New legislation to overhaul laws governing dog breeders, including a robust new licensing scheme, and limits on the number of female animals per breeding program and number of litters that can be bred by the licence holder, is being introduced by the State Government.

The new reforms will impose increased penalties for dog owners whose pet attacks people and animals, and the ability to issue control orders on dogs that continually wander at large, with penalties of up to \$2500 each time a dog with a control order is caught wandering.

Dog attacks have skyrocketed in South Australia, with 503 people presenting at a public hospital in the past year from attacks, while another 1200 dog attacks were reported to SA councils last year.

The Langhorne Creek community on traditional Ngarrindjeri Country, with its beautiful Angas and Bremer Rivers, gumtrees and ancient landscape are depicted in a newly-launched public painting.

Named Murrund-engk (Two Rivers), the painting is by Ngarrindjeri artist Kath Moore and is displayed at the updated tourism information bay, while the original will be displayed at Langhorne Creek Grape & Wine Inc.'s office, the region's cellar doors and Alexandrina Council galleries.

In the painting, Ms Moore described the two rivers are depicted feeding into Lake Alexandrina, bringing water and life to the ancient flood plain lands.

The Ngori (pelican) – an important Ngarrindjeri Ngartji (totem) – represents miwi, the spiritual connection that Ngarrindjeri people have with the land, sky and waters.

"The painting reflects the abundance of Lake Alexandrina and surrounds and its influence on the local climate," Ms Moore said.

"The circle in the middle represents the community, Langhorne Creek, as the meeting place where people gather and share stories."

Ms Moore is a Ngarrindjeri and Kaurna contemporary Aboriginal artist from Adelaide. Telling the stories of the Ngarrindjeri and

Kaurna people helps Kath share more than 60,000 years of a rich culture passed down from her ancestors.

The artwork was launched on October 4 and commissioned by Langhorne Creek Grape & Wine Inc. and made possible with the support of a Creative Communities Grant from Alexandrina Council.

"We see this as a valuable piece to represent

the region," Langhorne Creek Grape & Wine Inc Executive Officer, Lian Jaensch, said.

"I really want to congratulate Kath for making such a beautiful piece... I think this is a really great outcome for the region."

Alexandrina Mayor Keith Parkes was "excited" to be part of this collaboration between one of Australia's oldest wine regions and the traditional owners.



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#### New dog-related reforms introduced amid increase in reports

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The new reforms will impose increased penalties for dog owners whose pet attacks people and animals, and the ability to issue control orders on dogs that continually wander at large, with penalties of up to \$2500 each time a dog with a control order is caught wandering.

Dog attacks have skyrocketed in South Australia, with 503 people presenting at a public hospital in the past year from attacks, while another 1200 dog attacks were reported to SA councils last year.

In Alexandrina Council, 71 reports of dog-related incidents were made to the Community Safety team over the last 12 months, including 45 allegations of dog attacks and 26 reports of harassment by dogs.

Strathalbyn councillor Craig Maidment was "disturbed" by the number of reports locally.

"One in particular disturbed me because it was a little tiny dog and it got chewed up by a retriever, and it cost the guy \$600 and he is a pensioner," he said.

"I know of one dog attack that just happened not 20 metres from my place, and it cost the owner \$3000 to fix the dog up that was attacked by two others.

"They did stump up the money though to their credit, but you don't need that aggravation, and you need to be able to walk your dogs on a leash in this town, but it is hard to police."

All Alexandrina incidents were investigated by authorised officers in accordance with the Dog and Cat Management Act and appropriate enforcement actions were taken as necessary.

As a result of investigations, council issued eight expiations and nine formal warnings, and 12 control orders were placed on dogs involved in the reported incidents.

Six investigations are currently ongoing.

"Council is closely monitoring the number of dog incidents reports that have occurred in the region," Acting Chief Executive Officer, Stacey Bateson, said.

"We recognise the significance of community safety, and we seek to address any concerns that may arise from these incidents.

"We have observed a slight increase in reported cases over the years – a total of 68 incidents were reported in 2022/23 compared to 51 in 2021/22.

"We believe this trend reflects our efforts to encourage the community to report all dog incidents, no matter how insignificant they may seem.

"It's important to note that not all cases can be fully investigated, and at times an educational approach is deemed the most appropriate course of action."

The reforms also include an assessment system for breeders, criminal background checks on applicants, fines of up to \$10,000 for breeding animals without a licence, and the ability to suspend and cancel breeder licences.

Meanwhile, the new breeder laws will impose a limit of 50 female animals per breeding program, outlawing large-scale, inhumane puppy farms that increase the risk of animal cruelty.

Most breeding kennels in SA are far-below this limit, but setting it at the same level as Victoria – the strictest jurisdiction in the nation – will prevent large-scale interstate breeders seeking to set up shop here.

Under the changes, female dogs will be limited to having a maximum of five litters in their lifetime and mandatory reporting of each litter will be introduced.

Dog control orders placed on owners who move to South Australia from interstate

 such as a dangerous dog order or a prohibition order for breeding puppies – will also be recognised and enforced under South Australian law.

"The State Government is delivering on its commitment to eradicate puppy factories and prevent any such operations setting up in South Australia," Deputy Premier, Susan Close, said.

"When you get a new family dog, you deserve to know the puppy came from a healthy and cared for mother.

"These new laws will ensure that puppy factories with hundreds of dogs are prohibited in our state.

"We want to send a clear message that putting profits before animals in South Australia will not be tolerated.

"These new penalties for people who don't keep their dogs from attacking people and other dogs will act as a deterrent and hopefully bring the incidence of dog attacks down."

Councils will also have increased powers to manage dogs that persistently wander in their districts.

Ms Bateson said the Community Safety team has increased patrols on roads and in public spaces to ensure compliance with the council by-laws and the Dog and Cat Management Act.

"In these interactions, we take an educational approach to remind dog owners of their responsibilities," she said.

"We are also enhancing our enforcement efforts, ensuring that all reported incidents are thoroughly investigated, and appropriate actions are taken to uphold community safety.

"Furthermore, we actively communicate with residents through social media and other channels to share information about dog safety and responsible ownership, and we provide resources within the council office to keep the community informed.

"Our priority is to promote responsible dog ownership, and enhance safety for all residents and visitors."

# Country Cabinet heads to Encounter Bay

People living and working in Victor Harbor, Goolwa and surrounding towns will have the opportunity to speak with State Government representatives about what matters them at the next Country Cabinet forum.

The government will host Country Cabinet in Victor Harbor and Goolwa on October 24 and 25, bringing together Premier Peter Malinauskas, ministers, chief executives, Fleurieu councils and the community to discuss what's most important to people living, working and doing business in the region, how the State Government can support the community's needs, and ask any questions of the cabinet.

"I always look forward to bringing our cabinet on the road to hear directly from locals, first-hand, on the issues that matter most to them," SA Premier, Peter Malinauskas, said.

"The Fleurieu Peninsula is known for its stunning coastlines and great food, but it's also a significant economic and agricultural contributor to our state."

The main event will be a free community barbecue kickstarting at the Encounter Bay Football Club from 5pm on October 24, followed by a public forum from 6pm to 7.30pm.

Access to the club will be via the driveway off Armstrong Road.

#### **Crime rises in Adelaide Hills**

Crime has risen in the Adelaide Hills according to statistics released by SA Police, as a Mount Barker shop reports a rise in theft in recent months.

Crime was up more than 50 per cent in the Kavel electorate, which includes Mount Barker, Bugles Ranges, and Wistow. Serious criminal trespass is up 127 per cent and theft up 102 per cent.

The state's Opposition criticised the rise in crime since Member for Kavel Dan Cregan was appointed to Police Minister.

Opposition Minister for Community Safety, Police and Corrections Jack Batty believes SAPOL is under-resourced, with a shortfall of nearly 200 officers.

"Crime is skyrocketing under Labor, including in the new minister's backyard," he said.

"What is his plan to tackle the crime crisis that we see right across the state?

"South Australians deserve to feel safe, and law and order should be core business for any government."

Mount Barker country boutique

clothing shop Cloth and Bale has fallen victim to a rise of shoplifting in recent months of mainly smaller items, such as hair clips, beanies and headbands.

Owners Tegan and Jessie Foster find it has a "huge impact" on their small business

"Our rent has gone up, council rates increased by 11 per cent, staff wages have gone up, yet due to the economy and cost of living, people are retail shopping less," they said.

"So, having people steal from us on top of all that is a real blow to our small business."

Cloth and Bale has been running for almost four years, starting as a pop-up store in Nairne, before moving to the shopping strip on Gawler Street in Mount Barker last year.

The sisters have installed additional security cameras in hopes to deter shoplifters.

"We would just like the community to know that all small businesses are doing it tough right now, so please support them wherever you can," they said.

"If you see or know of anybody who shoplifts, report it and call it out as it is not OK."

#### CFS volunteers join a training day

Country Fire Service (CFS) crews from the Strathalbyn Group gathered at Langhorne Creek for the annual Field Day last month.

The halo system sprays water to protect the truck and crew in dangerous situations including a burnover.

A burnover is when flames can overrun or burn over a fire truck.

CFS thanked the Lions Club and Strathalbyn Group Operations brigade for providing lunch.

This event is part of pre-season training to prepare for the fire season and has been growing each year.

# **Serious incident at Port Elliot**

A New South Wales man was charged over a serious crash at Port Elliot in the early hours of Saturday morning.

Just after 1.30am, police and emergency services were called to North Terrace in relation to a blue Ford sedan which had collided with a group of people out the front of licensed premises before leaving the area.

Upon arrival, police identified numerous

victims and a number of witnesses came forward providing information in relation to the vehicle involved.

A short time later, the driver of the suspect vehicle returned to the scene and was promptly arrested by local patrols.

The vehicle believed to have been involved in the incident was located nearby on Sturt Street.

A 21-year-old Goolwa Beach man, a

37-year-old Port Elliot woman, a 20-year-old Inman Valley woman and a 30-year-old Blackwood man were all treated for minor injuries, while a 22-year-old Hindmarsh Island man received serious life-threatening injuries and was flown to Adelaide where he remains in hospital.

The driver, a 37-year-old New South Wales man, was taken to the Christies Beach police station where he was charged with causing

harm by dangerous driving, due care and leaving the scene of a crash.

He was refused bail and appeared before Christies Beach Magistrates Court on Tuesday.

#### Regional towns report highest number of scams

Murray Bridge and Encounter Bay are among the top South Australian towns impacted by scams, according to recent data.

In an effort to boost scam awareness and help more Australians spot a scam, Westpac has revealed the postcodes with the most scam cases.

While scammers don't discriminate when it comes to the age of their targets, the data reveals 61-to-75-year-olds reported the highest number of scams, accounting for almost one third of all reported cases.

The top scam types driving the largest losses are investment scams, followed by business email compromise, remote access, romance and impersonation scams.

Westpac's Head of Fraud Prevention Ben Young urged all Australians to be wary. "Our data shows scammers aren't letting location limit what they do, with impacts seen in all corners of the country," he said.

"We're finding scammers are having the biggest impact in communities with increasing economic activity or those with ageing populations.

"Scammers aren't necessarily out there stalking the streets of these postcodes, they're constantly evolving the way they target people, with many scams originating online or on social media platforms.

"This includes investment scams which account for around 50 per cent of all losses, as well as various buying and selling scams which evolve with the latest trends."

Some tips to help protect yourself from scammers include:

• Never give out personal or financial information to anyone you don't know or trust.

 Don't click on links or open attachments in unsolicited emails, text messages or social media messages.

• Do your research before buying anything online, and check the seller's reputation and reviews.

 Always phone a company to check the payment details are correct before paying an invoice.

 Be wary of offers that sound too good to be true.

• Don't send money or gift cards to someone you've never met in person, no matter how convincing their story is.

• Phone a family member or friend if you're unsure about anything.

# 'Freshly brewed' campaign tells drink drivers 'they're full of it'

A 'freshly brewed' South Australia Police road safety campaign has launched to curb drink driving on the state's roads.

Aiming to confront the selfish choices that fuel drink driving offences, the new 'drink drivers are full of it' campaign underscores

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DAVID BASHAM MP MEMBER FOR FINNISS SAPOL research findings that show drink drivers are taking themselves for a ride.

Last year, drink driving was a factor in 100 serious injuries and 19 lives lost, and police caught 5595 drink drivers on SA roads.

Between 2019 and 2023, 17 per cent of all fatal crashes and 10 per cent of serious injury crashes involved at least one driver or rider with a blood alcohol concentration over the legal limit.

Officer in Charge of the Traffic Services Branch Superintendent Darren Fielke said the innovative campaign, which features a drink driver's vehicle filling with beer or wine, sends a new message that leaves drink drivers with nowhere to turn.

"Road users across South Australia will see this campaign," he said.

"There are still some people who think it's okay to drink drive and this campaign is here to tell them they're full of it.

"Police have heard drink driving excuses from, 'I can handle my alcohol,' and 'I don't have a licence, so what does it matter?' to 'I'm not paying for a cab.'

"Our campaign message is clear – if you still think it's ok to drink and drive, you are full of it."

Throughout three filming days, the production team used a Port Adelaide warehouse and surrounding streets to bring a scene of grim symbolism to life to represent

the potential horror of drink driving.

Set engineers disassembled a car to apply watertight seals and other trickery that enabled vehicles to be filled with around 60,000 litres of fake wine and beer to create the symbolism for the campaign statement.

Additionally, stunt crews staged a rear-end collision and a head on with a stobie pole.

Minister for Police Dan Cregan said the highly visible campaign would leave selfish drivers with no excuse.

"If you plan on having a drink then you must plan to get home safely," he said.

"It is important to remember that your actions can have the most serious consequences for you and others around you."

# Car runs off road at Currency Creek

Two people were fortunate to walk away without injury after their vehicle went off road at Currency Creek last Wednesday.

At about 6.10pm on October 2, emergency services were called to Goolwa Road after the driver of a Honda sedan that had been travelling north lost control and crashed off the road into the scrub.

The driver, a 25-year-old woman, and passenger, a 26-year-old man, were uninjured.

The car was towed from the scene.

# Container fire east of Murray Bridge

A shipping container fire east of Murray Bridge last Wednesday caused hundreds of thousands of dollars in damage.

Just after 8.30am on October 2, 10 Country Fire Service firefighters on two trucks and a bulk water carrier, supported by the Metropolitan Fire Service, responded to a shipping container fire at Kepa, which was likely caused by an overheated generator.

Thanks to their efforts, firefighters controlled the blaze within the container, safeguarding a nearby diesel tank and neighbouring properties, while limiting damages to an estimated \$200,000.

Fire investigators attended the scene.

# Local man caught four times over legal limit

A local man lost his licence after being caught drink driving at Middleton last Tuesday.

Just after 6pm on October 1, police stopped a Nissan van on Hero Avenue for a random driver test, where the driver, a 52-year-old local man, provided a positive blood alcohol result of 0.253 – more than four times over the legal limit.

Checks revealed he was also medically suspended from driving.

The man was reported for drink driving

and driving while being disqualified, and issued a 12-month immediate loss of licence.

His van was impounded for 28 days, and he will be summonsed to appear in court at a later date.



# **Shannons Adelaide Rally returns to Strathalbyn**

Shannons Adelaide Rally returns to Strathalbyn in November with double the excitement, including two runs through the town stage and a show and shine hosted by a special guest.

The Shannons Adelaide Rally is one of the largest tarmac rally events in the world that is based in Adelaide, with 30 stages across November 8 to 10 in and around the Adelaide Hills.

The Strathalbyn Lunch Stop and Town Stage debuted at last year's rally, proving to be a huge hit with the locals and visitors alike.

This prompted organisers to schedule a full rally field through the town streets for the two stages on the last day, starting on Catherine Street, turning onto Donald Street and Rankine Street before Sunter Street, crossing the St. Andrews Bridge before the stage finish.

Other features of the day include a formal car show in the Soldier's Memorial Garden, and a 'Cars and Coffee'-style parking area at the Strathalbyn Oval.

Port Power star Charlie Dixon will also bring a 'Drivin' with Dixon' car show, with Dixon and guests Craig Lowndes and Lara Lowndes set to judge cars in the 'show 'n' shine' event.

Spectator points will feature across the stage for the free community event.

The first run of the Strathalbyn Town Stage begins at 10.40am followed on by Macclesfield – on Strathalbyn Road – at 10.45am.

The field regroups for stops in Strathalbyn in-between – along Commercial Road –with the second Strathalbyn Town Stages getting away at 1pm, followed straight after by the second run through Macclesfield.

#### **Categories for the 2024 rally**

- Competition: Driver skill and mechanical performance will determine winners for the outright competition in the Shannons Adelaide Rally. Vehicles will be limited to 200km/h while on closed road stages.
- Challenge: Based on the same year of build and rules as the Competition category,

except there is a 130km/h speed limit on all closed road stages. Challenge participants will follow the same course and include the same activities as the Competition category.

- TSD: A Time-Speed-Distance (TSD) category in which entrants will aim to match a target time set by the clerk of course. Penalties are applied against minimum and maximum speeds, as well as for arriving early or late of the allocated target time. The category will be limited to 120km/h, with average speed targets of around 70km/h or less.
- Spirit Tour: The Spirit Tour is noncompetitive and untimed. Vehicles will follow the same course and include the same activities as the main competition. Vehicles will be limited to 120km/h while on closed road stages.
- Main Tour: Run on the same course and including the same activities as the main competition, Main Tour vehicles will be limited to 100km/h while on all closed road stages. Entry is open to modern and classic cars with current registration.

# **Grants open for health initiatives**

South Australian sporting clubs, community volunteer groups, and Suicide Prevention Networks are invited to apply for a share in up to \$180,000 of Suicide Prevention Community Grants.

The grants, which have been running for 10 years, aim to reduce suicide by building compassionate, safe and resilient communities through skill-building, education and training.

Individual grants of up to \$6000 can be used towards attendance at education and training sessions, including trainer and course fees, venue hire, catering, resources, travel and accommodation and promotional activities.

"We all have a role in preventing suicide, and the Suicide Prevention Grants will support local sports clubs and organisations to raise awareness and have conversations around mental health and wellbeing," Preventive Health SA Chief Executive, Marina Bowshall, said.

"It is important to support communityled projects to strengthen the mental wellbeing of South Australians and reduce suicide risk."

Sporting clubs and community groups are encouraged to apply for funding and encourage members to take up training opportunities to support wider conversations on how people are feeling, and know where support is available.

The grant application period is open until Tuesday, November 15.

#### **Grain Harvest Code of Practice remains unchanged**

The Grain Harvest Code of Practice will remain unchanged for the 2024/25 harvesting season, with the South Australian farming community continuing to use last season's measurement of Grassland Fire Danger Index (GFDI) of 35 as the cease harvest threshold.

The GFDI threshold, which uses local temperature, humidity and wind speed measurements to develop a fire danger risk rating, will remain consistent with previous seasons, emphasising the commitment to community safety and risk reduction by the state's grain producers.

The announcement comes as South Australian farmers prepare for their annual grain harvest and, concurrently, weather forecasters are predicting hot and dry conditions throughout the remainder of Spring.

SA Country Fire Service (CFS) and Grain Producers SA (GPSA) believe the threshold's retention will maximise the time farmers can safely harvest their crops by measuring local conditions, while also ensuring personal and community safety.

CFS Acting Director of Regional Services and Operations Steve Salamon said the cease harvest threshold retention is a positive outcome for farmers across the state.

"This cease harvest protocol has been utilised responsibly by grain producers over preceding Fire Danger Seasons (FDS), and we appreciate their safety awareness whilst also managing their very important seasonal programs in the most efficient manner possible," he said.

"Experience has shown that GFDI 35 is a manageable threshold that meets the production needs of growers, while providing safety for residents within regional communities

"With the forecast of a dry season ahead, we are thankful for the risk management processes employed by South Australian grain producers during harvest."

GPSA Chief Executive Officer Brad Perry also welcomed the cease harvest threshold's retention, which follows ongoing consultation with grain producers, regional communities and CFS volunteers.

"South Australian grain producers have demonstrated strong adherence to the voluntary harvest code under the GFDI of 35, and GPSA welcomes agreement with CFS for another season harvesting under the same threshold," he said.

"Many of South Australia's grain producers are also CFS volunteers and understand the importance of fire safety, and that's why they invest significantly in preventative measures across their properties that are above and beyond those required in the Grain Harvest Code of Practice."

"It is called *In The Night Garden*, and I have a companion piece at home called *In The Day Garden*," Ms Ramsay said.


"Quite often, I do portraits, but (they) are not like realistic portraits, they are symbolic, so (this one) is gentle, like the night."

#### Ladies' Probus Club learns about Neighbourhood Centre

The Ladies' Probus Club of Strathalbyn met on September 9 when Manager of the Strath Neighbourhood Centre (SNC) Malcolm Sutcliffe was welcomed as guest speaker, accompanying his talk with a PowerPoint presentation.

The SNC has been located in its present home at 6 Parker Avenue since 2019, occupying the premises which were originally created as the Senior Citizens' Centre in 1974.

From a recent community needs analysis undertaken by social work students at the SNC, it was established that for 24 percent of the Strathalbyn community, the SNC provides their only outlet for socialisation.

In 2014, the SNC became an Incorporated Association, which is independently governed and self-funded, and is focused on reducing isolation and loneliness while building on fellowship and friendship.

Malcolm Sutcliffe told the Ladies' Probus Club that what the SNC provides includes emergency food relief, crisis support, community connection, health and wellbeing activities for fellowship and mental health, and a place for people to drop in for a coffee and a chat.

Some of the activities offered at the SNC include table tennis, bingo and line dancing, and each Tuesday a two-course community lunch is served.

The SNC property, for which only a peppercorn rental is charged, is owned by the Alexandrina Council which provides a Community Wellbeing Grant and offers administrative and compliance support to

Presently, the only other income for the SNC comes from the charges made for some of the activities it conducts and

from minor grants.

Malcolm Sutcliffe said future plans are fluid and flexible, and include the obtaining of some permanent, part-time social work support, the creation of a tranquil garden space, a building refit, redevelopment of the carpark, and the provision of a community bus with, at the same time, the centre continuing to provide its current support within the community.

The SNC has around 20 volunteers and are always seeking more.

A vote of thanks along with a gift was conveyed to Malcolm Sutcliffe by Colleen Jaensch in appreciation of his talk.

Meanwhile, 28 members heard Storyteller of the Day Yvonne Dawson read a humorous tale entitled The Great Lesson.


Confirmation of the sale of Strathalbyn's IGA is expected in the coming weeks to months, as a buyer has reportedly expressed interest.


The interested party hopes to open the space as an IGA and is awaiting approval.





A Strathalbyn property open to the public this weekend has been crafted by the ultimate duo – Diana McGregor as a retired landscape designer, and husband Michael who is a hobbyist in building stonewalls.

Since moving to Strathalbyn from Crafers 11 years ago, they have transformed Watendlath into a beautifully-designed garden with different levels and interesting and well-crafted retaining walls.

Previously, Diana designed gardens in the Hills and foothills, so she found Strathalbyn is "totally different", with minimal rain. Starting with a sloping block, Diana had

a vision for the multi-level property and her "boldest" decision was excavating a huge amount of dirt.

The dirt was sifted through a machine to extract rocks which were repurposed into another retaining wall, and the sifted soil made another garden.

"It was enormous job – thousands of tonnes of dirt were removed," Michael said. 'It (took) me a little while to adjust to the idea, but it always works out."

Some considerations when designing a garden are allowing sufficient drainage and sorting which plants complement each other for watering purposes, and the use of the plants such as their thick front garden that protects from dust.

"Garden design is really interesting,"

"It's wonderful when you can get someone you can inspire."

The garden – which was featured in ABC's Gardening Australia earlier this year attracts many species of birds and lizards.

Green thumbs will be offered plenty of inspiration this weekend as three gardens open to the public in the area including Tickle Tank at Mount Barker which is filled with beautiful mosaics, and the historic farm Dalveen at Woodchester.

Watendlath is open at 11 Hillview Road, Strathalbyn, this Saturday and Sunday, from 10am to 4.30pm, and will have morning and afternoon teas and informational talks about how to build stonewalls.

The event fundraises for Guide Dogs SA, which Michael was a board member for for nine years.

#### Mental health for tradies one loud shirt at a time

On the last Friday of every month Daish Irrigation and Fodder employees in Strathalbyn don bright shirts in the name of mental health.

They buy the shirts from TradeMutt who initiated the campaign to 'start the conversation' about mental health, help tradies to gain counselling, and donate 50 per cent of profits to mental health charities.

Daish Irrigation Owner Brendan O'Neil said he and his business jumped on board about three months ago.

"We deal with a lot of tradespeople and a lot of people in that sphere, and just one day I thought, 'let's show some support for the community and show those people we deal with that we are here for a chat," he said.

"Between our two stores we run approximately 30 staff, and it is there (to show) them as well as the broader community that we are here to help."

Mr O'Neil said it was important for businesses to strive to have good mental health among its employees and customers.

"It all gets back to work efficiencies," he said.
"If they are in a good space, we are in a good space.

"You have to be on top of and aware of it and follow your staff, so it does mean a lot."

The shirts have been a hit with both staff

"It's been fantastic," Mr O'Neil said.
"A lot of blokes ask about it, and we go

"A lot of blokes ask about it, and we get a lot of appliauds from people.

"They all enjoy what it is about, and it does start a conversation."

This year World Mental Health Day is on October 10 (today), with a focus on mental health at work.

Mr O'Neil said his team may don the shirts for the day or put up some posters to commemorate the day.

He encouraged other businesses to join the campaign with TradeMutt.

"If more businesses get behind the process and dedicate a day or so a month, that is what we (want to) do," Mr O'Neil said

"It brings your staff in and they enjoy it.
"Every shirt you buy, some of those proceeds
go towards mental health, and what they do is
fantastic for the broader community.

"I would love to see a lot more smaller businesses buy some shirts and get behind the process.

"It is only a shirt and gives everyone a happy feeling for the day, and that is what it is all about – to add a bit of colour."

# Upcoming community street talk

Community members are invited to an upcoming free barbecue in Strathalbyn to connect with others during Mental Health Month.

Strathalbyn and Communities Suicide Prevention Network volunteers have been hosting these events in recent years to spark conversations with local residents and offer mental health resources.

Strathalbyn Rotarians support the initiative by cooking the barbecue.

"You never know who you're going to meet... (and) where conversation is going to end up," volunteer, Gwenda Knights, said.

"We don't realise how many people in the community are struggling – too many – and how do we reach all those people?"

Volunteer Cliff Sweetman likes to welcome connections and build relationships with others through ongoing conversations.

"There are a lot of people who are struggling by themselves," he said.

"The person just needs to reach out in some way, shape or form and express themselves.

"You only need to come 10 per cent and there are some people that will come the rest of the way."

The advocacy group formed more than 10 years ago in the wake of a cluster of local suicides, and has since developed countless mental health resources and held special events.

Held at Church of Christ forecourt on October 24 from 10am to 2.30pm, the chat follows a similar one held last month for R U OK Day?.

More than 100 people visited, and volunteers were relieved that the collective stress around COVID lockdowns and social isolation has subsided.

They believe socialising and connecting with others has returned and made a positive impact on overall mental health.

"We're fortunate to live in a town that's smaller," Mrs Knights said.

"(I've heard people say) that it's the friendliest town that they've ever seen."

"Anyone can be a carer," Ms Ottaway said. "Carers are people who provide unpaid care and support to family members or friends who are frail, aged, or have a disability, chronic illness or other condition.

'Quite often, people who are carers do not identify as carers, seeing it as their 'duty' or responsibility as a family member or friend.

"Unfortunately, this can mean they don't seek formal help or support services.'

Support services are designed to match the interests and personal choices of the person and their carer.

"It's not just about getting help with tasks," Ms Ottaway said.

"It's about making sure carers can enjoy life, whether that means having more time for hobbies, staying active, or spending more quality time with family and friends."

Having respite from caring duties helps keep carers healthy, improving the quality of care they can provide.

"A little respite support can sustain carers so they can continue their caring role, and the person they care for can stay living at



home for longer," Ms Ottaway said.

"Respite groups can also be beneficial to the person being cared for, offering them social connections through group activities, outings and individual services."

Resthaven offers a range of respite care options, as well as community service programs, residential aged care and retirement living options.



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# Strathalbyn pickleballer on the national stage

Strathalbyn pickleballer Grant Diggins claimed a bronze medal at the national championships on Monday, as the game continues to go from strength to strength across both the world and locally.

Diggins won his bronze medal in warm conditions in the 60 plus men's singles with the ability level of 3.5 to 3.99

He was one of more than 1200 people to take part in the Gold Coast competition – the third biggest Pickleball tournament in the world, behind competitions in the US and London.

This week is World Pickleball Week, with a number of free come-and-try sessions booked for Strathalbyn and Mount Barker

Pickleball is a cross between tennis and table tennis, with some elements of badminton thrown in.

"It is played on a badminton court, but there is one line that is a little bit out," Diggins said. "So, it is hitting with a paddle or bat,

"So, it is hitting with a paddle or bat, and you are hitting a plastic ball with holes in it.

"It is like a little practice golf ball that golfers use, but around the size of a tennis ball, and you can play doubles or singles on the pickleball court."

Diggins played in three events, and was among 12 players who headed for the Gold Coast from South Australia.

"The first event I played in was the men's doubles, but we didn't get through to the finals in that – winning three games and losing two in our pool," he said.

"The mixed doubles we won all four of our pool games, but we lost the quarter final match, so we got knocked out there.

"It's been great, and good fun... There were a lot more from Victoria, I think there were a couple of hundred from Victoria, and lots of locals, but it was nice to have our little group of 12 here.

"We have a few medals, which is good, to take home, but it was very difficult to get a medal because it has been at such a good standard."

The local competition in South Australia has gone from strength to strength with a new club – the Southern Sharks - covering the Fleurieu and Hills area formed to provide an overarching body across venues such as Strathalbyn, Mount Barker, Aldinga, Victor Harbor, and Goolwa.

"It is an affiliated club with SA Pickleball, so a lot of members from SA Pickleball have come across to the Southern Sharks Club because SA Pickleball had to manage all the different venues and that was getting pretty big," Diggins said.

"They have been encouraging people to try and start their own clubs,

so we have done that in the Fleurieu Hills region, with all those venues coming together."

As part of World Pickleball Week some free come and try days have been scheduled including:

- Strathalbyn Monday, October
   14, from 7pm to 9pm at the Tyndale
   Christian School
- Mount Barker this Friday, October 11, from 1.30pm to 3.30pm at the town's recreation centre
- Mount Barker Wednesday,
   October 16, from 10am to 12noon at the town's recreation centre.

Diggins said the competition continued to grow.

"Mount Barker in particular is very popular, we had to put on an extra session, because we only had the one session," he said.

"We probably started off getting 12 to 15 people and now we are getting every week 30 to 35 people coming, as most people get hooked when they come along.

"Strathalbyn is going very well, we are covering our costs there to run the sessions and we tend to get between 15 and 25 at Strath."

Younger players have also embraced the game with a number of teenagers playing locally, and were featured at the nationals as well.





Last Saturday the Strathalbyn Golf Club conducted a Stableford competition and Michael Clarke won the day with 37 points, in a field of 49, thanks to winning a tie breaker against three other players.

B grade player Don Bell led the early morning charge as he finished with 37 points with 17 on the front and with a lot of five's on the back nine had another 20 points, having 47 and 44 off the stick.

Also with 37 points was another B grader in Mark Condon and A grader Phil Perrin, both having 18 on the front and 19 on the back.

Michael Clarke, in B grade, playing in the worst of the conditions with light rain and then with the strong wind persisting, picked up a birdie two on the 15th, had 17 points on the front nine and 20 on the back for 37.

Brian Simpson, not playing due to having been stung on the hand by a bee on the Friday, still came out to walk the course picking up five balls on his way for future use as he doesn't use new ones.

He was also keeping Michael on his toes with some useless advice and working out for him what he needed on the last few holes to win the day, just needing to par the last hole to be the outright winner but his short putt was short, too short to drop in the hole.

Brian at one stage behind a tree on the edge of the ninth fairway was a target for Stuart Warnock teeing off on the eighth, with his tee shot going wide seeing Brian quickly moving his feet to avoid having another sore spot on his body.

There were a few who started the day well but couldn't sustain their effort, Dave Bell having a par on the first hole and picking up 19 points for the first nine but came unstuck on the back nine with just 13 points to total 32 for the round.

Kym Nelson certainly didn't recover from his effort on the first hole by shanking every shot to get no points for the hole in his round of just 27 points.

He must have had a bit of trouble placing his feet in the right place, a bit like bar lady Karen Robson who during the week bought a pair of sneakers only to find out when she got home she had two for the right foot.

Paul Coombe had a great start with a birdie on the first, with his second shot

just a foot away from the pin, and a par on the next but only picked up nine points on the next seven holes for 16 on the front nine on his way to 32 points for the day.

There were a few making clever shots, like during the week when, on the third tee block alongside the club house, at last someone instead of hitting the wall put a ball through the window.

Clever shots on Saturday saw Ben McLeod on the par three six over the creek seeing his tee shot hit the big tree on the left of the green to bounce the ball off it and finish on the green to pick up the nearest to pin prize for that hole.

Mick Beasley showed he had a trick shot as well when on the 18th got his ball to turn at right angles, when with his second shot smacked the ball into the marker just in front of him and nearly took out a player on the 12th fairway.

The wind certainly helped a few with the drives off the tee, Craig Nelson on the par four 13th smacking one within 35 metres of the green and Stuart Warnock belting one to within about 20 metres of the green.

Gordon Robson also had a big hit on this hole but for the first time in his long playing period on the course went far enough to go into the drain on the left hand side of the fairway, luckily able to get out and complete his par.

There was a bit of panic when on the next hole Gordon couldn't find Lord Haberfield's score card as the wind had blown it off his buggy.

Habers not that worried after his tee shot on the 14th was stuck behind the big tree on the left just over the drain, causing him to have a small chip shot back out onto the fairway

back out onto the fairway.

All finished well for Habers, still finishing with a five for the hole and they found his card later in the drain behind the 13th green.

Winner the previous Saturday John Owen, along with Ken Lester were going around with Gordon and Habers. John was heard to mutter a few words when he had to have three simple putts on the 15th and Ken finding it difficult playing into the win with eight on the 12th, the same hole that the Lord needed three putts which ruined his run of pars.

Craig Nelson also had two good hits on the 16th but his drive gave him a problem with the gobble bush on the

corner making sure that if he wanted to reach the green in two he would have to go over the dam, which he did to be just off the green, unfortunately finishing with just a par.

Stuart Warnock with another long hit on the fourth found himself in the drain to the right of the fairway but played a good shot out to be just off the left of the green and then almost chipped in for a birdie three.

Stuart played another great shot to get out of trouble on the fifth when off the tee he curled the ball over the creek on the right and into the trees, then somehow hitting the ball back through the trees landed on the other side of the creek, just outside the red hazard marker.

From here Stuart was still in good shape for a par with his fourth shot stopping on top of the green, unfortunately his downhill putt missed, to make it five for the hole.

Others going around with Stuart were Sean Walsh who had a par on this hole as did Kirk Richardson, while Michael Young, finishing with an ordinary score of 25 points, had a day of wild shots, on this hole seeing his ball land on the fourth fairway off the tee and after his sixth shot still wasn't on the green, so picked up.

On the previous hole Michael found his tee shot on the drain to the right and then was very lucky his next hit just missed going up the drain pipe, but with three putts had six for the hole.

On the sixth Stuart sank a long putt to salvage a par three, Sean missed a very short putt for four and luck was against Michael again when his putt for par lipped out.

Kirk on this hole picked up his par, a better effort than his four putts on the third and also when he went into the dam on the seventh, saying it wasn't happening for him today.

On the seventh Stuart found his long tee shot in the rough to the left of the fairway but then chipping back onto it saw his third shot get over the dam and finish just off the green before just missing a birdie with his chip shot.

Kingsley Handke on the seventh with his third shot went into the dam and to prove it was no fluke after having a drop, went back into the water with his next shot.



# Junk Stayman with 1 HCP

#### BIDDING ANALYSIS

South 1NT: Weak NT 11-15 HCP

West X: Double

North 2C: Junk Stayman, 5-4 in ♥&♠

East P: Confusion! South 2D: No 4-card Major

West X: Double again
North 2H: bids the 5-card Major

The bidding by North/South in this hand amounted to daylight robbery. West stared at his 20HCP and was dismayed that partner did not help, even after doubling twice. He must have decided to attempt to take 2H(N) down as being the best option, since East wasn't saying anything. Surely there was a reason. Looking at all 4 hands, it is clear that E/W had 27 HCP available, so it was very cheeky of N/S to compete for a contract with only 13 HCP. How did they get away with it? They did it by playing to the score.

Junk Stayman is a very useful device to be used whenever someone holds 5-4 (or better) in the Majors, after partner has opened 1NT. There is no minimum HCP requirement (the same as transfer bids), which is why it was used here, with only 1 HCP. The mechanics are to bid 2C (Stayman) and just accept whichever Major partner bids; if partner bids 2D (No 4-card Major) you simply bid the 5-card Major. When you have a stronger hand, you will be able to bid as per a normal auction, and stop when you have reached your optimum

My partner and I use a Weak 1 No Trump (12-15 HCP) because these hands occur more often than the 15-18 1NT that is widely used. There is a down-side, and that is that the risks of not making your contract are greater, as are the penalties. I has a slight preemptive effect, as opponents need to bid at the 2-level just to enter the auction.

It is significant that on the day this hand was played, we were Not Vulnerable whereas our opponents were Vulnerable. We failed to make our contract, going down by one trick, giving away 50 to East/West, but that gave us a top board for North/South. Three East/West pairs played in No Trumps for 10 tricks (one reached 3NT) and one other played in 2C by West for 8 tricks and a score of 90 (something went wrong there).
