contact police about any suspicious activity

"Vandalism sends the message our community is uncared for and unsafe, which couldn't be further from the truth," he said.

Two men arrested at Mt Barker

Two men were arrested at Mount Barker on Friday after being caught stealing copper piping.

Just after 10.30pm on May 19, police were called to Skipper Street following reports a man was acting suspiciously around a house.

When police arrived and searched the area, they found two men in the rear yard of a property who were in the process of stealing copper piping.

A 46-year-old Mount Barker man and 49-year-old Murray Bridge man were arrested and charged with being unlawfully on premises, theft, and going equipped to commit an offence.

They were bailed to appear in Mount Barker Magistrates Court on June 28.

Goolwa North housing questions

I read with interest the front-page story in *The Southern Argus* May 11, 2023 which refers to a development of 2500 homes at Goolwa.

Of particular interest was the State Minister for Housing and Urban Development saying that "they" are fast tracking this.

I assumed from this statement that a plan was in place to show how this development would work so I visited Alexandrina Council in Goolwa to view the plan, or to at least get an overview.

There is no plan that council could show me. It does not exist. It has not yet been drawn up... and I find this disturbing given that *The Southern Argus* article states that building could commence as early as 2025.

Goolwa's current population is some 7617. An additional 2500 HOUSES with an average occupancy of 3 (and I think that is a fair estimate) means an additional 7500 people moving into Goolwa, effectively doubling its population in a very short period of time, and whilst I do not necessarily oppose development, I believe it should be sustainable and planned in a holistic sense, and I do not mean architects drawings of narrow streets and very small parks, but a societal plan of where these incoming 7500 people are going to find work and where the services they will need are going to come from and be located.

This societal, holistic planning is needed because current services struggle now to provide for the existing population, so it is the very clear responsibility of our elected leaders from all levels of government to be upfront and honest with us about this "fast-tracked" development and how it will impact on Goolwa residents.

So, I have a few questions for our elected leaders:

Where are the 7500 people coming from and is this part of the "Big Australia" immigration policy championed by the current Federal and State ALP Govts?

What additional services are going to be fully funded and provided by each level of govt to cater for these people and when will construction of these services start?

Where will the staff for these services come from?

What is the plan for a total upgrade of roads in the region because 7500 additional people will mean some extra 5000 cars a day on our roads, which are now hopelessly degraded and in need of major works.

Where is the extra parking going to be provided in our towns? Heavy transport will also increase as this region is solely supplied by road transport... what provision is being made for this increase?

Where is the plan to upgrade our health services and when will the construction of the new Goolwa Hospital start?

This will be needed to cater for a town of 15,000 people. South Coast Hospital can't cope now, so no point in looking at that.

When will construction of new schools start and where will these be located?

What shopping centre complexes are planned and where will they be built?

Please provide details (including funding if Govt jobs) of where these new 7500 people are going to find work?

If this increase in population is going to commute to Adelaide for work then please provide costed details of Goolwa > Mt Compass Road upgrade to dual lanes, including how many magnificent, century old, gum trees will have to be cut down, and when does this work start?

Please provide costed details of the expanded police service that will be required.

Is an airport upgrade to allow for commercial flights planned and can we see that funded plan please, size of aircraft allowed eg: jets etc.

Federal, State and Local Governments are elected by their constituents to serve, and in case they have forgotten, allow me to remind them that we do this by a democratic process called an election.

Once elected we expect our elected representatives to serve our best interests and to be upfront and honest with us, not dictatorial and secretive.

Ladies and gentlemen, you have a short time before your next election... get busy.

Balancing act

Hills/Fleurieu residents are being encouraged to have a say on how their rates are spent by giving feedback on local councils' proposed annual budget and business plans.

Alexandrina councillors opened the 2023-24 draft budget – inclusive of a 7.2 per cent average rate rise – on Monday night to public consultation.

Mount Barker District Council last week released its draft business plan and budget, proposing a 5.6 per cent rate increase.

As discussed in the Alexandrina council chamber, there's no argument the community continues to face hardship as interest rates continue to rise and cost of living soars.

Each year, budget time presents a balancing act as community needs are weighed up against council's available income.

Alexandrina CEO Nigel Morris was tasked with the job to turnaround a deficit budget to the first surplus in years – but at what cost?

As many elected members consider the repercussions a 7.2 per cent average rate increase may have on those already doing it tough, the reality is services must be cut to lower the projected figure, or to move into a deficit.

According to the Local Government Association, SA councils receive the lowest level of grants and subsidies per head in the country and have for the past 10 years consistently operated with the lowest total revenue per head of any Australian state.

High inflation also continues to put pressure on the cost of goods and services, including road and construction materials.

Sacrifices in both local council budgets will be unavoidable this time around.

It is up to local communities to determine what makes the cut and what is shelved, while councils are still expected to keep streets clean, maintain parks and playgrounds, provide library services and sporting facilities, run community centres and collect rubbish – just to name a few.

Works tee-d up for **Murray Bridge golf** course expansion

Works on Murray Bridge Golf Club's \$2 million upgrade are well under way to transforming the facility into a par 71 championship course.

The current 18-hole golf course is set to expand into the neighbouring residential development at the old Murray Bridge Racing Club, with two new fairways being prepared as part of the Newbridge housing development next to the existing course.

The \$50 million Newbridge development by Burke Urban will feature fairway-lined housing, and up to 350 new residential allotments.

The recent River Murray floods delayed works on the two new holes – which were set to be ready for action in winter – but the project is now back on track and estimated to be completed by the end of June.

Rural City of Murray Bridge is preparing a short-term lease with Murray Bridge Golf Club to allow the current course to continue operating, as well as the expansion once completed.

THURSDAY, MAY 21ST, 1998

Alexandrina Mayor Kym McHugh officially opened the new Clayton Bay jetty on Saturday last at noon before a large crowd. The Clayton jetty built through funding from the State government's Boating Facilities Advisory Committee on a one for one basis with the Alexandrina Council has cost some \$46,000. It was designed by well known architect and wooden boat builder, Chris Crabtree and built by Chips Barclay and Allen Edwards of the Goolwa Šlipway, it will serve for many years.

The Goolwa District Ratepayer and Residents Association, was pleased to have Dr. Bryan Pearce, Senior Inland Fisheries Scientist speak at their April meeting. The main subject was the proposal to install computer operated gates at the barrages to allow estuarine fish access to the fresh water, which in turn offered the prospect of more indigenous fish in the Murray and Lakes and reduction of the introduced species and thereby an improvement in water quality, a boost for the commercial and recreational fishermen, and with the latter, a probable boost for the local tourist industry.

50 YEARS AGO

THURSDAY, MAY 24TH, 1973

Mr. Keith Veenstra, building the Murray River Queen on Hindmarsh Island, hopes to launch her by the end of June and tow her back to Goolwa where he will complete the top side and fit her out. The hull is 5/16 steel plate, 160 feet long, with a beam of 38 feet and will weigh when complete about 650 tons, and in twin self contained cabins will accommodate 72 passengers and a crew of 17.

On Sunday last a record number of members of the Vintage and Sporting Car Clubs paid an official visit to Strathalbyn. LOW YOUR HEART: standing up for a cause

An Albury man attempting a Guinness world record on a stand-up paddle board will end an incredible awareness-raising 2800km journey at Goolwa next weekend.

Weather permitting, professional photographer and author Peter Charlesworth is expected to arrive at Goolwa beach next Sunday, June 4, following a three-month expedition.

Beginning on March 4, the father of two has paddled the length of the Murray River as well as lakes Hume, Mulwala and (currently) Alexandrina.

Mr Charlesworth named his paddleboard "Karina" after the paramedic who kept him alive during an ambulance transfer from Albury to Melbourne in June 2020.

He is proudly fundraising for The Heart Foundation; dedicated to fighting the single biggest killer of Australians - heart disease after having emergency triple bypass surgery at 47 years old.

"My personal experience has shown that we all need to be aware of our state of cardiac health in advance of having a significant or catastrophic cardiac event such as a heart attack or stroke," he said.

"Many of us live for decades as these

conditions progress with us unaware, or unprepared to face facts and take sound corrective action.

"There are a number of things we can all do to prevent, avoid or treat many of these issues before they progress to become life threatening.

"The four foundational areas of rest, low stress, nutrition and exercise are vital in tuning our bodies to function better."

Mr Charlesworth will hopefully accumulate enough distance to break the existing 2643.3km ultradistance world record.

At time of print, Mr Charlesworth had already raised almost \$6000 and countless awareness of the disease across regional communities.

Averaging 42 kilometres a day solo, with no support crew, he hoped to show that "life can still be incredible" after a significant cardiac event.

"If you have a history of heart disease in your family, you MUST be tested regularly," Mr Charlesworth added.

"If you do not get enough support from a healthcare professional, seek alternate opinions and advocate for yourself."


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



St. John's Anglican Church's almost 100-year history in the Langhorne Creek community will be reflected upon during its final service on Saturday.

The historic church was recently sold after ceasing services almost 18 months ago due to low-attendance.

The church is enriched with community history, after a committee in 1913 decided to search for a suitable site to build a local Anglican Church.

A great effort was undertaken by local parishioners not only to raise funds for the purchase of land, but also to construct the church.

After securing the land in 1914, more funds were raised from fairs and dances along with generous donations from local families, enabling the construction of the church, which was opened in 1929.

The last member of the church, Marlene Potts, will speak about her connection to the church on Saturday, with her family involved since its beginning.

Strathalbyn private dams pose flood risk

An official review has revealed more last winter's extensive rains. than 10 Strathalbyn and three Paris Creek private dams pose a potential flood risk among those now calling on the State to nearby residents.

Following a partial levee collapse that threatened Echunga households in September last year, the Department for Environment and Water inspected almost 6300 dams or watering holes, finding if 460 of them failed – including 31 in the Angas River catchment zone – they posed a potential flood risk to local communities due to their location.

In the Angas catchment zone, 11 at-risk private dams were from Strathalbyn, 11 from Green Hills Range, three from Paris Creek, and six from Flaxley.

The findings have caused concern for community leaders about the potential costs for farmers and property owners for improving dams that were filled during

Member for Kavel Dan Cregan is Government to work with the community to safeguard local dams by providing funding and support.

"Private dams offer vital stock and fire water during summer," he said.

"My strong message to government agencies is they should not take a punitive

"Agencies need to work with land owners who may not have the resources for expensive engineering assessments

"This is an issue we have raised with the Deputy Premier, and I am hopeful additional funds will hit the ground."

2023-24 FEDERAL GET WRAP

In a challenging economic climate Australian **Treasurer Jim Chalmers** handed down the 2023-24 Federal Budget.

A number of proposals aimed at helping with the cost of living, including energy bill rebates, out-of-pocket health costs and more money for jobseekers and renters were announced.

Read on for a round-up on how some of these proposals might affect your financial future.

Increasing income support payments

Proposed effective date (PED): 20/9/2023

The Government will increase working age and student payments by \$40 per fortnight. This includes:

A single person (<60) receiving a typical total rate of JSP of \$701.90 per fortnight will start to receive approximately \$733.10.

Also, JSP recipients aged 55 and over (currently 60 years) who have been on payment for 9 continuous months will receive the higher maximum rate of approximately \$785.20. This reflects increased difficulties people in this age range have in securing re-employment.

Increasing help for renters

PED: 20/9/2023

The maximum Rent Assistance (RA) rate will increase by 15%. This means a single person with no dependent children currently receiving the maximum RA payment of \$157.20 per fortnight will start to receive \$180.80, as well as their income support payment.

Expanding Parenting Payment (single) access

PED: 20/9/2023

Eligible single parents will receive the Parenting Payment (single) until their youngest child turns 14, up from 8 years

It will make these single parents \$176.90 per fortnight better off rather than transferring to the JobSeeker Payment.

Reducing energy bills

Starting 2023-24 for two years Eligible households will receive a rebate of \$500 per year, eligible small businesses \$650 per year on their power bills.

Reducing health costs

Provided over 5 years from 2022-23 The Government will invest \$3.5 billion over five years to triple the bulk billing incentive for GP consultations for children under 16 and Commonwealth concession card holders; supporting 11.6 million eligible Australians to access a doctor with no out-of-pocket costs.

Introducing payday super

PED: 1/7/2026

Employers will need to make super contributions on the same day they pay their employees' salary and wages. Currently contributions are made to super once a quarter.

The Government estimates this would increase the retirement savings of a 25-year-old median wage earner by \$6000; particularly benefitting lower paid workers or casual/insecure workers.

Reforming aged care

2022-23 and over the next 5 years The Government is providing extra funding to:

- Increase the pay of many aged care workers by 15%.
- Provide an extra 9500 Home Care packages.
 - Continue COVID-19 measures.
 - Strengthen regulation.
- Postpone the new 'Support at home Program' and extend grant arrangements for the 'Commonwealth Home support Programme' for a further 12 months.

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Expanding the Home Guarantee Scheme

PED: 1/7/2023

Siblings, friends and other family members will be able to use the Government's first home buyer programs legislation passes through parliament. together to boost participation. The Legislation passed by the Australian expanded eligibility will allow any 2 eligible people to be joint applicants for is formally accepted by the Governora guarantee.

This includes the First Home Guarantee, the Regional First Home Guarantee and the Family Home Guarantee.

Small Business - \$20,000 instant asset write-off

PED: 1/7/2023

Tax breaks for small business to writeoff assets on multiple assets.

"I have written to the Premier and Gillon McLachlan at the AFL, and asked them to consider Murray Bridge and Strathalbyn as potential venues for Gather Round over the next three years," he said.

"Both locations are convenient, as they are only an hour's drive from the

city.

"They are also close to some of the state's most iconic tourist attractions such as Monarto Safari Park, The Bend Motorsport Park, and Langhorne Creek wine region."

As part of the 2018 JLT Community pre-season competition, Strathalbyn Oval played host to a trial match between Adelaide Crows and Fremantle, which attracted a crowd of more than 6000 keen spectators.



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Season change sparks warnings

Overloaded power boards are one of the most common fire safety issues in the local region over winter, with many local residents plugging in heaters and electric blankets to warm up their homes.

"Before they know it, they've overloaded the power board," Strathalbyn Country Fire Service (CFS) Lieutenant Andrew Wardle

"The electricity going through the cable becomes quite hot to touch and eventually the plastic melts and catches on fire... (or) whatever is sitting on the cable can catch on fire - you can build up quite a lot of heat there."

Mr Wardle also recommends residents clean out electrical filters, such as in tumble

Another major issue during colder months is blocked or partially-blocked chimneys.

"Chimneys are one of the biggest ones because going from summer into winter they don't check their chimneys," Strathalbyn CFS Captain Brenton Scott said.

"It only takes a partial block to restrict the flow of the smoke and you've got an issue," Mr Wardle added.

Residents are recommended to clean out their fireplaces and chimneys, including soot which can catch alight and often builds up in the chimney flue or damper plate.

The CFS members saw the result of a blocked chimney when called to a local house about a month ago.

'We had a house full of smoke," Mr Wardle said.



"We had to ventilate it and the interior was at a toxic level - our air quality tester showed that it was not fit for breathing.

'We had to send in crews with breathing apparatus to open every single window, every single door."

Hydraulic ventilation was undertaken, where water was squirted from inside to out, which draws inside air and pushes it out, while ventilation fans were also sourced from Mount Barker to assist.

While regular rain can deter residents

from hanging out their washing or cooking outside, Mr Wardle recommends taking caution when moving inside, such as drying out clothes in front of a fire.

"Whilst it seems like a good idea when the clothes are damp when you first put them there, after a while they dry out and they've lost their moisture, so that makes them more combustible," he said.

"Don't use any gas appliances inside – people have been tempted to use a Webber barbecue or an external patio heater inside the house, but what that does is use up all the available oxygen and before they know it, people suffocated.

"I (also) encourage people to use dry wood not wood with any significant moisture content."


Mr Wardle added before and after winter is a good time to clear-out leaves and gutters before summer.











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

"It's very different, but I think Australia is better.

"When we compare with France, the (school) days are very short and teachers are nice."

Host families will be required to provide students with a safe, supportive and

welcoming home environment, a clean and appropriately furnished bedroom, food, access to study, kitchen, bathroom and laundry facilities, and will be responsible for their care.

Families will be reimbursed for their participation, and given ongoing support throughout the experience.





It was ten goals for the term when Simounds kicked his tenth for the day before, in the last minute of play, the Magpies' Heintze was able to take a strong pack mark to convert.


The siren ended their pain for the day, leaving the Roosters well clear and hopefully back to playing their best football from now on in their quest to play finals football.





"We provide excellent greens which attract people to play on."




"What we're emphasising to kids at high school is, there is a lot of opportunity for young people to play bowls at a very high level - state, national or even international," Doyle







Creek 'shaka up' for mental health

It's a pandemic that's prevalent in communities now more than ever, and one the Langhorne Creek Football Club spreads awareness for each year through community education to coincide with the league's Mental Health Breakthrough Community Round and its own Cooney Cup, which the Senior Colts play for against Strathalbyn, in honour of and with support of Jarrad Cooney's family.

Previously, the club held an 'Are you Bogged Mate?' presentation with Mary O'Brien, targeted at helping country men start discussions around mental health and suicide, while also giving them the tools to support each other through feelings of depression and embarrassment.

This year, with the help of a \$2000 Alexandrina Council grant, the club has partnered with The Shaka Project to deliver an hour-long workshop designed to ignite conversations around mental health, and encourage connection, mateship and brotherhood through the 'shaka'.

"It's easy just to do the round and that be it, but rather than just putting on the armband and saying 'this is for mental health', we wanted to dig deeper than that," LCFC Co-President, Jessica Chandler, said.

"(The Shaka Project) was always in the back of my mind, but then I connected the two and I was like 'these guys are a big thing and I think it could be amazing'.

"I know it's going to be tricky for boys to get interactive when you're talking about feelings, but I've seen some stuff (Sean Weir) has done and he's amazing, so I think it's going to be a relatable way to talk about it.

"We've seen the impact lately of some events both in Strath and Creek, so I think it's very significant and something that needs to be addressed more frequently."

The event will particularly hit close to home for Strathalbyn and Langhorne Creek communities, which have been impacted 'far too many

times' by suicide.

As a club that prides itself on being a place where friends call each other family, Chandler said it's important members stick together both physically and mentally moving forward.

"As the Executive and President, you feel a sense of protection and care for everyone involved in the club," she said.

"When you come here, it's like your second home – it's just a big family club – so when you hear news something has happened, your heart breaks, and you can't help but think of the worst and it's one of your players or someone you know.

"I think we're in a powerful position as a club, with the platform we have, that we can do more, and if there is an opportunity, we're going to do that.

"It's like a game of footy – you're going to be there if (your teammates) get knocked down, if there's a bump, you're going to pick them up, and if they get tackled, you're the first one to grab their hand, so why should mental health be any different?"

Everyone is welcome to attend the workshop at the club from 6pm on Wednesday, June 28.

Even if people aren't struggling themselves, Chandler said it's a good opportunity to learn how to support others.

"If we're not struggling personally, it's about identifying those signs we can see in someone else, and at least know the steps how to support them moving forward," she said.

"I personally don't know what to do if someone came up to me saying they were struggling, so I think it would be just very informative for us to help others

"We'll definitely keep supporting this kind of event moving forward because I think it has no discrimination and obviously, we can tell it's not slowing down.

"It's a pandemic that's going to keep going unfortunately, so the more times we can have that conversation, the better."



Not everything is crystal clear in bidding, and this hand highlights the need to read between the lines to decipher what the bidders are really saying.

This comes about because of the limited choice of legal bids, there are only 35 permissible bids plus Pass, Double and Redouble.

To all of that players will add their own vision to overcome the foggy haze of other people's bidding.

In the hand above, North opens 2 Hearts, which most players will recognise as a Weak Two, 6-card suit, less than normal opening points.

Instead of Doubling, a fainthearted East timidly passed after confirming with South that the bid was in fact a Weak Two.

South, not one to be faint hearted, realised that E/W had the balance of the points, so bid 4 Hearts pre-emptively, and East/ West had no opportunity to win the fair maiden, a Game in Clubs.

What East should have done, especially after the inquiry, is Double.

It is the ideal time, having opening points and a shortage in the suit opened with a Weak Two.

After South's pre-emptive jump to 4H, it would have been West's turn to be brave.

A Weak Two followed by partner's Double, and an obvious obstruction from South, reading between the lines leads to the conclusion that 5 Clubs should be a safe contract.

Perhaps that does take a bit of courage, but the information is all there for the reading.

These days we hear about FOMO, fear of missing out, and on the night this was played, that is what 5 out of 7 E/W pairs did, allowing N/S to play in Hearts, mostly making 8 tricks.

Only one E/W found a Club Contract, settling in 4, but why not go for the Game? Faint heart never won fair maiden!
