Hundreds owed Medicare payments are urged to update banking details

Almost 800 residents in the Mount Barker area are being urged to complete one simple, outstanding action to claim hundreds of thousands worth of Medicare repayments – update their bank account details.

Under the national Medicare scheme, Australians are provided with free or subsidised health services.

However, due to people failing to provide their most current bank account details, in South Australia alone, about \$19 million is sitting in the government's bank accounts.

The Mount Barker region has the highest number of people of any town in any South Australian electorate who are owed payments with 759 residents recorded in the 5251 postcode.

Minister for the National Disability Insurance Scheme and Government Services Bill Shorten pleaded with Mayo residents while at Mount Barker's Services Australia last Thursday to go to the MyGov website or phone app, link their Medicare card to their account, and ensure their bank details are up-to-date.

"If finding treasure was this easy, we'd all be treasure hunters," he said.

"(Medicare) is there to help people defray the costs of the health system, and what we find is there's \$241 million which people can legitimately claim – just tell us your bank account details then we will pay you.

"For some people I think the average that is owed is about \$262, which is great, but there's thousands of people who are owed

tens of thousands of dollars, so my plea is go online to myGov, download the myGov app, link up the Medicare card, make sure you've got your bank details are up-to-date, then if you are owed money, in three days it's in your account."

The payments are non-inflationary and have no due date to be claimed.

The government has already reunited \$117 million with Australians who had outstanding payments since last year.

However, people are warned to be wary of scammers who may prey on this opportunity.

Payments can only be claimed by visiting the MyGov website or app – the government will not send a link by any means of telecommunications.

Step-by-step instructions can be found by visiting (servicesaustralia.gov.au/getmedicarebenefits).

Heysen Boulevard crossing complete

A much-needed new rail level crossing on Heysen Boulevard has been completed, providing improved connectivity and safer travel solutions in Mount Barker.

The \$5 million project – announced during the State Government's Country Cabinet in August 2023 – connects a crucial section of Heysen Boulevard, giving residents better transport options and easier access to local shops and other amenities.

The works include completion of the road and pedestrian paths, together with realignment of the existing Steam Ranger rail line and installation of new signalling, lighting and landscaping.

The level crossing closes a gap in the Boulevard between the Bluestone and Minters Fields estates, and opens a critical part of the route, which is reliant on developer funding to construct the connector road.

Member for Kavel Dan Cregan said the community had long been waiting for a connection of the east and west sections of Heysen Boulevard.

"These works will benefit thousands of residents in the southern development areas of Mount Barker," he said.

"The new level crossing opens up an important thoroughfare and will serve as a platform for further progress along the increasingly popular route."

The State Government and Mount Barker District Council have jointly co-funded the works, which will help kickstart further construction for the remainder of the connector road.

Heysen Boulevard will eventually run through the entire 1300 hectares of the growth area in Mount Barker following a rezoning in 2010.

Mount Barker District Council Mayor David Leach said council was thrilled with the completion and opening of the level crossing on this section of the Heysen Boulevard connector road.

"Council views the investment of up to \$2.5 million for the construction of the new rail level crossing on Heysen Boulevard, in partnership with the State Government, as vital for community safety and social well-being," he said.

"As our district continues to grow, council looks forward to further partnerships with State and Federal Governments, with the knowledge that collaboration on infrastructure projects ensures we build a truly liveable community, integral to the region and South Australia's future prosperity."

'Needed' town facilities planned for Milnes Road development

A one-on-one basketball training facility and an allied health service have been revealed to be in the plans for the ongoing Milnes Road development.

As previously reported in *The Southern Argus*, a modern commercial precinct boasting local employment and multiple tenancy opportunities has been in the works at the former Strathalbyn Harnessing Racing Club headquarters.

New development applications have recently been opened for public consultation for the ongoing development for conversion of building 4, tenancy 1 – which is currently approved for warehouse use – to an indoor recreation centre with associated on-site parking, and change of use to building 5, tenancy 1 – which is currently approved for warehouse use – to consulting rooms, including associated fit-out.

Developer Richard Shoesmith told *The Argus* the indoor recreation centre will be a coaching centre/one-on-one training facility, which will be "quite important for the town" and "fill a need" not currently here.

This is a fact that is well-known by the Strathalbyn and District Basketball Association.

The association has been fighting for more basketball facilities in the growing town, particularly at Lot 10, Langhorne Creek Road.

Committee member Chris Clark, who has been an outspoken advocate on the issue, welcomed any additional facilities

in Strathalbyn

"Anything that brings people to the sport, we're very happy with that," he said.

"While this one we don't have any direct involvement, it would maybe assist our players and community.

"It is a private enterprise, so if we utilise it there would be a hire fee, but we are limited to where we can play basketball and that could be a good training facility maybe once we get a few more details."

Meanwhile, the consulting rooms will be for an allied health service helping train pensioners and people that need specific help with movement.

Both operations will be run by local people who are expanding their business.

"We're getting a lot of that first-time business people and start-up sort of stuff, where they can't find anything at a reasonable price or right size to go," Mr Shoesmith said.

"None of the changes (in the development) are particularly different from what was there originally."

Buildings 6 to 9 are currently proposed for use as warehouse/service trade premises.

Tyndale leaders prepped and ready for end-of-year exams

Tyndale Christian School's student leaders Mia and Shana say taking care of your health should be the first priority for those completing their end-of-year exams from this week.

The main exam period began on Monday for more than 12,500 secondary students enrolled in examined Stage 2 SACE subjects as part of their South Australian Certificate of Education (SACE) qualification, rounding up next Friday, November 15.

Tyndale Christian School Strathalbyn year 12 students Mia and Shana have been preparing ahead of this week for their exams – the former for general maths and nutrition, and the latter for nutrition, biology and maths methods.

Both have found practice questions and revising over past exams to be the most useful.

"I was doing flash cards, which helped to revise all the content," Shana said.

"Then I'm hoping to go through them a couple more times.

"Practice questions are really helpful, and the revision guides give you lots of exam questions from past exams which are good to look at."

Mia has also been remembering to highlight difficult questions to go back over later. "I initially started with going over my textbook content and taking out key ideas, and actively recalling what I was meant to know," she said.

"Then I've been doing practice questions and exams to solidify my knowledge.

"Then obviously, highlighting the questions I struggled with and going back over that content.

"Doing practice exams and all that makes me feel a bit better about them."

Surprisingly, both feel most confident in their maths exam.

That's because for Shana, it's "less scientific".

"For biology and nutrition, you have to use your words a lot to describe stuff and I find that difficult sometimes, but maths is a lot of numbers and it just clicks in my brain," she said.

Mia has applied to study speech pathology at Flinders University, with her back-up preferences being occupational therapy or counselling, while Shana wants to pursue paramedicine at university.

However, both were open to other options.

Ahead of the exams, Shana told her peers to make sure they are getting enough sleep and taking care of their health, so they are mentally prepared on the day.

Mia's parting advice for the year 11 students who will be in their place next year was to use their time wisely and start revising early.

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she gets to a drum, she can roughly work out to turn, and they blow a whistle after the

last drum to show her where the gate is out." Megan's daughter also competed in the junior barrel race and was gifted \$200 from a sponsor to put towards her riding career.

Other entertainment was also on show, including busker Malachi Frost and local band Motel Music, while Zac Taylor was offering helicopter rides.

Competitors and crowd members travelled from as far as Broken Hill, Blayney, near Melbourne, and across South Australia.

"For those that were new to rodeo, they certainly got a dusting," Ms Angel said.

Meanwhile in Strathalbyn, local kids descended through the streets, particularly popular around the loop of Hooper Road, Strathmont Drive and Parker Avenue.





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






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Car fire causes hundreds of thousands in damage

A car fire at Hindmarsh Island in the early hours of last Thursday morning caused an estimated \$135,000 in damage.

At about 3.30am, eight Country Fire Service (CFS) firefighters on two trucks, with the assistance of SA Police and SA Ambulance, were called to an Arcadia Avenue property following reports of a fire in a vehicle stored under a carport attached to the home.

Upon arrival, the car fire was rapidly spreading to the carport, but a quick CFS response allowed firefighters to assume control of the blaze, and to limit damage to the carport, effectively saving the rest of the house that shared the same roof structure.

The damage to the impacted assets is estimated at \$135,000.

Fire investigators attended the scene later that day, but the cause is yet to be identified.

The property occupants were assessed by SA Ambulance on site and no injuries have been reported.



Drivers urged to dob in SA's risky roads

RAA's Risky Roads survey is now open for drivers to nominate dangerous roads or intersections, with the results to be used by the state's peak motoring body to advocate for safety upgrades.

Risky Roads is SA's most comprehensive state-wide survey of road users aimed at identifying unsafe roads or intersections, with the results then used by RAA's traffic experts to make recommendations to road authorities and the State Government.

Of the 20 most-nominated roads in the latest survey in 2021, 19 have had at least some upgrades completed, announced or a planning study commenced, including the Victor Harbor Road/Hindmarsh Tiers Road intersection, underscoring the potential impact of the community's feedback to RAA.

A recent RAA poll of motorists found 73 per cent say they regularly drive on a road that makes them feel unsafe, with the most common safety concerns being related to road surface, dangerous road users and poor road layout.

'Our Risky Roads survey is the biggest piece of community research we undertake every few years to inform our infrastructure priorities that we present to government and road authorities on a regular basis," RAA Senior Traffic Engineer, Matt Vertudaches, said.

"Nominations can be made by all South Australians for a range of issues, from poorly maintained road surfaces through to dangerous road user behaviour or unsafe intersection design.

"The local knowledge that drivers have about the roads and intersections they travel on every day is invaluable, and helps us identify areas that have an increased risk of serious crashes occurring."

All South Australians can nominate roads or intersections until December 4 at (raa. com.au/riskyroads), as well as provide any feedback on why they find a road or intersection risky.

Fatal crash at Wattle Flat

A Victor Harbor man has been charged after his truck collided with multiple vehicles at Wattle Flat on Monday, killing two women.

At about 12.15pm, police and emergency services were called to Main South Road after a truck and trailer collided with three vehicles - a black Ford sedan, a silver Ford sedan and a white ute.

Sadly, two women, who were rear passengers in the silver Ford, both died of their injuries – one at the scene at the scene and the second in hospital.

The deaths are the 74th and 75th lives lost on South Australian roads so far this year.

Seven other people were injured in the rash – some of them critically.

The silver Ford driver, a 43-year-old man, was taken to hospital in a critical condition, while his 14-year-old male passenger also went to hospital with minor injuries.

The ute driver, a 48-year-old Hay Flat man,

was taken to hospital in a serious condition.

The black Ford driver, a 38-year-old woman, and her two passengers, a 45-yearold man and a 10-year-old girl, were all taken to hospital with non-life-threatening injuries.

The truck driver, a 35-year-old Victor Harbor man, was taken to hospital with minor injuries.

He was later arrested by Major Crash investigators and charged with two counts of causing death by dangerous driving, two counts of causing serious harm by dangerous driving, and four counts of causing harm by dangerous driving.

The man was granted police bail to appear in Christies Beach Magistrates Court on

Freak accident at Mt Compass

A child is in a stable condition after a fall at Mount Compass last Wednesday.

Around 3.30pm on October 30, it is understood the girl was being pushed in a pram at Mount Compass oval when the accident happened.

Specialist emergency crews raced to the scene and worked on the child before she was airlifted to Adelaide.

Van and truck collide at **Murray Bridge**

A local man sustained serious injuries after his van collided with a truck at Murray Bridge North in the early hours of last Wednesday morning.

At about 2.15 am on October 30, police and emergency services were called to Mannum Road, near Reedy Creek Road, after a Hyundai van collided with the side of a B-triple road train.

The driver of the van, a 60-year-old local man, sustained serious injuries in the crash and was airlifted to Adelaide for treatment.

The truck driver was uninjured.

Mt Barker man arrested over police pursuit

A Mount Barker man was arrested after leading police on a chase through the metropolitan area on Monday.

At about 1.40pm, police allegedly spotted a blue/white motorcycle on Hereford Street at Enfield, which checks revealed its registration had expired and the plates failed to match the bike's description.

The motorcycle then sped off towards the city on Main North Road, travelling south while PolAir was called in to follow

It drove around the eastern side of the city and headed east on Magill Road, then south on Portrush Road, speeding on to the South Eastern Freeway and heading east before exiting on to Bald Hills Road.

The rider was tracked to his house in Mount Barker where he was arrested.

The 28-year-old man was charged with numerous traffic offences, including engaging in a police pursuit, driving unlicenced, excessive speed, and unlawful

He was bailed to appear in the Mount Barker Magistrates Court on December 11.

Local drivers reported at Murray Bridge

Two local drivers will front court for unregistered and he was disqualified traffic offences committed at Murray Bridge over the last week.

On Friday, a 24-year-old Murray Bridge man was stopped on Old Swanport Road, where police checks revealed his car was from driving.

He was reported and his vehicle impounded for 28 days.

On Monday Murray Bridge police observed a vehicle driving erratically on Agricultural Drive, and the driver perform a sustained wheel spin.

Police reported the driver, a 21-year-old Murray Bridge man, and impounded his vehicle for 28 days.

Both will appear in court at a later date.


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

Movie making at the movies

A small team of movie makers descended on Wallis Cinemas at Mount Barker recently to film a scene for the short film *Little Kindness*.

Little Kindness was created as an entry in the Adelaide 48-Hour Film Project by the team 'Often Running'.

The 48-Hour Film Project challenges film makers to create a short film in just 48 hours in a global event that happens in more than 150 cities across the world.

It all begins at a Friday night kick-off event where teams in each city draw genres out of a hat and receive the required elements for each film.

The teams then have 48 hours to write, shoot, edit, and do whatever it takes to submit the completed short film by the Sunday night.

Team leader for *Little Kindness* Rick Clise said the challenge was "a lot of fun".

"Each team is given three required elements that they have to incorporate in their script," he said.

"One is a character name and this year the character was Ashley Green – dog catcher, while the required prop was an ice cube and the required line of dialogue was 'this, my friend, is my favourite part'.

"Each team also draws two genres out of a hat, and they can use one or both genres in their script.

"The genres we drew were sci-fi and road movie, and we decided to go with road movie for our genre."

This year's 48 Hour Film Project is Mr Clise's third, and this time around he is team

leader, producer, editor, and also the writer, after the team's designated one had to pull out on the Friday evening.

"The tagline is that a lonely widow is trying to go through her grief and working with a third party who is the dog catcher, who is supporting her, but it comes as a cost," Mr Clise said.

The scene shot at Wallis Cinemas last month was the start of the movie, featuring Karen Williams as 'Mary' and James McCluskey-Garcia as 'Ash Green – dog catcher'.

Also bringing the film to life were a number of other Adelaide Hills creatives, including Gail Morrison as 'Bobby', director and camera operator David Moore, sound recordist Bruce Hall, and boom operator Kevin Cringle and others, making up a team of nine people, with many of the crew also acting as extras.

Little Kindness screened at the Mercury Cinema in Adelaide on Tuesday, with awards such as People's Choice Award, Best Cinematography, Best Editing, Best Audio, Best Sscript and Best Performances up for grabs.

"Then the best film for the city goes on to a national competition, and the best Australian 48-Hour Film Project goes on to an international competition," Mr Clise said.

"It is a huge amount of fun.

"It is a crazy weekend, sleep-deprived weekend, but it is just a lot of fun, and it is wonderful to be able to put something together in such a short amount of time.

"It is a no budget film, as no-one can be paid or do anything for a fee – it is entirely voluntary."

Mr Clise said the team had "great support" from both Mount Barker Council and Wallis Cinemas who supported the application to film in their jurisdiction.

Tightening the belt

There's no doubt about it, a dollar doesn't stretch as far as it used to.

I have been having this discussion with my daughter Jessica over the past couple of months, as she picks up extra shifts as a nurse to meet all her expenses.

She lives in the outskirts of Melbourne. It was a lengthy struggle to find somewhere she could live by herself and afford.

She wanted to know what I thought would be the minimum amount of money you would need to earn each week to be able to live comfortably enough to cover basic expenses such as rent, food, transport and utilities, with a bit extra for emergencies in case the car broke down, which it has done before.

We came up with the figure, for Melbourne at least, of about \$1000 a week.

There are so many people who don't come close to earning this much money in their weekly pay packet.

Coming up to Christmas this year our support groups across the Hills and Fleurieu are all expecting the lean times for many to transform into an increased demand for Christmas hampers and other support.

This cycle of hardship also impacts on our small businesses.

People are spending less, so businesses in turn have to put prices up to cover the many costs they have to meet each week such as their own rent, electricity bills, insurance, freight costs – the list goes on.

There are some State Government support packages for individuals and families, along with some help for small business – such as Round 2 of the Economic Recovery Fund to support up to 8000 eligible small businesses and not-for-profit organisations with grants between \$2500 and \$50,000 to invest in energy efficient equipment of other improvements to reduce and manage energy usage.

These are little things that help, but for now, for many, they are not enough.

Buying local has never been so important, so skip the big companies this Christmas and support those for which a dollar has never meant so much.

Compass prepares for an emergency

The amount of community interest in a recent emergency preparedness day at Mount Compass exceeded the organisers' expectations.

More than 50 people learned how to prepare for bushfire season and other emergencies during a special event recently held at Mount Compass.

The newly-formed Mount Compass Resilience Group hosted the event which included activities, games, a sausage sizzle, and a lecture by the Country Fire Service (CFS).

Chair Andrew Wilson was "surprised" with the numbers of people who attended the day. "I didn't expect... for us to be that busy with the community coming through," he said.

"It was a good day – we had good feedback." Mr Wilson credited the day's success to the volunteers – members from the CFS, Red Cross, Mount Compass' Community Shed, Lifestyle Group, and Resilience Group.

The potential future emergencies for the region are "debatable", but bushfires are a current focus, with the local CFS recently responding to three incidents within one week.

"After bushfires, we would be more concerned with a heatwave or a cold snap where we have power failure because – unless people have their own generators – there is no back up power source in Mount Compass," Mr Wilson said.

"None of the facilities we have at the moment have back up power, which is next on our program – to look at how we get that fixed."

While floods are less likely, farmers could get stranded on their properties if it occurred, as Mr Wilson has seen photos of historic floods where Nangkita and Mount Compass were isolated from the other.







Teaming up for Shannons Adelaide Rally

Strathalbyn drivers Steve Coombe and Graeme Nicholson are teaming up to take part in this year's Shannons Adelaide Rally in a Volvo most recently used to promote Gilbert's Motor Museum.

The rally is one of the largest tarmac rally events in the world that is based in Adelaide, with 30 stages across November 8 and 10 in and around the Adelaide Hills.

The Strathalbyn Lunch Stop and Town Stage debuted at last year's rally and was such a hit that this year, on November 10, organisers have scheduled a full rally field through the town streets for two stages, starting on Catherine Street, turning onto Donald Street and Rankine Street before Sunter Street, and crossing the St Andrews Bridge before the stage finish.

Mr Coombe and Mr Nicholson will be taking part in the tour category, with their vehicle holding special significance.

"It is nothing spectacular, but the car itself is significant to me," Mr Coombe said.

"A friend of mine, who we got up to all

sorts of high jinks over the years in cars, passed away last year, and it was the last car in his collection of cars.

"I purchased it and I thought as a thing for Roger (Ingerson) we will do the rally this year in the Volvo.

"It is not much of a sports car, although it has been modified slightly – it has a stage one tune, got some wider than usual tyres, and upgraded springs and dampers.

"It is a bit heavier than what I am used to driving in the rally."

Mr Coombe has taken part in the rally since 2016, but the 2024 event will be the first for Mr Nicholson.

"I consider myself to be too old to be too competitive these days, although, the mind is willing but the body is weak," Mr Coombe said.

"I just go in the tour sections, and I thoroughly enjoy it.

"It is a really lovely experience.

"You meet and become friends with people who are regulars in the event, and you get to drive at perhaps less constrained speeds on familiar roads."

The duo have one aim for the rally.

"It is about competing and having the car still running at the end," Mr Coombe said.

"The gentle drive home in an undamaged

car, that is always our goal, as it is a long walk home otherwise."

The event will be a chance to promote Gilbert's Motor Museum, with the car already adorned with appropriate sign writing.

"I have had the car done locally by the local signwriter to use as a promotional vehicle for the museum," Mr Coombe said.


"We have used it a few times during the year for various events, and I thought, with the stickers on it, we could put it in the rally as well"




Scouts reflect at Macclesfield ahead of Remembrance Day

Editors have included Alan Dennis, Gordon Moore, Doug Lawson, Eric James, Trevor Riches, Graham Warner, Neil Gamble, and current Editor Jan Pinchbeck.

On December 31, 1985, the Probus Club of Strathalbyn was registered with Probus South Pacific, and in February 1986, was issued with a Certificate of Incorporation of an Associaiton.

The membership has remained stable over

At 10 years, it had 36 members, at 20 years 34, 30 years 36 members, and 40 years 39 members

In July 2019, the Probus Club concluded discussion over months of consultation with its members and admitted ladies for the first time.

Since then ladies have provided committee service as Vice-Presidents, Editor, Public Relations, Welfare and Secretary, and in 2025 will have its first female President.

Epic run raises thousands for important cause

An epic 80km run from Victor Harbor to Glenelg to fundraise for childhood dementia research will now pass through Mount Compass thanks to a local getting involved.

After recently ticking the Melbourne Marathon off her bucket list, Mount Compass runner Emma Brokenshire is excited for her next challenge that also fundraises for an important cause.

She has a mutual friend with the creator of Run Robby Run, Robby Lippett, who teamed up with Little Heroes Foundation to fundraise for childhood dementia.

The goal is to fundraise \$80,000 which is \$1000 for every 1km of the route - and at time of publication was coming close with more than \$71,000.

Childhood dementia is a rare neurological condition that affects one in every 2900 children globally.

Similar to adult dementia, symptoms include memory loss, speech difficulties and cognitive confusion.

The condition results from progressive brain damage caused by more than 100 rare genetic conditions and significantly impacts a child's development and overall quality of life.

Currently it has no cure, with half of children with the condition tragically dying by the age of 10 and 75 per cent pass away before their 18th birthday.

Little Heroes Foundation helps fund research aimed at finding a cure at Flinders University.

Awareness of the condition will be spread on December 1, when about a dozen runners will start at Victor Harbor, collecting extra runners at pit stops on the way, including Mount Compass.

"I decided to jump on and do what I love and help make a difference at the same time," Ms Brokenshire said.

"I think we will be taking it pretty slow and steady and promoting as we go along.

"It is not a race – the idea is to be inclusive and get the message out there."

She is calling on other locals to get involved by supporting the crew at the Mount Compass pit stop, whether that be with coffee, help to refuel, or by joining them for the remaining 53km leg of the route.

Taking the high road? Gophers face footpath obstacles

Local gopher riders are being forced to drive on roads in Strathalbyn because of substandard footpaths or a complete lack of them, according to one local user.

Colin Townley has been using a gopher for the past four years and says access issues are a concern for gopher riders, as well as those who use walking frames or wheelchairs in the town.

Mr Townley had a motorcycle accident at 16, and not long after moving to Strathalbyn in 2011 had to use a walking stick to get around.

Then, after a spinal operation about four years ago which eased the pain but affected his balance, he used the stick around home but crutches when outside.

"I so missed walking, so the gopher gave me that independence to feel as if I was walking again," Mr Townley said.

"I can travel up and down the street and I can go to the shop, and I don't need to get the car out, so it has replaced my legs - it is really good."

Mr Townley had praise for the footpaths within the centre of town, but said that outside that area "things can be really horrible".

'Within the township is great- apart from the fact that you can't actually access a lot of the shops because the council has said these are heritage," he said.

"So, I can't go into the butcher and I can't go into Pestka's bakery because they have got steps, and I am in a gopher."

A number of areas have been highlighted where gopher riders have to use roads in

An example was access to the new doctors'

surgery and chemist on the west side of town.
"To get over there you cut across the skatepark, you come to the end, and there is no footpath – it is a road," Mr Townley said.

"So, then you have to be on the road for about 40 to 50m, turn left into the new precinct - the chemists and the doctors there is nothing in between.


"If you are on a walker or a wheelchair, bad luck, that would be really difficult to actually process and move through."

Mr Townley said that was just one example

of the need to use roads. "Sometimes you have to in Strath – there is no other way," he said.

"There are roads around here where the footpaths are shocking, and there is stuff growing over fences and there are pot holes, (so) you don't use the footpath because it is dangerous, so you have to have to go on

"Sometimes I have to go on the road because even though there is a footpath,



it is in such shocking condition that you would never use it.

"I know my way around Strathalbyn enough to say 'I don't go that way anymore"." Crossing South Terrace was another concern for people with accessibility problems.

"When you cross South Terrace, you take your life in your hand because even though they have the koala crossing where you can stop in the middle, if the trucks are barrelling through, you have to stop dead in the middle and make sure your gopher is not sticking out either end," Mr Townley said.

"It will fit just, and then you have to wait for the traffic to come the other way.

"Strathalbyn rush hour – school times in the morning and afternoons - I never go because it is too dangerous."

Mr Townley has approached Alexandrina Council regarding his concerns for disability access but has "basically given up".

"You don't understand accessibility until you have lost it, and that is when you find stuff out constantly," he said.

'Even the public toilets here – the accessible toilets - some of them the doors are so stiff because they are on a tight spring, so you have to push hard to get in.

"In winter they wash the floors and the doors close, so if you go there an hour or two after they have been washed, they are still soaking wet, and if you are on crutches that is deadly.

"Why don't they just prise the door open, leave it so it dries, and someone pops back a few hours later and opens it up?

"How come the springs are so tight that you have to push on the door with all your might to get in there?'

Though, Mr Townley believed those on walkers or in wheelchairs had even more issues than gopher users.

"It is those people who are on walkers, who tend to be very frail, and those people in wheelchairs that are being pushed along or in electric ones, they are the ones that have way more difficulty than I do with footpaths in Strathalbyn," he said.

"I can bounce over them, whereas they have to actually negotiate them all."

While Mr Townley acknowledged the cost of improving the footpaths he would like to see them made wider, level, and cleared of bushes and hedges growing out onto them.

Alexandrina Council Acting Chief Executive Officer Alan Harvey said council has formal pathways prioritisation guidelines to help prioritise new footpaths and pathways across the region.

"These guidelines are available on our

website and they set out considerations for access and mobility needs, and help us determine what are low, medium, or high priority," he said.

"Each year council sets a budget for new footpaths and this set amount, our guidelines, master plan, and the complexity of construction determines what is built and where, and how many footpaths can be built.

"Some footpaths cost more to construct because of where they are, what materials are needed, whether they need stormwater and other considerations."

Last financial year council set aside a budget to construct 1.75km of footpaths.

"Due to community feedback regarding one project along Excelsior Parade on Hindmarsh Island that project was deferred and council constructed 1.2km of new footpaths in 2023/24," Mr Harvey said.

"Council is about to go out for community consultation on our Strategic Plan Review.

"Our pathways prioritisation guidelines form part of our Strategic Asset Management Plan in that review.

"We would encourage the community to give their feedback about pathways through out community consultation process."

Hindmarsh Island code amendment opposed by council

A "premature" code amendment has failed to gain Alexandrina Council's support.

Noble Investments Superannuation launched a proposed code amendment with Planning Minister Nick Champion in December last year to rezone Lot 485 Randell Road at Hindmarsh Island from Rural Living to Rural Neighbourhood Zone to facilitate 2000sqm allotments.

Feedback during community consultation, held between July and September, garnered 48 responses – two from utility providers, three from State Government agencies and 43 from community members – the majority in opposition.

Concerns raised included increased traffic, lack of access, bushfire risk, impact on character, avoidance of on-site stormwater treatment and disposal, flood risk, infrastructure provision, and environmental impacts.

While council missed its opportunity to provide its comments as a stakeholder on the amendment during the consultation period, the Designated Entity agreed to give an extension.

In a letter addressed from Alexandrina Mayor Keith Parkes that councillors agreed to submit to Noble Investments Superannuation, council shared the same concerns as the community.

"Council appreciates the increasing pressure to accommodate additional housing opportunities across the Fleurieu region and is working with the state in identifying future growth areas across the South Coast," the letter read.

"However, in reviewing the proposed code amendment, council believes the proposed rezoning is premature and does not facilitate orderly development.

"In addition, there are opportunities for additional accommodation in existing undeveloped residential zoned areas on Hindmarsh Island."

Council's primary areas of concern included:

- Use of the right of way to service the anticipated number of allotments and the ongoing burden for future residents to maintain the 'private' roads to service allotments.
- For land divisions creating 10 or more allotments, the SA Country Fire Service will require a second road access for emergency purposes given that the affected area is situated within a high bushfire risk area this matter has not yet been resolved.
- Any future on-site waste management systems that are poorly managed will place additional environmental impact to the RAMSAR wetlands

This prompted councillors' lack of support for the proposed development at last Monday night's meeting.

"It represents a disjointed development of Hindmarsh Island area," North Ward councillor, Craig Maidment, said.

"Not to say in future years it could come to fruition, but at this point in time, to have a disjointed number of developments on Hindmarsh Island would be detrimental."

Upon council's submission, the Designated Entity will prepare an engagement report, which, together with any amendment instructions, will be forwarded to Mr Champion for decision

Milang land put forward for revocation

A Milang land owner plans to maintain and repopulate native vegetation, and repair damaged fencing on an adjoining property if the state's planning minister approves for its community land classification to be revoked and then sold by Alexandrina Council.

After receiving a request from the adjacent land owner of Lot 4 Landseer Road to purchase and amalgamate it with their existing property, council agreed in June to undertake public consultation on a proposal to revoke the site's community land classification and dispose of it by sale.

Held from August 22 to September 13, the consultation garnered 14 submissions – half in support and half in opposition – with those against the sale citing it needed to be retained as uncleared land and open space could threaten existing biodiversity.

However, the inquiring landowner Wendy Johnson assured her intent was to maintain the adjacent property in accordance with fire management requirements, manage flora to encourage bird life and native animals, reduce habitat for vermin, manage weeds and replant native species, repair and replace damaged fences, and undertake responsible rotational grazing to control grasses.

At last month's council meeting, she presented a deputation explaining her plans.

"Our request is to incorporate the land into our existing title and remove the burden with respect to fire load reduction management, weed and pest control," Ms Johnson said.

"Our intention is to complete all boundary fencing requirements at our cost, and maintain the land in line with the local area.

"The sale of land will offer council revenue and reduce on-ground operation expenditure for maintenance.

"It will also offer the community and users of the Nurragi trail an aesthetically pleasing view.

"Additional native plantings will offer native wildlife habitat further and improve the landscape.

"We do run a few horses for personal pleasure and grass management, but we very much enjoy the rural aspect of the land, and wish to maintain this aspect for residents and visitors"

At the meeting, councillors supported the revocation and disposal of the land.

The decision will now be presented to Planning Minister Nick Champion for approval.

This will coincide with another revocation of community land classification status at Milang made on the same night.

Drive' has existed since at least 1947, transitioning from crown land to a road over time, starting with a casual walking path that was widened by informal vehicle use into an unsealed road that required maintenance to eventually sealed in recognition that it provided a natural access point to the river.

Goolwa Code Amendment raises a 'stink' with council

The potential for an odour overflow under a proposed Goolwa Code Amendment has raised a 'stink' with Alexandrina Council, who have asked for guarantees from the developer.

Beston Parks Land Company launched a proposed code amendment with Planning Minister Nick Champion in July to rezone 76 Kessell Road from Rural and Deferred Urban Zone to Caravan and Tourist Park Zone.

This will enable them to facilitate an expansion of the adjacent Discovery Parks tourist park to meet growing demand for short-term accommodation.

Feedback during community consultation, held for a six-week period between August and September, garnered eight responses – three from utility providers, two from government agencies, and three from community members.

Of the community responses, one was in support, another with no objections but a request for additional footpath and street trees, and a third in opposition.

While council missed its opportunity to provide its comments as a stakeholder on the amendment during the consultation period, the Designated Entity agreed to give an extension.

In a letter addressed from Alexandrina Mayor Keith Parkes that councillors agreed at last month's meeting to submit to Beston Parks Land Company, council supported the intent of the Code Amendment, but raised concerns about the retention of vegetation across the affected land, and potential odour complaints from the decreased 'buffer' due to the development.

"Entering into a land management agreement or a document of similar ilk prior to a decision on the code amendment is recommended, clearly identifying the vegetation to be retained so any future development application will enable the protection of existing vegetation," the letter read.

"Council's Wastewater Treatment Plant (WWTP) is a significant infrastructure investment and the envisaged development of the affected area will reduce the 'buffer' contingency to 40 metres.

"Any odour complaints received via the Environment Protection Authority may warrant additional odour treatment works – the cost of which will be borne by council.

"Council seeks information that the proposed rezoning to the caravan park and tourist zone does not compromise the continued operation of the WWTP, nor prevent any future expansion if required.

"In addition, any future upgrades to council's infrastructure will need to satisfy the criteria of the environment protection policy, which may warrant more works than what would ordinarily be expected under existing conditions.

"Therefore, it is requested the designated entity demonstrate that with any future caravan park extension, the level of upgrade required by council in the event of an expansion to the WWTP to abate noise will not be more than what is currently required."

Upon council's submission, the Designated Entity will prepare an engagement report, which, together with any amendment instructions, will be forwarded to Mr Champion for decision.

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Cost-of-living crisis sees businesses s

There's no doubt about it, money doesn't seem to stretch as much as it used to.

For many households, the expenses they incur when buying the goods and services needed to maintain a certain standard of living has increased.

Increases in electricity, insurance, mortgage rates, food, beverages, fuel, transport - they all add up.

What does this all mean for our small business owners who also have these pressures and are seeing consumers being more cautious with their money?

According to an Australian Chamber of Commerce and Industry survey, small business owners have been struggling for some time, and the situation is getting worse for many.

The 2024 survey revealed 45 per cent of small businesses have considered leaving or closing their business in the past 12 months, 40 per cent anticipate a reduced or significantly reduced profit, 61 per cent say the impact of red tape has increased, and 50 per cent say they are spending more time and money on red tape than 12 months ago.

As the cost of living continues to bite, Southern Argus Editor Deirdre Graham spoke with some of the region's small business owners and a support organisation to hear how the 'belt tightening' has been affecting them.

Strath Neighbourhood Centre reports increased need

The number of people seeking help as the cost of living is bites is on the rise at the Strath Neighbourhood Centre, which is experiencing the issue themselves.

Manager Mal Sutcliffe first noticed the

gradual increase about 18 months ago.

He said people, particularly the elderly on lower grade pensions, have had difficulty spreading a dollar far enough.

"It is generally those on the lower incomes - which is obvious - but I have also noticed there is a little bit of a middle cohort - those that are driving around and you would think 'yeah, you are not doing it too tough'," Mr Sutcliffe said.

"But surprisingly, those people are not necessarily doing as well as what we think because they may have mortgages that are really eating into their income (or) they may have other activities that are part of quality of life that they may have to let go because of the costs."

The neighbourhood centre provides support to the Strathalbyn community in a number of ways, including emergency food relief, community lunch, a garden, a repair shed, and a safe place to chat.

Its programs are aimed at reducing the feeling of loneliness and breaking the isolation barriers experienced by many locals.

More people are taking advantage of the activities available at the centre, as they look to cut back on those they once took

"Maybe the word is spreading that it is not a bad place to come to," Mr Sutcliffe said.

"I think part of that is that they are

recognising this is where they can get some fellowship and some companionship... and instead of travelling to Mount Barker... they are hanging around here a bit more closer to home, which is a bit more cost-effective."

But they too have been impacted by the rise in the cost of living, particularly for the community lunch, amid growing demand.

Numbers for the Tuesday \$5 lunch have now risen to 50 people and are heading towards 60.

"That is going to be impacted," Mr Sutcliffe said.

"I have been watching the figures there, and we, as an organisation, get far less for the money I spend than what we were getting.

"I don't plan the menu too far in advance now, and when I do go and do the shopping on the day of the lunch, I look to see what is the best I can get at the best price."

It has meant the price of the lunch is expected to soon rise.

"We are only talking small amounts, but if we are looking to go up \$3 from \$5 to \$8, that is a fairly big jump in percentage terms, but in real terms it is not even the price of a cup of coffee - that some people can't afford anyhow," he said.

"However, if someone can't afford it, they have only got to come and see us, and we will provide a voucher.

"Having to put the cost up goes against the grain, but if we don't we won't be able to continue to provide the lunch."

The Strath Neighbourhood Centre recently hosted a small business breakfast aimed at supporting small business owners.

Mr Sutcliffe said it was time governments on all levels pressure larger companies with



"ridiculous profits" to do more to close the wealth gap.

"Our small businesses, while on the surface they look like they are doing well and they are making lots of profit, they are not really making lots of profit," he said.

"Like a hardware shop, you have to put stock on the shelves and there is a lot of stock, but if you are not moving it or if you put your price up and it sits there, it is costing you money as well just to have it sitting."

Market shift sees less customers through the door

Notching up 10 years at Strathalbyn H Hardware, Candeece Falland noticed the biggest indicator of a change in the market came around Christmas time last year.

She says the business has seen a shift from COVID, where people were going "absolutely mad" with DIY projects to spending on just the essentials.

'We are not seeing the foot traffic that we were seeing prior to that," Miss Falland said.

"There's been a shift from COVID when people were just going absolutely mad and doing everything to their house.

"While our electricity bill is at least offset by our large solar system on the roof, even that has gone from us not having a bill to suddenly having a bill... so that would have gone up probably 50 to 60 per cent realistically."

Miss Falland has also noticed the different spending habits among the generations shopping at the store, with younger people having tighter budgets.

"The younger generation who have just gone into mortgages, most definitely they are strapped for cash because they bought houses that probably they couldn't afford in an economic cycle where interest rates were low, and now they are actually feeling the lifestyle crunch," she said.

"I think, in general, people forget that good and bad times are a reality of life and we have had an incredibly long period in the general economy of good times.

"So, therefore, do we have a cost-of-living

crisis or do we have a cost-of-lifestyle crisis because everybody has to have 15 TVs, seven new cars and lunch out every day?

"Are we having to pull in our belts? Most

While COVID for her store as an essential service was "brilliant" because they were the local gas supplier, Miss Falland could see the change coming.

"Getting stock in post-COVID has been a challenge," she said.

"We have had to change suppliers to make sure we still have stuff on the shelf.

"I was actually prepared for this because I follow the financial markets and I also follow what is going on in the mortgage market, so we started to change our strategy prior to August last year when a lot of people were coming off the mortgage cliff... so we had already started changing our strategy with our stocking levels before that."

Prices have had to increase if a price increase from suppliers occurs, with freight increases "ridiculous".

"I think the banks have a lot to do with the cost-of-living crisis," Miss Falland said.

"I think the Australian Government has a lot to do with its decision-making and its policy-making on the cost-of-living crisis.

"I think the next 12 months is going to be incredibly challenging, especially for small business, who are used to running in the good times."



struggling to survive under pressures

General Store attempts to keep positive outlook

Langhorne Creek General Store owner Chris Holecek is focusing on the positives, despite believing tough times will continue.

Cost-of-living expenses have been hitting the local business hard.

At one point, during a three-month period over winter, it got so bad it almost caused Mr Holecek and his partner Sarah Watkins, to close the doors.

"Being a small business, there just seems to be so many peaks and troughs," Mr Holecek said.

"Your levels get up, but they go straight back down again - you never plateau.

"This year has probably been the most affected that we have been because our trade is down this year about 15 per cent, and we have had some months when we have been down 20 per cent on previous months.

"We were one major breakdown away from closing our doors, but since then, we are sort of back to where we need to be.

"But it just peaks and troughs, you have to go with the flow and hope that the trade keeps continuing."

Among the costs, electricity has been "a killer".

We went from about \$900 a month to over \$1200 in a heartbeat," Mr Holecek said.

"The cost of supplying all the products are gradual increases - they don't happen at once – but we will get notified if there is a price rise coming, and then we have to adjust our prices.

"We have a decent turn-over, but our expenses are massive, so with our annual turn-over, our expenses would be probably 90 per cent of our turn-over each year.

"So, we probably only make a 10 per cent net profit on our annual turn-over if

"We have definitely been forced to put our prices up unwillingly just because of the cost of everything for us and our margins... anything cooked like hamburgers and steak sandwiches, there is a really small percentage of margin, so we have to concentrate on other things that cost us a bit less to prop that margin up."

But the costs don't stop there, and they

"I call them profit killers – electricity, GST, government expenses and bank charges," Mr Holocek said.

"Bank charges and fees are a really big expense for us.

'We would love nothing more than to be cash only, but you can't ... a lot of people these days don't carry a lot of cash."

Mr Holecek said many of his customers were battling with increasing costs and pressures in their lives, affecting the amount of money they were spending in the store.

"People have to tighten their belts and have to watch what they spend... this is like a luxury coming in and getting take away food," he said.

"It is not the sort of business that you are going to get rich or retire early from, but we love the shop and we just love the community here.



"Amid all the doom and gloom of do anything to change it, so you just focus go from there."

Not such a sweet time at Goolwa's lolly shop

Lyn Clark from River Dolls of Goolwa and Dollies Lollies has seen the bad and the good over the 25 years she has ran her museum of 3000 dolls and lolly shop, with the cost of living just another hurdle.

COVID was her biggest challenge, which forced her to close the museum for the duration of the pandemic, but noted the cost of living began having quite an impact around Christmas time.

"You need the better sales to pay the bills and see you through the difficult times," Mrs Clark said.

"You would know which ones were going to be good months and the not-such-good months, but (now with the bad months) it has been very bad.

"Insurance is at least a good third higher, but when you consider we haven't made any claims that would justify it...

"It has been particularly difficult and you have to justify, 'do we put in an order this month or do we wait a bit longer?' - perhaps decide not to offer so many options – because if they don't sell, you are not making any money."

Like Mr Holecek, Mrs Clark has had to put prices up and has some bad news for those who love chocolate.

"At the moment, the price of chocolate has skyrocketed, so all of our suppliers that use chocolate in their manufacturing... each time their order forms come in, the price of chocolate has affected those," she said.

"Come Christmas, we are noticing a big difference in what we paid for lollies with chocolate last year, compared with what is currently being charged.

'It is creeping up now to at least a 50 per cent increase, which is huge.

"Chocolate is a treat, but it is something

that people like to give as a gift, particularly for Christmas and birthdays. and other special times like Mothers Day and Fathers Day."

Another problem for Mrs Clark has been the effect of the price of petrol.

"You also have problems with the price increase of petrol and that is affecting deliveries, so every time you get something delivered, that company is under stress as well," she said.

"They try and keep their prices as best they can, but all their delivery prices have gone up as well.

"It is everything, and that is why it is hard to predict how it is going to work out because there are so many categories that influence your business that are all suffering.

"We have tried to control the prices but we have had to put the prices up, and the children in particular notice it when they haven't got all that much money to spend when they are on their way home from school – something they paid 20 cents for for quite some time is now 40 or 50 cents.

Mrs Clark says the future will depend on what governments can do to assist.

"If they make decisions that are encouraging for people to give them the confidence to keep going, then things will improve, but if the traders in particular lose confidence, they will close," she said.

"We are fortunate we built this building so we haven't had to pay rent... if I had to pay rent I don't know that I will still be open.

'Because we are independent in the way that we have been able to run our business... we have been able to weather the storm a lot better than others have simply because they have had to pay the rent, the staff, and all those sorts of things.



"If you can't pay them you have the option of either going into debt, which a lot of people don't want to do, or you close."

Mrs Clark said customers were tightening how much money they give children to spend in the lolly shop, and more people were approaching her to see if she would buy any dolls they bring in.

"I have been inundated," she said.

"What people are doing is they are selling their own things to get a little bit of expendable income to see them through the difficult times.

"People are considering, 'do I keep my treasures or do I try and sell them?', and that is a difficult decision for people to make."



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

Haberfield pips the early leaders

The Strathalbyn Golf club conducted a Stableford competition last Saturday with all but one group hitting off early due to the predicted heat.

That group of five contained the winner of the day in Alan Haberfield coming in with 42 points in a field of 39.

'Lord' Haberfield had his work cut out for him as Don Bell came in earlier with a score of 41 points, which was then beaten by Stuart Warnock on a count back.

Habers picked up birdies on the seventh being just off the green in two and the 15th with his ball just running past the NTP plate.

There were a few tragedies in his round having 41 and 39 off the stick for 20 and 22 points, one of his partners Kim Wittwer keeping him honest with

Don was well on his way to setting a big total when, with 40 off the stick on the front nine picked up 24 points to win the prize for the best front nine, having putted in twice from off the green and landing his tee shots on the sixth and eighth green.

After a par on the 10th Don ran into a bit of trouble on the 11th with a double bogie on the 11th, while grandson Cooper Barker was in the trees with his tee shot and then under a bush near the green, also having six for the hole.

Don travelled from left to right off the fairway on the 12th but was still in contention for a par if he could sink another putt from off the green.

But his putt only made it half way to the hole as his next putt went in and out of the hole, just like partner Kevin Shepley's putt for par on his way to nine's of 14 and 15.

Cooper, however, sunk a long putt for par

The 13th saw Don in the drain off the tee on the right and he was still in it after his second shot for another double bogie and he was in early trouble off the 14 tee when the ball didn't travel too far as it hit the big tree on the left near the drain.

Kobi Hutchinson, also in that group, went further left with his tee shot onto the 13th fairway saying that at least he got to play on that fairway as none of his shots were on it on his way to that green.

Don did recover to have 19 points on the back nine but was later rolled by Stuart Warnock.

As for Stuart he played some great recovery shots, picking up two birdies from off the green, as he had nine's of

21 and 20

Des Kelly, not used to real early morning starts, had a few problems adjusting his games with 16 points on the front nine but then had pars on the 10th and 11th, but said on the 12th, after his poor tee shot, that he would not be making a par five on this hole, but he did on his way to 20 points on the back nine and 36 in total to beat three younger players in his group in Henry Kelly, Ben McLeod and Ben

The bright spot in this group was Henry Kelly, who after sinking a long putt on the ninth and having tree trouble on the 10th in trying to cut the corner, put plenty of effort in his tee shot on the 11th, almost falling over as he had an 'airv'.

His next shot off the tee was not that long by his standards, while his third shot went far right up past the first tee block heading towards the practice fairway to finish with a double bogie.

Ben McLeod on the seventh lining up a shot at the green over the dam found his eight iron getting over the dam and over the boundary fence and onto the road.

On the 10th Ben also tried to cut the corner with his tee shot finishing on the 12th fairway but he had a clear shot at the 10th green finishing just off it, but like Henry and Ben Clark, who went over the back, still only had six, while Des calmly sank his par four putt.

Ben Clark, after picking up after six shots on the 11th, had a problem in going over the back of the green on the day, like he did in getting out of the dam on the 16th, then chipping the ball back into the hole.

On the 17th par three his tee shot went over the back of the green but he recovered to pick up a par, as did Des Kelly in landing his tee shot on the green, while Henry, after a stray tee shot, picked up a four, as did Ben McLeod after missing a one foot putt - a bit like his putting effort on the 11th when his was just off the edge of the green with his second shot and taking four putts to get the ball in.

Some players to still have reasonable scores but with a few problems included Terry Merritt on 33, starting off on fire until he found himself pinned against the fence at the back of the

Mike Semple got 33 points with pars on the first and 10th holes but produced just one putt on two holes, while Sam Avramidis, with 37, quickly turned a birdie two into a bogie five on the 15th.

Gary Beasley was travelling well with

34 points, striking trouble on the par three 15th when going right with his tee shot, then went over the back of the green before seeing his third shot go well past the flag and then missing the putt to have his first scrub for the day.

Brian Simpson, playing with Kingsley Handke and Michael Clarke, said he was in no danger of coming last with his 27 points, but he must have thought that to win the hole in one jackpot money on the par three eighth was to hit the sign on the edge of the 17th tee block just up a bit, as he did, the ball going half way down the fairway.

Kingsley was bragging on the sixth as his tee shot over the creek finished 10 metres below the green and then proceeded to chip the ball over the rise and in for a birdie two.

Michael Clarke certainly had some issues to deal with on the 13th as his second shot hit Kingsley Handke's cart near the green, then only getting his short chip shot up the rise to the edge of the green before sinking a long par

He finished the round with 37 points as he picked up three points on five holes for the back nine.

Darryl Holt certainly had plenty of problems in scrubbing the first three holes and had three more scrubs on the back nine for scores of eight and

Good to see Sydney Swan's player Matthew Roberts on leave back home to play at Royal Strathalbyn with his handicap of three, but he was a bit off the pace with only 30 points for the round, scrubbing the par three 17th despite his tee shot being just off the

Matthew did have birdies on the eighth, 13th and 16th, on which he held nearest third shot prize (0-18) being about two feet from the pin.

However, Matthew's effort on the par five 16th was not to last as there were a few eagles flying around on the day, two of then popping up on the 16, when Andrew Hentschke and Sean Naylon, playing with Graeme Bertholini and Sean Walsh, both landed on the green with their second shot.

While captain Bertholini had first go down hill to salvage a par missed by an inch, he cheekily then marked his ball to let Andrew and Sean have a go at their long uphill putts to pick up the nearest third shot prize, but they both went one better in getting their third shot in the hole for eagles.

The pair carried on with their antics on the 17th when Sean Navlon, with his second shot, in chipping from just and A.Hentschke.

Bergen Raises provide us with options for bidding with 4-card support for partner's Major suit, and that means we need new methods of bidding 3 and 5 card support. With 3-card support, a weak response is 2H over 1H, a strong response is a delayed raise to the level appropriate fir Total Points held.

With 5-card support, and based on the Law of Total Tricks, the correct response is 4H, a pre-emptive raise, for any 5-card supporting hand that has no prospect of going beyond Game, say, 0 to 12 Total Points, but with 0 – 6 some distributional values will be highly desirable. With 6 – 12 TP, you have other welldeveloped ways of reaching the optimum contract, sometimes you will treat the 5th trump as a bonus and stick ti Bergen Raises. A preemptive raise gives you a device for the lower point-count hands.

In the above hand played in A-Grade, three pairs found the 4 Spades contract, and with the bidding as above, East/West were cut off from discovering their Heart fit and 11 tricks. This was the results: -






