## **Macclesfield Shed 'nails' it**

Macclesfield Men's Shed has been recognised as the top branch in the country this year for going above and beyond for their members and community.

More than 1300 sheds span across Australia with an average of about 50 members, making this a high honour for Macclesfield with a membership base of 20.

President Ken Smith received feedback that the atmosphere in the shed was "second to none".

"The bottom line of a men's shed is the health and wellbeing of men, that's always at the bottom of our thinking," he said.

The local group has immersed themselves in community projects, including recently supporting Macclesfield RSL Sub-Branch in the Reach Out posts project.

As previously reported in *The Southern Argus*, hundreds of bollards are earmarked to be distributed in quiet locations around

the state with the contact details of crisis networks such as Lifeline and Beyond Blue.

The initiative is the brainchild of RSL President Dennis Oldenhove who initially had them erected in the local Anzac gardens, and found people were ringing those numbers.

With an aligned passion for supporting mental health, Macclesfield Men's Shed partnered with the local RSL for the cause.

Other projects have included improving local parks and reserves with timber bench seats, a picnic table and seats, shelter structure, and disability access pathways.

They have also worked with Goolwa's Armfield Slip on a boat, repaired the propeller of a 1932 biplane in partnership with the RSL, and installed bollards at Crystal Lake to restrict vehicle access.

The group has a strong relationship with community groups, such as Lions, RSL and Macclesfield Community Association, and has also gotten involved in local events, such as the Lions Bike Show and Strawberry Festival.

While the group has largely worked with Mount Barker District Council, they hope to

expand their reach into other communities into the future.

The organisation's primary focus is to offer a social connection for members as they work on a project, as men typically talk shoulder-to-shoulder rather than face-to-face.

The Macclesfield leg started in 2013 when a group of men purchased a shed off a farmer's property and relocated it to the Macclesfield Oval.

Their first woodworking project was erecting the premises itself, which President Ken Smith found allowed members to take ownership of the space.

New members are welcome to their Thursday morning sessions.

The Australian Men's Shed Association (AMSA) made the announcement of 2024 Shed of the Year recently during a function at Murray Bridge.

Executive Officer David Helmers saw some "truly unique and innovative" activities in sheds, and he commended the "creativity of these shedders" who are doing "great things for their communities".

## Strathalbyn Pool ready for a 'fin-tastic' season

The Strathalbyn Swimming Pool team is ready to 'dive in' to another season.

Starting on Tuesday, the local pool will kick off its 2024-25 season, which for the first time will run for an additional four weeks as part of a trial initiated by the community and approved by Alexandrina Council in May.

YMCA Pool Regional Development Manager James Lomax was excited to welcome back the community with open arms and pool gates, and hoped the extended season would be embraced by users.

"It's fantastic for the community that the pool season will be extended," he said.

"We are hoping this will be well-received and that the community embrace the opportunity to utilise the facility in the additional weeks.

"Our recruitment has remained the

same in terms of numbers of staff, but (we have) just (been) engaging them earlier and retaining them later than we would normally.

"The extended season is covering traditionally cooler parts of the season and is aimed primarily at morning lap swimming."

This year will feature some brand-new special events such as inflatable days, Salti board sessions, pool discos and movie nights, and will see the return of aqua aerobics and swimming lessons.

The pool will remain open for general admission on off-peak days when the weather is 25 degrees celsius or above as per the 6pm forecast the day prior.

The pool is open for lap swimming regardless of the forecast.

The season will break from December 15 to January 28 before concluding on April 30.

"Our staff team is really excited for the centre to re-open and welcome the community back to the pool," Mr Lomax said.

"The pool is a real community hub over the warmer months, and attracts locals and visitors to the town."

## **Buffy wins Mayor's Short Story Challenge honour**

A young, home-schooled student has been crowned this year's overall winner of the Mayors' Short Story Challenge for her war-time piece involving a girl and a pelican.

A collaboration between Alexandrina Council, District Council of Yankalilla and the City of Victor Harbor, the Mayors' Short Story Challenge is an annual initiative that encourages school-aged children from reception through to year 10 to "let their imaginations run wild" and share stories through creative writing.

More than 1100 entries were received between the three councils this year – 446 of those from Alexandrina – with winners announced at a celebration at Yankalilla Library on September 11.

The overall winner for Alexandrina was Buffy Hamer Dal Pont, who was also this year's year 5 and 7 category champion, for her short story on a girl who runs away from the war and meets a pelican.

Buffy entered the competition after being informed about it by the local librarian.

"I was at the library and I was talking to the librarian and she told me about it, so I decided to enter," she said.

"It's about a girl who runs away from the war, and she comes to a lake and she meets a pelican. "In the end, she turns into a pelican.

"I was sitting at the lake and a pelican flew past me, and (the idea) just popped into my head."

Buffy was surprised to win.

She hoped to pursue writing in the future. Other winners of the challenge included Mount Compass Area School's Amaya Baker (reception to year 2), Tyndale Christian School's Tallan Pingel (year 3 to 4) and Shiloh McKenzie (special options), and home-schooled Jonathon Green (year 8 to 10)

Individual category winners receive a \$50 book voucher, while the overall winner from each council is given an additional \$50 book voucher and \$1000 towards their school.

In the case of a home-schooled student winning, they will be invited to select up to \$1000 worth of books or library resources for their local council library.

In presenting the awards, the mayors

In presenting the awards, the mayors from each council praised the children who took up the challenge and demonstrated their creative writing skills.

They also thanked the three public libraries for their co-ordination of the challenge, and principals, teacher-librarians, teachers and student service officers who played a key role in encouraging their students to enter and showcase their talents.

## 'Future living' discussed for Alexandrina Council

Both interested and concerned community members 'dropped in' to an open information session at Strathalbyn's St Andrew's Hall last Wednesday to hear more about the proposed Future Living Code Amendment.

The proposed Code Amendment stems from the Co-housing for Ageing Well Project – a collaboration between the University of South Australia, Office for Ageing Well, State Planning Commission, and Eastern Region Alliance of councils.

It aims to introduce a new form of colocated housing to allow more homes to be built in established suburbs without impacting the existing character, heritage and streetscape of them.

It intends to do this by creating low-rise and small-scale housing, and encouraging the use of intelligent design and adaptive re-use to modify original houses and preserve the existing trees, mature gardens and established streetscape.

Co-located housing is anticipated to appeal to a range of demographics, including older people wishing to downsize in their own community, extended families wanting to live in close proximity or young people looking for affordable, sustainable housing options.

fordable, sustainable nousing options. This was proven at the Strathalbyn drop-in information session held at St Andrew's Hall last Wednesday.

Almost 20 people passed through to hear about what the Code Amendment entails and how it impacts the local community, and ask questions from Alexandrina Council staff.

"Although attendees were generally supportive of the co-located housing model, there were some concerns that the policy criteria may need further attention in terms of design," Acting Chief Executive Officer, Tash Hunt, said.

"Additional community engagement activities are being held during the consultation period, which include online sessions, and community dropin sessions at other affected councils."

Public consultation closes at 5pm on November 7.

After the consultation period, submissions will be reviewed and the State Planning Commission will prepare an engagement report.

The minister will then make his determination, and if approved, it will be referred to the Environment Resources and Development Committee of Parliament.

## Bumper numbers, but not everyone can play

The Strathalbyn and District Basketball Association (SDBA) has more than 400 players registered to play this season, but the ongoing limited court space and facilities has meant about 40 people – half under 10-years-old – have had to go on a waiting list.

As previously reported in *The Southern Argus*, the association has long-been calling for a new, multi-court sporting facility due to outgrowing its current stadium.

The 400 players spread across 51 teams demonstrates the extreme interest in the sport, but the wait list highlights the crippling impact of insufficient community infrastructure.

"As we have seen over previous years, demand for basketball in Strathalbyn has continued to surge," SDBA committee member, Chris Clark, said.

"Once again, we experienced high demand across all grades.

"As a result of this demand and the limited court space available, we regrettably had to close our Expressions of Interest earlier than expected, creating a player wait list across all grades.

"It is particularly disappointing to have had to place a number of Under 10s on a wait list

"Due to our limited court space we are unable to provide adequate time slots at appropriate times of the day to fulfill the player demand, (and) our training opportunities are also very limited."

Strathalbyn mum Sally Smith, who has one child able to play and one on the waiting list, said the situation was "frustrating".

"It is frustrating and it is really sad that there is just not enough space for everyone to have the opportunity to play, especially the young kids," Mrs Smith said.

"You want to get them into sport and doing things and it is definitely hard.

"With the younger kids there is not as many sports you want your kids to play, but basketball is brilliant.

"It is such a supportive club and it is testament to them that it is so popular because it is a really inclusive space to bring your kids and to play, so it is nothing against them that there isn't space, they can only do so much with what they have and what we have isn't enough."

The association believed that everyone should have the opportunity to play, and to say no was "incredibly difficult" and "truly saddens them".

"We are very aware our club is a community club in a growing community experiencing growth and demand, daily," Mr Clark said.

"Our volunteers face difficult decisions as we work with what we have, as efficiently as we can.

"We continue to raise the issue of court and facility availability with the local council and politicians as it really is unacceptable for a growing community like ours.

"We would also encourage you if you're out and about to raise the issue with our decision-makers (as) it's the only way we will get this issue addressed."

The association continues to work on solutions to provide a brighter, more sustainable future for the club and its facilities for the future of basketball in Strathalbyn and surrounding communities.

"These solutions are taking much longer than we had hoped, but know we are doing all we can to try and increase facilities in our local area, as it really is unacceptable to have to tell people they cannot play local sport," Mr Clark said.

"We thank you for your understanding and commit to doing all we can to give as many people as we can the opportunity to take part in basketball in Strathalbyn."

Meanwhile, Member for Mayo Rebekha Sharkie promised to continue advocating for a solution.

"It is so sad to hear people, particularly children, are being turned away from sport simply because there is no room," Ms Sharkie said.

"We must do everything possible to ensure every child keen to try basketball can be accommodated.

"We really need to make a new stadium a priority for Strathalbyn... State and Local Governments cannot keep allowing our towns to grow exponentially without provisions for the social infrastructure needed to support a larger population.

"I am keen to work with the council and State Government on a solution and will do my bit to advocate for Federal Government funds to assist the project."



### Free CPD training on recognising and responding to sexual violence

Monash University's Department of Forensic Medicine (DFM) and consortia partner the Victorian Institute of Forensic Medicine (VIFM) have developed a threeunit course for health practitioners in recognising and responding to sexual violence, which will come to Mount Barker in November.

According to the Australian Bureau of Statistics, an estimated 2.2 million women aged 18 years and over have experienced sexual violence since the age of 15.

Many victims/survivors suffer in silence without access to the support they deserve.

Those that do disclose to a health professional need to be treated with care, understanding, and provided with informative resources.

Funded by the Commonwealth Department of Social Services as an initiative under the National Plan to End Violence Against Women and Children 2022-2032, the university's course equips healthcare workers with vital skills through a patient-centred and practical curriculum.

Addressing a gap in healthcare training, the course takes participants on a deep dive into the drivers and effects of sexual violence and responding to adult disclosures and at-risk patients.

The three-unit course educates healthcare professionals to:

- Determine indicators of sexual violence and assess patient risk.
- Understand drivers and the short and long-term impacts on individuals and the community.
- Respond to sexual violence in adults through patient consultation, medical

care, documentation, and referrals.

- Construct trauma-informed patient management plan for patients who disclose sexual violence.
- Respond to sexual violence in patients who are known to be at a higher risk of experiencing sexual violence.

Accessible to all APHRA-registered healthcare professionals across Australia, the course is delivered at no cost to participants and via either online or face-to-face delivery modes.

DFM will be delivering a number of in-person one-day intensive units nationally, with a focus on more regional and remote locations where patients are at higher risk of experiencing sexual violence, and support services are more limited, which ultimately places more responsibility on clinicians responding to patients.

DFM are delivering Unit 2 and Unit 3 face-to-face training in regional South Australia in November at Gawler on November 11 and 12, and Mount Barker on November 14 and 15.

## **Post returns to Callington**

Callington residents have given their stamp of approval to the news that Australia Post services returned to the town this week.

Callington General Store previously sorted the town's mail for a population that just exceeds 600, before the service changed about six months ago when it was sent to Murray Bridge, then Kanmantoo.

The shop subsequently closed.

Some older residents without driving licences, or parents of young children, were reportedly forced to rideshare with others for the 14km round trip to collect their mail.

Others limited their mail collection to once

Local Carole Horne delivered a package of good news to the community when she came out of retirement and resurrected the store weeks ago with support from her husband Simon, with a mail service

starting on Monday.

"Somebody needed to put their hand up the town needed a general store," she said.

"They wanted their mail back but - if they needed milk for breakfast in the morning they didn't want to have to pile all the kids into the car and drive 20km just for milk."

Simon has also received positive feedback from community members.

"Now the mail is back, hopefully it will improve everybody's' lives - they won't have to worry about hitching a ride to Kanmantoo," he said.

"The people have been great."

The couple have a passion for the community after volunteering in town for more than 20 years and having their children play sport in the area.

That love has been reciprocal as local residents supported the couple in refurbishing the space by donating time and materials.

Future plans for the store include returning petrol and gas offerings.

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
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## Fatal crash at Hayborough

A Davoren Park woman lost her life after a van crashed into a tree at Hayborough on Sunday.

Just after 4.30pm, police and other emergency services were called to the intersection of Ocean Road and Port Elliot Road after a Toyota van hit a tree.

A 59-year-old Davoren Park woman, who was a wheelchair passenger in the van, sadly died.

The woman's death is the 60th life lost on

SA roads this year.

The driver, a 20-year-old Northfield woman, and front passenger a 30-year-old Croydon Park woman, were both taken to hospital for treatment of non-life-threatening injuries.

The southern end of Ocean Road was closed as police and Major Crash Investigators examined the circumstances surrounding the crash.

Major Crash Investigators arrested the driver on Monday, and charged her with

causing death by careless use of a motor vehicle and causing injury by careless use of a motor vehicle.

She was granted police bail to appear at Christies Beach Magistrates Court on November 15, and issued an instant loss of licence for an indefinite period of time.

## SA to introduce toughest laws

South Australia will have the toughest penalties of any state or territory in the nation against the sale of illegal vapes and tobacco under sweeping new proposed laws introduced to State Parliament.

In the latest step in the State Government's crackdown on the illicit vape and tobacco market and the criminals targeting children, the legislation will significantly toughen controls and penalties relating to the sale and use of vapes and tobacco products in SA.

This new state legislation will bring SA in line with tough new national laws which ban retail supply of vapes or e-cigarettes, going one step further by banning supply of e-cigarettes to minors even by prescription.

The legislation also includes:

- An increase in penalties up to \$1.5 million for some breaches.
- A ban on vending machine sales of tobacco products in public areas.
- A ban on supply of therapeutic
- e-cigarettes or vapes to any person under 18.

   New authority to ban novel products which are marketed as an alternative to
- which are marketed as an alternative to e-cigarettes, including nicotine pouches.
- Creation of a five-metre buffer zone around smoke-free areas at covered public transport areas, complementing smokefree and vape-free areas near schools, childcare centres, hospitals, beaches and shopping centres.
- Authorising controlled purchase operations to enable effective surveillance of sales to minors.

Among the changes to penalties for body corporates are:

- Advertising tobacco products an increase from \$10,000 to \$750,000 for a first offence or \$1.1 million for subsequent offences.
- Selling without a licence an increase from \$20,000 to \$750,000 for a first offence or \$1.1 million for subsequent offences
- Sales to a minor up to \$1 million for a first offence and \$1.5 million for subsequent offences up from \$20,000 and \$40,000.
- Sales of illicit tobacco or possession for the purpose of sale an increase from \$50,000 to \$750,000 for a first offence or \$1.1 million for subsequent offences.
- New offences for the sale or possession for the purpose of sale of e-cigarettes or other prohibited products up to \$750,000 for the first offence and \$1.1 million for subsequent offences.



A Murray Bridge man charged with child exploitation offences allegedly blames the behaviour on pornography, which he started watching from a young age.

Troy Lang, aged 25, appeared in the District Court last Tuesday after pleading guilty to seven child sexual offences, including three counts of disseminating child exploitation material and charges of producing child exploitation material, aggravated making a child amenable

to sexual activity, and hosting a website dealing with child exploitation material.

It follows his arrest in January this year after a tip-off from Queensland Police Service's Taskforce Argos.

Defence counsel for Mr Lang claimed he had been corrupted by pornography, leading to "amorous sexual behaviours" as an adult.

Judge Michelle Sutcliffe ordered Mr Lang a home detention report and remanded him in custody until November.

The incident took less than an hour.

## Latest FFU grants awarded

More than 200 farmers and landowners, including 11 from the Alexandrina Council region, will receive support to purchase essential firefighting equipment ahead of the bushfire season to keep South Australian communities safe.

The \$2 million four-year program – reinstated by the State Government – helps landowners safely respond to fires starting on farms using better equipped Farm Firefighting Units (FFUs), which often arrive first on scene and whose operators provide vital local knowledge to the Country Fire Service (CFS).

The third round of FFU grants includes 205 successful applicants – 147 of them new – to fund 262 individual pieces of equipment, including 43 UHF/CB radios, 26 pieces of personal protective clothing and 18 first-aid kits.

Successful applicants will be reimbursed between \$200 to \$3000 (GST inclusive) through the Regional Capability Community Fund (RCCF), with those awarded funding encouraged to buy from their region to boost the local economy.

"Supporting farmers and landowners to purchase the firefighting equipment they need helps keep lives, property and livelihoods safe," Emergency Services Minister, Dan Cregan, said.

"Farm firefighting units are an important component of the state's fire emergency response, and this program ensures those on the fireground are properly resourced.

"Strong uptake for the third year running shows widespread demand, and funding awarded will secure vital equipment in time for the bushfire season."



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## Harsh penalties for animal abuse introduced in State Parliament

Tougher penalties for people who abuse and neglect animals are a step closer after the State Government introduced a bill to amend the Animal Welfare Act in State Parliament this month

The bill includes fines of up to \$250,000 or 10 years jail for people who mistreat animals, while new penalties will be a significant increase on the current maximum fine of \$50,000 or four years in jail for the aggravated ill-treatment of an animal.

It follows community extensive consultation, which showed eight out of 10 respondents backed a new proactive 'duty of care' provision that requires owners to provide animals with a minimum level of care such as adequate food and water, allowing authorities to address neglect before an animal is harmed.

This means RSPCA SA can talk to owners about better looking after their animals without having to wait for the animal to be harmed or having to lay cruelty charges.

The definition of an animal will also be updated to include fish, bringing South

Australia in line with the rest of the nation.
"Whether you have pets at home, work with animals or simply appreciate our unique

with animals or simply appreciate our unique and vibrant native species – animal welfare is a subject that many of us care about," Deputy Premier, Susan Close, said.

"The Act was last updated in 2008, so this bill is about ensuring animal welfare laws, and the penalties for breaching them better reflect modern practices and community expectations.

"It was also pleasing to see the proposed reforms receive such strong support from the community via the public consultation process.

"People who deliberately mistreat animals deserve to face serious consequences.

"We want to establish a strong deterrent, and I'm confident these changes will play an important role in reducing incidents of animal cruelty in our state."

The amendments also include mandatory reporting of suspected animal welfare offences within the greyhound racing industry, and improved regulation and oversight of animal research.

## Strathalbyn aged care residents experience a blast from the past

Local aged care residents on High Street had a wheely good time watching a procession of classic cars drive through the facility on September 11 as part of a special treat organised by the Gilbert's Motor Museum.

About 14 cars, one bike and one motorcycle formed the procession for the Strathalbyn and District Aged Care, with volunteers parking the vehicles in the driveway in groups of two or three for about five minutes, so residents could see them up-close and talk with the drivers before they headed back to the museum

It was organised after social worker Belinda Oswald approached the museum in June about 'bringing the cars' to the residents.

"It was hoped that the experience of seeing the older cars would trigger memories of their younger days and add some colour to their day," Museum volunteer, Grant Chandler, said.

"Unfortunately, the initial date we had planned was delayed due to a flu and COVID outbreak, so when we revisited the plan with Belinda, we decided to provide an initial 'virtual' tour of the museum – where a small group of us took a few bicycles and a motorcycle to the residents, and gave them a small talk about the museum and its history, whilst a slideshow of museum photographs was playing in the background."

Residents then got the real deal earlier

The cars that participated included a MG TF, Riley Special, Jaguar E Type, Triumph TR2, Holden EH, Holden HK, 'Red' sports car, 1938 Buick, 1950s Jaguar saloon, 1980s Rolls Royce, 1924 Buick, 1919 Model T Ford

and a 1926 Rugby Tourer.

One of the highlights was having motor racing legend Glen Dix wave each group of cars off with his flag.

"Following the success of the 'virtual' tour, the enthusiasm among the museum volunteers to make the parade an even bigger success grew," Mr Chandler said.

"Glen Dix was thrilled to be able to display his famous flag waving talents again.

"Glen greeted the residents and gave them a flag waving display before the other vehicles arrived in groups of two or three cars.

"Each owner then gave a small talk about their particular vehicle and answered any questions that the residents may have had before the next group of cars arrived.

"The parade ran for about 30 minutes before the last half a dozen cars remained parked in front of the residence, so the residents could spend some time having a closer look at the cars, and chat with the owners/volunteers and have their photos taken."

Museum volunteers were happy they could brighten the residents' day.

"The parade appeared to be a big hit with the residents and staff," Mr Chandler said.

"The museum volunteers were warmed by seeing the smiles they were able to put on the residents' faces and Glen Dix was very humbled by the reception he was given.

"I personally was happy to put in the effort to make the day possible because I thought that if my dad or mum was a resident and their day could be made a little brighter, then I hope that somebody else would make that effort too if they were in my position to be able to.

"It was a very rewarding experience and is a reflection on the whole Gilbert's Motor Museum team."

### Strathalbyn local takes one step forward for mental health

Tikarma McPherson has battled mental health problems since a teenager, but now the Strathalbyn local has joined the Black Dog Institute's One Step Forward challenge to help those going through similar journeys.

The One Step Forward campaign runs across October – which is Mental Health Awareness Month – with participants walking, running or rolling a distance that suits them throughout the month while raising money.

Mrs McPherson has decided to run 6.4km every four hours for 48 hours on October 5 and 6, setting a goal to raise \$1000.

"I live with mental illness myself, as I have Bipolar Two disorder," she said.

"So, I am well-aware of the challenges that a lot of people face, and I have also had suicide in my family.

"It is just an issue that I am very aware of, and very aware that we need to raise more awareness of, particularly in rural and remote area where mental health services are not always meeting the needs of people in the community."

Mrs McPherson said training for the challenge was going well.

"I am training every day," she said.

"The end of the week is a very big run,



and during the week it is shorter – about 12kms a day – along with some resistance training as well."

In Australia one in five people will experience mental illness each year, with nine people a day taking their own lives.

Despite the statistics, only 50 per cent of people living with a mental illness will seek professional help.

"I have had my mental health problems

ever since I was a teenager – roughly from around 13 – back in the time when kids and mental health problems really didn't go together," Mrs McPherson said.

"They didn't really understand children and mental illness, so I spent a lot of time in and out of hospital.

"I have had a range of diagnoses and issues until I was finally diagnosed with the Bipolar Two disorder.

"I have had a range of psychiatrists, and now I actively see a psychologist regularly, and have medication that I take regularly, and a whole management plan around how well I am doing, or how well I am not doing.

"We work at the things that do work for me to know when it is time to call for help or when it is time for me to step back from work a little bit."

Mrs McPherson has found running to be a big help in keeping her on an even keel.

"Part of my plan back to mental health was about five years ago, and why I took up running," she said.

"It had always been something I wanted to do and was very bad at, but it seemed like a good thing to at least seriously try and get good at it.

"It took a long time before I could run properly, but once I reached the point that I was running 8km consistently, I got bitten by the running bug I suppose, and have just kept at it ever since."

The Black Dog Institute is providing participants in the One Foot Forward campaign with plenty of support, including a virtual check-in where people can meet up virtually online to talk and get support, and ideas for events and fundraisers they are organising.

Mrs McPherson has already raised \$573 of her goal of \$1000, and those who would like to help can go to the Black Dog Institute website.

In 1986 Paul Kemmis left school in England with no idea what he was going to do with his life. Now the acclaimed local picture framer is

Now the acclaimed local picture framer is celebrating 20 years with his Strathalbyn business K Frame Strathalbyn Picture Framing – framing just about anything.

"I had a careers counsellor at the time and he said 'Would you like to go and have a look at framing pictures', and as a 16-year-old kid I was kind of like, 'what is framing pictures', as we did art at school but they didn't tell us about what happens to art afterwards," Mr Kemmis said.

He landed an apprenticeship with the company First Floor Gallery, where he also did graphic design work two days a week for First Floor Graphics.

At 18 he added interior design to his skillset, which helped his framing skills.

"In 1996 in Britain the Printmakers Association was looking at how to vet people so that they had a vested interest in the preservation of various aspects of art and photography and printing, so they set an examination to try to find picture framers within businesses that actually had a vested interest in the art they were dealing with," Mr Kemmis said.

"I was the 61st person in the country to take the examination, which gave me the title of Guild Commended Framer."

He left First Floor Gallery in 1999 as an associate partner – before walking off a plane and into a job in Norwood. Australia at an art gallery

in Norwood, Australia at an art gallery.
In 2004, after a couple of other jobs, he turned his attention to Strathalbyn, and his own business.

"I actually went around town in Strath in 2004 and I knocked on people's doors, and I said 'these are three business ideas I have got, do you think there is a market for any of these three things in Strathalbyn at this time?"," Mr Kemmis said.

"I think it was 70 per cent, 30 per cent in favour of what I wanted, so I thought, there are artists in this town, and there are people with a creative mind.

"The nearest place they could go to would be Mount Barker, and at that time, Murray Bridge or Victor Harbor, so I decided that I would put the skills that I have back into practice."

Before too long the idea paid off.

"I frame everything from photographs, to people's soccer shirts, to footy shirts, to just recently, for the Whittam family, a steering wheel of the father's first truck," he said.

"Just recently a customer picked up her ballet shoes I had framed – ballet shoes she had when she was six and ballet shoes she had when she was 16.

"Memorabilia is a big part of my business because a lot of people keep memorabilia in boxes, they never show them.

"I did a Chopper Read axe, that was interesting, but it didn't feel good... I have framed original Heysens',

works of art that exceed \$200,000."

Some of the framing has been quirky.

"I did frame a telephone for a lady once," Mr Kemmis said.

"It was a wall mounted telephone and she didn't like the look of a telephone, so she had me make her a box with a hinged lid, and in the face of the lid was a Monet picture, so the idea was when the phone rang she had to open the hinge of the lid of the box to answer the phone, but when she didn't use the phone, it was just a picture of Monet's on the board."

Mr Kemmis is passionate about attention to detail

for each of his projects.

"To this day, 38 years later, I treat every single job as unique and individual, as everything is interesting for its own reasons," he said.

"It could be watercolours one day, it could be photographs the next day, it could be a print from somewhere in Greece the next day, it could be textile work, it could be 3D art, or a First Nations canvas, or a local artist.

"My mentor when I was 16 was a really good man, and he taught me some very, very valuable life lessons, and one of them was that you have to stand by your morals and principles.

"So, I go to sleep at night knowing that I have done everything I can to make sure each person is happy.

"I would rather see somebody get something that I am happy with and that they love, rather than worry about the bottom line of how much money it costs."

Each job can take from 10 days to three weeks, but Mr Kemmis leaves room for "emergency" creations. After 20 years in business in Strathalbyn he lists his highlights as receiving tears and hugs for his work,

but also just reaching the 20-year milestone.
"I started this business to run the distance in the hope that the quality of my work would be the salesman of my business," he said.

"So, the highlight has been reaching 20 years and still being busy, because that is a credit to my work, what else could I ask for?

"I honestly think it is good for people to read that they can have an idea for a business, and whether they project the ideas far into the future or not... if they are realistic about it they can be here in 20 years and that longevity is very rewarding."

To mark his 20 years Mr Kemmis plans to donate 10 per cent of his November/December sales to The Smith Family.

"I see a lot of businesses get new cars, I don't see them make charitable donations, and this time of the year, heading into Christmas, there are a lot of kids that go without," he said. "Adults, their circumstances aren't always the

"Adults, their circumstances aren't always the best, but kids don't get a choice, they are forced into situations, so I thought, this is my 20th year, I am going to do it."

# Balco \$15m expansion to benefit local hay growers

Balco Australia has announced plans for a new \$15 million hay processing plant at Monarto South, which could open the opportunity for locals to grow export hay for the business.

The oaten hay exporter announced the plans last week.

"At this stage, we have just purchased a block of land that is about 157 hectares, and we have a view to build a new processing plant," Balco Australia Chief Executive Officer Rob Lawson told *The Southern Argus*.

"It will be over the next two years, but we will have storage sheds and contracting hay from the South East region from next year, (with the sheds) to be built before hay season next year.

"We probably will not have the pressing plant there until the following year, so that is over the two-year build.

"The sheds will be large enough to hold 10,000 tonnes of hay in each shed, and we will probably build two of those, so they will be in the order of 160m by 60m, and about nine metres high."

The company hopes to build up to

processing about 100,000 tonnes of hay a year at the site over a four to five-year period.

The site of the plant is in Monarto South near where Australian Portable Campsites is located.

"It is a great way to capture people from the South East to bring product to us, and it also has excellent access to the highway," Mr Lawson said.

"And being on the rail corridor, it will give us the option to look towards putting things on the rail to go to the Port of Adelaide, and possibly the Port of Melbourne."

Balco Australia's traditional markets include Japan, South Korea, Taiwan and China, while also selling some product into the Middle East and a small amount to Vietnam.

Mr Lawson said the company expects some growth opportunities in both the Middle East and China.

He also expects the new development to employ between 20 to 25 workers.

Balco Australia has sites in Raywood, Victoria, just out of Bendigo, Brookton in WA about 130km east of Perth, and Bowmans, 100km north of Adelaide.

"This new one will give us the opportunity to be south of Adelaide, so that geographical spread helps us to spread our risks," Mr Lawson added.

"But also gives growers in different regions the opportunity to grow some export hay."



## An honour decades in the making

In 1995 Goolwa Lion Tony Siciliano completed building a gazebo on the shores of a man-made lagoon at Goolwa's Murray Smith Park.

On Friday, September 13, he was finally recognised for his efforts with a plaque and ceremony at the site.

Goolwa Lions President Tony Snelson said it was time for Mr Siciliano to be officially awarded for his work.

"This site was first developed in the early 1980s, and this was a concept by the Lions for enhancing the area so the community could get the most out of it," Mr Snelson said.

"Tony has been a member for 30 years – he was a carpenter when he came and did this. "Obviously, there was help with moving stuff here and carrying stuff around, but most of the carpentry work he did himself.

"There was no power here at the time, so it was done in the traditional way with hand tools, and he erected most of it.

"The Lions were honoured by having a sign nearby that recognised the work that the Lions had done (in general), but being given this to recognise Tony personally for his efforts, he is very proud."

Alexandrina Mayor Keith Parkes was on hand for the ceremony – one he was happy to do.

"Tony did this without power tools and things like that – he just worked away and did it," he said.

"It has taken a long time to get proper recognition for what he has actually done, and he really deserves it.

"It is not a little project, it is a big project, and to do that all by himself on behalf of Lions and the community, I am really pleased we have got to the stage where we have got a plaque and he has been recognised for what he has done."

Mr Siciliano, who brought family members with him for the ceremony, was "very proud" to be acknowledged for his work.

"I am very proud, and I only had to wait 29 years," Mr Siciliano said.

"It was my first year as a Lion... that is when I started working on this."

when I started working on this."

He was also proud just to be a Lions member.

"Whatever we do, we don't do for self, we do it to raise money and help the people, and that is the reward we get," Mr Siciliano said.

"That is why everybody is happy to do it.

"Any chance to raise money, we do all the

time, and we never knock anything back, especially today when so many people need help, it is terrible."

A local Lions Club is looking forward to continuing to service the Goolwa community and visitors at its new shed after finally receiving their lease from Alexandrina Council.

The Goolwa Oval grounds recently underwent a significant redevelopment, and its new facilities were officially opened to the public in June.

As part of the redevelopment, discussions have been ongoing between council and the user groups, including the Lions Club of Goolwa, on the most appropriate forms of tenure, and after much consideration, the club has asked for a separate lease over an exclusive portion of the grounds not occupied by the other users, which has been supported by the newly formed Goolwa Recreation Grounds Management Committee.

The new lease area is proposed to be the footprint of the Goolwa Lions Book Den building, inclusive of the agreed adjacent surface and garden areas only.

Another initiative is a Youth Arts Participation program run via awards such as the David Dridan Award.

Mr Butler said the biggest growing area of homelessness locally is single women aged 60 or more, along with coach surfing youth and domestic violence victims.

The foundation provides \$30,000 to help close the gap in services for







## Why is there an Encumbrance on my property?

Firstly, we need to understand what an Land Title with each settlement ("lift Encumbrance is.

An Encumbrance imposes one or more restrictions on a landowner's ability to use their land.

Encumbrances can restrict how you use your land.

If you are looking at buying land in a new residential subdivision - this is where you will often find an encumbrance that has been put in place by the developer of the subdivision.

#### Why do Encumbrances exist and why is there one on my property?

Quite often an Encumbrance is put in place with the aim of maintaining uniformity in a development, and the Encumbrance is applied to every property in the development or subdivision.

These are often seen as a benefit because they prevent certain types of development and require the use of certain building materials and colours etc.

Some Encumbrances are registered on the Land Title by the first purchaser team are experienced in all areas and remain for all subsequent transfers of Conveyancing and can answer to purchasers ("subject to").

Others must be removed from the Encumbrances on titles and properties.

#### **Deed of Covenant**

The transfer of property is subject to the Encumbrance.

The Deed binds the purchaser to the terms of the encumbrance already registered on the title.

A Deed of Covenant is a legal document that states the purchaser agrees to undertake an obligation (or series of obligations) that are laid out in the document.



### **Tourist cabins** proposed for **Mount Compass**

#### By Giorgina McKay

Two new accommodation cabins proposed to be built at Mount Compass are expected to bring tourists to the town who will likely visit local wineries and cellar doors, and support the region's economy, if supported by residents.

A development application was recently lodged by land owner Rajender Dhillion to construct two tourist accommodation units with a new driveway, car parking and Country Fire Service (CFS) turnaround at his 11.4-hectare Cleland Gully Road property.

Located on the eastern end of the site, the cabins, comprising of one bedroom, living area, bathroom and open deck area, and made of board and batten cladding with aluminium glass windows, will be small in size and discreet, and harmonise with the landscape.

They will be raised 800-millimetres above the ground to resolve any potential flood risks and serviced with existing driveways and landscaping comprised of native trees and shrubs.

The CFS turn-around will be positioned in front of the second cabin, and have a 22,000-litre fire tank that can be used in a bushfire event.

The development is estimated to cost \$450,000 and expected to increase local tourism.

"The proposal consists of small-scale tourist cabins that are to be discreetly sited on the land to not impede on the primary production potential of it, nor on the amenity enjoyed on neighbouring properties," Adelaide Planning and Development Solutions Director and Principal Urban Planner, Mark Kwiatkowski, said.

"The cabins are appropriately designed to harmonise with the rural landscape, and will be supported with landscaping and driveways that work with the natural topography.

"The cabins are well-separated from neighbouring sensitive receivers.

"Although it is unlikely noise to any noticeable degree would be generated by visitors to the cabins, having separation to neighbouring dwellings ensures there will be no disruption to the amenity of the locality.

"Access to the cabins is also away from neighbouring dwellings, so vehicle movements to and from the cabins will also not disturb the amenity."

Public consultation closed on Thursday, September 19.

It now awaits assessment.

Strathalbyn represented at racing industry awards

Strathalbyn's trackside talent was on show at the recent South Australian Racing Industry Awards.

Racing SA held its night of nights – the Sportsbet Industry Awards – at Morphettville's Wolf Blass Event Centre in early September, which honours the premiership winning jockeys and trainers, and hard work and dedication of stable staff.

Among the night's winners was Strathalbyn's own Kirra Reynolds, who took home Trackwork Rider of the Year.

Reynolds has always been surrounded by horses, first through participation in pony club and showjumping, then as a stable hand, and finally a trackwork rider.

She started in track work in 2019, but didn't come to Strathalbyn until the start of last year.

"It was always something I wanted to do but never really found anyone that was willing to take me on, and put all the time and effort in," Reynolds said. "Then I found a really good

"Then I found a really good community here, and they've taken me under their wing, taught me a lot, and it's been very good."

Reynolds currently works with about 30 horses in total that rotate through the track every morning.

It means early morning starts, but an opportunity to work with a variety of personalities.

"At a time, it's usually 15 in the morning, and they swap and change," Reynolds explained.

"Usually, I'm up at 3.30 in the morning then I've got my own horses and animals, so I get them all sorted, then Strath racetrack, I start there at quarter-to-five in the morning.

"They close at 9.30am usually, so it's getting as many horses worked as you can in that time frame.

"I'm lucky that I finish by 10 o'clock in the morning, then I've got the rest of the day to sort out my own animals again.

"It's a big challenge having to adjust to different personalities and different ways of going around, so I really like the challenge of having to work in with each of them."

Her work and dedication on the track



culminated into winning Trackwork Rider of the Year.

The award came as a "shock" to

Reynolds.
"I wasn't expecting it," she said.

"There were some really great candidates this year, and I think being a newcomer I assumed I wouldn't be up there with the rest of them, but they look at your dedication to the industry and positivity, and I think it's more about that

than what you can do. "So, I'm very lucky I've got some really great people behind me that have pushed me, and I like to think I've come pretty far in my short time of doing what I'm doing, but there's always more to learn."

The Strathalbyn rider was nominated by not just one but seven local trainers.

In an industry that lacks trackwork riders, Reynolds was amazed by the support.

"I was working for a bigger stable

initially that were putting me on five or six horses a morning, and they really helped me out to get started," she said. "Then I branched out, and started

"Then I branched out, and started freelancing and riding for a few other trainers and same thing – they just backed me.

"There's maybe an idea that there's not many horses going around at Strath, but they do get quite a lot put through there every morning.

"There are not enough riders for horses, so the few of us there are just getting as much done as we can while we're there.

"I think because there's not many riders we're all the more valued."

riders, we're all the more valued."

Reynolds wasn't the only local winner on the night.

Strathalbyn-based trainers Shane and Cassie Oxlade won the Festival Hire South Australian Champion Racehorse of the Year award for their horse Queman.

As previously reported in *The Southern Argus*, Queman won the Oakleigh Plate in February, becoming the first South Australian Group 1 winning horse in two-

and-a-half years.

The win was "great recognition" for the local father and daughter trainers.

"It's good recognition for the horse, for us as the trainers, and the owners," Shane said.

"We don't have the best training facilities in Strath – we have the bare minimum to work with – so we do what we can, so it's a big effort from a little horse.

"Once he was in the final three, I thought he probably should win.

"He's the only Group 1 winner among them, so he was fairly entitled to be there in the first place."

I have titled this article "A Cue Raise" because it illustrates the point of using Cue Raises. The Cue Bid occurred when North bid the same suit as West, who bid Clubs naturally. The Cue Bid is anything but a natural bid, and according with ABF Alerting Regulations, Cue Bids are regarded as Self-Alerting, along with Doubles and Re-doubles, so no need for partner to say anything, unless asked.

Used in conjunction with Bergen Raises, which are based on 4-card support for a 5-card Major, cue-bidding opponent's suit give us a device to show strong 3-card support for partner's opening 5-card Major suit. With a minimum 3-card support, you would normally bid 2 of the Major, but when opponents have slipped in a bid (as above, 2C), you can show 3-card support in a strong hand by cue-bidding 3C. You would not do this with a less strong hand: this one has 16 TP, so it fits the bill. It is good enough that, when Opener showed a minimum hand by bidding only 3H, you are safe in this case to bid Game. The double fit with Diamonds is an unexpected bonus.

It would not have been wrong to bid 4H immediately over the intervening 2C, but using the cue bid allowed South to show the suit was only a 5-card suit, and that in turn invited North to choose between a NT contract or 4H, so there was an extra opportunity created.

On the day this was played, there were 5 tables and only one pair found the 4H contract, which was a shame, considering the possibilities available, three pairs played in Diamonds for 11 tricks (only one reached 5D) and one pair other played in 2H, a serious underbid of the North hand, as it made 10 tricks but only scored 170 instead of 620. That is poor value when North had 16 Total Points opposite an opening bid.








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# 'Your community, your show': Strathalbyn ready to put on a Show

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





# Strathalbyn baker prepares to 'cook up' a storm at Show

Strathalbyn's Vaughan Wilson has always been a cook, and these days combines his love of cooking with judging some of regional South Australia's best at the state's multiple country shows.

"Growing up I used to go to the Royal Adelaide Show and look inside the cookery cabinets and think 'yep, I can do something like that', so when I moved up here as an adult, I went to the Strathalbyn Show and looked at some of those entries as well," Mr Wilson said.

some of those entries as well," Mr Wilson said.
"Then the following year, 1997, I found the local Show book which had the information on how to enter, and I thought I would give it a go to see how I go.

"That year I put in five things and got four firsts, which was rather surprising for someone who was a pure novice.

"As a child I did cookery at home – I even did a cookery class when I was in primary school – and for my 10th birthday I was given a cookbook from my grandmother, which I still have."

From 1997, until today Mr Wilson has lost track of how many blue ribbons he has won, not just at local show level, but at regionals and the Royal Adelaide Show.

He has won at state level with his rich fruit cake and genoa cake, along with Scottish shortbread.

"It is a very hard competition just to get in the final, and then to actually win it as well," Mr Wilson said.

"Most people who enter in cookery still do it because it is fun to do.

"We are not doing it for the money, we do it because we like it, and we will share recipes and things like that.

"Of course, we do have our little tricks that we try to improve, but it is good camaraderie to be part of the cookery section community, not just the Strathalbyn Show, but the other



shows as well."

After his initial success at the Strathalbyn Show Mr Wilson stepped up as a steward, convenor, and judge.

"You don't necessarily know why you have won something, so it is a really good learning experience to try and find out," he said.

"One of those ways how I learned basically

how to do good cookery was to become a steward.

"The judge does all the cutting and sampling and everything like that... but while the judge is judging, often they talk about what they are doing and why, so being a steward is actually a really good way to learn from a judge."

After being a steward for a couple of years

Mr Wilson stepped up to the convenor role. Taking the step up to judge was next.

"For a couple of years I went around to the various Shows with permission from the convenors and judges to just listen to the judges because every judge does judge a little differently in what they are looking for, so to learn from a variety of judges is one of the best ways to become your own judge," Mr Wilson said.

"Each judge could have a slightly different taste or preference, but the basics are still there for what you need, for example, for a good cake."

Mr Wilson now spends a lot of time judging across the state at the Royal Adelaide Show, as well as still competing in competitions he is not judging.

He is unsure if cooking shows such as Masterchef or My Kitchen Rules have helped the home cook.

"For some people it probably would, but a lot of what we try for with country shows is to have a go, as you will never learn how to do something unless you do give it a shot," Mr Wilson said.

"At show level it is very much encouragement to try to get people to re-enter the next year, and to give them some hints on what the judge is looking for.

"So, at Strathalbyn we have, for quite a few years, always done some open judging.

"While most of it is done when the hall is closed, we leave a few things that are done when the hall is already open, so the judge can actually talk to an audience about what he or she is looking for when judging it."
