Approved Strathalbyn development at former SES site to create jobs...

Local jobs and further town amenities are expected to be created as a result of a recently approved development at the former Strathalbyn State Emergency Service (SES)

station site.

As previously reported in *The Southern Argus*, IBS Planning and Projects' Dennis Chung lodged the application earlier this year for the alterations, additions and redevelopment of the former SES site on Murray Street on behalf of landowner and

Murray Strath Investment's George Mocatta, who wants to turn the canopy and shed into a bulky goods outlet/shop, the existing garage into a service trade premises occupied by Kokovans, and the office into a consulting room/office.

The bulky goods outlet could also be

centrally divided and form two separate tenancies at each end of the building.

Mr Mocatta told *The Argus* the development would create jobs and amenities in the growing town.

Supporting youth mental health was the top priority for many visitors at last week's street chat hosted by Strathalbyn and Communities Suicide Prevention Network.

Mental health advocates intermittently run streets chats to offer resources and connection to community members.

They were supported by Rotarians who cook a free barbecue.

Last Thursday's event corresponded with Mental Health Month where Cliff Sweetman - who is a retired teacher and

student counsellor - offered resources he has created that promote mental health and wellbeing.

He found many visitors seeking support for young people.

"Young people were on top of the list in terms of expressing concerns and showing anxiety and depression as a symptom of their mental health issues," Mr Sweetman said.

"One was a nurse at an emergency department who found a lot of young people come in with mental health issues that need to be addressed.

"There's a sense of hopelessness starting to develop in some people."

Plaque handover at Mt Compass Area School

Mount Compass Area School's thriving agriculture program, complemented by the most recent additions to the campus, were on show for the Minister for Education, Training and Skills Blair Boyer during a Country Cabinet visit last Thursday.

The minister met with Principal Lucie Walker and her students to present a plaque to mark the \$11.5 million worth of capital works that were completed at the school in late 2021.

The capital works included:

- A new administration building with reception area, offices, meeting rooms, staff room, storage areas and staff amenities.

- A new resource centre with student services, sick room, offices and storage areas as well as food technology, canteen, teacher preparation and storage.

- A new technology studies and art building with general learning spaces, teacher preparation, storage areas, student and staff amenities.

- A new classroom building with two general learning areas.

- A defined entrance to the school linked to the new administration building.

- Appropriate disability access to facilities.

Mr Boyer was "pleased" to see the progress, and how the new classrooms and specialty centres have energised staff and students.

"This is my first look at the work that has transformed the school," he said.

"The new facilities replaced some very outdated ones, including a tired prefabricated

building that was the administration centre.

"While it has long been a leader in agriculture studies, the transformation of the site has made learning spaces more functional, inspiring and flexible, improving learning environments and education outcomes."

In addition to the presentation, the minister and Department of Education Chief Executive Martin Westwell were taken on a tour of the school, with a focus on its agricultural studies.

Now in its 125th year, the reception to year 12 school has a 16-hectare working farm with industry-standard farming practices as part of its VET program, and stewardship of the Fleurieu Swamp, which plays a key role in students' learning about protecting endangered ecosystems.

Ms Walker said it was a "really awesome" opportunity to showcase the school.

"We're such a passionate advocate for our school – it's a fabulous place – so to have time with Blair and Martin just to highlight some of the things we do is brilliant," she said.

"Our vision for this school is that we are so privileged to be the students of that unique fleurieu swamp and have 17 hectares of land that's swamp and agricultural farming land.

"Part of what I really wanted to promote was let's share this with other schools, and is there a way we can invite other schools to camp here or come on to our land and learn?"

"I hope that's something him and Martin can take away and help us facilitate in the future."

She added it was an equally valuable experience for the students to meet and chat with the state's leaders.

Community 'shows up' for C

It was a full house at Encounter Bay Football Club last Thursday for Country Cabinet Victor Harbor and Goolwa, which saw residents take the opportunity to address concerns about housing, homelessness, infrastructure and local council-related issues.

Country Cabinet provides an opportunity for communities to voice any concerns or challenges, and ask questions directly to Premier Peter Malinauskas, his cabinet and chief executives in an unmoderated forum.

The cabinet has previously visited Kangaroo Island, Port Pirie, Port Augusta, Yorke Peninsula, Limestone Coast, Adelaide Hills, Naracoorte and Eyre Peninsula.

It was finally the Fleurieu's turn last week, with the major event last Thursday garnering a packed audience, as noted by the Premier.

"As a government we reinstated the practice of having what we called Country Cabinets, and I've got to say they've been exceptionally useful, hopefully, to members of local communities, but certainly as a government we've found them to be a thoroughly productive exercise," he said.

"The honest truth is no matter how many briefings on a particular subject, nothing quite replicates hearing from people directly, and what briefings don't necessarily fully illuminate is the weight of concern a particular issue has amongst a community.

"Forums like this one really go to the heart of a chance for us to familiarise ourselves in a thoughtful way where we should be putting the weight of emphasis in terms of reform or policy, or even just investment of resources.

"These forums only work when people turn up and this community has well and truly shown up, so we value it."

Among the topics and queries raised by the community on the night were:



- Homelessness
- Trust homes/housing trust
- Local kidney dialysis services
- GPs and bulk billing
- Transport Act review
- Funding for a mountain bike park
- Dedicated hospice care
- Government advertising
- Bike tracks
- Advocacy for people with intellectual disabilities
- PATS scheme
- Council powers

Concerns were also raised about Local Government sustainability, with mention given to the recent rate increase for Alexandrina Council ratepayers, and the proposed Goolwa North Code Amendment.

In regards to sustainability, Treasurer Stephen Mullighan, representing Minister for Local Government Joe Szakacs, noted the Essential Services Commission's external annual review along with the upcoming ECOSA review, while Planning Minister Nick Champion declined to comment directly on the code amendment while it was still ongoing, but expressed he wanted to get the process right.

Mr Malinauskas believed the state to be in a “relatively good position” but noted there was no shortage of challenges, and the government was planning ahead to fix and prepare for them further down the track.

“I think economically the country is in a unique position – there’s still economic growth but cost of living is a real first-order issue, and we are worried about some of the implications of the rising costs and what that means for people on fixed or low incomes.

“Having said that, what really makes me have a degree of hope and confidence isn’t so much where we’re at now, but where we have the capacity to go if we play our cards right as a state over the next 10-20 years.

“There’s an awful lot of opportunity coming our way, and that represents a really important moment for us to seize to make sure the next generations of South Australians – our children and grandchildren – actually get a chance to have the best standard of living.

“The only catch is this – when we think about opportunity it probably means growth and growth brings with it growing pains, and I do think many parts of our state are experiencing these challenges and this is no exception.”

He thanked the community for coming out.

Goolwa Secondary College officially opens Ag space

The official opening of Goolwa Secondary College’s agricultural studies space on Friday was heralded with the arrival of some new ‘kids’ on the block and a visit from the state’s Education Minister.

Although students have already been using the space in their studies, Friday’s opening marked a significant milestone for the school in its journey to providing “innovative and practical learning opportunities” through partnering with local industries.

The school has worked with Neti Pot to establish its own local flower farm and with the Ferguson family to supply calves for the Cows Create Program, and will connect next with the Miller family at Briar Rose Farm to have baby goats on site at the beginning of next year.

“This developing space and program represents our commitment to equipping our young people with the skills and knowledge they need to thrive in the agricultural and horticultural sectors,” Goolwa Secondary College Principal, Rebecca Moore, said.

“By partnering with local industry, we are creating a dynamic learning environment that bridges the gap between education and real-world applications.

“Our collaboration with industry experts ensures our students gain valuable insights and hands-on experiences, preparing them for successful careers in agricultural and horticultural, and importantly, doing this within our community.

“As we continue to grow our agriculture program, we look forward to deepening our relationship with the Millers and embracing the mini goats as an extension of the livestock focus.”

The space complements work being done in the classroom, which includes using cutting-edge technology that’s becoming increasingly important in modern farming practices, and allows students to have hands-on learning opportunities, particularly with livestock.

For student Brydie Allsop, it’s one of the most enjoyable aspects of her studies.

“This incredible addition to our school has provided us with hands-on learning opportunities, the joy of being outdoors, and the excitement of working with and learning about livestock,” she said.

“Perhaps the most exciting addition to our agriculture space has been the introduction of livestock.

“Caring for livestock, understanding their needs and observing their behaviours have provided us with unique insights into farming.

“It has been thrilling to see the chooks and calves thrive under our care, and this experience has sparked an interest in many of us to explore careers in agriculture and animal science.”

The space, while already in use, was officially opened by Minister for Education, Skills and Training Blair Boyer and Ms Moore on Friday.

Mr Boyer, who also toured the school’s Lumination space and design tech workshop during the visit, was blown away by the space, and the partnerships between the school and local farming community.

“It’s incredible to see the local community getting behind our public schools like that, but also in a way that benefits the broader community as well,” he said.

“I grew up on a family farm down in south-west Victoria, near a place called Portland, so I understand the importance of programs like this, particularly in areas where we rely on learning institutions, whether it’s school or TAFE, to produce the next generation of workers for our agricultural sector – that’s really important.

“Something like this is fantastic, not just in the sense it will lead to real-world job opportunities in sectors that we really need them, but sectors local to where they grew up which is what a lot of the young people rightfully want to do.”

It is hoped the space will continue to inspire students to pursue careers in the agricultural and horticultural industries.

Went Up the Hill

Most people would be familiar with the nursery rhyme *Jack and Jill* in which Jack and Jill went up the hill to fetch a pail of water, then Jack fell down and lost his crown, and Jill came tumbling after.

Well in this film, things definitely go ‘tumbling after’, and by things, I mean the audience’s attention span about halfway through the movie.

In *Went Up the Hill*, Jack, played by *Stranger Things*’ Dacre Montgomery, travels to remote New Zealand to attend his estranged mother, Elizabeth’s, funeral, which is where he first meets her grieving widow, Jill, played by *Old*’s Vicky Krieps.

Jill offers him a place to stay, thus catapulting the pair into a series of haunting events in which Elizabeth’s spirit possesses their bodies, leading to a life-threatening three-way nocturnal dance Jack and Jill must attempt to escape.

Filmed in the same location the story is set, the cinematography is by far the highlight of the film, as too is the acting brilliance of Montgomery and Krieps, who were able to shift into the character of Elizabeth with a simple movement in their eyes and stature.

Their acting prowess, alongside the landscape, lift the film from its mediocrity.

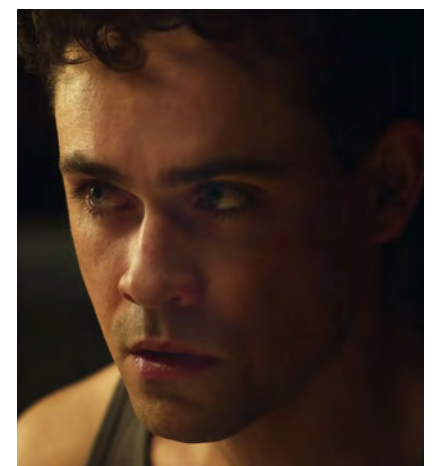
If you are someone who enjoys the cinematic aspect of films then you’ll love director Samuel Van Grinsven’s artistic eye in this film, however, if you are simply there for entertainment value, then *Went Up the Hill* sadly lacks that.

This is due to its inability to know when to make a stylistic choice and when to call it quits.

The removal of several unnecessarily long shot scenes and repeated sequences would have cut the run time by half, making for a great short film, which is what I believe this tale is better suited for rather than a feature-length flick.

On a personal note, I also disliked the unanswered or partially answered questions the film left behind, particularly in regards to Jack’s past and his relationship with his boyfriend, in addition to the nature of Jill and Elizabeth’s relationship, which, while we could conclude from reading in-between lines, makes for a more satisfying experience if disclosed upfront.

I wish I could give the film a higher rating, but as this is the first time I’ve sat in a cinema and checked my phone to see how much longer of the movie we had left, I can only give it a two-and-a-half.

Year 12s prepare for exam time

Put the hard work in early and stay on track is the advice Eastern Fleurieu year 12 students Leah Jantke, Sam Erbsland and Lachie Cutting have for their peers ahead of the upcoming SACE exams.

The main exam period begins on Monday with mathematical methods and general mathematics, and rounds up on November 15 with music studies and geography.

The exams – paper, electronic and oral – will deliver final assessments for more than 12,500 secondary students enrolled in examined Stage 2 SACE subjects as part of their South Australian Certificate of Education (SACE) qualification.

Among those thousands of students will be Eastern Fleurieu year 12s Leah, Sam and Lachie.

Leah has a singular biology exam, while Sam and Lachie have three each – general maths, biology and chemistry for Sam, and biology, chemistry and math methods for Lachie.

To prepare, Leah has been limiting distractions and honing in on her studies, while Sam and Lachie have been using past exams.

For all three, the exams are coming “quicker than expected.”

“I feel like even though I have been putting time aside and doing study, it’s all coming together all at once and I don’t have

enough time to learn everything, but I’m sure I’ve got it down-pat,” Leah said.

Sam felt the same way.

His exams are spaced on Monday, Wednesday and Friday, which he felt was not enough time to cram everything in.

“I feel like, for Lachie and I, we have the Monday, Wednesday and Friday, and two days between them is not a lot because I want to be able to space them out a bit better,” Sam said.

“I’m going to have to juggle a bit, so that’s going to be hard.”

After exams, Leah has a vet nursing apprenticeship lined up through TAFE that she will jump straight into, while Sam is hoping to pursue secondary education at university, and Lachie plans to study medical imaging.

Sam encouraged his peers to work hard and know they are “nearly done”, while Leah says to stay on track.

For those year 11s who will be sitting in their place next year, the trio warned them to stay on top of the workload and to get as much done at school while you can.

“Stay on top of your work is probably the most important thing” Leah said

“Everyone says it but there’s a reason for that.

“It can get very overwhelming, and feel very busy and you don’t have enough time very quickly, so stay on top and keep track of everything.”

Students will receive their SACE results on December 16.

Approved development set to create local jobs

Local jobs and further town amenities are expected to be created as a result of a recently approved development at the former Strathalbyn State Emergency Service (SES) station site.

As previously reported in *The Southern Argus*, IBS Planning and Projects’ Dennis Chung lodged the application earlier this year for the alterations, additions and redevelopment of the former SES site on Murray Street on behalf of landowner and Murray Strath Investment’s George Mocatta, who wants to turn the canopy and shed into a bulky goods outlet/shop, the existing garage into a service trade premises occupied by Kokovans, and the office into a consulting room/office.

The bulky goods outlet could also be centrally divided and form two separate tenancies at each end of the building.

Mr Mocatta told *The Argus* the development would create jobs and amenities in the growing town.

“It’s such a quaint town that is growing and I think there’s probably going to be a need for something that creates jobs and gives amenity to the residents of the area,” he said.

“It will create some local jobs and amenity via service trade or bulk goods outlet.

“It all fits into that classic historical amenity of Strathalbyn.”

Public consultation on the development was open from August 12 and 30, garnering two responses – one in support with concerns and another in opposition.

The major concerns focused on noise generated by the development, increased traffic along Rowe and Murray Streets, and rubbish generated by patrons.

The proposal was internally referred to the heritage department for advice on the built form and its appropriateness to the area, which recommended a light grey finish to be used in a corrugated profile.

It was also referred to the development engineering department, which recommended a condition be applied to ensure stormwater management is maintained in a manner that alleviates the possibility of inundation.

The Fleurieu Regional Assessment Panel considered the application earlier this month and decided it met the Planning and Design Code for planning consent.

“Based on the application proposed and its presentation, the service trade premise is regarded as relatively small in scale,” the report read.

“It has effectively demonstrated its compliance with the code requirements for on-site parking, vehicle manoeuvring, and overall traffic flow.

“The mix of land uses proposed demonstrate that through the employment of suitable

measures, the development can mitigate the unreasonable generation of noise.

“Having adequately addressed matters relating to the function, operation, design and built form, it is reasonable to conclude that the proposed development, as a whole, will not have an unreasonable impact on the character and amenity of the locality, appropriately manages stormwater, will not have an unreasonable impact on the local road network by way of increased traffic, and that the scale and function of the proposed development will be in a matter that can co-exist with the established surrounding land uses.

Planning consent was granted on the following conditions:

- No more than three finished caravans are to be displayed on the site – two parked in dedicated caravan parking bays within the compound and a potential third caravan located within the ‘showroom/office’ space. Two additional caravans can be contained within the workshop area to be restored.

- The service trade premise roller doors remain closed during operation of any noise emitting equipment and tools, including power saws, hammers and grinders.

- Rubbish collection is restricted to Sundays or public holidays from 9am to 7pm, and any other day from 7am to 7pm.

- Landscaping is planted within three months from the date of completion of building works and prior to occupation of the development. Any such vegetation must be replaced within the next available growing season if and when it dies or becomes seriously diseased.

- All stormwater drainage to discharge in a way that it does not flow or discharge onto land of adjoining owners or, in the opinion of council, detrimentally affect structures on the site or any adjoining land, including the public road.

- Car parking bays are permanently delineated prior to the occupation or use of the development.

- Collection of commercial waste is undertaken by a licenced contractor collected from within the confines of the land. Waste bins need to be kept out of view from the public road, must not be stored on areas used for car parking, and kept in a neat and tidy manner.

- External and security lighting is directed in such a manner so as to not, in the opinion of the authority, create unreasonable overspill onto any adjoining property or roadway.

- Operating hours remain as stated.

The next step is to get the building works undertaken.

Mr Mocatta is “pushing on with it” and encouraged interested tenants for the available two or three buildings to get in contact with Venture Commercial.

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Thousands flock to Callington Show

“We like to change things up, so that people who are coming feel like it is new and reinvented every year.”

The committee has received “very positive feedback” for the new entertainment on the lower oval, along with the music from the SA Police Band and the Murray Bridge Community Band that could be heard throughout the day.

Meanwhile, the competition entrants impressed the judges, with a mix of returning exhibitors as well as new ones that travelled to come to the event.

Mrs Lindsay thanked the patrons, volunteers, committee and sponsors for helping put on another fantastic Callington Show.

The committee will now have a break before meeting in February to elect a new one, and would love to hear feedback about the 2024 event.

It also welcomes new members to the committee.

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Car ploughs into Goolwa bakery

A woman sustained serious injuries after a car ploughed into a Goolwa bakery on Sunday.

Just before 11am, emergency services were called to Hutchinson Street's Live 'N' Let Pie after a car left the road and crashed into the store front.

Several people, including customers and staff, were inside the shop at the time.

One of the customers, a 62-year-old woman, was injured and taken to hospital by ambulance.

Fortunately, her injuries are considered non-life-threatening.

The driver, a 69-year-old Goolwa woman, was also taken to hospital as a precaution, but appeared physically uninjured.

State Emergency Service crews helped to shore up the structure, and the car was removed and towed from the scene.

Investigations into the crash are ongoing.

In a statement on Facebook, the bakery announced it was closed until further notice.

"Thank you for all your kind words and messages," it wrote.

"We really appreciate you all and a special thanks to the wonderful emergency services who attended."

Man wanted over Goolwa hotel theft

Public assistance is being sought to identify a man who allegedly stole money from a Goolwa hotel earlier this month.

Just after 9pm on Thursday, October 3, a man entered the gaming room of a Railway Terrace hotel and accessed the service area behind the counter, where he stole a small grey plastic box with a yellow lid containing cash.

The suspect is described as Caucasian and approximately 175cm tall with a medium build and short brown goatee.

He was wearing a black baseball cap with a silver logo on the front left side, a black jumper with a yellow hi-vis vest with reflective silver lining, beige pants, and brown laced work boots.

Tips and tricks to keep monsters at bay this Halloween

Ahead of tonight's spook-tacular celebrations, South Australia Police has formulated trick-or-treating safety tips to help keep children safe from ghouls and goblins.

While we know many are bone to be wild, not everyone shares the Halloween spirit, and therefore, SAPOL is sharing resources to ensure all have a terror-ific time.

Residents may display posters on their door, window or letterbox indicating whether they welcome such visitors or don't wish to be disturbed.

You can download the poster from SAPOL's website.

To ensure Halloween is more fun than

scary, SAPOL also encourages families to consider a few safety tips before venturing out for a night that's hex-tra special:

- Little monsters trick-or-treating should be accompanied by a trusted and responsible person and travelling in smaller groups is encouraged.

- Talk with children about the risk of distracted walking, including text messaging, talking on or looking at their phone, and listening to music.

- Plan costumes that are bright and reflective. Glow-in-the-dark elements can be a fun way to incorporate safety into a scary costume. Consider adding reflective tape to costumes and trick-or-treat bags for greater visibility. The use of Halloween masks can also restrict vision, making it difficult for children to see and avoid hazards.

- Be sure to obey road traffic rules and

use proper road crossings if available. Take extra care when crossing driveways.

- Only accept sweet treats that are wrapped. Accepting treats from neighbours/known addresses is also encouraged.

- For adults, lay off the 'boos' when you're out and about this Halloween, and be extra vigilant. Plan your journey home to your lair in advance.

- For drivers, practice safe driving by slowing down and being alert in residential neighbourhoods. Most children are excited during Halloween and may move in unpredictable ways.

Meanwhile, if you see anything that is more suspicious than spook in your neighbourhood, who are you going to call?

Contact police immediately on 131 444, as timely information may assist in preventing criminal behaviour.

Fatal collision at Meadows

A woman sadly lost her life following a collision at Meadows last Wednesday.

Just after 3.30pm on October 23, emergency services were called to Dashwood Gully Road following reports of a crash between a Suzuki sedan and Hyundai sedan.

The 76-year-old Suzuki driver was taken to hospital for treatment of life-threatening injuries but sadly, passed away.

The 68-year-old Hyundai driver was also taken to hospital with minor injuries.

Dashwood Gully Road was closed between Brookman Road and Ellis Road for a period of time.

Major Crash investigators attended the scene to investigate the circumstances surrounding the crash.

The woman's death is the 70th life lost on SA roads this year.

Two-car collision at Meadows

No stopping Aubrey at the Callington Show

Aubrey-Rose Whelan may have cerebral palsy but that didn't stop the seven-year-old cleaning up in the junior cookery competitions at the Callington Show on the weekend.

Among her awards were Special Needs Cookery Champion Exhibit, Produce Champion Exhibit, Junior Cookery 5-7 Years Champion, Junior Cookery Grand Champion, and Junior Cookery Highest Aggregate Points.

Her mum Rhiannon said Aubrey's love of cooking had come from watching her at work in the kitchen.

"She watches me do a lot of cooking and preserving, and attending country shows," she said.

"We decided, with some encouragement from Carolyn and Elsie Johnson, to get her involved in the cooking side of things.

"We discovered very quickly it has become a bit of her passion, and... when she is cooking she is very focused and very involved in what is going on versus her curriculum attention span (which) is very short – they will literally say under 30 seconds with her disability.

"When we are cooking we can do multiple recipes for up to an hour-and-a-half, and she is on task the whole time, so it is quite amazing."

Attending local shows is something Aubrey looks forward to.

"She loves coming to the shows and seeing when she has tickets and got ribbons," Miss Atkinson said.

"She has had a couple of rosettes with eggs

before at other shows, but this is the first time she has got sashes.

"I was ecstatic when I saw one, but then when we counted she had a total of five.

"It was quite amazing, and she is very happy.

"She was walking around the oval before when we had a bit of a break, (saying) 'Aubrey win', so she knows she has done something amazing today."

Aubrey has plenty of people who enjoy her cookery.

"She has a few fans that are always waiting in the wings to try the leftovers when we do some new recipe testing, and there are always people willing to jump in and take some cookies and cakes, and give us their feedback," Miss Atkinson said.

"Everyone loves that they are involved in some way."

She thanked the Johnsons for their encouragement, and to Cookery Convenor Barb Smithies for including special needs categories at country shows.

"If it wasn't for there being a special needs category in a previous show that Barb convenes, we probably would never have entered Aubrey in cookery," she said.

"So, it was a good step in to have that safe zone for her to be able to enter, and we went all in after that, so it is wonderful.

"Those people have been a big part of our journey."

Country shows are a big thing for the family.

"If we enter a show and we know there are entries, we come to see the results and it makes us have a family day out that is not disability related," Miss Atkinson said.

"So, it is just something that we do that is a normal family activity."

Lions bike show to take centre stage

Thousands of motorcyclists are expected at Macclesfield this Sunday for the Battunga Country Lions Bike Show.

Last year the event drew 2700 motorbike riders, with organisers expecting more this time at the Macclesfield oval.

Numerous clubs will be represented, with prizes going to the best American bike, British bike, Japanese bike, Italian bike, German bike, and best other bike.

"It is an informal show," Bike Show Chairman, Fred Keal, said.

"People just roll in in their thousands, park up, have a walk around, see a few people, have a burger and a beer, and listen to the bands.

"We can be confident we will have more than 2000 bikes turn up, but if we get much more than 3000, we are going to run out of places to put them.

"This year we are featuring the SA Ducati Owners Club because it is 50 years since they set up the club.

"They are an Italian motorbike, and like Italian cars, they are very flashy and very fast, and not to everyone's taste."

A purpose-built stage will see a number of blues and rock bands perform throughout the day, with catering from several groups, while a swap meet selling motorcycle-related items will also take place.

"What we say to our people who come is the ride to the show is half the fun because we have people riding up from

the city (and elsewhere)," Mr Keal said.

"All roads lead to Macclesfield, and they have a good ride.

"It is often the first ride out for a lot of people, as the weather is starting to pick up.

"Unlike a lot of shows, the people who are attending are front and centre – they park on the grass of the oval and we make sure they are welcomed."

The Battunga Country Lions Club has a number of charities the funds raised on Sunday will go to, with members of the Williams Syndrome Association of SA – a condition similar to Downs Syndrome – helping out on the day.

Gates will open at 9am, with the largest crowd expected by 12-noon, and people drifting home from about 2.30pm.

Igniting passion in motor history

Automotive and history enthusiasts are revving up for the 37th Power of the Past, where range of historic machinery and vehicles will be on display. The now biennial event had more than 2000 visitors to the previous rally, and the display this year will have more than 100 exhibitors and about 260 items, including cars, trucks, and engines. Visitors can view the pieces at the Mount Barker Showgrounds on November 9, 10am to 5pm, and November 10, from 10am to 3pm. Entertainment will also include a sheep shearer, a range of market stalls, lunch offerings, and an exhibitors' dinner on the

Saturday night. Hosted by Adelaide Hills Motor Restorers, the event falls on the club's milestone 40th anniversary. "It's great when you've got people streaming in, and exhibitors from all over Australia who have come to talk about their pride and joys," Co-ordinator, Allan Wheaton, said. "You get a variety of people – people who have never seen this stuff before, but also retired people who say 'dad had one of those on the farm'." "The prime objective is to display our toys and get together with other restorers, but it's also about education. "We're really keen for people to come along and ask questions like 'what did that engine do? What was it used for on the farm?'"

The display will also have Adelaide Hills Motor Restorers' extensive historic collection, with a large amount made locally in Mount Barker. Mr Wheaton finds members get satisfaction in rescuing historic treasures from the dump. "We tend to hang onto things and preserve them – it just keeping history going," he said. "They take ages to restore – I've got one engine I've been trying to put back together for two years." The club also aims to spark an interest for young people in restoring historic vehicles – which can be a dying art – with specific junior entries, awards, games, activities and rides in a 1949 fire engine.

In Alexandra Cricket games ending Saturday, Milang Blue declaring at 5/109 in passing Strath High School's 97 were looking for an outright but opener for High School in Brian Simpson foiled that idea in scoring 90, as High School declared at 3/179. Milang then 6/109 chasing 168 for the outright. Langhorne Creek Black in removing Finnis for 99 had a 16 run win, Ian Tonkin taking 5/22. Langhorne Creek Gold with 72 were five runs short of Strath White's first innings 77, with Perry Jones taking 7/24, while Milang White with Brian Paech top scoring with 55, beat Ashbourne by 62 runs on the first innings, 154 to 92, Bronte Pike taking 5/28.

Former Strathalbyn lad Ken Blake and Len Atlee won the Castrol six hour motorcycle race at Amaroo Park, Sydney in a close and controversial race. A recount of the laps after they finished second revealed they had won by eight seconds from twice winner Bryan Hindle and Clive Knight who were then disqualified for suspension modifications.

Elliott and Captain Leo Hawke congratulated the team on the premiership and Ken Bell received an inscribed gold medal for the most successful player of the year donated by Mr Almond.

Officers elected for the Milang Swimming Club were as follows; President, Mr. F. Kruse; Vice-Presidents, Messrs. J. & W. Woodrow and J. Daniels; Secretary and Treasurer Mr. A. Maude; committee, Messrs. J. Schmook, E. Bowden, T. Johnson and W. Higgins.

"I heard the local businesses were very

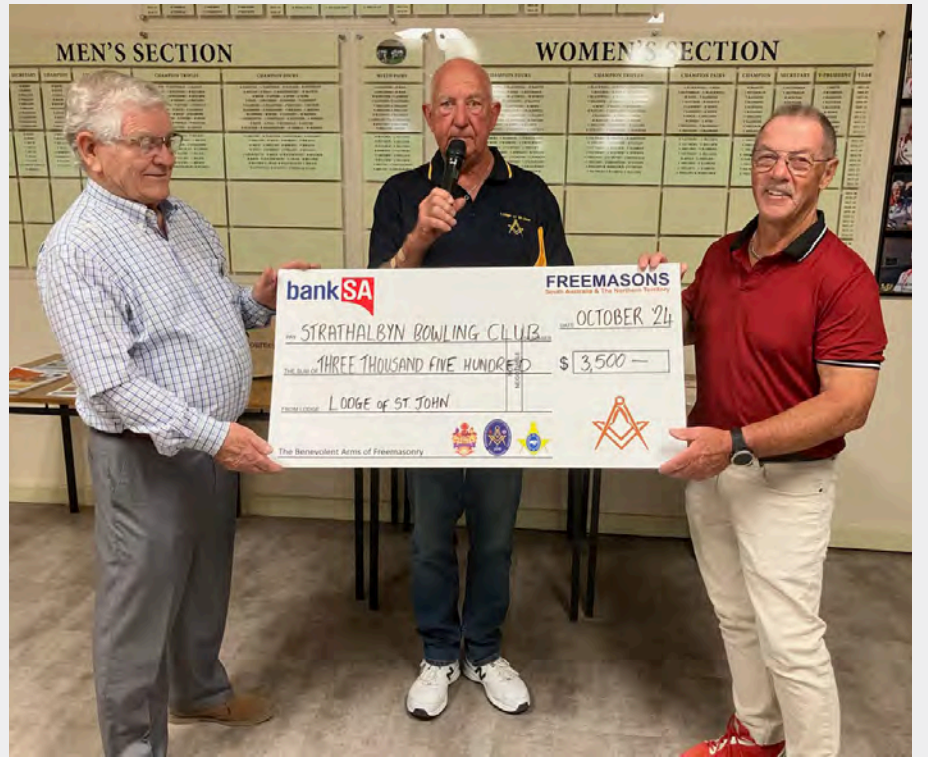
pleased with the weekend – they did a lot of business."

The \$3500 cheque has enabled the club to purchase 10 sets of new bowls to be used at the Night Owls competition, as well as by Eastern Fleurieu and

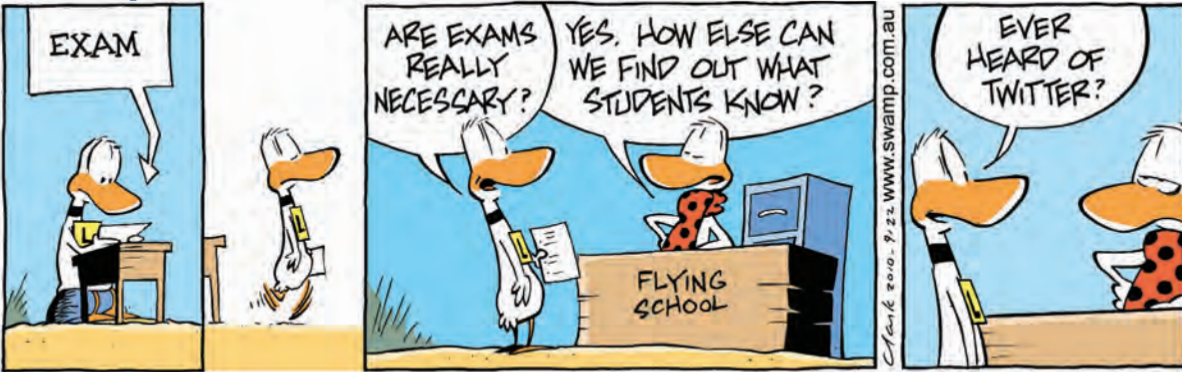
Tyndale Schools.

Lodge of St John has been associated with the local bowling club for several years and wishes them every success for the future.

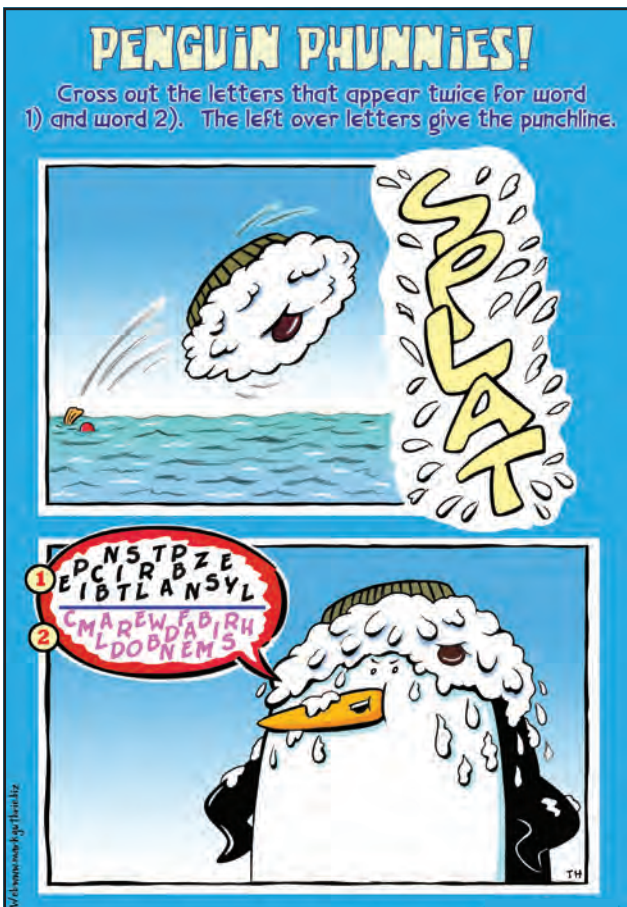

Basketballer chosen for international stage

A 15-year-old Strathalbyn basketballer has been shooting to new heights, after being selected to represent Australia in an international championship next month.

Alex Blackmore will be the youngest player in the U23 Australian Spinners in the Asia Oceania Championships in Bangkok, Thailand, in November.

The top three teams will qualify for the U23 World Cup in Brazil next year.

The honour was described as "pretty exciting" by Blackmore, who is now ramping up his training and commuting to Adelaide four nights a week in the lead up.

Blackmore has been ahead of the game in his basketball career from just 12-years-old when he was chosen to represent South Australia in the U23 team.

As followed in *The Southern Argus*, the Tyndale student has since been moving from strength-to-strength, with Blackmore's recent selection following the National Junior Wheelchair Championships earlier this year.

From there, he was invited to a selection camp last month on the Sunshine Coast, where he was chosen alongside two other South Australians to represent the country.

The ultimate goal for Blackmore would be the Paralympic Games in Las Angeles in 2028.

He has enjoyed building on his skills and improving his knowledge of the game, learning from attending camps and mixing with players and coaches.

In wheelchair basketball, every player receives a classification number, and the team is limited to 14 points on the court at one time.

"I love playing and socialising with the team and I just enjoy it," the year 9 student said.

His mum Lauren said Blackmore started playing basketball as a way to meet other people with disabilities.

"That's really the only place in the world where he's surrounded by people just like him," she said.

"He's learned from the older guys too – they're all pretty generous with their knowledge of how to get around well, and how to navigate things like plane trips."

Blackmore has been supported by former Australian of the Year Dylan Alcott, who has the same diagnosis as Blackmore, and whose foundation – which aims to help young Australians in sport and education – granted him a special sports chair and a pair of Kicks.

Habers in lining up a putt on the par three sixth was certainly inconvenienced when playing his shot having to deal with a fly in his eye for the ball to run off the green then scrubbing the hole.

It must have been still bothering him on the ninth in missing a simple birdie putt, as Kim made it three pars in a row. Kim, after three pars in a row, on the seventh saw his tee shot go deep into the trees on the right-hand side up the fairway, and then followed up with his next shot staying in the trees, necessitating a short shot to get back to the edge of the fairway.

Then Kim tried to go over the dam but the ball rolled into the water, and he was probably not happy that there was no long grass to stop it on the edge anymore as Mike Semple had neatly cut it during the week.

Trying to redeem himself Kim, on the jackpot par three eighth mentioned about the hole in ones he had had on the course and promptly made a mess of his tee shot, as Welky gained another plus on his way to victory for the day.

It was the eighth hole that Grant Ewins scored his only plus for the day as he finished with -5, like his partner and visitor Graham Rigney who picked up longest drive (19+) and also a nearest the pin on the sixth.

Michael Semple who didn't have any shots left to have a putt on the first, did well to finish on -1 when on five consecutive holes was putting for pars and a birdie, but finished with five bogies instead, while partner Peter Drury was happy with his effort on the sixth in sinking a long putt for par as he finished with -2 for the round.

David Wright, with a birdie on the sixth, was going well with +4 on the front nine with 40 off the stick but fell off the pace a bit on the back nine to finish the day on +2, a bit better than partner Mark Condon with -7 who had just two positive holes for the round.

Damon Mayes was another to be in form on the front nine with +4, then getting his score out to +5 before he went on to scrub the last three holes.

Paul Coombe was +1 after the first nine but on the 10th found his drive

was too long and went out of bounds and he was going down the gurgler on the back nine, before he recovered with plus efforts and a square on the last four holes, to finish at -1.

The last hole saw his second shot against the yellow peg next to the drain on the left of the green, promptly then hitting the ball onto the green and then picking up a par.

Ken Lester with positives on the last four holes on the front nine was climbing up the leaders' board and still in contention in being +2 after 13 holes but on the 15th found his tee shot going into the creek and his provisional shot going over the back of the green to then roll the ball back over and off the green to pick up.

In this group was Gordon Robson, who on the 15th, for the third hole in a row, missed a simple putt on his way to +2 for the round, while Kingsley Handke, also in this group, putted in for a par three.

Kingsley was still in the running before scratching the 16th, as he did the first time around the dam (seventh) when his fourth shot stopped just short of the dam before proceeding next shot to get the ball into the water.

On the 16th Ken was lucky his tee shot rolled over the bridge and up the fairway but not so lucky with his third shot which went out of bounds leading to a minus score, also picking up on the next hole due to his putting, Kingsley having three putts on this green as he finished the round square.

With more tree trouble on the last Ken finished with -2, while Gordon, missing a birdie putt on the last, made sure of ruining his chance to win the day as he finished with +2.

Stewart Glatz, finishing a -2, confessed to having trouble on the 10th and 11th holes with three shanks, nearly falling over in playing one of them on the 11th.

Kirk Richardson would have been grateful that at the halfway mark that Sean Walsh lost his card but in putting his cart away found the wind had blown it up to the cart shed so he finished filling it out for his round of -2.

Derek Keane showed his talent again last Saturday, firstly in getting out of the drain on the left of the 13th

with his second shot, then in finding himself near the water's edge on the 16th saw his next shot finish next to the pin to pick up a birdie.

Then on the 17th Derek gained nearest the pin with his tee shot but unfortunately failed to convert a simple birdie putt.

The week Derek was wearing a blue shirt which was certainly compatible on the fifth and 14th holes with the blue mental health tree situated on them, as he had to think his way through his shots in having to hit the ball out from the rough both times on the hill just above the green.

The first time he used the back of his putter to roll the ball down onto the green to salvage the hole and the second time rolled the ball down the slope again to finish close to the hole and pick up a plus, as he finished on -4.

The lucky putt for \$105 didn't go off again although Kingsley Handke and Kirk Richardson got close, while Sean Walsh was miles off.

This Saturday is the first stroke round of the Summer Cup, while players are reminded to put your name down if you are attending the presentation day on Sunday afternoon in the Terminus Hotel Beer Garden, 12 noon for 12.30, while the AGM is on November 18 at 7.30pm at the clubhouse.

What's the Hurry?

BIDDING

What a bunch of weird hands! Aren't we lucky we can see all 4 at the same time? I didn't have that benefit when my partner (South) opened the bidding with 1S. Curiously, West declined the chance to spoil the N/S bidding with a pre-emptive 3D weak jump overcall, possibly thinking that 5HCP was insufficient, but that left me free to try a delayed raise, as my hand looked too good for immediate support. So I chimed in with 2H, intending to support Spades at the next bid. East is now out of contention, so my partner, with a 4-loser hand jumped immediately to 4S, ending the auction. This is what is called Fast Arrival, and it carries the message, STOP BIDDING. So I did.

But what's the Hurry? Afraid that your partner will drop the bidding? Trust your partner, and get there slowly, Slow Arrival allows you to explore the hand to find its potential, and in this case, you know that you have a 4-loser hand and that partner was strong enough to bid a new suit at the next level which is forcing for 1 round of bidding, 1S - 2S would be a weak response, anything else invites further attention. Take advantage of the forcing bid to re-bid the Spades. 2S would have done the trick, now North can show support by bidding 3S, and South knows this shows 3-card support because if North has 4-card support he would have used a Bergen Raise. Because of the 4-loser hand, and the suit is spades, South can check for Aces, Blackwood will reveal 3 Key Cards and Greber CRO will specify exactly which Aces North holds, either way, 6S is easily found. If South doesn't try for the Slam, North should, with his 6-loser hand. I didn't do it because the Fast Arrival to 4S told me not to; I should have tried anyway. We can all be wise with hindsight, and seeing all 4 hands!

On the night this was played, 2 out of 7 pairs bid 6S making 12, the other 5 stayed in 4S, some making 13 tricks on a Club lead.
