As the historic Woodchester property Dalveen hits the market, the community is invited to view its garden to help fundraise for the restoration of St Andrew's Uniting Church.

Six generations of the Richardson family have worked on the farm for the past 171 years, and is currently run by John and Tania and their son Angus, making the sale mark the end of a long running tradition and their well-respected reputation in the industry.

Tania described the decision as "difficult", but also "sad and exciting" as they explore the possibilities of their next venture.

"While we're still young enough, we want to try something else, or go touring, or wherever the wind takes us," she said.

The garden has changed and developed over the years under different ownership, and three weddings were held in the space in the 1800s.

In recent years, Tania has experimented with plants that grow "in tough conditions" and her "intermittent attention".

"Since having cancer, people are having much more of my time than plants," she said.

"Trusting the long-range forecast of rain resulted in a lack of garden lushness that I'd wished for my Open Garden, but majority of plantings are coping.

"Mulching with aged-sheep manure and straw over the last 15 years has created

better garden soil, and garden beds are relatively happy.

"A dry summer creates a 'battle of the fittest', so that's the real test here."

The garden full of variety is a mixture of gifts and marked down treasures planted in an area that is surrounded by beautiful views of the property.

The event will fundraise for the restoration of St Andrew's Uniting Church, a passion of Tania's even before she moved to Strathalbyn in 1987, when she would borrow a car to go to the church while visiting and found it "very welcoming and friendly".

The restoration fund started after a

structural survey found repairs were needed of the historic 1848 church, as the result of weather and time over 176 years.

As reported in *The Argus* last month, the committee vowed to "never" give up on the project, despite the ever-increasing cost of the restoration expected to pass the \$1.8 million assessed at 2020 prices.

Church members will perform live music during the upcoming event, which will also include children's activities, a big plant stall, Devonshire tea and a raffle.

The event is at 173 Dalveen Road, Woodchester, on October 12 and 13, from 10am to 4pm.

#### **Review undertaken of clinic**

A review is underway of the after-hours, nurse-led clinic in Strathalbyn that has run for 12 months, which has reportedly received "overwhelmingly positive" feedback, however a local Member of Parliament is concerned for its longevity in a growing community.

As previously reported in *The Southern Argus*, the model was a proposed solution to the closed emergency department (ED), which "temporarily" shut its doors in 2020 due to COVID-19 and being located alongside vulnerable people in the conjoined aged-care facility.

The clinic has treated 294 patients with after-hours access to urgent non-emergency care for the local community to prevent the need to visit an ED.

A further 231 patients were referred to other services.

Partnering with the University of Adelaide, a review is now being undertaken into ways services could be improved for the community, with results expected to be shared early next year.

"Feedback we've received in the last six months regarding the service has been overwhelmingly positive and patient numbers continue to grow each month," Barossa Hills Fleurieu Local Health Network Chief Executive Officer, Bronwyn Masters, said.

"This is proof of the community's confidence in our ability to manage minor

illness and injuries and a testament to the hard work of our incredible staff."

Member for Hammond Adrian Pederick continues to advocate for a functioning ED where patients could be triaged in Strathalbyn.

"No criticism of the staff – it's the modelling they're working under – but it's essentially a band aid and minor patching clinic and I don't think the model is sustainable into the future," he said.

"We've got a State Labor government who are making a big noise about extra nurses and doctors, well, where are they in country regions?

"It's not good – it's disgraceful actually. Why do country people have to take second best?"

He added that treating patients locally saves congestion at city emergency departments.

departments.

"We're a growing community – there's plenty of housing going in and developments opening all the time," Mr Pederick said.

"It's 20 minutes to get to Mount Barker and, apart from the roads being narrow and windy, it's getting more congested with the amount of development.

"We certainly – from my perspective, and I've been consistent with it – we need an emergency department in Strathalbyn so I will (watch for) the outcome of the review with interest."

The "icing on the cake" was Mr MacDonald's strong connection to the Alexandrina region.

He spent his early years on the Southern Fleurieu before moving with his parents to Goolwa.

"Through his involvement in local sport, he has probably kicked a football on most of the ovals in our region," Mayor Parkes said.

"Andrew knows and loves Alexandrina, and moving here is a 'coming home' moment in his career.

"We at council are looking forward to welcoming him to our region and

benefiting from the effective stewardship of his CEO appointment.

#### Strathalbyn Abattoir in jeopardy amid Co-op's voluntary administration

The Fleurieu Community Co-operative in charge of the Strathalbyn Abattoir redevelopment has gone into voluntary administration, putting the future of the project in doubt.

The abattoir closed in December 2020 when former operators Strath Pastoral ceased trading, but was reinvigorated by the Fleurieu Community Co-operative, who undertook a \$3.5 million restoration of the site.

The reopening was previously earmarked for August 2022, but the project has experienced continuous delays, first with releasing the necessary grant funding, then with complications with contractor schedules and sourcing materials among other factors, and now it's been hit with another hurdle.

The Southern Argus can exclusively reveal the Co-operative went into voluntary administration last week, with Andrew Heard appointed as one of the joint administrators.

Mr Heard told The Argus it has been a troubled development, but one he believed could be re-established under the right person.

"The Co-operative had lost the lease of the abattoir several months ago, and realistically it has not been actively redeveloping the abattoir most of this calendar year because it just hasn't had the monies to be able to do it," he said.

"The organisation's debts are approximately \$1.4 million, including an \$850,000 loan that needs to be returned to the government, due to the project not meeting its deadlines.

"Victoria (Young) and I have met with the landlord Terry Steed and he's got most of the parts required to get the abattoir back up and running, but what is needed is somebody to complete the redevelopment, and add the expertise and management skills... that will lift the development to be able to be re-established.

"That takes time and money, so to that the project. extent, what I have been doing, late last week, we have sent out an invitation to all of the Cooperative's members to give them an update as to where the financial position of the Co-op is, as they're the people who are most likely to be motivated to be able to recapitalise the Co-operative to finish what has been started."

Mr Heard encouraged Co-operative members to talk with one another and work out whether they can raise the funding to do a deal with the landlord and complete

However, anyone could do a deal with the landlord and try to redevelop the Abattoir alone, rather than inside the Co-operative

He hoped Co-op structure could be recapitalised so the planned abattoir can find its way back into a footing and service the businesses in the district.

Victoria and I went out on site in the middle of last week to walk around it, talk with the landlord, and Terry had some people there with him," Mr Heard said.


"There was a chap that was expressing a view to Victoria and I that the project can be completed in a relatively cost-effective manner - it doesn't have to be done to the 'Rolls Royce' standard the Co-op may have been wanting to achieve.

"There seems to be sentiments it's a worthwhile project to get off the ground.

"I'm hoping that the members will see it that way."







#### Greater Regional Adelaide Plan released, Strathalbyn off the list

Planning for the future growth of the Greater Adelaide region, including the Hills Fleurieu, has been detailed in a new State Government document that is now open for public consultation.

Greater Adelaide's population is expected to grow by an additional 670,000 people by 2050.

The Greater Regional Adelaide Plan (GARP) is a 30-year plan that identifies appropriate land for future housing, employment, commercial uses, and the necessary supporting infrastructure to meet this expected demand.

Communities, councils, state agencies, industries, interest groups and other key stakeholders were invited to have their say on the Greater Adelaide Regional Plan Discussion Paper between August and November last year, garnering 754 submissions – 479 from the public, 102 from landowners and 30 from councils, including Alexandrina.

This has now culminated in the draft GARP document which is open for public consultation.

While the plan notes Strathalbyn could support moderate expansion of local housing – limited by a lack of transport and social infrastructure – no specific sites have been identified for development.

Raine and Horne Strathalbyn Selling Principal Nick Grosvenor said the amount of housing supply in town at the moment is "okay" but anticipated more land would need to be classified as residential in the next five years to meet growing demand.

"There is still a huge supply issue within Strathalbyn," he said.

"There's some land that's earmarked, but I think they're on the verge of maybe the next five years (having) to classify some more land residential just to keep up with the up-keep.

"I would say now within Strathalbyn it used to be probably 50 per cent locals buying and moving around in circles, the sad thing



now is locals are probably 20 per cent of our market.

"Outsiders, especially people from Mount Barker and southern suburbs, have really found Strathalbyn as the place they want to call home, and that has shuffled prices up significantly."

He welcomed any additional supply and affordable allotments for the region to help buyers.

In Alexandrina, Goolwa is one of the coastal towns earmarked for potential new long-term development.

The plan identifies potential sites that could support future employment land parcels – one to the north of the town and another adjacent to the airport in the west.

Meanwhile, Mount Barker, like Strathalbyn, has no new sites in the draft plan earmarked for new housing development to ensure its existing growth fronts can fully develop and infrastructure provision is effectively co-ordinated.

Murray Bridge on the other hand has plenty of land to accommodate demand, with eight greenfield areas identified for long-term housing land supply in the town.

Drink Wise. The plan expects a diversion of demand for employment land from the Adelaide Hills, resulting in an increased take up of employment lands in Murray Bridge in the future.

Alexandrina councillors have already been briefed on the GARP's key messages but will have the opportunity to discuss the plan in more detail and formalise a response at the November general meeting, factoring in the incoming Strathalbyn Town Plan and South Coast Growth Strategy.

"In respect of growth capacity around the township of Strathalbyn, council will shortly commence investigations into a new Strathalbyn Town Plan which will replace the existing Strathalbyn Town Plan that expires this year," Acting Chief Executive Officer, Stacey Bateson, said.

"This will help inform whether there is capacity for the township of Strathalbyn to further expand and the infrastructure that is likely to be needed.

"The findings of this will be used to inform the GARP.

"Regarding whether Goolwa should be the focus growth area for Alexandrina, council

is still collating feedback from its South Coast communities on our draft South Coast Growth Strategy that is currently open for community consultation.

"This feedback will be considered by council before formalising an endorsed South Coast Growth Strategy (and) will also inform the GARP.

"Goolwa does have similar infrastructure constraints to Strathalbyn, and these constraints would need to be resolved and planned for."

Community members are encouraged to share their views on the draft GARP, including the location of new housing and employment areas, major infrastructure required to support growth, and the specific areas that should be protected from future development.

"The community's passion for their region is evident, and we are eager for them to play a central role in shaping the plan," State Planning Commission Chair, Craig Holden, said.

"Much of the feedback focused on how we can protect and enhance the region's most valued attributes – our premium food and wine, scenic landscapes, natural environment, cultural and built heritage, and our world-class beaches – while also ensuring we have the land needed to support future growth.

"We encourage everyone to get involved in the development of the plan – this is your city, and now it's your time to have your say and directly influence how your communities will grow and thrive."

Consultation closes at 5pm on Monday, November 4.



Farmers across the region are becoming increasingly nervous as the dry spell drags on. Growers have experienced exceptionally dry conditions across much of the state.

While local conditions have not been as bad as those in the Coorong area – which has recently been declared a drought - Milang Ag Bureau President Neil Harvey said our farmers also need more rain and soon.

"Obviously it was a very dry start, (and) the majority of farmers dry seeded," he said.

"When the rain did come, the crops emerged fairly well, and June and July we had reasonable rainfall throughout the district.

"In August it started backing off, and unfortunately, September hasn't delivered what us farmers would like.

"At our place at Woodchester, we have only received seven millimetres for September, which isn't enough when you get those hot

"Plus, in the last couple of weeks there has been a couple of major frost events that came in, and obviously, farmers have had to make decisions on what they do with their crops.

"In January we had quite a bit of summer rainfall, and a lot of farmers did a lot of spraying to try and preserve that moisture, and I think if it wasn't for that preserving of moisture, the crops wouldn't be where they are now."

This year Mr Harvey has sown canola, wheat, barley, beans and oats.

"I guess the barley has done a run and is filling quite nicely at the moment, but we really need 10 to 15mm of rain to finish what we have got... at the moment we are sitting on a knife edge - it could go either way," he said.

'The frosts have had a major impact in the past two weeks, so even though the crops look good and are starting to fill, we still need rain to finish."

On Saturday night Mr Harvey received

"A lot of people were banking on the weekend to get a rain event to carry us over until hopefully we get another one in a week's time," he said.

"Unfortunately, the forecast looked good seven days out, but when the time comes it is just not quite delivering."

Mr Harvey said farmers were banding

We had a combined Ag Bureau meeting just last week with the Monarto and Milang Ag Bureaus, (and) obviously further east it is pretty bad out there, so at the moment it is all about everyone getting around each other and having those social days, and helping each other out if you can," he said.

"Obviously, the flow-on effects of a drier season flows right through the community, so if the farmer is doing it tough... we are seeing now people are not spending.

"It is not over yet, but we haven't got much time up our sleeve.

"The weeks are running out, and with warmer temperatures and longer daylight hours, we need that bit of moisture to just finish it off."

## Tough year for grape growers made worse

Recent frost has made a tough year for local grape growers and wineries even tougher, with the damage being assessed across the region.

Widespread frost experienced in September has created concerns for the Langhorne Creek wine region's crop.

Langhorne Creek Grape and Wine Executive Officer Lian Jaensch said white grape varieties had been especially hit by the conditions.

"It seems to have mainly been the northeast part of the district and a bit to the north west as well, with a bit of cold air coming in off the land," she said.

"I haven't been able to assess closely yet ourselves, but I don't think it was favourable, particularly whites.

'Your white grapes are out earlier with their bud bursts, so they have their fresh buds and leaves out, and are more advanced, so they are the most vulnerable, particularly at this time of the year when we have the frosts.

"I suspect that it will impact on some of the varieties like chardonnay and pinot gris, and the worst part of that is that they are the main varieties that are selling at the moment, as we are still in oversupply with the reds, so it is a bit of a blow for those growers."

Growers are now assessing the damage and seeing whether there are any secondary shoots that they can nurture for that fruit coming through.

"It has been very dry, so the frosts haven't been totally unexpected," Ms Jaensch said.

"When you get a very dry season there is no soil moisture... you can expect clear nights in the dry season, and that is where you get the frost."

Ms Jaensch said while as a region the local area had failed to have been as impacted as badly as others, for those affected it was "not ideal", with the next hurdle the need

"In places, which we are hoping we are, the vines will respond to the secondary growth, and you will get a secondary flush of flower buds, but they are usually much lower in yields," she said.

"Ideally, we won't get any more severe

frost but... we have had frosts until the end of October before, so we are hoping that

"As you can tell, we have had some warmish days, and we certainly need more moisture and more rainfall.

"People are watering because you need to be watering when the vines come into bud burst and are actively growing, but we just haven't had the winter rains.

"There are forecasts for a wetter period coming into late Spring, but it remains to be seen how much comes through Langhorne Creek."

The latest blow follows a number of other challenges facing the industry.

"It is pretty tough in the industry at the moment, there is no denying that," Ms Jaensch said.

"It is not just Langhorne Creek, it is across the board - anywhere that has got large plantings of shiraz and cabernet.

"It is still pretty tough because the oversupply takes a while to come through, and there is just not the demand out there for grapes because the wines are in stock.

"(Some) people possibly won't sell grapes this year, which means another year of very low-to-no income from the grape vines.

"So, it is pretty tough economically for growers at the moment and for the wineries as well because the economic climate is starting to bite and people aren't spending what they did."

Goolwa Country Fire Service (CFS) Lieutenant Malcolm Biscoe recently returned from a deployment in the United States, adapting to vastly different conditions that he has experienced back home.

He joined 66 Australian firefighters in supporting the US' key wildland firefighting agency the National Interagency Fire Centre (NIFC) in managing extensive incidents across the nation's Pacific Northwest – states of Oregon and Washington.

This was the first SA CFS deployment to US since 2018 and followed another SA CFS deployment to Canada.

Thunderstorms and lightning strikes kept sparking new fires in conditions quite different to what Mr Biscoe has encountered back home, with a terrain of about 60 to 80-degree slope, altitude between 5500 and 9000-feet, and wilderness with high trees and no access points.

"Their fires are in terrain that is super hard to get into, so everything is slow-going," Mr Biscoe explained.

"Getting into the fire is harder because a

lot of it is handwork, whereas we are very much more open country – we can get into the fire much easier.

"Our vegetation burns hot and fast."

Working under a Divisional Supervisor, Mr Biscoe was a Strike Team Leader on a fire named Pine Bench, with some of the work including forming containment lines, learning how the fire was behaving and how the terrain was affecting the fire.

For his 35-day deployment, he lived in a tent and slept on a camp stretcher.

They worked 16-hour days, working two weeks before two days off, then another two weeks.

This was the second year running that Mr Biscoe has been "lucky enough" to be chosen for an overseas deployment.

He was sent to Canada last year which was a "good learning curve" and prepared him for this time around.

Owning Ocean Living Surf School, and having a supportive wife and two grown children, has allowed him the flexibility of leaving at short notice.

Mr Biscoe described the deployment as a "great experience" and said he met "incredible people".

"To be asked to go overseas is a real privilege... if you get asked, it's a real highlight in a firefighter's career," he said.

"Everyone is like sponges trying to get as much information out of you as they can, about firefighting, our environment, and what Australia is like."

The deployment falls on Mr Biscoe's milestone 30th year of volunteering for the CFS, starting at Bridgewater.

He has also worked in the Airforce and as a paid firefighter, but still volunteered on the side.

"One of the things I learned at Bridgewater was giving back to the community is a big thing, so even when I have been a paid firefighter, I have also volunteered as well – why would you have all this knowledge and not share the knowledge with other people?," he said.

"When you look at any volunteer service – fire service, SES or ambulance service – there are highly-trained people who give up their time.

"There are a lot of very smart and intelligent people and they give up their time freely."

Goolwa CFS is always looking for new volunteers for various roles.

"It builds a stronger community – you get to meet lots of different people, and we have all sorts of tradies, very skilled people, in different fields," he said.

"Volunteering builds the community – it gives people a bit of self-worth and a sense of giving back."

#### **Learner driver** charged with drink driving

A learner driver will front court after crashing into a tree while under the influence at Strathalbyn in the early hours of Sunday morning.

At about 3.15am, police and other local emergency services were called to Adelaide Road after a car hit a tree.

The driver, a 24-year-old Strathalbyn man, who sustained minor injuries, recorded a blood alcohol reading of 0.134 and was reported for drink driving, breaching the conditions of his learner's permit, failing to display L plates, and failing to have a qualified supervising driver present.

He will be summonsed to appear in court at a later date, and his car was towed from the scene.

### Spring school holiday warning for road users

Road users are reminded to be safe this Spring school holiday period, with warmer weather set to bring more cars out to the regions, and cyclists and pedestrians onto the road.

So far this year, 61 people have lost their lives and 611 have been seriously injured on South Australian roads.

While fatalities are down slightly on a horror 2023 – 61 versus 84 at this time last year - serious injuries are continuing to occur at an alarming rate - 611 versus 643 this time last year.

In order to be on track to reach SA's Road Safety Strategy targets, SA would need to record less than 80 lives lost and 637 serious injuries for the full calendar year.

It's why RAA Senior Manager Safety and Infrastructure Charles Mountain is warning road users to be careful, particularly in the regions.

"We're continuing to see a concerning rate of road trauma in South Australia," he said.

'These school holidays, thousands of families may be heading to our regional areas for a road trip or getting out on their bikes and sharing the road with others.

"If you're going on a road trip, make sure you're driving to the conditions, taking regular rest breaks, and remaining focused on the task of driving.

"With three months left in the year, we're urging all drivers, cyclists and pedestrians to be aware of the responsibility that comes with sharing the road."

Other warnings included:

- Double-check trailers or caravans if you're towing. Pay close attention to tyres, brakes, lights, and how it is attached to the tow vehicle.
- If the vehicle hasn't been recently serviced, book it in before heading off to avoid a break-down.
- ullet If riding or walking with family, always stick to the dedicated paths and crossings and look out for one another. Use pedestrian crossing facilities where provided.
- Pay particular attention at train and tram corridors and only cross where there is a dedicated crossing point. Scan the tracks to the right and left before attempting to cross.

#### Two suspects arrested over break-in at **Murray Bridge**

Two men were arrested, including one local, and two more are on the run after a break-in and assault at Murray Bridge last month.

At about 7.45pm on Friday, September 20, four men armed with weapons allegedly forced their way into a Clifford Street home and assaulted the 42-yearold male occupant.

The victim was later taken to hospital for treatment of non-life-threatening

Two of the suspects, a 24-year-old Murray Bridge man and a 19-year-old Loxton man, were arrested soon after, and charged with aggravated serious criminal trespass and assault causing harm.

They were both refused bail and appeared in court the following day.

Investigators are following positive lines of enquiry regarding the two remaining suspects.

Police are appealing for any witnesses or anyone who may have been driving in the area and captured the incident on dashcam footage to contact Crime Stoppers on 1800 333 000 or online at (www.crimestopperssa.com.au).



Almost three in four drivers say they were involved with or witnessed unsafe behaviour such as drink driving or extreme speeding as youngsters ahead of the state's largest youth road safety event last week.

A recent RAA survey found 69 per cent of drivers participated in or witnessed reckless behaviour such as drink driving, speeding, not wearing a seatbelt or driving distracted between the ages of 16-21, while a further 48 per cent said peer pressure had led to the dangerous behaviour, cementing the importance of exposing young drivers to circuit-breaking road safety education before they get behind the wheel.

Across three days at the Adelaide Entertainment Centre last week, more than 12,000 high school students from more than 100 schools received a stark road safety wake-up call at RAA's Street Smart High event in what was the largest attendance since the program began.

As part of the event, students witnessed a realistic simulated crash scene in which actors played young people involved in a fatal crash, and first responders from SA Police, the Metropolitan Fire Service and SA Ambulance Service rendered assistance.

Students also heard from people who lost

loved ones or suffered a life-altering injury due to road trauma.

"Young people are overrepresented in serious crashes, and losing a young family member to road trauma is catastrophic for all involved," RAA's Senior Manager for Road Safety, Charles Mountain, said.

"Our inexperienced drivers may be more susceptible to peer pressure or just making a bad decision because they aren't cognisant of the potential consequences, and many of us would've experienced this ourselves at a younger age.

"Street Smart High is all about getting the message to soon-to-be drivers about what's at stake when they get behind the wheel

Minister for Police and Emergency Services Dan Cregan said targeted messaging was a vital way to reduce the number of serious injuries and fatal crashes on the state's roads.

"Seeing first-hand the impacts of road trauma is challenging, but far too many young people are being hurt or dying behind the wheel," he said.

"Bringing together the next generation of road users to make better decisions in a supportive environment will help save lives."


On September 27, a Chiton home was broken into and a Land Rover was stolen.

Got some junk in the garage, looking to downsize or need to clear out an estate?

This year's Rotary Auto Swap Meet in Strathalbyn on October 13 is just the thing for you.

Strathalbyn Rotary spokesperson Craig Maidment said while last year's event attracted 164 stallholders – the highest since Rotary took over the event – organisers are expecting more this time around at the town oval.

No registration is necessary, with stallholders to queue at the Ashbourne entrance before grabbing their spots ahead of the gates opening to the public at 6.30am.

Mr Maidment said buyers can expect "a big trash and treasure".

"Clean your shed out, put items in the back of your ute or on a trailer, and line up on the morning prior to the gates opening, and providing you pay our entry fee (\$20 for stallholders), you are in," he said.

"Then it is down to you after that and see how you go for the rest of the day. "If you are thinking of downsizing or you are cleaning out one of your family members' estates, it is a lot easier to do it when you have over 1000 people coming to look at what you have got.

"It is a lot simpler to get rid of stuff here than try and sell it in your garage or try and sell it by swap and sell or whatever."

Funds raised for Rotary will be funnelled back into community projects, particularly for young people, with the group's focus on youth this year.

"It is not decided per se, but we have got lots of youth programs this year, a couple of scholarships, and we are sending young people off to leadership programs," Mr Maidment said.

"We have someone to go on the One and All experience, and we are looking at a potential exchange student to go away next year, and that all costs money."

Rotary have run the event since 2022 and will continue to do so, with tickets costing just \$5 for adults, and children free.

Extra catering will be available this time following the demand at 2023's event.

I devoured the book *Before We Were Innocent* which builds on intrigue and suspense with mysterious storylines while switching between the present and past.


The book's biggest strength is the way author Ella Berman realistically captured the complexities and nuances of the dynamic between the three female friends.

There is a lot of stress across our rural sector, with combined headwinds that so many people are facing.

The embattled Strathalbyn Abattoir redevelopment has hit another snag, with the Fleurieu Community Co-operative going into voluntary administration.

Its future is again in serious doubt. The abattoir closed in December 2020 when former operators Strath Pastoral ceased trading, leaving the Fleurieu without an abattoir of scale.

It was reinvigorated by the Fleurieu Community Co-operative, who undertook a \$3.5m restoration of the site.

Hopes were high for a reopening earmarked for August 2022, but the project experienced continuous delays – first with releasing the necessary grant funding, then with complications with contractor schedules and sourcing materials, among other factors.

Sourcing contractors proved one of the biggest hurdles, as it has for many developments across the state in recent years, with a shortage in regional areas.

The Co-operative had been putting on a positive face, but it appears it has all been too difficult, with the redevelopment put into voluntary administration.

Despite the complicated monetary details, administrator Andrew Heard believes the abattoir could be reestablished under the right person or organisation.

Mr Heard's confidence is testament to the fact that an abattoir in the local area, to help local producers, is on the wish list for many local farmers.

Mr Heard said most of the parts required to get the abattoir up and running are already available, and what is needed is for the redevelopment to be completed by someone with the expertise and management skills to bring it to reality.

He is thinking members of the Cooperative might be able to raise those funds needed, but that anyone could realistically strike a deal with the landlord to do the job.

Here's hoping the confidence is wellplaced, and a positive end can come from the current disarray.

"They've all been above what we did last year, but the 24-hour one, we did four 22 laps this year which is the highest we've ever done, so that was a big highlight," Vrabec said.



Strengthening the ties within personal 'pods and patches' is a key way at maintaining mental health, according to a local advocacy group.

For Mental Health Month, Strathalbyn & Communities Suicide Prevention Network offered *The Southern Argus* readers tips on maintaining relationships and strengthening

Volunteer Cliff Sweetman draws knowledge from his career as a teacher, student counsellor and engaged community member in supporting others.

He encourages others to think about personal pods and patches within communities such as workplaces, clubs and social groups as the "foundation stones" to building wellbeing.

For those who feel disconnected or alone, some areas for connection could be at home or family life, social circles, work relationships, self-development environments or hobbies.

"Connecting with others is more important than you might think," Mr Sweetman said.

"Social connection can lower anxiety and depression, help us regulate our emotions, lead to higher self-esteem and empathy, and actually improve our immune systems.

"By neglecting our need to connect, we put our health at risk."

He has found that in supporting others in helping themselves, it is necessary to engage in explorative and reflective conversation while listening to a person's challenges in a non-judgemental and empathetic way.

Looking after wellbeing is a process that builds on personal mental health toolkits, and allows people to adapt with the constant changes of life.

Mr Sweetman likens looking after mental health to physical, as an ongoing process of implementing positive practices and experiences that strengthen resilience.

To revamp a 'mental health and wellbeing toolkit', Mr Sweetman offers the following suggestions:

#### Social and community connectivity

Communities are strengthened by the

connectedness and networks of its members.

#### A sense of purpose and direction

Maintain mental and physical skills, for example, keeping a diary, upskilling, building a raised garden, DIY projects, start an online community chat group or produce a community newsletter.

#### Take care of self and others

Look out for others and check in on immediate patches.

Maintain identity, self-esteem, selfconfidence, stability, sense of belonging, and mental and physical fitness

#### Relationships with others

Keep in contact with family, friends, colleagues and neighbours via phone, electronically, writing letters, sending a photo-a-day, or by waving with a verbal 'Hello, how's it going?" across the divide.

#### • The value of getting out and about daily

Fresh air, daylight, nature and seeing others is important.

• Exercise, activities and projects

Physical and mental activity is vital. Some examples include arts and crafts, bushwalking, caring for pets, reading, writing, illustrating, board gaming, gardening, jigsaws and crosswords.

Looking at another area, Strathalbyn & Communities Suicide Prevention Network has developed a resource on how violence can impact a child if they witness the behaviour growing up.

This toxic exposure to stress can lead to children adopting violence into their toolkit as a means to an end, as well as life-long problems with learning, behaviour, depression, and antisocial behaviour.

"Our awareness (around domestic violence) has been raised, however, the issues are as strong and emotionally draining in our communities as ever," he said.

"They are 24/7 issues – not once a week or once a month - they are in every community and can often be very close to home."

Stresses for children can have an impact on the rest of their lives, and life coping skills they gain need to be adaptable and purposeful.

Research is clear that all children need to live an an environment of healthy relationships with family members, caregivers, and community members.

Like a game of serving and returning in tennis, children naturally reach out for interaction, such as facial expressions as babies, or conversations and positive attention in older children.

Adults need to get in sync with them to create stability and well-functioning brains, as well as level environments that buffer

## Scavenger hunters turn out to aid Kombi Tour

A scavenger hunt to raise funds to help a Mount Barker woman with stage four metastatic cancer drive a restored Kombi across Australia has added about \$2000 to

As previously reported in *The Southern Argus*, Shiralee Judge is preparing to undertake a 1741km journey in a lovingly restored Kombi to raise funds and awareness of breast cancer and the McGrath Foundation.

About 57 Australians are diagnosed with

breast cancer every day, and about 20,000 every year.

One in seven women and one in 500 men are diagnosed with the cancer in their lifetime, with nine people dying every day from the disease.

Miss Annabelle's Kombi Tour will travel from Mount Barker to Sydney, stopping at nine towns, including Loxton, Mildura, Wangaratta, and Berry.

The team hope to raise \$50,000.

On Sunday, about 25 cars set out on the scavenger hunt across the Hills region, covering 55km for the day, and taking in sights many saw for the first time.

"It turned out to be a really good day,"

Ms Judge said.

"So many people either hadn't attended a scavenger hunt before or hadn't been on one since the early 1990s, so it brought back a lot of memories.

"Lots of really good photos were taken along the way which were proof photos, so we knew they actually drove the route, not just put it in the GPS."


After the hunt, participants were treated to a pink spread of food at the Mount Barker Bowling Club and tippy go cricket on the greens while waiting for all the cars to make it home.

"My aim for the hunt was that Miss Annabelle – the Kombi van - was first registered in May 1974, so obviously turned 50 this year, so I tried to keep it in that theme," Ms Judge said.

"Participants had to look out for lots of different signs and animals... for example, there was a question of how many 50 (km) signs will you see along your route."

Renovating Miss Annabelle is coming along well, and Shiralee and her supporters – including a number of businesses and Rotary clubs – hope to stage several more fundraisers and awareness events over October, before setting off on November 16.





Strathalbyn and District Basketball Association (SDBA) referees are stamping their authority at multiple levels, as the association's training program bears fruit.

Among the list of achievers is Thomas Peachey, fresh from umpiring the bronze medal game between West Adelaide Bearcats and Sandringham Sabres at the Under 18 Club Nationals in Perth.

Association President Belinda Vivian said Peachey's achievements were something to be proud of as he regularly referees NBL1 and Reserves games in Adelaide.

"It is a huge deal (the bronze medal game) and we are so very proud that Thomas has not only been selected to officiate on national platforms, but that he was awarded a medal game," Vivian said.

"Referees attend Nationals competitions from all over Australia.

"They are assessed and work hard with the referee coaching group all week to then be among a select few to be rewarded with a medal game.

"In July this year, Thomas also attended Footlocker U16 National Championships, and fast forward a few months, to see him listed as Crew Chief at U18s just emphasises his personal investment to do well and be rewarded."

Peachey said it was an honour to officiate the bronze medal game.

"I have been fortunate enough to be surrounded by people and friends I have made through the sport who are as invested into refereeing as I am," he said. "This has helped me maintain my

"This has helped me maintain my motivation and continue to put time and effort into refereeing.

"Other than that, I've followed the same pathway as many before me – from refereeing in local associations in a green shirt earning \$5 a game, to association carnivals across the state while I was playing, along with district games on Saturday mornings and Friday nights."

"The game was highly competitive, with both teams bringing intensity to match their skill.

"Overall, the game was well-controlled, with thanks to my partners working the game with me.

"It was a joy to work as crew chief for the first time on such a close medal

Vivian said other stand-out referees in the Strathalbyn association staking their claim on the court included Jordyn Summers, and Samuel Sargent

Summers has recently achieved his Level 1B accreditation, and travels each week to Adelaide for extra experience.

"He was recently asked to join the SA Country Referee Development Program, which involves more off court learning with some experienced presenters from across Australia," Vivian said.

"He also attended Albury for the Australian Country Junior Basketball Cup in January this year for the first time, which was a fantastic opportunity."

Likewise, Sargent was progressing in the sport, working towards his Level 1A Accreditation.

She said the association was also proud of its 'green shirt' program, where referees begin.

The association works with approximately 20 to 22 referees, with six qualified referee coaches, and more wanting to achieve that accreditation.

"Without referees, there is no game," Vivian said.

"With one or two exceptions our group is a young one, ranging from 11-to-20-years-old.

"Many of them play and coach junior teams too – all learning to be great role models and aspire to work through their pathways as others before them.

"These kids just create a great culture amongst us.

"We all want to be there, and they all represent Strathalbyn very well – we are on the map in the referee department."

Referees too struggle with having just one court for the association, as it impacts on the number of games they can offer in a week.

Also, like players, referees have to fund much of the travel to officiate

"Accommodation and airfares if required in the Higher Performance Programs – state and national levels – can be covered by SA Country, Basketball SA and Basketball Australia," Vivian said.

"Otherwise, families of the referees are usually the main tier of funding for them.
