

'During term three and four, the Goolwa Secondary College Sustainability Group (GSCSG) met every few weeks and refined what activities we could offer, who we could contact, and what our students would enjoy," she said.

"The students reached out to local organisations for support and received donations from Salvos Victor Harbor, Fleurieu Milk, and Blackwood Seeds.

We had a student group with the help of Scott Trestrall build wooden frames for the scarecrow skeletons and we received a lot of donations for the clothes swap.





"Over 150 items of clothing were saved from landfill and this was probably my favourite part of the day."

Students enjoyed the day and are looking forward to being involved in future events.

"As we create a learning space that is relevant to the world the students are experiencing, we know we face issues with resources," Ms Anderson said.

"We want to offer experiences that help students understand that small steps can make big differences, and normalise repairing and recycling.



"The GSCSG and other student groups here have shown a real interest in greening our grounds and creating more outdoor spaces to learn and hang out in.

"We have some passionate young people here at school in regards to the environment and sustainability, and it is important we support their projects and goals.

'The community really got behind this day and our students, and that is great."

Milang Master Plan given green light by council amid 'divergent' reviews



Despite receiving "polarising" responses to several proposals and recommendations, Alexandrina Council endorsed its Milang Master Plan on Monday night.

The Milang Master Plan was prepared to guide the future development and placebased projects for the town, to identify actions to enhance local character and amenity, and inform strategic planning and policy-related decisions.

Formal consultation – which included a co-design workshop and drop-in sessions – ran from July to November last year, garnering "divergent" responses from the community.

Out of the 64 responses received on MySay and nine other submissions, general support was provided for road safety and welcome signage, vegetation management of parklands, new playspace area for Lake Foreshore park, and improved walking trails creating a parklands loop.

Meanwhile, the projects that received mixed reviews were the lake foreshore walking loops and wayfinding, boardwalk, possible alternative skate park location, and Luard Street, Anzac Park, Coxe Street and Daranda Terrace placemaking.

Significant opposition was recorded for the proposed improvements to Daranda Terrace through a petition signed by 104 people in January this year, while another petition with 69 signatures also hit back at several proposed plans in the document in August last year.

In addition, further face-to-face

engagement activities found the future of Milang, particularly in relation to the streets, and potential to improve pedestrian safety and amenity, garnered mixed reviews.

Despite some of the backlash, the draft master plan and its community feedback were presented to and endorsed by council on Monday night for adoption as the basis for prioritising future projects for the town, noting they would require funding, tailored investigation and engagement.

"I think these plans are wonderful," North Ward councillor, Sue Miller, said.

"I commend the staff for the incredible amount of work, I thank the community for responding, and I look forward these informing our future decisions."

The next steps as outlined in the plan will see a steering group or something similar explored to work with council on the recommended initiatives.

While the master plan was endorsed, West Ward councillor Lou Nicholson noted the community would still have a say in the proposed projects.

"I want to acknowledge the significant contributions the community has made," she said.

"I know a lot of time... and effort (was put) into reviewing these master plans and giving feedback, which is really valuable.

"I want to acknowledge the plans aren't going to incorporate all the feedback – they can't possibly – but I want to note in each of the recommendations that future projects will require funding, tailored investigation and engagement, so this isn't the end of our community's opportunity to participate, and give direction and feedback to the future projects and spend of this council."





Long road ahead for Strathalbyn Abattoir

A local businessman is in the process of repairing and rebuilding the Strathalbyn Abattoir after he alleges previous management "absolutely butchered" the facility, spending money unnecessarily and leaving the site in disarray.

As revealed in *The Southern Argus* last month, the Fleurieu Community Cooperative (FCC) in charge of the Strathalbyn Abattoir redevelopment went into voluntary administration, leaving the organisation in debt approximately \$1.4 million, including an \$850,000 loan that needs to be returned to the government, as well as FCC members in the lurch.

Weeks on from the announcement and the project is trying to be plucked from the ground by long-time butcher Ross Frick, who was one of the original people pushing for the abattoir project.

However, he has a long road ahead.

In the wake of the FCC going into voluntary administration, the redevelopment of the abattoir has been left unfinished.

One of the major projects that was uncompleted was the removal of the roof on the lamb and beef kill floors, which has now caused damage to the equipment due to prolonged exposure to the elements and Mr Frick says is going to cost thousands to replace.

He alleged the project had been mismanaged, with money spent unnecessarily on consultants and on parts for the abattoir that were either substantial enough already or could wait until the facility got up-and-running to be purchased. "The lairages were rebuilt which was not

"The lairages were rebuilt, which was not necessary until we had the whole works upand-running - there were more important things to get done before you did the lairages," Mr Frick said. "The rigors for transporting the offal outside the works were taken out, removed and fixed on site - that was only a couple days' job. 'They subsequently got a big kill box... and what was there originally was substantial enough - it worked for 50 years and it just had to be tidied up, and it would have been ok. "They purchased a high-puller – Terry (Steed) had one in the shed, so there was no need for that. They purchased a new boiler, which there's no need – there's two boilers in the shed and they were working up to the day



the place closed down.

"They didn't go ahead doing anything important, they just wasted money."

However, FCC Director Grant Baker disputed these claims, saying all works had to legally be performed.

"There was a complete audit done that was presented, and there was no money spent on anything other than the project, so there was no financial mismanagement at all," he told *The Argus*.

"Everything we spent money on was a necessary spend.

"We had the PIRSA guys involved at all times, advising us on the work we were doing for the licence accreditation.

"The roof had to be lifted otherwise we wouldn't get the licence because it was illegal. "The chillers had to be fixed, the kill floor in the beef kill floor was really dangerous animals were unable to be secured which is a major risk - so no work was done that was unnecessary or could have been done at a later point." Preliminary findings from joint administrator Andrew Heard also found nothing unusual with the finances. "I've had a preliminary chance to look at the books and records of the company to form a preliminary view," he told *The Argus*. "Initial reviews of the books and records have indicated the money was raised both through debt and equity appears to have been applied towards the project. "There are different people with different attitudes about how the project should have



been carried out, but if people are concerned

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if money has gone left or right, I can assure you that my preliminary investigations haven't identified that."

Mr Frick is planning to "tidy things up" on site and source quotes on the cost to install a new roof among other works.

He said it was important for the town to have an abattoir.

"It's more important to have it operating as a normal abattoir to service local butchers, wholesalers and farmers for private kill," Mr Frick said.

"It's been a big employer for possibly 50 years.

"Butchers all over Adelaide Hills need the stock kill to service their butcher shops. "It's got to be one of the best things to come back to Strathalbyn."

'LOSING BATTLE': Locals urged to take care around nests



In the middle of turtle breeding season and during Turtle Month, a Goolwa-based rescue group is urging locals to take care around nests after a steep decline in populations.

While the drought from around 2008 to 2010 may seem like a long time ago, the impact from a tubeworm encrustation on freshwater turtle shells has devastated local populations which have struggled to recover.

Alexandrina Wildlife Support Group Chair Deanne Smith described it as a "slow road to recovery".

"You can virtually say, they're at the risk of extinction in the Lower Lakes and down (Goolwa area) - that's how bad it is," she said.

"We're fighting a losing battle down here.

"They're an important animal in the system... they're classified as vacuum cleaners... their diet consists of a lot of dead matter."

Alexandrina Wildlife Support Group formed during the drought to help rescue the declining reptiles, and had 900 turtles in care within two years.

From their estimations, for every turtle the group saved, at least 10 were dead.

Initially it was believed that tubeworms just affected the exterior of turtles, however they discovered toxins were getting into their systems and without fresh water, had no means to flush it out.

Ms Smith believes some longnecked turtles may be stunted in growth, therefore unfit for breeding. Another hurdle to growing populations is being attacked by predators, which can quickly 'devastate" a nest, leaving no survivors.

Murray short-necked and eastern long-necked freshwater turtles are found in local waters, with broadshelled turtles found further upstream.

Ms Smith has more than 20 turtles currently in care, with an objective of rehabilitation and releasing, however some were dumped pets that will stay in care as they have no instincts to survive in the wild.

In the local area, short-necked turtles are often found around Hindmarsh Island and in the main river system and rarely on banks.

Long-necked turtles often float along the water enjoying warmth on their backs, and are often the species sighted on local roads.

If spotted, it is recommended to put to the turtle to the side of the road they are walking as they can travel a "hell of a long way".

If turtles or nests are spotting during breeding season, it is encouraged to notify Alexandrina Wildlife Support Group to help identify and track current species.

Ms Smith also recommends community members download TurtleSAT, a citizen science mapping tool to help inform scientists.

With a love for rescuing wildlife since she was young, Ms Smith rescued her first joey at 16-years-old and now also has possums, lizards, and birds. Her efforts are funded by the

charity's op shop on Corio Terrace.





One turtle close to Ms Smith's heart is Martha who came a long way since arriving with shell rot on her belly and a lost bridge on her outer shell.





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
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Centenarian celebrates 106th birthday

Strathalbyn centenarian Edith O'Brien is celebrating her milestone 106th birthday today, November 21.

Every year she turns older, she remains in disbelief of her significant age with her youthful and warm demeanour.

"I certainly don't feel 106 – no way near it," she told *The Southern Argus* during her party on Monday.

She offered some nuggets of wisdom and secrets to her longevity, which she partially credits to her positive outlook.

"I think you've got to look after your health as much as you can," she said.

"You've got to respect everybody no matter who they are – that's what I think.

"Another thing I do believe is learn something new everyday of your life."

Born in November 21, 1918 – just 10 days after World War I ended – Mrs O'Brien has "seen a lot" over more than a century of life.

She is now five years shy of who is believed to be Australia's oldest living person, 111-yearold Ken Weeks from Grafton, New South Wales, and four years behind the oldest woman, Lorna Henstridge, who celebrated her 110th birthday in June at Bordertown.

She is among about three Strathalbyn residents who are 100 years old and over, according to the latest Australian Bureau of Statistics, and among 16 in the Alexandrina

Council district.

Growing up on a Hanson farm, South Australia, Mrs O'Brien still remembers using a horse and buggy and riding horseback to school before her father bought the family's first car in 1926, which she learned to drive at 11 years old.

During World War II which began in 1939, Mrs O'Brien worked as an ammunition inspector and met her late husband Ivan – who was one to "call a spade a spade" – and who served in the 43rd Battalion.

Tying the knot in 1942, they were married for 60 years before his passing, and have a daughter and son, daughter-in-law, grandchildren and great-grandchildren.

With a love for the community and keeping a busy life, Mrs O'Brien was at one stage involved in eight different organisations when she lived in Keith.

She moved to Strathalbyn in 2016 and is now involved in Legacy, Returned and Services League (RSL) and Ladies Probus Club of Strathalbyn.

The landmark occasion of her 106th birthday was marked at Robin Hood Hotel on Monday surrounded by almost 30 friends and family members.

With the national review into Australia's live music industry over, a local pub is facing its own difficulties providing entertainment at its venue.

"Some of our best memories at the pub stem from our gigs."

The Robin Hood has gigs at least every month, if not each fortnight, with performances in the beer garden to the front bar from a mix of bands, duos, and solo artists.

"We have a solid rotation of artists that have been playing for us for years now and some fresh faces too," Ms Thomson said.

"They love coming back to rock our little pub, (and) it is a reciprocated appreciation. "We appreciate them and they

appreciate us."

Woman jailed over Goolwa Beach ordeal

The accused ringleader of a trio who assaulted a man at Goolwa Beach in 2022 over a missing woman has been sentenced to jail.

As previously reported in *The Southern Argus*, Will Fisher, aged 42, Natalie MacDonald, aged 48, and Lynette McDonald, aged 63, were all arrested for allegedly threatening and assaulting a victim with a hammer during an incident at Goolwa Beach in April 2022 after wrongly believing the man knew about a missing woman's whereabouts.

The District Court heard the victim was in a relationship with the missing woman and was told she was found safe on the day by police.

However, when the victim was about to leave the property, the trio arrived and accused him of kidnapping the woman.

It soon escalated, with the trio hogtying the victim before delivering blows to his head and legs with a hammer – all of this allegedly filmed.

He was then dragged towards the main road, where members of the public contacted police who attended and spoke to MacDonald, who told them she had made a citizen's arrest.

A CT scan revealed the victim suffered a fractured nose, bruising and cuts.

MacDonald and Fisher pleaded guilty to assault and false imprisonment, while McDonald pleaded guilty to assault by threatening to use a weapon.

MacDonald was sentenced to one year and 10 months' jail with a non-parole period of one year, while Fisher was sentenced to one year and five months' jail with a non-parole period of 10 months, and McDonald to two months' jail.

Due to Fisher and McDonald's lesser roles in the offending and rehabilitation efforts, their sentences were suspended on a \$500 good behaviour bond.

Victor Harbor man charged

A prominent Victor Harbor businessman fronted court last week for allegedly selling and possessing a number of firearms against the relevant licences and regulations.

Seventy-six-year-old Allan 'Shonky Tonks' Tonkin, who runs Tonkins Sports, is charged with 27 counts of possessing various categories of firearms without a licence, eight counts of supplying a prescribed firearm to an unlicensed person, an aggravated count of possessing a firearm without licence, an aggravated count of possessing a sound modifier, and one count of contravening a provision of the code of practice.

He is yet to enter a plea to all 38 counts.

Last Tuesday, Mr Tonkin fronted Adelaide Magistrates Court to apply to vary his bail to allow him to travel to India for "business opportunities".

Magistrate Simon Smart remanded Mr Tonkin on simple bail, with permission to travel to India for business.

The matter will return to court in January.



Driver in Hayborough fatality fronts court

A Northfield woman allegedly responsible for causing the death of another in a horror crash at Hayborough in September fronted court for the first time last Friday.

As previously reported in The Southern Argus, just after 4.30pm on September 22, police and other emergency services were called to the intersection of Ocean Road and Port Elliot Road after a Toyota van hit a tree.

A 59-year-old Davoren Park woman, who was a wheelchair passenger in the van, sadly died, while the driver, a 21-year-old Northfield woman, and front passenger, a 30-year-old Croydon Park woman, were both taken to hospital for treatment of non-lifethreatening injuries. Major Crash Investigators arrested the driver, Mahnoor Malik, that Monday, and charged her with causing death by careless use of a motor vehicle and causing injury by careless use of a motor vehicle.

She appeared in Christies Beach Magistrates Court last Friday for the first time, but is yet to enter any pleas.

During proceedings, a police prosecutor asked Magistrate Todd Grant to adjourn the matter for charge determination in March next year in order for forensic evidence and reports to be gathered.

Ms Malik will now face Adelaide Magistrates Court in March next year.

Operation Nomad launched

With the fire danger season now launched in most regions across the state, SA Police will monitor people considered at risk of starting fires this summer through Operation Nomad.

SAPOL continues to work with other agencies to reduce and prevent deliberate, reckless and negligent acts that may cause bushfires by increasing police patrols through high-risk bushfire areas and monitoring would-be arsonists.

Last year police investigated 81 suspicious fires of which 28 were determined to be deliberately lit, with nine people arrested for those fires and two people reported.

A total of 40 explations were issued, mostly related to lighting or maintaining a fire during the fire danger season.

Throughout the season, officers will regularly visit those identified as being a high or significant risk, especially on days of extreme or catastrophic fire danger rating.

In addition to police patrols, this year will see police security officers conducting highly visible patrols, and observations in areas of high fire danger risk, complementing the frontline police patrols who will attend incidents, and be able to identify and observe any suspicious behaviour and report in a timely manner back to SA Police communications.

This year also sees the introduction of bushfire offender monitoring orders on persons of interest.

South Australians are encouraged to familiarise themselves with the Australian Fire Danger Rating System released by the South Australia Country Fire Service (CFS).

Minister for Police, Emergency Services and Correctional Services Dan Cregan said police will step up patrols and monitor known risks to help prevent bushfire offending and keep the community safe.

"With fire danger season dates brought forward, and forecast hotter and drier conditions ahead, an act of arson has even greater potential to threaten lives and property," he said.

"New powers to track people convicted of bushfire offences is another tool to combat individuals who may seek to put others at risk."

Arson attempts or suspicious activity may be reported on the police assistance line 131 444, or through Crime Stoppers on 1800 333 000 or online at (www.crimestopperssa. com.au).

If you see a fire that may threaten life, call 000 immediately.

Mount Barker trainer confesses to drug charges

A Mount Barker personal trainer pled guilty to several drug-related charges last week.

Following an investigation into a dark web money laundering and drug trafficking operation, Sebastian Adcock, aged 26, was arrested last year for allegedly importing drugs overseas and peddling them on an online marketplace under different aliases.

Fronting Adelaide Magistrates Court last week, his lawyer announced Mr Adcock admitted to 15 of his 74 original charges – two counts of trafficking in a commercial quantity of a controlled drug, four counts of trafficking in a large commercial quantity of a controlled drug, eight counts of trafficking (type unknown) of a controlled drug, and one count of money laundering.

In accepting his guilty pleas, prosecutors dropped the remaining counts against him.

Magistrate Justin Wickens remanded Mr Adcock on continuing bail to face the District Court in January, where a date will be set for sentencing submissions.

Two-car collision at Hindmarsh Valley

New 'bonus' incentive for learner drivers

Novice drivers could soon earn up to 10 bonus hours if they train with a registered motor driving instructor, improving the skills and knowledge of future drivers by adding the incentive of gaining professional tuition from the driver training industry. Under the planned change, South Australian learner drivers will be credited with three hours of driving experience for every hour they train with a professional instructor, up to a maximum of five hours. That means five hours of driving with an instructor will be logged as 15 hours.

Not only will this incentivise learners to complete their required minimum of 75 logged hours faster and to train with a qualified instructor, it will also improve their knowledge and provide them with a better chance at passing the final on-road test.

"The driver training reforms are the most significant reforms that any government has made to the industry," Minister for Infrastructure and Transport, Tom Koutsantonis, said.

"We have recognised the importance of professional training and the role it can play in improving road safety outcomes. "That is why we want to reward and encourage learner drivers who decide to train with qualified instructors.

"Not only will this help learners obtain their provisional licence faster, it will also give driving instructors the confidence knowing the State Government values their expertise." To help the public make an informed decision about choosing an instructor, an online register will be established that will provide details of every industry member.



The losing battle

According to a number of sources, for many Australian native species, the fight for survival is already too late.

Since the arrival of Europeans in 1788, more than 100 species endemic to Australia have been documented as becoming extinct.

Plants, fish, frogs, reptiles, birds, mammals, invertebrates and protists have all been eradicated in just over 200 years.

And they are only the ones that have been recorded.

This week comes the story about how our turtles are faring.

It is the middle of turtle breeding season, and a Goolwa-based rescue group is urging all of us to take care around their nests this season after a steep decline in turtle numbers.

Alexandrina Wildlife Support Group Chair Deanne Smith is concerned wildlife rescuers and conservationists are fighting a losing battle, believing the turtles are at risk of extinction in the Lower Lakes and Goolwa area.

While the drought from around 2008 to 2010 is more than 10 years ago, the impact of a tubeworm encrustation on turtle shells devastated local populations, and now they are struggling to recover.

The group believes for each turtle it saves, at least 10 have died.

Initially it was believed that tubeworms just affected the exterior of turtles, but then it was discovered toxins were getting into their systems and without fresh water, had no means to flush it out.

Another hurdle has been attacks by predators.

Turtles contribute in their own way to the ecosystem, as their diet consists of dead matter.

For now, rescuers are asking all of us to be mindful of the fragile nature of their existence.

Don't ruin their nests, leave them be in the waterways, and notify the support group if you spot any to help track numbers.

It is a little thing every person can do in the ongoing problem of national and global extinctions.








Olives shine on the Fleurieu

A 17,000 tree olive grove near Finniss is proving Australia can rival the mediterranean when it comes to producing both table olives and olive oils.

The Australian Olive Company has been in the hands of the Chehade family for the past 25 years, and now includes processing facilities to make both products - for both themselves and others.

Operations Manager Peter Reaich said the local region normally has ideal weather suited to grow the olives.

"It is a mediterranean climate, so olives thrive in that style climate," he said.

"They do not like humidity – similar to grapes - so wherever you can grow grapes, you can grow olives, and the olive harvest happens straight after grape harvest.

"The grape harvest might finish in March, for example, and we basically start March/April.

"Olives have one year as a big year and the next year not such a big year, so the way we look after that is to make sure our trees are fertilised, pruned and irrigated well, and that helps the off year to be not as bad."

The 70-hectare farm employs two people throughout the year - Mr Reaich who looks after the factory and processing, and a farm

hand who does the harvesting, and grove and factory maintenance.

An extra two or three workers are employed at harvest time.

The business looks after three areas of production - the trees they look after are primary, secondary is the processing of olives to table olives and oil, and then the tertiary, which is the packaging of the finished products.

"Most of our sales are bulk sales, so 20-litre drums of oil to 1000 litres, and 10kg buckets of olives to 150kg in drums," Mr Reaich said.

"(The harvest) is very similar to grapes in terms of when the fruit produces - similar timings, just a longer time on the tree.

We pick green table olives first before they turn colour in March/April, as most olive varieties go from green to dark.

"We pick the oil varieties from when they start to change colour, and that happens anywhere from May/June or July at the latest, but because we are a processor for other producers, we will stay open until sometimes September processing olive oil, especially those from the Adelaide Hills as it is a cooler climate and it takes a bit longer to ripen the fruit."

On a low year, the business produces about 200 tonnes in total, and up to 1200 tonnes in a good one.

For just themselves, they produce about 300 tonnes each year.

They are happy supplying their table olives to New South Wales and olive oil in South Australia.

Getting the harvest right though can

be tricky.

"If you pick too early you get a higher quality of oil, which is high in anti-oxidants but lower in quantity, so the yield drops quite a bit," Mr Reaich said.

"Pick it too late and you get a higher quantity but lower quality of oil, so it is all about picking at the right time, which is usually when the olives start to turn colour and you get a good blend of quality and quantity."

Olive oil continues to be one of the best oils to use for cooking, as it is high in monosaturated fats, polyphenols and antioxidants, and having processing facilities is a big bonus for the company.

For olive oil processing the olives are cleaned, washed, de-stemmed, leaves removed, and then crushed to turn the fruit into a paste.

It then gets decanted, and the water and oil separated via a three-phase system which is more environmentally sustainable than a traditional two-phase process.

"The oil that comes out of the decanter system goes to the oil separator, as in that oil, there is a bit of water, and that is the final product with the oil," Mr Reaich said.

"With the oil, we have to let it sit for about a week before we put it in the big tanks because there is a lot of sediment in the oil and that just drops over time.

"So, it collects at the bottom, and we suck up the oil from the top and transfer it to the

big vats. "The table olive side is quite similar, and we are lucky to have a machine that does

the job of about 10 people.

'We have the usual deleafing process, washing process, and then the olives go to a sorter - which is very high tech - and it takes photos of the olives on the conveyor belts and I can determine which olives go where." With the untimely weather events over

last year, Mr Reaich said the latest harvest was the worst on record across Australia.

"Locally we had a lot of rain during flowering, so a lot of flowers got aborted," he said.

"Last year we had a year that was one month later than usual due to the wet Spring we had, and also the early summer was really cold and wet as well... but climatically there is probably something bigger going on.

We have noticed the season is getting earlier and earlier.

"Once we picked May/June, now we are picking March/April."

However, this next season is shaping up well so far, and prices are high in the wake of the shortage of supply from last season.

"Prices are definitely high at the moment," Mr Reaich said.

"If I use olive oil as an example, last year we sold our 20-litre drums for \$180 which is quite reasonable, but this year, because of the shortage of olives and olive oil, it went up to \$350, which is a good indication of where we are at.

"And the bulk sales, usually it starts at \$6.50 a litre and this year it is anything from \$10 to \$13 a litre for bulk sales, so it has almost doubled."

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Trial and error on show

As Milang Agricultural Bureau members settled into the October meeting at the Syngenta trial site, located just south of Strathalbyn, rainfall was a popular discussion topic, with the majority grateful for what the region has had in comparison to other areas doing it tough.

Leading the tour of the trial site was Ashley Pilkington, along with Peter Jolly, Jason Sabeeney and other representatives from Syngenta, who showed members the range of herbicide and fungicide treatments being trialled on a variety of crops such as canola, wheat and lentils.

As the weather stayed rather humid and sunny, with heavy rainclouds off in the distance, the Bureau moved a few kilometres down the road to another trial site run by Adama, where representative Lachlan Parker talked members through what they were working on.

The first trial plot encountered was to see the effects of different herbicide treatments compared to none on Ryegrass, which is considered a very troublesome weed amongst most broadacre farmers.

Without these trials, located on land temporarily and kindly donated by local farmers, newer and better herbicides and fungicides cannot replace the older ones that are beginning to be less effective or are slowly being removed from the market.

How agribusiness can thrive and survive

Bentleys is hosting a panel discussion and Q&A on carbon accounting in February next year to help farmers out following the rollout of new government legislation mandating climate-related reporting from January.

The Treasury Laws Amendment (Financial Market Infrastructure and Other Measures) Bill (the Bill) passed senate in late August and gained the House of Representatives' approval in September, solidifying its enactment into law.

Large businesses such as banks and major retailers will be required to report on Scope 3 emissions – those acquired from suppliers and therefore are included in a business' own emissions caused by their own operations – from as soon as next year, resulting in direct implications for agribusinesses.

For farms of any size that supply to supermarket chains and other large or medium entities, a low or neutral carbon footprint becomes a competitive advantage and a value-add.


A carbon neutral supplier becomes the supplier of choice given that the recipient business is now required to capture and report a carbon footprint via the supply chain.

Agile farmers who respond swiftly to the demand will be ready to increase the chances of protecting their current customer contracts and may be able to entice new ones.

"We are seeing clients getting preferred supplier status and longer-term contracts as a result of reducing or offsetting their carbon baseline," Bentleys SA/NT Partner and Agribusiness Advisory Specialist, James Allen, said.

"Forward-thinking agribusinesses are paying to have this done as they see the commercial benefits."

The argument for carbon emission reduction goes beyond simple legal



compliance, environmental mindfulness and marketing advantage.

Banks and insurers are increasingly wanting to see carbon neutrality as an indicator of business longevity and sustainability.

With specialist advice, carbon footprint can not only be measured, verified and reported on, but identifying emissions sources enables strategies to reduce, offset or mitigate carbon emissions and reduce operational costs.

Carbon credits are another opportunity for large emitters that wish to improve their baselines for verification and reporting.

"Some farms will produce excess credits and be able to sell to these markets after reducing their baseline to nil, however, many more higher intensity farms will have a footprint that needs to be reduced," Mr Allen said.

"Those are likely already looking towards reducing their footprint and can look to work towards increasing sequestration practices across their operations via soil, trees and herd management methods. "It is our job as advisors to explore the many options, and often times farmers don't realise they are already doing many of the right things and just need the clarification.

"The process of getting a baseline helps farmers identify where the problems are at, establish what can be done to reduce the emissions, and start a longer-term project to sequester more carbon across their farming enterprise.

"The combination of these will in most cases assist in getting the farm to a largely neutral position."

For a time-poor industry at the mercy of the seasons and required to wear multiple hats at the best of times, the good news is that carbon assessment and reporting can be managed with minimal labour.

Pacific Islander workers flock to region

Samoan Journalist Manaui Faulalo was among six print journalists from the Pacific who were recently invited to a placement with regional Australian newspapers, including The Southern Argus, in partnership with ABČ **International Development and Country Press Australia. She** speaks to Pacific Islander workers at a Currency Creek farm.

Seasonal workers from Vanuatu have found significant opportunities while working on Graeme Pitchford's Currency Creek farm in Australia.

For many years, Pitchford Produce has fostered strong ties with these laboursending units, transitioning from third-party contractors to direct partnerships with the Federal Government.

"We're really grateful Graeme has made it possible for us to come directly instead of going through contractors," one of the ni-Vanuatu house leaders, Kevin Bong, shared.

"We have experienced that in the past. "With contractors in-between, we get the money a bit low."

Mr Pitchford - who has employed 24 seasonal workers from Vanuatu – walked The Southern Argus through the Pacific Australia Labour Mobility Scheme and how it has helped the ni-Vanuatu.

Mr Pitchford said the way workers spend their money has changed over the years.

"Some people would put money into a water tank or something like that for a

community," he said.

"Now some people are actually buying businesses or buying a car, so they can actually create more business and have a bit of a plan for their future when they've finished here."

Mr Bong told *The Argus* the communal impact of their earnings rather than individual was a testament to that.

"Back in the islands, we live as a

community," he said.

"If one boy from a village comes to work here, he is going to go back and develop.

"It's not just his personal development, but for the community as well.

"If he builds a permanent house, it can shelter two or three families during a cyclone."

arrangement, recognising the importance of workers returning home to support their families.

He believed being away for four years

"isn't good for families", highlighting that many workers aim to earn money to uplift their communities.

Mr Pitchford added that the PALM Long also does not benefit the farm, as the farm operations occur on a weekly basis throughout the year.

"By having these guys on a casual basis for nine months, they work hard for nine months, then they go home for nine months, and then they come back again," he said.

Mr Bong's group of Ni-Vanuatu typically Mr Pitchford has opted for the PALM Short stay for nine months, engaging in various agricultural tasks, primarily harvesting broccolini and lettuce.

One house accommodates the group on-site while two other houses are located in Goa.

Murraylands mother's foster care experience empowers others

Ensuring children experience safety, love and stability to thrive has been a life-long commitment for Murraylands mother Niki Borchardt.

In addition to raising her own children, she has provided a foster home with her husband for young people in need of care, before joining the ac.care staff team as a key support worker for other carers.

"The rewards have always absolutely outweighed the challenges – knowing that even if you only cared for a child for a week, you were making a difference," Mrs Borchardt said.

The Borchardts first became foster carers when they decided to welcome children into their Murraylands home in addition to their five sons.

Despite the reward of seeing young people develop in her care, Mrs Borchardt said occasions of challenging behaviour when children struggled emotionally was at times difficult, but her ac.care case worker was always a strong support.

"Your heart breaks for the children when that's happening, but our case worker at the time was just amazing, and made such a difference to our journey, particularly when there were tricky times," she said.

"She could help me to advocate for the child's needs and be a sounding board as someone who understood children who have experienced trauma."

Training Mrs Borchardt received as a carer helped her understand the impact of trauma and other factors on children's lives. She welcomed the opportunity to

empower other foster carers today.

"You might not understand at the time how the learning as a foster carer is going to help you, but then a situation will come up and you realise you have the tool you need," Mrs Borchardt said.

As the needs of the family changed, Mrs Borchardt moved from providing foster care to supporting those who do, joining ac.care's team at Murray Bridge as a case worker.

"I still wanted to be a part of the system of supporting children in care to be able to support carers in the way I was supported," she said.

"There are all sorts of ways that we support our carers, and different carers have different needs."

This support ranges from direct assistance, including a 24/7 helpline, to arranging trainings and co-ordinating networking opportunities such as coffee gathering and events at Easter and Christmas to bring carers together to support one another.

She encouraged people who had considered becoming foster carers to learn more and take the next step.


"With the training and support you receive along the way, it's well-worth doing," Mrs Borchardt said.

Hartley Bureau's 101-year history compiled into book

A hundred years of Hartley Agricultural Bureau history, from World War efforts to Hogget competitions and crop inspections, has been compiled into one book by a local member.

The Hartley Agricultural Bureau was formed in September 1983 by farmers who settled on the eastern slopes of the Mount Lofty Ranges, locating between Callington, south towards Strathalbyn and along the Bremer River Valley.

The group opened up for new learning opportunities, including the all-in-one harvester and other machinery measures, and discussions about the future of farming.

It disassembled in 1994 but its 101-year history is being kept alive today by a new 118-page book compiled and recently printed by Hartley resident Marian Harvey.

In the early 2000s, Ms Harvey was surprised to be given the complete set of bureau minute books in an old metal trunk by last President Arthur Graetz, and in 2018, decided the history contained within these documents needed to be shared more accessibly and got to work on creating a book.

"Due to curiosity, I decided to read and note down about every report this bureau did, said or went to, including every person, grain or rainfall," she said.

"Afterwards, the minute books were restored and placed in the Strathalbyn Heritage Centre.

"In 2018, I decided this bureau info should

be documented, so I began the Hartley Agricultural Bureau (HAB) history review, but due to other farm commitments from 2020, the book lay dormant until the last 12 months.

"The delayed break was beneficial because artefacts were found by descendants of the old bureau members, which filled the gaps of history."

The most interesting points of history Ms Harvey found during the process was the members' "blunt" questions and answers during meetings, and their attitudes towards farming.

Photographs have been sourced from bureau members' families who found the farming certificates and albums that showed the mechanical changes throughout the decades.

This was one of the most difficult parts of the process for Ms Harvey.

"You couldn't get a lot of information after 1954 because the national library didn't have it," she said.

"Getting photos is the hard part because they didn't do much in those days.

"I had a break for about three years and doing that was a blessing because I had this section in there that I had no information on and someone found it in their ancestor's back cupboard, so that just made the whole thing come together."

The book was officially printed by Reid Print last month and can be ordered for by either contacting Ms Harvey on 0429 160 050 or at Strathalbyn's Baile Books.



A Clayton Bay snake expert is aiming to dispel a myth that the town is a "hotspot" for the slithery reptiles after some residents recently raised concerns about finding them on their properties.

Spring is the breeding season for snakes, with many residents likely seeing them more often as males are on the move and slither over greater distances in search of mates.

Tiger snakes have about a half a hectare home range, but males will move around Living near swamp rat colonies, Mr Mirtschin's property often has about four brown snakes, two tigers, about four redbellied, and *The Southern Argus* spotted a couple during a recent visit.

"It's only when people see them that they worry," he said.

"If they're living around you, they will see you heaps more times than you will see them."

Mr Mirtschin has also been involved in research papers arguing that snakes pose little risk to human health, killing less than three people per year in Australia. One paper explored why farmers should avoid killing snakes as they offer "substantial benefit" by consuming agricultural pests such as rodents. Brown snakes are deemed the most valuable in this sense, removing what is estimated as thousands of mice per square kilometre of farmland per year, saving eight tonnes of grain.



more during mating season, while brown snakes are "big foragers" living over about 35 hectares.

The concerns sparked a recent community talk by toxinologist and former snake farmer Peter Mirtschin to help locals feel at ease living around snakes that have a declining local population.

The Ĉlayton Bay and Milang region had "reasonable numbers" of tiger snakes about 30 years ago, but that has since declined which might be correlated to bell frog populations.

Mr Mirtschin recommends residents keep a distance when they spot snakes and, if bitten, to apply appropriate first aid which is a special bandage and immobilisation and to call an ambulance.

Ben Clark was in great form on the front nine with one birdie, seven pars and a bogie to be +7 for 36 off the stick but it was all down hill from there with 49 off the stick on the back nine despite another birdie on the 12th but finishing with -5 on that nine, as he landed on the par five 16th green in three and then proceeded to have four putts.

While Wayne Miels had a reasonable round of +2 with one birdie, partner Damien Nettle, also picking up a birdie, struggled on the front nine with trees a bit of a problem to be -4 but he didn't do any more damage to his score being square on the back nine.

Ben McLeod finished a -2 for the day as he picked up a seven on the 12th and then looked to be in a lot of trouble off the tee on the 16th.

Ben's tee shot here saw his ball disappear into the trees so he played a provisional tee shot only to see his ball heading onto the Ashbourne round on its way back to Strathalbyn.



penalty. For example, when partner leaves you in 4 Clubs when you were asking for Aces, and the opposition doubles, and you are not sure which is your partnership's best contract. Here is another use for a Re-Double.

Quite a few Wests would not open this 5 pointer, and what follows assumes West passed. In fact, to open this hand 2 Hearts is a good aggressive bid, and one that I would make, if I was sitting West: pre-emptive bids promise length not strength. That's another story.

North opens 1C, a normal sort of catch-all opening, and East Doubles for Take-Out. South has 12 HCP, and sitting opposite an opening bid, knows they have the Balance of the Points, so South Re-Doubles. This does not tell North anything about the suits, just that they should keep bidding until a fit is found. The inference is that there are three hands with opening points, so the fourth has very little in the way of HCP.

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Assuming West remains mute, North bids 1S, confirming a biddable Spade suit, only promising a 4-card suit at first, and with minimum HCP: with 14+, North should jump-bid. East is now wise to pass, and South can show Spade support, but no more than 2 Spades is indicated. That should be the end of the auction.

On the night this was played, most N/S pairs made 7 – 9 tricks, one tried 4 Spades and went down, and two plucky E/W pairs found the Heart contract and made 9 tricks. My point is that this is a good use for a Re-double.


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
