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Petition calls for restrictions on explicit publications

A growing concern for children's access to sexually explicit content in the state's public libraries and school resource centres has prompted the launch of petition calling for publications of this nature to only be borrowable by request and removed from open display, which can now be signed at the Strathalbyn Churches Book Shop.

The petition was started by Adelaide mother Angela Rojas, who has been working since February to challenge sexually explicit books for children in public libraries.

It asks the government to make all sexually explicit publications be available to borrow only by request, and in the case of minors, with an adult present, to place such content in a restricted area, to remove explicit content from library catalogues, and to audit public libraries and school resource centres for 'submittable publications'.

The aim is to reach 10,000 signatures before it is tabled in State Parliament, and

to help her get across the line, local resident Ruth Zaharuiko has provided a copy to the local book shop.

As a step-mother, she had concerns

about the impacts explicit content had on children.

“I think it’s a good cause that this Adelaide mum has highlighted,” Mrs Zaharuiko said.

“I think it’s really just about protecting the innocence of our children.

“I have seen books in the library which I’m not happy being in the open for children to see.

“What I’m thinking about is what is available to our children and, therefore, what are they filling their minds with and is that beneficial for society, and I don’t think it is.

“(It) is a different world we’re in nowadays with the access of a lot of things on the internet, so I recognise it is happening through other mediums and there are other fights going on to try and legislate around that, but in terms of the print literature, something seen can’t be unseen, so I think it is important the adults of our society are conscious and being responsible for what our children are consuming.”

The petition will be available for residents to sign at the book shop for the next week.

Community responds to Alexandrina Council draft budget

Leading the conversation at preliminary budget talks in Strathalbyn last Tuesday was the proposed town dog park, with many wanting to know its progress, while others raised concerns about staffing levels and asset renewal costs.

As previously reported in *The Southern Argus*, Alexandrina councillors opened to public consultation the 2024-25 draft Annual Business Plan and Budget inclusive of an 8.3 per cent rate rise, plus 1.3 from new developments and property improvements, at a special meeting in April.

As part of the consultation process, council scheduled three budget roadshow sessions for the three wards, starting with the South Ward on May 13 at the Goolwa Council Chambers, and ending with the West Ward on May 27 at Mount Compass Memorial Hall.

It was the North Ward's turn last Tuesday night, with about 30 people filing into Strathalbyn's St Andrew's Church Hall to hear council staff discuss the proposed plan and budget, and provide their feedback and ask questions on its contents.

The proposed Strathalbyn dog park was the main topic on residents' minds, with some in attendance questioning the delay on the project, and when the town can expect

one to be established and where.

Others raised concern about the increased staffing levels and their subsequent costs, along with asset renewal and waste management costs, and services planned to accommodate the influx of new houses.

Alexandrina Mayor Keith Parkes told *The Argus* these, along with sharing of services with other councils, had been commonly raised by other residents during budget consultation.

He recognised people's concerns but noted council's expenses had also increased.

"I respect people are not happy about 8.3 per cent, but they've been very respectful about the way they've been expressing their opinions and what they would like to see," Mayor Parkes said.

"Our biggest problem is asset depreciation, and of course, that was revalued based on what they would cost, and that's what they cost to replace today.

"Of course, three years ago, before COVID, it wouldn't have cost anywhere near that.

"Just like everybody's cost of everything in their house and daily things they buy have gone up, everything council does and buys has gone up, but we have a different bag of groceries and the stuff we've got is more effected than the daily purchases of households.

"We're doing everything we can to listen to the community – we understand the message – and look at ways we can come back to the community with a lower rate increase than 8.3."

Overall, the community has welcomed the roadshows once again.



North Ward councillors Sue Miller, Craig Maidment and Christie Thornton were in attendance at the budget roadshow in Strathalbyn to listen to the community's concerns.

Mayor Parkes found the roadshows informative for planning council's next steps.

"We want to make our decision-making process accessible to residents, so we have organised three public sessions in different locations across our council – one during business hours and two after hours," he said.

"The roadshows have been an opportunity to talk about that plan and how we are looking at asset disposals, revenue raising opportunities, and reducing capital and operational expenditure by reviewing our service levels.

"We will also take onboard any feedback from the Essential Services Commission of South Australia (ESCOSA) report, which is

happening this year.

"What we need from our community is feedback on the draft Annual Business Plan and Budget and draft Long-Term Financial Plan."

Community members can still provide feedback before 5pm on Monday by completing a survey via MySay or mail, or emailing council at (alex@alexandrina.sa.gov.au).

Mayor Parkes said council has started making reductions, but hoped the community would provide better information on what cutbacks it would like to see.

"We've done a lot of things to try and cut back and save money, and we are starting to do a lot more things in-house rather than use contractors, which works out cheaper for us," he said.

"If someone in the organisation leaves, we're not replacing anybody immediately, we're just looking at how we can fill that role, but we've still got to be able to go out there and provide the services to the community that they expect.

"So, hopefully, we'll get some messaging out of this roadshow... because there's quite a few things we're asking them... 'do you want them done?', and we're hoping they're going to come back and tell us 'no, we don't want them done'.

"We'd particularly like your feedback on the funded and unfunded operating initiatives – what you would like to keep in the budget and what you'd like removed – and if you would support an additional 1.25 per cent rate rise to deliver the Township Greening Strategy and Action Plan."

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New Catholic school proposed for Strathalbyn

The community has welcomed the announcement of a new \$30 million school planned for Strathalbyn, marking the first Catholic school in the Alexandrina region.

The new primary school – expected to open in 2029 – will be a campus of St Francis de Sales College and will cater for students in reception to year 6, with the possibility of expansion to year 9, depending on enrolment demand.

Students will then have a guaranteed pathway to the Mount Barker campus for their senior school years.

Located in Hickinbotham's Aurora on the edge of the town centre off Sandergrove Road, plans for the first stage of the eight-hectare campus, subject to council approval, include contemporary learning spaces, sports facilities and an oval.

The school is in partnership with home builder, the Hickinbotham Group and aims to support existing families and new home buyers in the fast-growing region.

Strathalbyn's population is forecast to grow by about 1800 people over the next seven to 10 years, with nearly 800 new homes planned across several developments.

These include 300 new homes to be established at Aurora.

Some Strathalbyn students are currently

transferred to St Francis de Sales College's Mount Barker campus on two daily buses.

Currently, 70 students live in Strathalbyn and a further 36 located in nearby towns such as Wistow, Highland Valley, Bletchley, Hartley, Langhorne Creek, Paris Creek, Red Creek, Sandergrove, and Willyaroo.

The school has had more than 30 per cent growth in recent years, from about 695 students in 2020 to 980 students with the mid year reception intake.

"In the last five years, we have opened our (Early Learning Centre) and new primary school facilities to meet growing demand," St Francis de Sales College Principal, Andrew Baker, said.

"We're committed to providing the same educational excellence and quality learning opportunities in Strathalbyn."

North Ward Councillor Sue Miller, who was previously the Chair of Eastern Fleurieu School Governing Council, welcomed the move as it would give local families more options.

"People make choices about where they send their children for lots of different reasons," she said.

"I know quite a few families who, for various reasons, have one child at a public school, and another child at another school, such as St Francis in Mount Barker.

"They do that because that's where their children are thriving.

"I just think it's so wonderful that those families will now be able to have their

children going to school in the same town for logistic reasons, but also for community sport and after-school activities."

Cr Miller said it could also attract new families, services and infrastructure in the town.

North Ward Councillor Craig Maidment believed it would be a "great opportunity" for teachers making a start in their careers.

"There are a lot of people who (currently) travel out of town to work, so they might be able to get a job in Strath," he said.

"Some people might decide that they want to stay in town to live and play and work – it's about the quality of life."

Cr Maidment also appreciated that the school would be located away from the others to prevent concentrated area of drop-offs and pick-ups.

Alexandrina Mayor Keith Parkes said schools are an "important infrastructure component" to growing areas, and the new school would offer "education and recreation opportunities".

Catholic Education SA Executive Director Neil McGoran said Catholic schools offer the opportunity to be "thriving, capable" leaders.

"St Francis de Sales College has a strong reputation in the local community and this new school will enable us to work in partnership with families from Strathalbyn and the surrounding areas to provide their children with an excellent Catholic education," he said.

Hickinbotham Group Managing Director Michael Hickinbotham said Aurora will include a \$2 million playground, which will support learning through playing.

"South Australians want well-planned and sustainable neighbourhoods that are welcoming, safe and secure for their families and will provide high-quality and supportive education for their children," he said.

"Families living in Aurora will be part of a vibrant community in which children can walk to and from school.

"We look forward to continuing our partnership with CESA to establish St Francis de Sales College as part of our wonderful new community at Strathalbyn."

STRATHALBYN 185 YEARS - TIMELINE

1980^s

- In 1981 the district experienced the biggest flood since 1941 after a week of rain. Paris Creek into Middle Creek flooded due to breaks in two large dams, while the Angas flooded due to breaks in three large dams. The Children's Bridge was almost covered and the bank of the Angas sustained the worst damage ever seen.
- The renovated primary school on Colman Terrace became the council chambers and was officially opened in 1981.
- Strathalbyn and District Concert Band was formed in 1981.
- Local branch of Men of the Trees was formed by Betty Westwood in 1981.
- The soccer club started in 1981.
- Severe drought wrecked farmers in 1982.
- The former council building was given to the CFS as district headquarters in 1982.
- The Commonwealth Bank building opened in 1982, while the other three banks were renovated and opened out to make more offices.
- The last service was held at the Methodist Church in 1982.
- St Andrews Church was restored and reopened in December 1982.
- The community gymnasium and indoor sports centre was opened in June 1982.
- A council-owned caravan park was established on part of the showgrounds in 1983.
- In February 1983, Ash Wednesday deadly wildfires were experienced across the Hills from McLaren Flat. Strathalbyn was in its path but the town was saved by a southerly wind change.
- Kalimna Hostel for Aged opened on High Street in 1983.
- The first Penny Farthing Challenge was held in Strathalbyn in 1984.
- In 1984 official trains stopped.
- The Probus Club was formed in 1984.
- In 1985 the Governor Sir Donald Dustan visited town and opened the new community library.
- An honour board was unveiled in the town hall in 1985 in recognition of the war service by local veterans of the Korean and Vietnam Wars.
- The new community library was opened at the high school in 1985.
- In 1986 the government bought 'crouton park' near Ashbourne and opened it as a drug rehabilitation centre.
- Valerie Ball became the first woman councillor and first woman Mayor in 1987.
- In November 1987 a bomb exploded in the post office but caused little damage and no reason was ever found.
- In February 1988 a crowd lined the streets as Prince Charles and the Princess of Wales drove quickly through Strathalbyn on their way from Goolwa.
- In December 1988 the nursing home was opened by Dr and Mrs Fairley.
- The Rotary Club started its annual Duck Race in November 1988.
- The Advance Strathalbyn Association was formed in 1988.
- Council set up a committee for Strathalbyn's Jubilee 150 celebrations in 1989, with Mac O'Donnell selected as town crier.
- The Caledonian Society was formed in 1989.
- Ken Knights' takeaway shop was gutted in a fire.
- Bells former store was opened as a reception centre and art gallery.

Heritage celebrated at Alexandrina Council awards

Strathalbyn's Old Angas Mill restoration was the major winner at Alexandrina Council's Heritage Awards last Thursday night, taking home not only the Mayoral Award but one for Historic Research.

Hosted by council's Heritage Advisory Committee, the awards recognise excellence in heritage conservation, research, and works undertaken within the district, with categories including Heritage Tourism, Conservation or Restoration, Adaptive Reuse, Heritage Gardens and Fencing, and Historical Research.

After having to be deferred last year due to a lack of nominations and committee delays, the event was held this year at the newly restored and re-opened Milang Butter Factory, which was attended by more than 100 members of the community and hosted by council Senior Town Planner Sarah Longden.

Alexandrina Mayor Keith Parkes opened the night by speaking on the region's rich history and acknowledging all of the nominees.

"We are fortunate enough to live in a council area with 11 towns and they've all got significant historical backgrounds, and preservation of that background is really cherished by us and the people that live in those towns," he said.

"I know people go out and restore buildings and care for them a lot, and really bring them back to their former glory, and they do it in a way which is appropriate and proper, and retains that original character.

"But they do it voluntarily out of their

own fruition... not looking for an award or recognition, they're doing it because they love doing it and respect the heritage of our region.

"I assure you this council is committed to making sure we do retain that heritage."

Long-time ABC radio presenter and South Australian arts personality Peter Goers was the night's guest speaker.

He had the room in stitches with his recounts of travels through country South Australia and stories from his childhood, and spoke largely on the importance of heritage, congratulating Alexandrina for its preservation of history.

One of the major award winners on the night was the Strathalbyn Old Angas Mill ongoing restoration project, which came away with two wins – the Mayoral Award and Historic Research – the latter of which was a close call against Port Elliot National Trust's Lorraine Pomery Project.

Constructed in 1849, the mill is a key historical building in town that was taken over by new owners Jessica and Ray Groot in 2021, who are working to restore the state heritage building to its former glory, including by doing extensive research into its past and present structures.

Mayor Parkes believed the project was the best in celebrating the heritage of the Alexandrina region, and in doing so, providing a long-lasting benefit to the community.

"In 2021, the new owners of the property felt it important to document the past and present structures and uses on the site, and the influence the building had on the township," Ms Longden explained.

"The research also included forensically mapping the building, investigating stone,

mortar and other materials and their composition, digitising the structure and its composition.

"The documentation produced includes 3D-rendering and laser point surveys both internally and externally, with the internal space modelling able to provide lasting evidence of the operation of a working flour mill.

"The research was undertaken to inform the respectful and impactful series of restoration initiatives that the owner is currently undertaking."

In an exciting win for both parties, both the Strathalbyn National Trust Museum and Heritage Centre and Middleton's Pago Luxury Treat were joint winners of the Heritage Tourism award.

Following on from their success at the recent Langhorne Creek Wine Show, Bleasdale Vineyards won in the Conservation Practice – Small-Scale Projects under

\$50,000 category, while restoration of Mary's Well at Red Creek was commended.

The workshop – built by original settler Frank Potts – is part of the State Heritage-listed complex and was constructed in 1858 using red gum, limestone rubble and bricks from the Belvidere brick work.

Its restoration has included reconstruction of damp damaged limestone, the replacement of damaged bricks with ones of a similar age from the same producer that was sought from another ruin on the Bleasdale property, and replacement of the windows and door frames as close as practically to original.

Similarly, for Conservation Practice – Large-Scale Projects over \$50,000, the night's hosts were recognised for their work into restoring the butter factory, taking home the win, while the Trafalgar House restoration on Port Elliot's The Strand received a commendation.

For the first time, council presented the Lorraine Pomery Service to Heritage dedicated to the late Port Elliot resident and awarded to a person who has had a significant contribution to the preservation and advocacy of heritage within the Alexandrina region.

Anthony Presgrave received the inaugural award for his many years with the National Trust, while Cedric Varcoe came a close second.

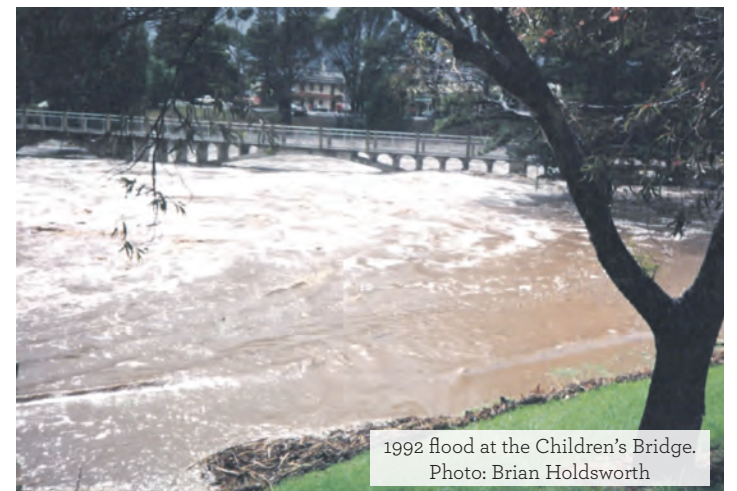
While there were no winners for Heritage Gardens and Fencing, Langhorne Creek's Melrose's Garden at Woodburn Homestead and a private Tottenham Court Road garden at Port Elliot each received a commendation.

No awards or commendations were issued for Adaptive Re-use, as the Gilbert's Motor Museum – the only nomination – had previously received a heritage award.

STRATHALBYN 185 YEARS - TIMELINE

1990^s

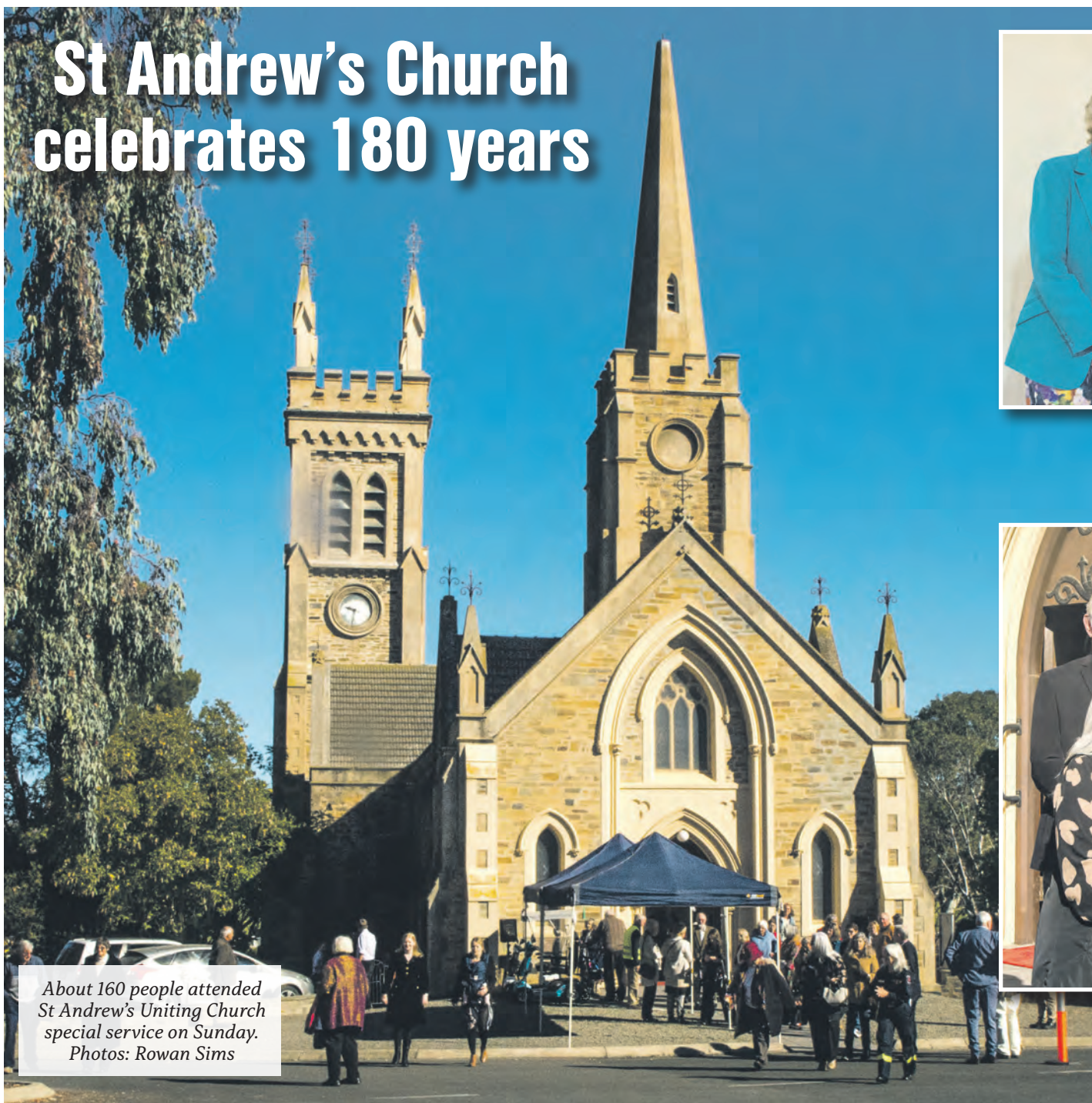
- In 1990, the local dump on Forrest Road became a recycling depot and the main rubbish dump started at Hartley.
- Penny fathering races ended in Strathalbyn in 1991.
- The Antiques and Collectors Fair started in 1991.
- Council spent a year renovating the Town Hall, including building new toilets, upgrading the entrance, redecorating the interior, and removing all old, large pictures, in 1991.
- Obstetrics services were cut at Strathalbyn Hospital in 1991.
- The football club oval lighting system was switched on by Mollie Richardson – the first female Life Member – in 1991.
- The Murraylands Christian School opened on East Terrace in 1991.
- In December 1992, huge downpours over four days caused massive flooding in Strathalbyn and surrounding districts.
- The railway station was restored in 1993.
- The Lions Club completed work on the Thomas Adams Park in 1993.
- Town gardener David Adams restored the 'Remember the Anzacs' at the memorial garden.
- A large day care centre was built on High Street in 1994, made possible by \$200,000 legacy from the estate of Reg. Sissons.
- The Angas River Catchment Group became an incorporated body in 1994.
- In 1995, Clipsal's factory was opened by Sean Brown.
- A child care centre opened on Kennedy Crescent in 1996.
- Stationmaster's Gallery was established in 1996.
- In 1996 Strathalbyn High School, middle school and primary school were united with Langhorne Creek and Milang for administrative purposes and renamed Eastern Fleurieu R-12.
- In 1997, after polls and long discussions, the ratepayers decided to join Goolwa/Port Elliot as the Alexandrina Council. The new council started in July 1997 with seven wards.
- The Polo and Recreation Grounds became home to the Adelaide Hills Dressage Club, SA Tent Pegging Association, Strathalbyn Polo Club, Strathalbyn Pony Club, and Strathalbyn Show Jumping Club in 1998.
- U3A was started by Fay Walker in 1999.

About 160 people attended St Andrew's Uniting Church on Sunday for the milestone 180th anniversary celebration of the first church building on the site in 1844.

On Sunday, guests of honour were Her Excellency, the Honourable Frances Adamson AC, Governor of South Australia, and Rod Bunten, who were introduced to others in the community.

Guests included Members of Parliament, Alexandrina Council representatives and church ministers and members.

Many members of local Uniting churches attended, which previously shared a Minister

with the St Andrew's congregation – Ashbourne, Finnis, Milang and Langhorne Creek.

As well as regular offerings to the work of the church, more than \$1100 was donated to the restoration of the building, as members continue to fundraise to protect the historic local landmark.

A Welcome to Country was given by Ngarrindjeri Elders Uncle Victor and Aunty Glenys Wilson.

Rev Philip Gardner led the service, and acknowledged the 30th anniversary of the Uniting Church in Australia's Covenant with the Uniting Aboriginal and Islander Christian Congress (UAICC).

He cited the 2009 Preamble to the Constitution of the Uniting Church in Australia that:

"The First Peoples had already encountered the Creator God before the arrival of the colonisers; the Spirit was already in the land revealing God to the people through law, custom and ceremony," it stated.

"The same love and grace that was finally and fully revealed in Jesus Christ sustained the First Peoples and gave them particular insights into God's ways."

Church Council Secretary David Bunton was pleased with the morning.

"It was an excellent service, very strong singing, a good mix of traditional and modern church music," he said.

"We've had many positive comments since, such as, 'the morning was a magnificent success and we enjoyed it very much' (and) 'I found the service quite uplifting'."

Song leaders were Meredith Green and Shirley McCabe, and music included an organ, piano and guitar.

After the service, bagpiper Caitlin Fry performed as guests walked across to the hall for refreshments and a history display.

The church was built by Scottish Presbyterians but was used by all denominations for the first few years and also served as a school during the week.

The simple rustic slab building was demolished after four years and the stone building built in 1848 is now the oldest Presbyterian church building in South Australia.

The stone church was extended in 1857, 1865 and 1869, with a clock installed in the bell tower in 1895.

The congregation has been a Uniting Church since 1977 when most Presbyterians and Congregationalists united with Methodists.

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Ewens Ponds

Snorkelling at Ewens Ponds is breathtaking in more ways than one.

Firstly, the chilly temperatures of 10 to 15C initially send a shockwave through your body, and you are under a time limit before getting too cold.

But, it's also breathtaking in seeing the spectacular world that lies beneath the surface.

The three basin-shaped spring-fed limestone ponds are about 10-metres deep and located on Eight Mile Creek, which is about 25km south of Mount Barker.

An online permit and allocated time are required before jetting off, and after parking and suiting up, the lake appears almost underwhelming from the surface.

But, once you jump in, the pristine water clarity offers ideal viewing and growing conditions for the underwater garden.

Beautiful greens and blues can be seen, from the rocks, seaweed and moss, and for some of the plants, Ewens Ponds is the only place they are found growing fully submerged in anywhere in the world.

We also spot some aquatic life, including

the nationally-endangered Glenelg Spiny Freshwater Crayfish, as well as some scuba divers swimming below.

The shallower corridors that connect the ponds have a variety of reeds and colours which can be admired while floating in the current.

The underwater world has continued to fascinate me.

So, when my friend Carina Rabong asked about joining a snorkelling crew to Mount Gambier, I jumped at the chance.

Leaving Strathalbyn after work on Friday

evening, the drive is just over 1.5 hours to Tintinara before pulling up at a motel for the night.

Plenty of worthy-stops are available along the route, including checking out the underwater lake Indawarra before continuing onto Naracoorte Caves and, of course, having a wine at one of the Coonawarra wineries along the way.

On the way home, it's much of a muchness timewise to travel along the coast, and exploring Blackfellows Caves proved worthwhile.

Mount Gambier itself has many gems to

visit, such as Blue Lake located near the main township, named for its intense turquoise colour, and with more time, I would have loved walking the 3.6km walking track around.

Port Macdonnell is the place to be for lunch, so, too, is a walk around the nearby stunning coastline to snap a photo at South Australia's most southern point.

Umpherston Sinkhole is a plant-lovers paradise, and is a perfect spot for photos.

We're home again Sunday night before work on Monday.

Perfect quick weekend getaway.

Orange day thanks local emergency service volunteers

When South Australia had a widespread power outage due to storm damage in 2016 and many trees were down, Bugle Ranges' resident Paul Bird felt motivated to contribute to the community.

"I thought I could be making better use of my time... I could be going out there and helping," he said.

It spurred his decision to join the Mount Barker State Emergency Service (SES), and last week he joined other volunteers from the unit in Wear Orange Wednesday – a national

day to recognise their service.

Member for Kavel, and Minister for Police, Emergency Services and Correctional Services Dan Cregan visited the Mount Barker volunteers to thank them for their service.

"Volunteers work tirelessly to support their communities year-round across the state, from the city to the remote outback," he said.

"Today and every day, thank you to our volunteers in orange who are ready to respond to a wide range of emergencies and help South Australians in need."

Over the past 12 months, 1700 SA SES volunteers from 67 Units across the state have responded to more than 6800 requests

for help, including rescuing people from mine shafts, road crashes and floods.

In the current financial year to date, Mount Barker volunteers have responded to 286 requests for assistance, predominantly fallen trees, compared to 470 requests in the previous year.

While the Mount Barker SES Unit has had a growth in volunteer numbers – from 29 in 2015 to currently 40 – reflecting the population influx, they are looking for more.

Volunteer Elissa Sampson finds "a lot of reasons" to volunteer, including building confidence and friendships and giving back to the community.

"It's good to learn life skills," she said.

"You can walk out with a whole toolbox of skillsets that you can use in everyday life."

Volunteer Michael Gray shared a similar mindset.

"(I find it worthwhile for the) ability to step into new challenges that the SES gives because it's a wide range of skills that we learn here and maintain," he said.

"In addition to that, it is giving back to the community."

SA SES Chief Officer Chris Beattie was "incredibly thankful" for the hard work of the "dedicated volunteers" who help prepare and protect the community for emergencies.

Fatal collision at Brinkley

A Mannum man sadly died after his vehicle collided with another at Brinkley last Wednesday.

At about 5.10pm on May 22, emergency services were called to Pfeiffer Road, near Murray Bridge, following reports a Ford ute travelling east and a Holden Commodore travelling west had collided.

Sadly, the driver of the Holden, a 19-year-old Mannum man, died at the scene.

The driver of the Ford, a 46-year-old local man, was airlifted to hospital with non-life-threatening injuries.

The young man's death is the 37th life lost on South Australian roads this year.

Horse head found in Strathalbyn causes night-mare

Strathalbyn residents were left disturbed by the discovery of a decomposed horse head on the side of the road last weekend.

Thomas Edward was parked on the side of the road, one kilometre out of town, on May 19, when he discovered the carcass out in the open.

"I saw something I never thought I would see and it was very disgusting," Mr Edward wrote on Facebook.

"Young children walk down there and was not something I wanted my kids to see."

"Also, I don't live in Strathalbyn anymore but work there a lot and noticed a lot of people dumping stuff on the outside of Strath."

A SAPOL spokesperson told *The Southern Argus* police are not investigating at this time.

SA begins hunt for Ag Town of the Year

The search to highlight South Australian Agricultural Town of the Year for 2024 has begun, with nominations now open.

Broken promises and rising costs spark outrage

Marine scale fishers across South Australia are justifiably outraged.

Promised reforms aimed at increasing the profitability of fishing businesses, ensuring sustainable fish populations, and enhancing recreational fishing opportunities have fallen woefully short.

These fishers were assured that compliance costs would decrease as the number of individual fishing businesses declined, and that red tape would be significantly reduced.

Yet, nearly three years later, the reality is starkly different.

Morale among fishers has plummeted as they grapple with escalating compliance and operational costs.

Many report being significantly worse off than before the reforms were implemented. Their voices are ignored, and their financial burdens have only increased.

Compliance costs have soared, license fees have skyrocketed, and there is a pervasive fear that future quota allocations will be cut.

In 2022, the government and the Premier announced an independent review of the cost recovery process, promising meaningful reform.

During the review process, some in the industry advocated for a Gross Value of Production (GVP)-based cost recovery model, successfully implemented in other states.

This model was supported by a 2021 government-funded review by SG Heilbron, which found the current system to be problematic, complex, and expensive to administer.

The report highlighted that the current cost recovery approach leads to disputes and inefficiencies.

Further inflaming the situation, Clare Scriven, in response to some sectors calls for cost reduction measures based on GVP, has stated that such a model is not under current consideration.

This blatant disregard for the GVP-based model has rightly angered fishers, who now demand answers regarding whether the SG Heilbron Report was seriously considered by the panel.

Regardless, whether it is through meaningful and practical changes to the current cost recovery model or by considering a model based on GVP, the government must now collaborate with the industry in an efficient yet methodical manner to ensure that the reforms genuinely address the underlying issue of the industry's economic sustainability.

What we cannot have is yet another delay, with another paper outlining what needs to be done, without actually doing anything.

Because fishers, generally patient in nature, are frustrated, and they are justified in their frustration.

The government's failure to deliver on its promises and to consider viable alternatives to ensure the financial sustainability of the sector demonstrates a clear disregard for the well-being of South Australia's marine scale fishing industry.

It is time for the government to listen to the industry, consider the evidence, and make the necessary changes to support these vital businesses.

More tough times on the way for SA families and businesses

The skyrocketing cost of electricity for South Australians will barely budge from July 1, meaning families are still \$669 out of pocket, while small businesses are paying an extra \$1257 or 31 per cent more.

Coming off the back of a massive 34 per cent increase over the previous two years, the small decrease of as little as 1.5 per cent leaves South Australian working families still being forced to pay more for their power bills than those in Sydney, Melbourne, and Brisbane.

The Australian Energy Regulator (AER) announced today that the Default Market Offer (DMO) for electricity would reduce prices by as little as \$41 for households from July 1.

The typical SA family is more than \$20,000 a year worse off as the cost-of-living crisis snowballs.

With no relief in sight, the Opposition is calling on the Labor Government to put a freeze on the Emergency Services Levy (ESL).

The former Liberal Government ended years of huge bill hikes under Labor, slashing ESL bills by more than 50 per cent, which saved South Australian households more than \$360 million over four years.

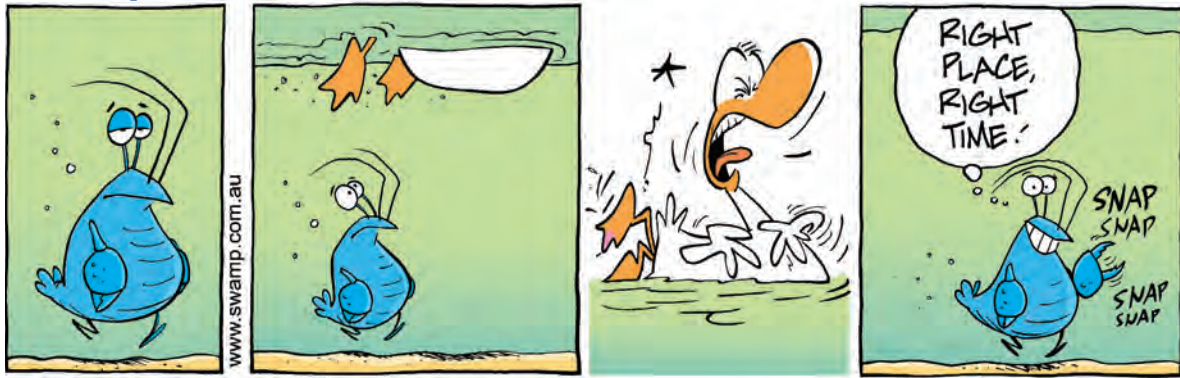

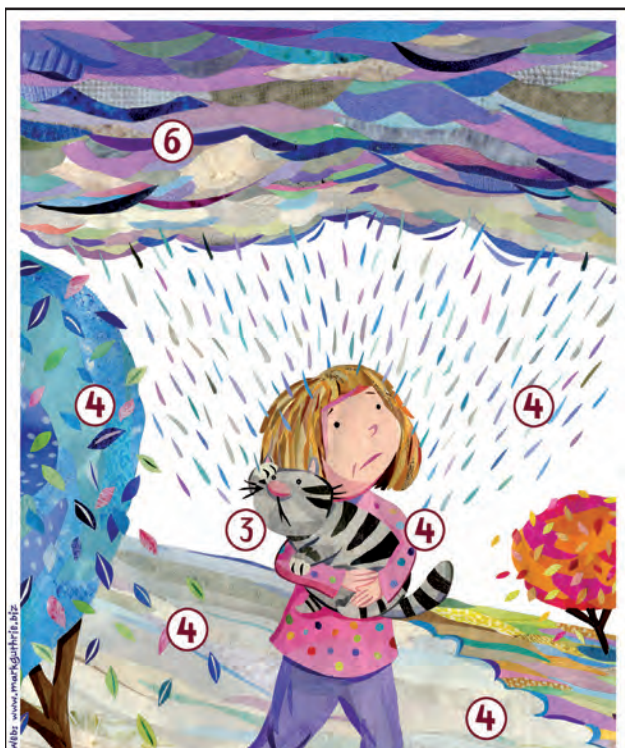

Meeting move shut down despite large attendance at Strathalbyn

A welcome reception from local residents at last Monday night's meeting in Strathalbyn failed to convince Alexandrina councillors to hold any future meetings in town or others in the region.

When Alexandrina Council formed in 1997, meetings were held twice a month, with the first scheduled for the first Monday in Goolwa, and the third Monday in Strathalbyn.

However, over time, meetings have remained in the Goolwa chamber.

For the first time in many years, Alexandrina Council held its May meeting in the St Andrew's Church Hall last Monday night in celebration of the town's 185 birthday and in acknowledgement of history month.

At the meeting, North Ward councillor Sue Miller brought back a motion to hold council meetings in other locations, including Mount Compass, Strathalbyn or Langhorne Creek, with a date and venue dependent on seeding, harvest and vintage timing, and/or other locality-based influences and events.

"Our council area covers 182,684 hectares and our community is diverse demographically and geographically," Cr Miller said.

"For electors in the outlying and northern, eastern, and western-most areas of Alexandrina Council, travel distances to attend meetings in Goolwa are further than those in the South Ward.

"The proposed locations significantly reduce the travelling time for a large number of residents in the event they are considering attending a council meeting.

"Whilst decisions regarding location and time for council meetings can be determined as required during the term of council, setting venues and dates from the outset allows the community to plan their attendance, and for council members and administration to plan agenda items pertaining to communities of interest."

More than 50 people formed the gallery to witness how a meeting is run and listen to the decisions of council, particularly in regards to the Strathalbyn dog park and swimming pool.

However, the high attendance failed to convince councillors to move meetings to other locations around the region, with Cr Miller's being knocked back due to cost and staff time.

It cost council approximately \$3000-

\$5000 to hold last Monday night's meeting.

"I think this meeting here in Strath is very significant for tonight, but I'm looking around the room and counting up the number of staff that have been involved," Deputy Mayor, Margaret Gardner, said.

"The number of hours that have gone into ensuring this is a successful night has been extraordinary and I do know that at least one of the staff has worked the entire day to bring us to a point where we can actually operate.

"While I think this is a special night, I won't be voting for any of our meetings at any other place except Goolwa unless we have a particularly special occasion which is the same as we are experiencing tonight."

West Ward councillor Bill Coomans also voted against the motion due to impracticality.

"I think the meeting tonight is certainly is worthwhile because it does coincide with a very important 185-year celebration of Strath, but to have one in (Mount) Compass I think, from a cost point of view (and) from the effort required to put it on, I would rather spend the time in our normal location in Goolwa, so we can really focus on the important matters.

"In my own town, there's a lot of people coming back from the city who have just travelled to Seaford Railway Station and travel to town for work.

"They don't get home by 5.30 and some who do want to spend just a little bit of time with their families, so time-wise 5.30 is ridiculous.

"You'll probably find that as you get to the end of our meeting, maybe seven-eight o'clock, some people may arrive and that defeats the purpose as well."

Though it was knocked back last Monday night, Cr Miller vowed to keep bringing the motion back to the chamber.

"I have been working on this since pretty much the first week I was elected," she said.

"Generally, people that are interested in Local Government are older; they don't necessarily want to watch a livestream.

"They want to see you and talk to you, they don't want to email and text you; representing them, and the only way to do that is to be present.

"I don't think this has cost as much as everyone is saying it has cost.

"This is not the end, it's just the beginning."

In the meantime, council will compile a report on the future possibilities of a council/community live streaming service that is low cost, real time and accessible to everyone at anywhere and anytime.

Locals oppose Strathalbyn dog park proposed location

Alternative locations are being sought for a proposed dog park in Strathalbyn through the development of Alexandrina Council's Recreation and Open Space Strategy after nearby residents complained the suggested location would 'disturb their peace'.

For several years, Strathalbyn and surrounds dog owners have called for a dedicated space that is safe and convenient to socialise and exercise their furry companions.

Back in 2021, Alexandrina Council initiated public consultation on the development of a proposed dedicated off-leash dog park in Strathalbyn, which, if successful, would be made possible by utilising available grant funding opportunities to contribute to its construction.

Of the 200 respondents, 95 per cent supported the development of a town dog park, while 91 per cent expressed they would utilise one exclusively for exercising their pets.

Initially the location was proposed for the corner of Langhorne Creek Road and Berry Smith Drive, but at last Monday night's council meeting, this was opposed by David and Vivien Pegler, who live nearby the site and argued a dog park in the residential would have negative impacts on neighbours.

One of their main concerns was the alleged decrease in resale value of their home.

"When we purchased our home from the real estate agent Rex Keily, the advertisement read 'Begin a new adventure - ideally located next to open space', which suited us as not having neighbours on both sides," Mrs Pegler said during her

deputation at last Monday night's meeting.

"In July, 2021 we received notification that a proposal for a dog park in Strathalbyn was open for consultation.

"We responded that we did not have an issue for a park in Strathalbyn, but that we opposed the location next to our home.

"Our concerns are the resale value of our home will be severely low from advice from a local real estate person due to who would want to live next to a dog park."

Another concern was the noise and odour from multiple dogs, which would allegedly greatly impact their ability to enjoy time outside, and potential for increased crime.

"We are probably the one per cent rejecting the proposal for the location, but we have the right to peace and quiet in our own home like everyone else," Mr Pegler said.

"Dog parks represent a cherished public amenity that serves only some of the neighbourhood and can generate problems for others.

"We do not challenge our town's right to build a dog park, we challenge their decision to disrupt the tranquillity of a neighbourhood by placing it in our backyard."

Hearing the residents' concerns, councillors agreed to consider alternative locations along with consultation feedback in the finalisation of Alexandrina's Recreation and Open Space Strategy, which includes a review of the current supply and future demand of recreation and open space facilities within the council region.

Concept design and costings have already been undertaken by a landscape architect in 2019 at an estimated \$460,000, with the first stage delivery to cost just over half of that figure, subject to external funding.

Community heard on Langhorne Creek trail plans

Solar lighting, dog water/bottle filling stations and bike racks are among the new inclusions to Alexandrina Council's proposed Langhorne Creek Discovery Trail (LCDT) concept plans.

As previously reported in *The Southern Argus*, a proposed, fit-for-purpose LCDT – spanning from Bremerton Wines, along Bridge Road to Bleasdale Wines – aims to provide interesting and accessible ways to access wineries, attractions and parks safely both on foot and bikes, in turn, increasing tourism and expenditure in town in an environmentally sensitive way.

The project has been under consideration for several years by the Langhorne Creek community and industry representatives, and council has been working closely with a key group of stakeholders since late 2020 on infrastructure, amenity and appropriate opportunities for it to enable visitors and locals to experience the wine region.

Concept plans for the trail were released for public consultation in February for residents to provide feedback on the designs, garnering 83 responses, with 47 in support.

Several recommendations were put forward which were taken into account and weighed against the proposed route, and in consideration of the trail's functionality, impacts, hazards and opportunities.

Administration then brought the following subsequent 'appropriate' amendments and inclusions for approval to partnership groups, who supported the changes:

- Reduce overall width to 2.0 or as close as practicable within applicable guidelines.

- Route amended to commence on corner of Bridge Road and Kent Town Road, and run along the northern side of Bridge Road to the Post office, minimising the impact on businesses and residences located on this stretch.

- Removal of all infrastructure at crossings/pedestrian refuges, and make crossing points have appropriate signage and sightlines.

- Stationed water bottle filling and dog water points near Post Office and Frank Potts.

- Termination of physical trail infrastructure on either side of pub land,

and additional allowance given for detailed wayfinding in this location.

- Inclusion of some sympathetically placed lighting, preferably solar.

- Inclusion of bike racks at Alfred Langhorne Park and Frank Potts, with a suggestion for business to also contribute and install some at their premises.

- Native/local plantings along trail, with council horticulture staff already providing a list of appropriate species.

- Request to the Department for Infrastructure and Transport to have a 50km/h start on the Strathalbyn side of Westbourne Street.

- In addition to solar shelters in Memorial Reserve, rest benches are proposed in same location as water points.

- Playgrounds, shelters and toilets included in scope.

- Existing signage to be upgraded at Frank Potts.

The amended plans by Aspect Studios were then endorsed by councillors last Monday night.

"I'm really delighted with the response we got from the community," North Ward councillor, Sue Miller, said.

"I think it is a credit to our staff in how they managed and dealt with the responses from the community."

To begin work on the construction of a new purpose-built pedestrian footbridge over a section of the Bremer River, councillors also agreed to initiate the process of opening a portion of currently privately owned land as a road in conjunction with DIT, crown lands and the adjoining land owner.

The final product will eliminate safety concerns, and create continuity and a more streamline user experience along the trail.

External funding will be key to delivering the project, which is estimated to cost \$7.1 million.

Council has applied for a grant through the Federal Government's Regional Precincts and Partnerships Program, which seeks to support transformative investment in regional, rural and remote Australia.

The outcome is expected by September, but administration is confident it will be successful.

Any future development to enhance the trail will be considered during council's Annual Business Plan and Budget considerations, and ongoing maintenance costs achieved through budget cycles.

Celebrating History Month: Life in Strathalbyn through the years

Over the 185 years since European settlement, Strathalbyn residents have experienced a changing town, from natural disasters, to war, to economic struggles and population growth.

To celebrate the town's 185th birthday and History Month, *The Southern Argus* published a five-part series (see pages four and five), with this edition marking the final segment.

The timeline was researched by local historian Carolyn Tucker with reference to *60 Years of Strathalbyn* by Nancy Gemmell and *Strathalbyn 1839 to 2016* by Brian Simpson.

Below are further insights researched by Ms Tucker into life of Strathalbyn residents throughout the decades.

Agriculture increased quickly in the district after European settlement, with thousands of immigrants from the UK gaining free or assisted passage in exchange for working in their trade or as labourers, employed by wealthier families.

In the 1850s and early 60s, builders, masons and carpenters were in demand as the town had a building and population boom of about 200 which reached 900 by the end of the decade.

Strathalbyn was one of the largest agricultural towns in the colony by 1869, but by the 1870s, the economy was in doldrums for three decades.

The prosperity of the district suffered, and a Depression hit in the 1890s.

Economic up-turn occurred in the early 1900s for the farming districts, which led to a boom in houses built in the region.

In 1909, Strathalbyn's population reached 1000 – a rise of 239 in 29 years since 1880.

Inventions and mechanisation brought improvements in farming and transport, with the first cars arriving in the district in 1905. Tractors, ploughs, and reaping machines followed, but horses remained a source of power for several decades.

Gas lit the town since 1869, and electricity began generation in the Power House, Commercial Road, built 1918.

Telephone use increased in the early 1900s.

World War I had an enormous effect on Strathalbyn like the rest of the country, leading to 33 sons of Strathalbyn and district families paying the ultimate sacrifice.

Farms and businesses were left without a full workforce.

In the local district, women knitted items to contribute to Red Cross Care Packages, and many fundraisers were held for the Soldier Relief Funds.

The war's end in 1918 brought a time of recovery, with plans for memorials for the fallen soldiers.

In the wake of the war, the RSL was formed, local community halls erected Honour Rolls and Soldiers Memorial Gardens was established.

In September, 1939, World War II started.

In farming families, some trained for war, while others remained growing food.

Rationing occurred for items including petrol, clothing, tea, butter and sugar.

A special mile-long trail brought 1000 Australian soldiers 2/8th Battalion from the Middle East in 1942, and were billeted for three months among Strathalbyn and

district homes.

The Great Depression impacted Australians for a decade, which led to severe hardship, high unemployment, poverty, loss of farmers and businesses and falling wheat and wool prices.

Houses were browned-out in case of enemy air attack, particularly following the Japanese bombing of Darwin.

Local residents volunteered for two-hour shifts at the Observation Post to provide 24-hour surveillance for enemy air attack.

Celebrations of the news of Japan's surrender occurred in 1945 when World War II ended, and a full Town Hall welcomed servicepeople home.

Shock followed reports of all that happened, when Prisoners of War returned from Germany and belated death notices ended years of hope.

As able returned soldiers resumed employment, women returned to former roles, mostly domestic or assisting in businesses and on farms.

The end of war brought many engagements, weddings and birth of babies.

Natural disasters impacted the town, including in 1939 when two days of bushfires threatened Strathalbyn when a broad fire front approached across Mount Lofty Ranges.

Work in town was disrupted for a week and men slept in streets as they waited to be called to the fire effort.

Significant floods occurred in 1941, 1981 and in 1992.

In 1982, farmers suffered through a severe drought, then in 1983, Ash Wednesday brought wildfires that came across the Hills from McLaren Flat.

Driving from Strathalbyn to the Hills and city became easier, safer and quicker by the '70s, after the Strathalbyn to Wistow road opened, and an extension was created of the South-Eastern Freeway from Hahndorf to Mount Barker.

The changes boosted tourism and the population as some began investing into a country life with a commute to work.

The '80s brought the most significant change, of great expansion, high interest rates, computers, mobile phones, changes in banking and Sunday trading.

Many households had two cars, women in the workforce, and employment at neighbouring towns.

Cost of living pressures increased as rising interest rates rose to record highs.

Single women had difficulty obtaining home loans, and when they did, would be slugged a 24 per cent interest rate while men received 19.

As many tightened their belts, businesses were impacted, and the Advance Strathalbyn Association was formed 1988 to promote local shopping and events.

Australia's economy was officially in a Recession by the early '90s.

At first, Strathalbyn's expansion continued but high inflation and interest rates led to struggling businesses while unemployment rose.

Strathalbyn's economy remained based on agriculture, so when it was tough on the land, the town felt the effects.

In the '90s, graziers were dealt a blow with the removal of the guaranteed minimum price for wool, leaving the returns subject to market forces.

Fast forward to today, Strathalbyn has a population of 7871 and is a tourist-destination, recognised for its heritage and antique shops, and being just a stone's throw from wineries, the coastline and the Hills.

Engagement in hospital redevelopment

Initial design concepts have been released for the new Mount Barker Hospital development, with detailed designs expected to be lodged later this year.

The new Mount Barker Hospital development is supported by \$320.8 million from the State Government and will triple the inpatient capacity on the current site from 34 to 102 beds.

Expanded capacity will be across specialist maternity, paediatric, rehabilitation, medical, surgical and palliative care beds, and 35 consult rooms

will be included to support community and allied health, Aboriginal health and medical outpatient services.

The development plans to allow for onsite dispensing pharmacies and pathology laboratories and establish a new 12-bed mental health unit.

The community is being engaged while a Community and Consumer Reference Group is consulting with the project team, providing feedback on the planning and designs.

Community feedback for pool land

Following much community discussion, Mount Barker District Council plans to seek feedback from the community on the future of the Dunn and Bickle land once the Mountain Pool is decommissioned.

Council recently endorsed the closure and decommissioning of Mountain Pool upon the completion of the construction of the Regional Aquatic and Leisure Centre.

Council staff previously planned to consider the best use of the future of the land and undertake community consultation, however, councillor Samantha Jones was concerned they would be a "token afterthought" rather than "involved in the decision-making process".

She found the unknown future land use was causing "angst" among local residents.

"There is a significant difference between engagement and consultation, I'm calling for engagement," she said.

"In considering the best replacement use of the land, we should be having



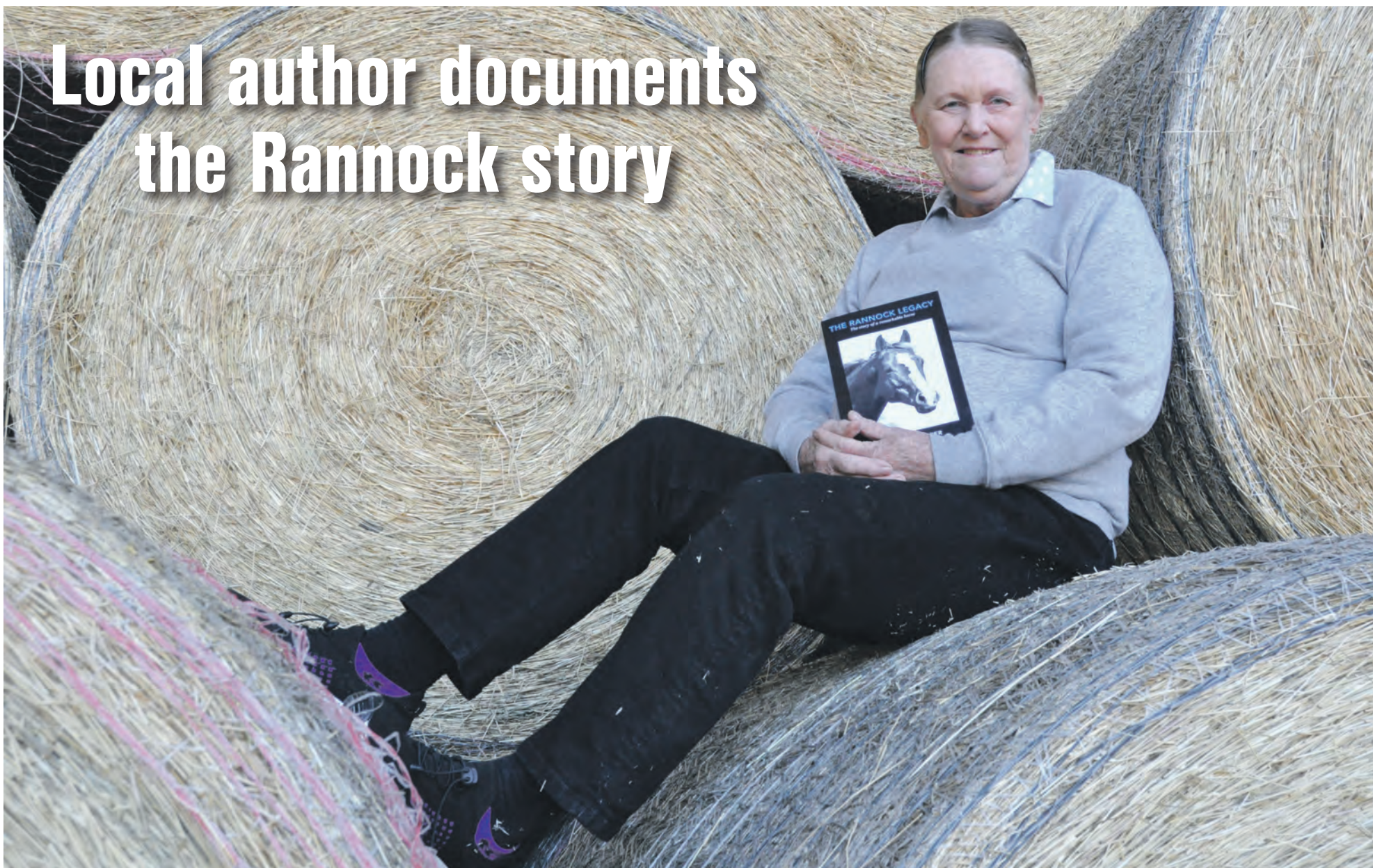

A comprehensive plan will now be designed to capture the expectations of the community and the results will be presented to council within six months.

Local author documents the Rannock story

A Strathalbyn horse breeder has turned her love for one of her star stallions into a book detailing his legacy.

Jeanette Gower's third book *The Rannock Legacy: The Story of a Remarkable Horse* details the story of Rannock – an Australian Stock Horse born in 1967 who became instrumental in the development of the stock horse industry in Australia.

"He was the beginning of this whole stud, actually – the horse that started us off," Mrs Gower said.

"My husband and I went to one of the first classification days in South Australia and that was up here at Mount Pleasant.

"We went along and there was this horse being classified at the classification day, and I just instantly fell in love with him.

"He was blind in one eye and he hadn't been ridden since he was broken in, so I think he was seven at that stage.

"I just fell in love with how beautiful he was and how quiet.

"And then my husband came over and said 'Did you see that horse?', and I said, 'Did you see that horse?'"

While unable to afford Rannock at the time, the couple hung around to find out more about his breeding.

"We discovered he was inbred to a horse that we had already visited about two years before," Mrs Gower said.

"Before we were married, we had been in New South Wales and we had seen one of the last living foundation sires for the Australian Stock Horse Society whose name was Panzer.

"And it turned out this horse was inbred to Panzer, and we thought, 'well, that couldn't be more perfect'"

The couple sent a mare to him to sire a couple of foals.

But in a twist of fate, the story soon took an exciting turn.

"Suddenly, one day, Alan McGregor – who was a polo player and had bought Raddock to play polo with, but couldn't because of the paddock accident that blinded him in one eye – rang," Mrs Gower said.

"My husband picked up the phone and he said 'Look I am going to advertise this horse; Where should I advertise it? Have you got any ideas?'"

"And my husband – I could hear him through the wall in the other room – said 'Don't look any further, we will buy that horse'.

"He still hadn't even asked what the price was going to be, so that is how it all started out."

It was the beginning of building a successful stud.

"We realised we had to promote him because we believed in him so much," she said.

"Long story short, he has got a big record of siring good, outstanding Polo ponies.

"I have worked through his descendants, and he has got four important sons that have carried on the line, but his own stock are well-known internationally now.

"My daughter has carried on with the stud and I thought the time was right to tell people about this horse, starting with my research about 10 years ago."

While Mrs Gower doesn't expect her book to be a best seller, she believes it would appeal to people keen to know more about horses and bloodlines.

"There are a lot of newcomers to the Stock Horse Society that are really keen on finding out about bloodlines, but as far as the society is concerned, they only know about the ones that have been advertised," she said.

The Rannock Legacy is Mrs Gower's third book to do with horses, following from *Horse Colour Explained*, and *The Thinking Horse Breeder* – a comprehensive guide to successful horse breeding.

"It is self-published through Amazon, so you can print on-demand, which is good for a small niche book," Mrs Gower said.

"I have only had 100 printed in the initial run, and I have sent out that in pre-orders.

"That has covered my costs and now I have just ordered another box of books, and I will just keep ordering them as the money covers the first lot, and any advertising that I am doing at the moment.

"I will go around to horse shows and have a stand, and I sell a few that way as well."

Remediation works begin on Strathalbyn weir wall

Remediation works are under way to upgrade the weir wall along the Angas River in Strathalbyn's Soldiers' Memorial Gardens, near the swimming centre.

Project works are expected to be completed mid-August 2024.
